O God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all works of piety and charity do proceed, we beseech Thee to visit with Thy favour our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and so rule her heart, that she may in all things seek Thy honour and glory. Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants, the Clergy; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign, and the labours of those missionaries who are promoting the same in this Province. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.— Amen.

O MERCIFUL GOD, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made, nor wouldst the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live: Have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels, and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. — Amen.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

---

## I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

## II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

## III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

## IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

## V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

## VI.

### *Officers.*

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

## VII.

*(Executive Committee.)*

1. There shall be also an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz :

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting, provided that no annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each Meeting, have paid his subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum:

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

## VIII.

*(Objects.)*

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other viz :—

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships at King's College, Fredericton; and assistance, where necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially Sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue

of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen; and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in Particular Parishes.

#### IX.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

#### X.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

#### XI.

##### (Local Committee.)

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the Members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish, (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop,) may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

## XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

## XIII.

*(The General Committee.)*

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; but in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman, the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a Member of the General Committee,) and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the Certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriation of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

*Firstly.* Production of Certificate of Lay Deputies.

*Secondly.* Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

*Thirdly.* Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

*Fourthly.* Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

## XIV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion for the General Purposes of the Society.

## RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That the title of all Churches, towards the erection or completion of which any grant is made from the funds of this Society, be vested either in the Church Corporation of the Parish in which such Church is situated, or in some party or parties in trust to convey the site, as soon as practicable, of such Church to the Church Corporation as soon as the same may be legally constituted. (14th Report, page 24.)

That no grants from this Committee, subject to conditions, be paid until an order is issued from the Executive Committee, who will previously ascertain that the conditions of the grants have been fulfilled. (17th Report, page 21.)

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz :

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized, in his discretion, to pay to him the whole, or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (23rd Report, page 33.)

That if any alterations shall be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary Salaries, granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it. (25th Report, page 30.)

That all vouchers for the payment of any sums of money whatever, must bear on the face of them, the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That the Treasurer be directed not to pay any monies after the 1st day of May in each year, until authorized to do so by the General Committee at their meeting in July.

That the following be the form of draft for a Missionary's salary, to come into effect on the 1st October, 1861, and that no draft be paid by the Treasurer, unless presented in person, or endorsed by the person to whom it is made payable, the Treasurer to take a receipt from the party to whom the payment is made on the same.

That for the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, be required in their lists of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

Passed July 6th, 1864.

The following are the conditions on which grants are made to Churches and Parsonage Houses, viz :—

To the Rev. A. B. to assist in building a Church at C. D., the sum of \$——, to be paid on a certificate that the land on which the Church is built is held in fee simple by or for the use of the Church, and the external walls completed.

In the case of a second grant, for "the external walls completed" must be substituted "the building finished both externally and internally."

In the case of a grant to pay a debt on a Church, for the same words must be substituted "the Church made thereby free from debt."

## REPORT.

In the income of this Society, derived from subscriptions and collections, there has been a small diminution during the past two years. This fact is certainly strange and somewhat alarming, especially at the present time. It must not, however, be disguised, but brought forcibly before every member of the Church. There have always been funds sufficient, it may be said, to meet with promptness, the required expenditure. Appropriations have been made for missions which still are vacant. From time to time considerable amounts have been invested; and, the excuse is always ready, made of late with more than usual force, viz., the scarcity of money and the increased expense of living. But are these valid excuses for going backward in the work undertaken by this Society? Soon, it may be hoped, Missionaries will be found for those fields of labor now vacant; and others sent beyond them,—among those “scattered like sheep not having a Shepherd.” Increased funds, allowing a little addition to stipends barely sufficient to defray necessary expenses, might often aid the Lord Bishop in securing services of great value for this Missionary work.

But, apart from all these considerations, it must now be well known that the members of the Church in this Province must give of their substance, in some degree as God has required, or else many Parishes must wholly want the ministrations of religion. When therefore this Society is about to stand alone to meet this approaching—this alarming emergency—is it a time for diminished contributions?

How the matter stands for the current year, may be gathered from the following abstract of the Reports of the Missionaries and Local Committees.

The labor of these Missionaries, which in most instances, would not have been engaged in but for this Society, are especially recommended to the attention and regard of every member of the Church.

**ANDOVER.**—Rev. W. Henry Street writes that a severe attack of illness has hindered him from completing the collections for the Society. He does not anticipate any decrease in the usual amount.

