

POPE LEO'S NEW MESSIAH

IT DESTROYS THE LAST HOPE OF FRENCH ROYALISTS.

This latest brief is even more decisive in its language than the former one. All Catholics are instructed to stand by the Republic and give it their unwavering support.

PARIS, May 11.—In explicit and direct terms the new brief of Leo XIII. to the French Cardinals leaves nothing to be desired. In it the Pope suggests that his brief published in February has been understood exactly in all quarters, and then proceeds to reiterate the fundamental principles then enunciated.

"There have been some different political parties, even sincere Christians, who have not understood accurately the meaning of this subject. Political changes are far from being always legitimate at first—it is even difficult that they should be legitimate, yet the supreme criterion of the common welfare and public tranquility should impress upon all governments."

"What is the conclusion from this if it is not that the question which concerns us is really in also a religious one? It is so, as it is connected with the fundamental principle of liberty of the church. Hence in our conduct towards nations we cannot subvert the same interests which the church appointed for the government of souls, a liberty which does not exist in the Vicar of Jesus Christ is not in his own home a true sovereign, independent of all human sovereignty."

"The brief is regarded as a fatal blow to the Royalists. Since the sending of the preceding brief of similar import they have not ceased to maintain that the Pope had no obligations upon the Catholic clergy to alter their attitude towards the republic."

"The clergy, they said, were still bound to serve the monarchy, and any other course would cross diametrically the spirit of the Pope's brief. To such a final answer, as well as to the subsequent refusal of the Archbishop and his fellow-ecclesiastics, who have declared practically that nobody is bound to obey laws of which he does not conscientiously approve."

"The Pope has sent a letter to the Archbishop of Paris ordering him to dissolve the Union of Christian France. This union was established last autumn and had as its object the promotion of the Republic. In reality it is said to spread monarchist propaganda. The French Government had requested the removal of the Archbishop, but the Vatican refused to grant the request."

"Editor World: I notice in your issue of this morning under the heading of 'Young Shoppers' reference is made to bogus telegrams. But another and more serious fraud is being carried on by a number of 'old sharps' on the other side of the Atlantic."

"I should like, Mr. Editor, if you would find time to do so, to see the columns of your paper if these men have any authority for doing this, or whether it is the authority of the City Commissioner, as their printed notices state. I can only advise you that the only thing which is only giving the worst sort of thieves free entrance to our residences is to permit them to do so without any check or demand for work that has never been done. I have since been advised of other frauds perpetrated with the above which have recently been perpetrated in the city."

A few years ago a person traveling or having friends departing from one trans-Atlantic port to another would have considerable anxiety as to about what date they would arrive at their destination, this being governed very much by the wind and the waves. Now, however, the steamship companies have made a thorough transformation of the day, instead of having evil forebodings, there is the satisfaction of traveling on absolutely unshakable steamers, and add to this the fact that you can figure almost to the hour the time that you will arrive at the Liverpool or New York dock. The Inman Line S.S. City of Paris, which left Liverpool Wednesday afternoon, was at her New York dock at 9 a.m. the following Wednesday, having steamed over the southern coast, making 10 days 21 hours and 15 minutes, on the shorter course of 2700 knots in 10 days 16 hours and 15 minutes, the best run made by any steamer previous to this date being 9 days 10 hours 15 minutes. The Inman Line S.S. City of New York, which left Liverpool last Wednesday afternoon, was at her dock at 10 a.m. yesterday. Such regularity equals that of any railway service on land.
