The Centre Riding Conservative Pow Wow.

The Conservatives of the Centre Riding are beginning to show signs of life again. They took their defeat last summer with a very bad grace, but time, while it has taken the sharp edge of their disappointment, has also again infused into them a little of the courage which they so lavishly displayed in fighting for a lost cause, and which immediately after their defeat seemed to have entirely deserted them. A few of the leading lights of the party held a meeting on Thursday in Elora, when a committee was appointed to consider how they could best advance the interests of the party in the Riding. This committee will meet in Fergus next week, and after profound consideration and due deliberation, will report the result at an adjourned meeting of the Association, to be held in Fergus on the 2nd of January. This is the substance of the report sent to their organ in Guelph, but some correspondent who has not been so reticent, has sent a communication to the Mail, to the effect that it was resolved at the meeting to contest Mr. Ross's election. This, then, we suppose is the great object which has brought these ardent Tories together, though it is very ungracious and ungrateful of them not to inform the Herald of it. All we have to say in the matter is, gentlemen go ahead with your protest. It will then give the Reformers an opportunity of showing up some of the means resorted to by Dr. Orton and his friends in order to gain votes. We can safely assure the Conservatives of the Riding that there will be a lively time in unearthing and bringing to light all the interesting details about the ways and means used by their candidate and his friends during the recent contest, and before the enquiry is over, we feel certain that they will wish they had never gone into it. However, that his business not ours, and we have no fear of the consequences. We would in the meanwhile offer a word of advice to the Reformers in the Riding. Their opponents are taking early and active steps to organize and agitate in view of any future contest. Let our Reform friends in the Riding not be behind in this matter. Let them also organize, so that they may be able to preserve a bold front to the enemy, to meet and answer the protest of Dr. Orton, if he is fool-hardy enough to go on with it, and to be prepared for any contingency which may arise.

Editorial Items.
There will probably be a reconstruction of the Cabinet before calling the House together. Sir John is said to feel that the character of the Opposition is such that something must be done towards meeting Parliament with an unbroken front. It is authoritatively announced that ex-Lieutenant-Governor Archibald, of Manitoba, and H. Bernard, Deputy Minister of Justice have been made companions of the order of St. Michael and St. George. It is also understood in official circles that Hon. Mr. Langevin, C. B., and Hon. B. Mitchell will shortly be placed on a par with their colleagues, Sir Francis Hincks and Sir George Cartier, in titular distinctions, and that they will be called to the rank of K. C. M. G.

The current report in Ottawa now is that Sir Francis Hincks has not resigned his place in the Cabinet, nor does he intend to do so. On the subject of his connection with the Government, he a few days ago stated in conversation that some people had an idea that to be a member of the Government was the next thing to reclining on a bed of roses, but that he heartily wished that he had respected his own feelings and kept out of it instead of yielding to the wishes of his friends; but now that he was in, and responsible with other members of the Government for its policy, he had to consider not simply how to get out, but how to get out with honour to himself and with a true regard for the interests of the country. The statement of which this is the substance and very nearly the precise words, was understood to mean that Sir Francis did not feel that the happy time had yet come when he could justify himself in retiring from the service of his country; that he meant to stick to the ship and go down with it if such should be its fate, which is very probable.

PROF. TYNDAL has just perfected a new respirator for firemen, in which the solid particles of the densest smoke are arrested by films of cotton well wetted with glycerine, and the most pungent gas by layers of charcoal. By this simple means firemen can remain within burning buildings for upwards of an hour at a time with safety and comfort, so far as their respiration is concerned.

Four.—T-day the market was largely supplied with pork; Messrs. Hutton & Co. bought 50 splendid hogs from Mr. J. S. Armstrong at \$5.60 the highest price yet reached; the average of hogs fetching, however, between \$4.75 and \$5.25, and the latter figure quite exceptional.

A little four year old son of Mr. Chas. Mann, Winterbourne, had two fingers of his right hand accidentally cut off on Tuesday, by coming in contact with the knives of a turpentine cutting machine while in motion.

Buried Alive in an Ottawa Cemetery. For some time past the work of removing the remains of the departed from the old Roman Catholic burying ground to the new cemetery, has been quietly going on, and nothing more than what might be expected under the circumstances occurred until the other day.

The sacred ashes had been reverently taken from their narrow beds and removed by the loving friends to the new city of the dead. Affecting incidents have naturally occurred, and some bordering on the revolting have been witnessed in the old cemetery. Recently buried bodies have been uncoffined that found eyes might gaze upon their features for a last time before covering them with the sod again. One such incident of a startling nature occurred lately in Ottawa. A gentleman who was engaged in removing the remains of some of his deceased relatives, was asked by an acquaintance, who was similarly engaged, to assist him in lifting a coffin from a grave. He did so, and the lid was taken off. To the horror of the small body of spectators who gathered around it, they discovered that the body (which was that of an uncle of the gentleman who was removing it) had been disturbed in the coffin. It was terribly contorted, as if the deceased had died in great agony. The face wore an expression of intense pain and horror, the arms were drawn up as far as the coffin would admit, and the head twisted round to the shoulders from which the flesh had apparently been gnawed by the struggling man. Startled by the horrid sight the spectators drew back from the coffin and looked speechlessly into each other's eyes. Not a word was spoken, but there was not a man present who did not feel that the deceased had been buried alive—probably while on a trance—and had awakened only to perish in his living tomb. The coffin was closed again and taken to the new cemetery where it was decently interred. Every precaution was taken to hush up the affair, but it has got abroad, and we now publish it without giving names.—Ottawa Citizen.

Manitoba has had its first cold spell. On the night of the 29th ult., the thermometer at Winnipeg registered 50 deg. below zero. Quite cold enough for all practical purposes.

The Air Line.—The Clitham *Banner* says:—The Great Western Air Line, from Gloucester to Buffalo, is now finished, so far as the tracklaying is concerned, and in a week or two regular trains will be run over it. The opening cannot take place until the spring, the traffic on the main line being so great that it is almost impossible to run trains enough to carry the freight offering. A few days ago, eighty-four trains were run over the line, without break or accident of any kind. On the opening of the Air Line a large proportion of the through freight will be sent by that route. Next season a double track will be laid from Gloucester to Windsor, making the Western, in reality, a "double track" road from one end to the other.

PROPOSED PRESBYTERIAN CEMETERY.—Among the fruits of the recent celebration of John Knox's ter-centenary is a proposal, which is becoming widely canvassed, that on as early a day as possible, and in such place as shall hereafter be agreed upon, there shall be held a grand general council of the Presbyterian churches throughout the world. The New York *Herald* is noticing the proposal as follows:—

"It is a most sensible suggestion, and one which cannot fail to meet with general acceptance. It is stated that Presbyterianism can boast of twenty thousand congregations and a population of thirty-four millions. Lutheran, and other kindred bodies included, the total swells to fifty-seven millions. Disunion has long been a disgrace to the Protestant section of Christendom. Such a council could hardly fail to have a healing and otherwise beneficial influence. Union in strength and beauty as well. We wish the project all manner of success. It would be one of the grandest ecclesiastical gatherings the world has ever known."