**BLACKVILLE AND NELSON.**—Rev. W. Cruden is sorry that he cannot promise a larger contribution to the Society, which, he considers, deserves from his parishioners their most cordial support, from the liberal allowances granted to them. Mr. Cruden adds that he shall be very busily engaged during the summer preparing his young people for a confirmation in September next.

**BUCTOCHE.**—Rev. A. H. Weeks writes that the contributions from this place, amounting to \$12, were forwarded through Rev. Dr. Jarvis in April last. The people would have given more, but they are about building a Church, the want of which is very much felt. The members of the Church are few at present, but they would increase in case a church was built. They are not able to do this without assistance. At present, they have for this purpose \$120 cash in hand and \$400 subscribed. The cost of the building is estimated at \$800. They earnestly ask aid from the Society. They are now obliged to assemble for Divine Worship in a private room, a miserable school house and sometimes in an office.

**CAMBRIDGE AND WATERBORO'.**—Rev. Benj. Shaw assumed the duties of this Mission last Autumn. He is required to have Divine Service at six Churches and Stations, besides occasional services at private houses. From the 25th October to the 31st May, he has performed Services on Sundays 64 times and in the week 25 times,—making in all 89 public Services in 7 months.

"I have little to remark," Mr. Shaw writes, "about my Mission. It is very large, and there is considerable difficulty in getting at the different places where services are held, except in summer, when the roads are good. I have only been deterred twice in the 7 months in fulfilling my appointments; once on account of the heavy snow storm which came in February, and the other, by reason of a gale of wind which prevented my crossing the Grand Lake.

Since I came to this Mission, I have been well received by the people, and have experienced very much hospitality from them. The people in Cambridge have as yet been by far the readiest to support me with their pecuniary aid, having given me \$30, while the other three parishes have only contributed \$10 altogether.

The Church feeling is at a very low ebb throughout the whole of my Mission. Most of the people are Dissenters from the Church of England, and even those who come to Church have an idea that all forms of worship are alike, and that one place is as good as another. Very few indeed of my own people can use their Prayer Books and follow the morning Service throughout. I cannot obviate this difficulty by having Sunday Schools and instructing them in the rules and discipline of the Church, as my Mission is so large that I could not attend often enough to keep them going, and I have not as yet been able to find any earnest and willing laymen to undertake this duty.

I have five Churches, which all want repairing. The Communion vessels are in a very bad state in three of them; the other two are without any Communion vessels.

We sadly want a new fence round the Grave Yard at St. James', Lower Jenseg, to keep the ground from being desecrated by cattle.

We are endeavouring at present to erect a new Church in the place of St. John's, White's Point. The Bishop kindly gave the plans; and we have got the frame-work up, and the roof on, with a neat little turret for the bell.

At St. Luke's Church, Waterborough, there is generally a very good congregation, but our great trouble here is the singing, there being no one to lead the choir, or practice them.

At Newcastle, the Church is in an unfinished state, it has not been

consecrated, nor is it yet fit to be so. Some of the people seem very earnest about trying to complete the building.

At Trinity Church, Douglas Harbour, there have been good congregations, I trust they will continue to be so.

At the Narrows, Washademoak, I have the largest congregation throughout the whole Mission; no less than from 100 to 200 people every time I go. I hold Service in the Temperance Hall. There are very few Church people here, the greater part of the inhabitants belonging to the Baptist Denomination.

I have added one more Station to my list this year, viz., "Iron Bound Cove," as Mr. Jeffrey, (who officiated here for some time) tells me there are plenty of Church people residing around the vicinity.

My report is now far longer than I intended it to be. You will see that I am by no means destitute of work. There ought to be another Clergyman sent on the Western side of the Grand Lake. There is plenty of work for one, and the people can and will subscribe £50 a year. If the Society could grant anything for the support of a Clergyman there, I do not see anything to prevent the people from having one, and enjoying the services of the Church Sunday after Sunday.

Our Subscriptions amount to \$30.07.

CAMPBELLO.—Rev. J. S. Williams has inclosed the following resolutions passed at a meeting of this Committee.

1. That this Committee desires to express their continued interest in the welfare of the Society, and the hope that the general prosperity with which this Parish is now blessed may be represented by increased contributions to its funds.

2. That this Committee in requesting a renewal of the grant to the Church School would respectfully draw the attention of the general Committee to the fact that the School is now more largely attended than for the last two years, and that external repairs have recently been put on the School house at considerable expense.

