At length it was determined that the clause, as reported by the committee, should stand "the expenses of the synod, including necessary travel-ing expenses of the members, shall be paid by an annual ascessment of the diocesses pro-portioned to their representation, excepting those which are featiled to send only one representative of each order." Clause eight defines the words "Ecclesias-tical province" to mean "any group of dioceses under the jurisdiction of a pro-vincial synod." The constitution was thus finished, but an opportunity was given to any member to make further amendments before the report as a whole should be adopted. The western delegates immediately took this opportunity to again consider the finan-cial arrangements which clause six had re-gulated. They believed that the expenses of an average delegates to the General Synod would cost about one half of the ready cash of some of the entire diocess of the west. The western delegates appeal to resay, and threaten with a mighty united power. The delegates thought of the poverty of their western brothers, thought that what was taken awar might have to be replaced by larger missionary grants and amended the clause. Now diocess having less than 10 clergymen will not contribut to the expenses of delegates. Rev. Provost Body saw another error in the constitution. He believed that canons relating to doctrine, worship or discipline should not be left within the exclusive jurisdiction of the General Synod, but that the Provincial Synod should have an oppor-tunity for considering any such canons pro-posed. The house saw some difficulties in the way of such proceedings as the Ray. Provost advised, but passed Judge Mac-Donald's amendment, which makes it neces-sary that such canons shall be twice deli-berated and twice passed by the Géneral Synod before they shall be effectual. The constitution was then adopted as amended. It has been a careful work, and has taken five whole days to complete the task. But the work has been a successful attempt. Delogates came from the west with instructions to enter into no General Synod unless certain regulations were maintained. Central and eastern delegates were bound by equally stringent promises. The convention has statisfied all, and joined together all the separate elements of the Anglican Chauch of the Dominion of Canada. Before the delest divided into the two houses committees were appointed for con-idering (1) Constitution, Rules of Order and Proceedings; (2) Doctine, Worship and Discipline; (3) Missionary; (4) Educational; (5) Adjustment of Finances of Different Diocesses; (6) Finances.
