





Why Dogs Howl at Music.

A dog doesn't howl at music a such, but at a medley of noises which are to him so discordant as actually to "set his teeth on edge."

What we call "music" is only, after all, a succession of sound waves so arranged that their vibrations strike our ears in harmonious rhythm. Our ears, we say; and yet all human ears are not fashioned on precisely the same lines.

Certain instruments, we know, will produce vibrations that strike the ears of some of us quite unmusically. The bagpipes, for instance, sound to many people as a collection of hideous discords. It isn't that the people who don't like bagpipes are not musical—they may enjoy, say, the piano or violin. It is only that their ears are not fashioned to pick up the bagpipe vibrations as a harmony, and so all they hear is a succession of noises, which, as we say, grate on

In the same way, the dog's ears are not attuned to the vibrations of our musical jastruments. He therefore hears no "music," but is only shaken by a series of noise-waves which set his nerves "all on edge."

"Playing Gooseberry."

This expression is really a contraction of "Playing Gooseberry Picker," a translation from one of the recognized French sayings which played so prominent a part in the conversation of our Early Victorian ancestors. Its meaning was, of course, obvious, The picker has to put up with all the pricks and stings of his unpleasant task in order that others may enjoy

the fruits of his toil. In the same way, the chaperon has to inconvenience herself for pleasures in which she has no part.

So apt was the comparison that the phrase lingered in England long after other common quotations had disappeared. Then we shortened it by the omission of the "Picker," leaving "Playing Gooseberry" as the recognized term for chaperonage.

Beaver Board.

Beaver in the beard sense has nothing to do with the animal beaver, but our worn in the Middle Ages.

United Holiness Meeting. SALVATION ARMY SERVICE

A service of a very impressive and spiring character was conducted by blonel Martin in the No. 2 Citadel alde Street at 11 a.m. yesterday; the three Corps united for the occas-ion. Colonel Martin is well known to St. John's audiences, having conducted a large number of public meetings during his four years' stay here and probably the best criterion of his popularity is that large crowds invering was no exception to the rule, the citadel being filled with a crowd of earnest seekers after the truths of the Gospel. Taking as his text Luke 22,31-32 the Colonel said in part: "This text reminds us that Christ is especially interested in every one of his followers and seeks to help them in every possible way. People seem to forget that the Divine Master is always near them, not to criticise and condemn, but to sympathise with and help. He understands our trailties and has unlimited patience with us in our mistakes and faffures. We also should remember that Satan is a very real enemy who desires to bring about our destruction and who will use all sorts of devices to accomplish his purpose. The text also intimates that the power of Satan is limited and that while we trust God and seek strength from Him to do right we shall be more than conquerors. This thought is borne out by the experiences of various holy men about whom we read in the Old Testament, such as Daniel, Job and others. The text also contains a definite command "strengthen my brethren." There is a tendency on the part of many professing Christians to think lightly of those who become converted and fall away again; this was not Our Lord's attitude towards Peter, nor is it His attitude towards any soul who honestly desires to do right, however many times they may fall. In conclusion the Colonel made a strong plea to those present to cultivate a feeling of sympathetic interest in each other so that by helping each other the spiritual life of the whole would be deepened and the Kingdom of God extended. It is impossible to give more than a bare outline of this splendid sermon which was full of hopeful thought and will no doubt prove an impetus to those who heard it to be more earnest than ever to their efforts to glorify God and bring blessing to others. During the meeting the Colonel made touching references to Sergt. Major Jonas Barter of No. 1 Corps, and several other comrades who are laid aside through sickness and asked the prayers of all Christians on their behalf. He also intimated that the revival campaign inaugurated a few weeks ago war still going strong and quite a number of penitents have been received to date.