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin has forwarded a list of Subscribers amounting to \$29 70.

CARLETON.—Rev. Canon Coster reports contributions to the amount of \$30.

CHATHAM.—Rev. S. Bacon reports on behalf of this committee that at their annual meeting they passed these resolutions.

1. That this Committee continues to entertain the same opinion they have ever invariably expressed of the invaluable benefits they conceive the Colonial Church must evidently (under God) derive from the Diocesan Church Society.

2. That the Committee return their warmest thanks for the annual grants of books by the general Committee. The books are attentively perused, and duly appreciated and make a valuable acquisition to the Sunday School Library, and the Committee trust they will not be overlooked in the appropriations of the present year.

Contributions amount to \$124 52.

DOUGLAS.—Rev. T. E. Dowling has enclosed a subscription list amounting to \$85 53.

"I am rejoiced," Mr. Dowling writes, "to report a slight increase in the amount of subscriptions for 1864. It was hoped that after circulating a printed appeal throughout the Parish a longer list of names would have appeared.

The Society will be pleased to learn that the two late Parish meetings have been well attended. The present parsonage and glebe (a most undesirable property for the Church to keep in possession,) was offered for

sale but found no purchaser. It was then determined to take steps to place the building in repair, and to complete the arrangements by July.

From Easter 1863 to Easter 1864 the sum of \$93 70, was received by the Rector as voluntary offerings. At each of the morning services held in the 4 churches, the alms of the congregation are appropriated by the clergyman, and this plan works more easily than the subscription system.

The congregation at Tay Creek with assistance of friends at a distance have contributed \$65 towards a Church bell, which was rung the first time at a very joyful service last Christmas Eve. The daily evening service at this distant Settlement during Holy Week was unusually well attended, and the number of communicants on Easter day was larger than hitherto.

Although it is not in my power to attend the annual meetings, I shall be rejoiced to hear that delegates—active working men have been appointed to visit this mission in order to create an interest in the endowment fund. If only \$20 were collected the first year it would be more than a step in the right direction. But without having some special opportunity of bringing the subject before the several congregations I should not feel justified in making the attempt single-handed—that is, with any probability of success."

Mr. Dowling adds that he has obtained permission from the Bishop to be absent from Douglas for three months on a visit to his relations in England, and that by the aid of different clergymen he has secured the regular performance of Divine Service in the parish.

**FREDERICTON.**—Rev. C. Lee reports contributions to the amount of \$847.05, an increase upon last year.

**GAGETOWN.**—Rev. J. Neales reports contributions to the amount of \$70.

"I continued," Mr. Neales writes, "my attendance in the Grand Lake Mission till the arrival of the Rev. B. Shaw the last week in October, having evening service there every alternate Sunday, besides a week day service every Wednesday, either at the Jemseg, White's Point, or Young's Cove, and private baptisms, funerals and holy communion with the sick in different parts of the Mission; but I am now happy to say that the zealous missionary, the Rev. B. Shaw from St. Augustine's, Canterbury, has, since his arrival fully justified the remark made in my last year's report, viz., 'all that I can do is as nothing compared with the earnest pastorship of a resident clergyman.'"

**GLENELG, NEWCASTLE, &C.**—The Rev. J. Hudson states that the annual meeting of the Glenelg Committee was held on the 25th June, and that those who were then present expressed by resolution their warm interest in the Society's welfare.

The Missionary adds, that he has omitted no reasonable opportunity during the past year of presenting and urging the Society's claims upon his fellow-churchmen throughout the Mission; and that he will endeavour, if possible, to prevail on them to increase their contributions before the Society's next Anniversary Meeting, as a suitable and thankful acknowledgment of what has been so long and lovingly done for the Church at Miramichi by the generosity of the faithful in our Fatherland.

Since the 23rd October last, up to April 27th; there have been remitted to the Society's Treasurer from this Mission, the following sums, viz., Newcastle, £7 11s. 3d., Glenelg, £5 1s. 5d., Ludlow, Blissfield, and Northesk, £2 10s. 10d; sale of Books, £5 1s. 4d., total £20 4s. 10.

The sum of £3 was also forwarded to the Secretary with the above report.

**GONDOLA POINT, ROTHSAY STATION, &C.**—Rev D. J. Wetmore reports as follows:—

"During the past year I have performed 84 full services and assisted in 30. The average attendance at Gondola Point Church and Rothsay Station during the Summer season is about 100, and during the Winter about 50. For the last four months I have also performed an evening service at Clifton three Sundays in every month, the average attendance at which place is about 120."

**GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.**—Rev. D. W. Pickett reports that, notwithstanding the distance between the Parish Churches, and the necessity of crossing the river, he has been enabled to open the Church in each Parish every Sunday. The week day services, as before reported, have been kept up with regularity, and in addition, another has, for the past nine months, been held every fortnight in the lower part of the Parish of Greenwich, which continues to be numerously attended.

The amount contributed to the funds of the Society by this Mission will not, I am confident, be less than that of previous years. The amount at present reported is \$60.

**GRAND MANAN.**—Rev. G. T. Carey has forwarded to the Treasurer the sum of \$20, being the amount of contributions from this parish.

**HAMPTON.**—Rev. W. Walker has forwarded the sum of \$80 15, as contributions from this parish.

**KINGSLEAR.**—Rev. J. Black reports contributions to the amount of \$59 10.

**KINGSTON.**—Rev. W. E. Scovil reports contributions amounting to \$123 30.

**LANCASTER.**—Rev. W. S. Covert reports that the contributions from this mission will amount to about \$87 or \$88.

**MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON.**—Rev. H. Pollard writes as follows:—

"I am happy to be able to report the very satisfactory progress of the Church building in the village of Oromocto. The exterior is completed, and the contractor is at work on the interior; we hope to have it ready for consecration by the beginning of October. With the aid of a melodeon, kindly lent for a time by a brother clergyman, a choir has been established in the village, which renders our service more attractive, and it is hoped when the new Church is opened, a much larger congregation will take advantage of its free seats. In the churches at Maugerville and Lower Burton, two services have been continued as usual.

In Upper Maugerville, the monthly service, discontinued during the fresher, has been recommenced and is well attended.

Since my removal to the Oromocto, I have been able to visit the Victoria Settlement regularly, and have slightly increased the number of services. I have also been able to assist the Missionary of New Maryland, by taking a part of the fortnightly services at the Rusigornis, thus providing them with more frequent opportunities of public worship, a boon which their heartiness in the cause of the church well deserves.

Notwithstanding the comparatively compact situation of my mission, I find that for the year ending last Easter, I travelled on duty 2719 miles, performing five marriages, eleven funerals, baptising seventeen children, and administering the Holy Communion twenty-six times."

Contributions from Maugerville amount to \$25.27 and from Burton they are \$56.44, in all \$81.71, an increase on last year.

**MONCTON.**—Rev. W. N. Boyer writes that owing to ill health he has been unable to attend to the business of the Society, being requested by his medical adviser to take a few weeks rest. There are some contributions yet to be sent in owing to the absence of the Subscribers. The amount of the contributions forwarded with the report is \$26.25.

The Services in Church have been less, owing to the ill health of the Missionary, and to the necessity of the Church being closed several weeks for repairs. Several members of the Church have left the Province, and this has caused a decrease in the number of Communicants. The attendance at the services of the Church is regular.

**NEW MARYLAND.**—Rev. Charles Medley, in forwarding the report of his duties in this Mission is very thankful to be able to state to the Society that the number of Communicants has been doubled during the last year, and the average attendance is larger since the erection of this new Church which was consecrated last winter. The people at Rusi-gornis are engaged in building a Church, which they are very anxious to complete, but their means are small. It is hoped the Society will generously help them. I am sorry to say, Mr. Medley adds, "that the resolutions passed at a late meeting of the Executive Committee will prohibit any returns from this Mission this year. It is next to impossible to get any money from the people in the spring of the year. Hitherto your Missionary has paid the amount of subscriptions to the Treasurer and been refunded by the people."

Rev. C. Medley, whose untiring labors as a Missionary, the Society cannot fail to appreciate, has left this Diocese for that of Newfoundland.

**NORTON.**—Rev. E. A. Warneford reports \$151.14 as the contributions from this Parish.

**PETERSVILLE.**—Rev. Theophilus Richey reports contributions to the amount of \$50.28. He adds, that the services of the Church have been regularly sustained throughout the year with one or two exceptions; occasioned by the weather. The congregation in the Parish Church has been on the increase, and we have lately been able to rejoice over some additions to the number of our communicants.

**PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.**—Rev. C. F. Street writes as follows:—

"There were 22 persons confirmed here last year by the Lord Bishop. My short residence in the Mission prevented me having more candidates for this holy rite. I have established a new station for Divine Service besides attending to those kept up by my predecessor; it is in Lower Prince William, where a neat roomy School House has been lately erected, and in which I held Divine Service during last winter once or twice every month. I have reasons for believing that my ministrations in this station have been productive of good as there has been generally a large attendance at the services, and many have gladly, for the first time, become subscribers to the Diocesan Church Society this year.

"There is a Church in Upper Kingsclear Parish, which was neatly completed and opened for services during the incumbency of the Rev. Mr. Loosmore in this mission. I hold services in this Church occasionally, (although it is not in Prince William Mission), as I do not like to see a Church adjoining my Parish closed, but there is expense and much labor attending this duty.

"Through the kind and active interest in regard to the D. C. S. on the part of Thomas Jones and James Henry, Esquires, and of Mr. McLeod, (Teacher of the Parish School in Lower Prince William), the contributions of this Mission to the Society for this year have been obtained, and as the laity have begun here to interest themselves in this matter, I am assured that the D. C. S. will become more popular in this Mission."

Contributions amount to \$61.56.

**PORTLAND.**—Rev. Canon Harrison reports from his people \$131.50, which he has paid into the Bank of New Brunswick to the credit of the Society.



**QUEENSBURY.**—Rev. W. H. Tippet writes that the contributions for the Society from this Mission will considerably exceed those of last year. "The Church affairs of the Mission," Mr. Tippet writes, "are much as usual, and my own duties, I am thankful to say, have been performed without interruption. Public Services are regularly sustained at four places, and at three of them (where we have built churches since my incumbency), the Holy Communion is administered nearly every month to small bodies of Communicants.

Contributions amount to \$52.59.

During Lent the special weekly Services were well attended. My Sunday School is at present well attended, and I have the continued services of a zealous and efficient Superintendent.

Thirteen persons were confirmed by the Bishop last Autumn. Although not so severely visited as some of the neighbouring parishes, during the year I had to perform the sad duty of burying three members of one family within a week, all of whom died of diphtheria, and in addition to them two aged members of the Church have departed, I doubt not, to their eternal rest."

**RICHMOND.**—Rev. N. A. Coster has forwarded a list of contributions amounting to \$43.75.

**ST. ANDREWS.**—Rev. G. D. Street, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$155.80.

Rev. Ranald E. Smith, Assistant Minister, reports that the services at Chamcook have been regularly kept up during the past year. There have been five baptisms, of which three were in the case of adults. The attendance at Church in Chamcook has been large and regular. On a late occasion at the administration of the Lord's Supper the number of communicants was eighteen.

**ST. GEORGE.**—Rev. J. McGivern reports the following contributions from this Mission for the general purposes of the Society, viz:—St. George \$103.48, Pennfield and Pope Logan \$22.18, Rourke Settlement \$6.62, total \$135.28.

Mr. McGivern has also enclosed the following report of the Local Committee:—

"As on former occasions the members of the Church in St. George desire evermore to thank God for His great goodness to this Society, and especially for the privilege of co-operating by our prayers and alms towards the objects it seeks to accomplish. The dissemination of the Holy Scriptures and discipline of the Church of England amongst the scattered poor of our country is truly a work which no Christian mind and believer in God's truth can overlook or undervalue. We are fully aware of the change contemplated by the Society for the propagation of the Gospel, with respect to the future support of the Church in this and the other Dioceses of British North America, and while deeply grateful for the generous support extended to this Mission for a period of 42 years, we are compelled, however reluctantly, to confess that we are not yet in a position, either in wealth or numbers, to rely exclusively upon ourselves for the support of the ministry. With the Missionary Schedule before us of last year's appropriations, it is a cheering fact to find that while the work of reduction is going on by the Society for the propagation of the Gospel, aid has been rendered from the funds of this Society, to no less than 25 poor Missions during the past year."

**ST. JAMES.**—Rev. W. Armstrong reports that the amount of \$260 and a list of names were sent to the Treasurer at the end of last week. It is a little above what was collected last year, and he hopes to be able to add about \$20 more from parties whose subscriptions have not yet been obtained.

**ST. MARK.**—Mr. C. H. Fairweather, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$427.85.



**ST. PAUL.**—Rev. W. H. DeVeber reports amount of contributions to \$343.80, \$8 of which are limited to 9th object.

**ST. JOHN.**—Rev. Canon Gray, D. D., reports contributions to the amount of \$727.06. He writes under date 20th May, 1864, "I inclose you the amount collected for the present year in my parish, together with the list of the parties who have subscribed, an exact counterpart of which has been transmitted to the Treasurer, and the whole amount paid in. I am happy to say that we exceed our last year's contribution by \$35.61."

