Chinese Charged With Crime Steamer Willapa Has Been Sold

Fuung Wong Accused of Attempting to Murder and Rob Look Den.

Di Lee Victim's Wife Is Alleged to Be an Accomplice.

Fuung Wong, the Chinese gambler of 37 Store street, has been charged with attempted murder and robbery of Look Den, who still lies in a precarious state at his residence on Store street, next door to that of the alleged assassin, whom Look Den says he saw bending over him with something that looked like a knife in his hand, after the first blow had awakened him from sleep.

The theory of the case as resulting in the arrests made is that the motive for the crime was the robbery of \$100, which Di Lee had hidden in the room of his friend, Fuung Wong, who was in the house, but it appears as if hatred against the Chinese gambler was the real motive.

These facts would certainly point to an attempt on the part of Fuung Wong, and when all facts are considered, the circumstantial evidence connected with the crime, and other facts, lead to the belief that the Chinese gambler was the perpetrator of the crime.

It was known only to her, it is understood, that the money was hidden in the corner of the bed, and that there was \$30 in the coat pocket hanging in the room. The Chinese gambler was secured, \$70 in all, beneath the corner of the bed, and after hiding it had made a return visit to Fuung Wong's living house that night.
