NOTE AND COMMENT

The woman in Parliament is proof of the great strides women has been enabled to make with short skirts.—Barrie Examiner.

That the exemption from income tax for each child be made \$500 instead of \$200, as at present, is the suggestion contained in a resolution placed on the order paper of the commons by Joseph Archambault, Liberal member for Chambly-Verchères.

The Woodstock Sentinel-Review suggests that the author of the Nick Carter stories, who committed suicide grew disgusted at seeing stories which he used to sell at five or ten cents padded out, bound in cloth, called "literature" and put on the market at \$1.50 and \$2. It must be admitted that the literary standard cannot be judged by the binding and the cost.

Woodstock Sentinel Review:—The mere fact that a man has had experience on the land in the Old Country is not, however, a guarantee that he will succeed in this country. Farming conditions are different here from what they are in England; however, for the man with some money, some brains and plenty of grit, there are good opportunities here. And there will be a welcome for such men.

Provisions governing the grading of vegetables, more particularly potatoes and onions, will be embodied in a bill to be brought before the Commons this week by Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture. Up to the present time no serious attempt has been made to grade potatoes and onions, and it is claimed that both buyers and sellers have suffered thereby.

Calgary Albertan:—The farmers just about have their share of premiers in Canada. John Oliver of B. C. is a farmer; Herbert Greenfield of Alberta is a farmer; the next premier of Saskatchewan will be a farmer; Norris of Manitoba is partly farmer; and his successor will be a farmer; Drury of Ontario is a farmer; Bell of P.E.I. is a farmer. In addition, among the provincial premiers there are two lawyers and one merchant.

When the Pope was Archbishop of Milan he once said: "Women are a great power for good. It is merely the shameless few who, by keeping themselves always conspicuously before the eyes of the public, give cynics and cheap humorists their chance to throw mud at women in general. Many other bakers, while not openly declaring against the holding of these sales, none the less feel the effect of this unfair competition."

LAMBTON CROP PRODUCTION, LIVE STOCK, &c

From the Annual Report of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, giving the crop statistics for 1920, the following information is gleaned: Lambton has 525,598 acres of cleared lands, standing sixth among the counties of the Province in this respect. In the quantity of crops produced Lambton ranks among the highest, standing second in fall wheat and sugar beets; second in flax, 3rd in alfalfa, 4th in corn and orchards. Lambton was second in the number and value of cattle sold; first in number of turkeys, and fourth in poultry of all kinds.

ALVINSTON WOMAN'S DEATH

Fell From Hospital Window in Absence of Nurse.

Falling from a second-story window in St. Joseph's Hospital, London, shortly after 2 a.m., Saturday morning, Miss Elizabeth Black of Alvinston, 51 years old, suffered internal injuries, that resulted in her death six hours later.

Hospital authorities report that although Miss Black had been ailing for several months she had only been a patient at the institution for the past two weeks. Early Saturday morning, they report, she arose from her bed to raise the window, immediately falling to the grass below, just missing the cement sidewalk. She sustained a broken arm in the fall as well as internal injuries, which caused her death.

Dr. A. MacLean, coroner, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

The doctor attending Miss Black stated that the news of the tragedy was like a bolt from the sky to him. "Miss Black was never a violent patient at any time. She never gave any intimation that she might end her life. She was certainly not that type of woman."

The death occurred at London Wednesday, May 3, of Helena P., the wife of James N. Dodd of Sarnia following a long illness. The remains were brought to the city from London on the 1.20 train this afternoon. The late Mrs. Dodd was the matron of the Lambton county jail at Sarnia of which Mr. Dodd is the governor. The family came to Sarnia eight years ago from Alvinston. Deceased was formerly Mrs. Albert E. Ketch, and her son, Harold Ketch, lost his life overseas. Her maiden name was Helena P. Wilson. Besides her husband, two daughters survive, Miss Hazel Ketch, Niagara Falls, N.Y., and Mrs. Lyla Greives, Milwaukee, Wis., a stepdaughter, Ella M. Dodd also survives. The late Mrs. Dodd was 53 years of age. Interment will take place at Alvinston cemetery. A funeral service will probably be held in Sarnia tomorrow evening by the Rev. Mr. Millyard.—Observer, May 4.

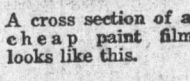

OF PASSING INTEREST

Only four passengers were killed on the Canadian railways last year, out of a total of fifty one millions carried.

During the last four months that the agricultural development board has been functioning, the province has lent to farmers in long term loans more than half a million dollars—to be exact \$571,579. In addition it has advanced \$25,000 in short term loans.

The importation into Canada from Europe of bees, used or second-hand hives, or raw hive goods or products, excepting honey, is prohibited on and after the first of May, 1922, according to an order issued by the Federal minister of agriculture. The order, a statement issued by the department of agriculture says, is necessary owing to the danger of introducing a contagious disease of bees known as the "Isle of Wight Disease."

The farmer is now starting on his annual gamble with nature. He has the promise that "as long as the world lasts, seed time and harvest will not fail," but between seed time and harvest there are many anxious hours for the man who must depend on sunshine and moisture, who must contend with insect pests and other unfavorable factors. Farmers deserve credit for being courageous and optimistic.

COUNTRY FAIRS NEED HELP

John Farrell, president of the Ontario Rural Fairs Association, will ask the Government to increase the grants to the county fairs this year by \$50,000. "At the present time," said Mr. Farrell, "the Government is making a grant of \$70,000. I am going to ask them to raise this to \$125,000 and if they will do this it will mean much to the small fairs all through the province. An increased grant would enable the fair boards to increase their prize lists and make them worth while. There was a time when a prize of \$5 or so would bring out some of the best stock in the countryside. Now, however, the farmers in general are not interested. They can make more by staying at home and working. The rural fairs are an important matter and should be encouraged in every way possible."
