One of the most marked features of th present debate on the address is the extent to which the speaking has turned on the fraudulent character of the constitution of the dominion. All who have ever paid any attention to United States history will recall the great struggle over the question whether, and in what sense, the states which make up the union are "sovereign"
—a struggle which culminated in the war of secession, though it has not been terminated by it. Are we to have a simila era of interminable discussion in Canada The tone of the speaking on both sides o the assembly indicates that we are.

The direction in which the opposition are looking was foreshadowed by Mr. Meredith in his speech, and was still more clearly defined by Mr. Morris. The great idea with them is the "dominion" idea. The people of Ontario are citizens of the dominion first, and citizens of the province after wards. Come what may their allegiance to the dominion must stand firm, even if the province is wronged. The right to veto provincial legislation, as one of the most important symbols of dominion au thority, must be preserved as a precious feature of the constitution and almost the corner stone of the federal system.

On the other hand Mr. Mowat and Mu Pardee were equally clear in the line they took. With them the rights of the prov inces are, first of all, to be considered, and if the dominion infringes upon them, so much the worse for the dominion. A thread of denunciation of dominion agression runs through their speeches, and both took occasion to declare that the veto power must he abolished if the federal constitution is the speeches on opposite sides are ample proof that the rank and file on each are at Ottawa is to carry the address without dis-

The issue thus raised is not a mere the oretical one, nor does it necessarily imply that either party is disloyal to the domin ion.
