The story of his capture is as follows:

The genuine bills are of the issue of March 31, 1898, which date also appears on the counterfeit bill. Stewart, who made the \$1 bills was arrested by Detective Forrest in Toronto on Nov 6. Three persons were taken into custody, and by the discovery of the machinery for the manufacture of the bills, complete evidence was established. Besides Stewart fiber were Anson Raymond, the proprietor of the Raymond hotel at 355 Wilton avenue, and Elizabeth Raymond, his wife. The man known as Stewart is 65 years of age, and although he refused to give any information about himself, it is known that the name is an alias, and the police claim to have a considerable knowledge of his previous history.

In connection with the non-union feature of the investigation, Mr. Mitchell announced that he is also representing thousands of non-union and that all the workmen would abide by the award of the arbitrators, "or get


