

But one day the plans for Niarinze's future were changed. Crampel received a commission to go to a part of Africa that no explorer had visited. No one knew what languages would be met, but the people probably understood Pahouin. Crampel needed a Pahouin interpreter. His mission political in its nature required celerity. In short, he represented France in the great race for Lake Tchad, in which France, Germany and England competed, though England alone recorded the goal. eached the goal.

Ill'luck and treachery involved the expedition in the most complete disaster that has ever befallen a peaceful African enterprise. When Crampel started northward from the Mabangi in January, 1891, he had 230 loads of merchandise and 78 porters. He was met at the outside by the impossibility of hiring men enough to carry his goods. All be could do was to instruct his four white assistants to move the goods northward as fast as possible, while he hurried on with twelve Senegal soldiers and forty porters in the hope of getting assistance to remove the remainder of his stores. He heard that in the north were Mohammedaus who could supply pack animals. These were the men who treacherously killed him. He had as a guide an Arab who had been released from a prison in Algeria to go with Crampel because he was familiar with a part of the country to be crossed. This traitor found means to send word to the Mohammedaus that Crampel was advancing in small force,

means to send word to the Mohammedans that Crampel was advancing in small force, and would fall an easy pray. With treachery in his camp, food very scarce, his little band of porters depleted every week by desertions, Crampel's situation grew more desperate and that was the position of affairs when in April last year irretrievable disaster over-

took the expedition.

Crampel, with Niarinze and the handful of men left to him, was among the Arabs El Kouti, in the southern part of Waidai. of El Kouti, in the southern part of waida. Biscarrat, with 25 porters and a part of the supplies, was about 100 miles south. Nesbout, with eight Senegalis, a few porters and some supplies was still further south. Messrs. Lauiere and Orsi, the other white members of the party, had died of fever. Crampel was received with the most friendly manifestations by the Mohammedans, who told him, however, that he must seek transportation further north. On the day that he renewed his journey came the beginning of the end.

A crowd of the apparently friendly Mohammedans suddenly overpowered and disarmed the Senegal soldiers. At the same moment another throng attacked Crampel and Mohammed-ben-Said, his arab interpreter, and stabbed them repeatedly with knives.
