There is no denying the fact that at present there is great depression in all that pertains to the commer-cial and industrial interests in the united States. This is partly at-tributabled to the unsettled condition of the finances, and the uncertainty with regard to the action of Congress on the currency question, but other forces have largely operated in bringing about the present state of business inactivity and depres-sion. Most of the leading papers on the other side of the lines unite in the opinion that this uztoward state of things springs from the reaction which inevitably follows overtrading and excessive speculation. Fevers are followed by prostration. It is in quietude that the patient recovers his strength. Dullness of business is the consequence of undue inactivity, and naturally succeeds the panic which inordinate speculation

At a meeting held in New York last week to consider the proposed action of Congress in increasing the volume of the currency, one of the speakers—a merchant of over thirty years' standing in New York—told his fellow traders some plain truths which in a sense are just as appli which in a sense are just as applicable to the people in Canada as in the States, and both would do well to take heed to his advice. He said:—"When the crash came, six months ago, the meaning of it was perfectly understood by everybody, and for a while it was taken for granted that the intelligence and integrity of the American people could be trusted to deal with it in an honest way. It was also confidently predicted that the year 1874 would be memorable in history as the dividing line between a long epoch of restless gambling and the gradual but sure return of solid prosperity throughout our whole country. Three months of the new year have passed away, and what now? Disappointment, distrust, and perplexity are visible on all sides, and in all our streets, save in the highways of Jay Gould and his followers. We are now about to readjust things. We have either to re-establish the fictitious values, to support the wild ventures, and reinforce the scandalous spirit of gambling which raged at its climax last year, by a new inflation of our currency, or we have to lay new foundations, and call upon the people of this country to go to work, that we may earn more than we spend, and save something for capital.
