-There are many plain talkers in the British Cabinet of to-day and their utterances on great international questions have stirred up considerable excitement through. out the empire and also in the government of Russia, France and Germany. Salisbury and Chamberlain have said many blunt things about the situations in India, China and Africa, till it seems as if the present ministry were about discarding that diplomatic suavity and patience that has so long characterized the British executive. Mr. Goschen, chancellor of the exchequer, has carefully planted the last hard blow by declaring that it is the purpose of the British government to increase her naval force to meet any increase in the Russian navy, and in connection with his statement h brought down supplementary estimates for \$40,000,000 to provide for the building of four armored cruisers, for battleships an four torpedo boat destroyers. This change in the naval program is for Russia's benefit alone, and is tantamount to a challenge to that country to trespass much further on proportion can readily be maintained.