**ST. MARY'S, STANLEY, & C.**—Rev. W. Jaffrey writes as follows:—"I have much pleasure in saying that within the last two years there has been a decided improvement in the morals of the people committed to my charge.

I cannot this year report quite so many confirmed as on former occasions; this arises from two causes, first; in accordance with the Bishop's circular I deemed it my duty to require more from the candidates than I had usually exacted; next, my scattered duties over so large a field of labour prevented my giving the usual amount of attention to any one place.

Of part of these duties I am now relieved by the appointment of Mr. Shaw to the Newcastle district. For extra duty performed in this district during the last three years, I received a small donation from the Society; it may therefore interest some to know the numbers attending the services during the years while the district was under my charge. The largest numbers attending at all the services during the year:—

At the last meeting of the Society \$40 were granted to St. Mary's towards the support of a catechist, I am happy to say that through the assistance of three brother Clergymen, the contemplated duty in the parish has been performed without drawing upon the Society's funds. I must therefore ask the Society to transfer the grant to the St. Mary's endowment fund, which already, with the interest accumulated thereon, amounts to the handsome sum of \$343.00 paid up and vested."

Contributions amount to \$50.03.

**ST. STEPHEN.**—Rev. Edward Medley reports contributions to the amount of \$78.66 and he writes as follows:—

"I am glad to be able to report contributions from the Parish of St. Stephen to the amount of \$78.66. This is even better than the last years. It is all the more creditable from the increased demand upon the Parishioners in aid of the New Church. The depressed state of the American Currency ought to be taken into account, for if the contributions had been put down in American currency our list would have looked more imposing. As it is, the Parishioners of St. Stephen have evinced their interest in the work of the Society by the willingness and readiness with which they have paid in their contributions.

"With regard to the work of the church in this mission it is impossible that that work can be carried on satisfactorily by one man in so extensive a mission. There is work enough and to spare for three hard working priests, and since the serious illness of our Rector the onus of the work has fallen upon me. I have been enabled to keep up two services on the Sunday regularly in St. Stephen, and this year have had morning service on every Holy day appointed by the Church. During Lent I held a special service with a Lecture once a week in the evening. These

services were well attended. On Good Friday and Ascension Day we had two services morning and evening and excellent congregations.

"The Holy Communion has been administered three times since I came, on Christmas Day, Easter Day and Whit Sunday. The number of communicants is small, on Christmas Day only numbering 37, on Easter Day they numbered 46, some of those lately confirmed here by the Bishop coming forward then for the first time to the Holy Sacrament. The Parish choir has greatly improved and soon, I trust we shall look upon church music as an act of *worship* which may be either acceptable or displeasing to God.

"I meet once a week a well behaved and fairly attended Bible class for instruction on the Inspiration and Interpretation of the Bible. We have also easy lectures on the Prayer Book and combine Parochial music with the whole. The Bible Class was only intended originally to be assembled during Lent, but at the request of the members it has been continued.

"Since our church was burnt we met for worship, first at the School House, which we found too small, and now we assemble at Mr. Thompson's Hall which holds about 200 worshippers. It is often inconveniently crowded and this is chiefly owing to the fact that every one who comes has a right freely to worship God there without intruding upon any one. If our New Church is seated upon this principle we shall have little difficulty in filling it. I am glad to find that the feeling of the majority of the Parishioners is in favor of throwing their Church open free to all rich and poor. I am myself responsible for £500 in order to advance this purpose and I am confident that the Church here will grow under that system and that the prejudices against it will wear away, by experiencing its practical benefits. It is devoutly hoped the Society will forward and help this object. It must not be thought that the Parishioners of St. Stephen have not exerted themselves about their Church. They have subscribed upwards of \$1000, and \$1500 has been raised since. The Church-women of St. Stephen have given a well-toned Steel Bell weighing over 1000 lbs. and have undertaken to provide an organ. It is impossible to speak too highly of the exertions made by our Church warden Nehemiah Marks Esq., to build a Church here worthy of the worship and glory of God; not only remodelling the old building which was burnt down, but solely by his efforts bringing the present Church so near to its completion. I trust it will be ready for consecration this summer.

"I have been much discouraged with the Church work at Milltown. The Church itself is so out of the way, and in such a state of ruin that few are ever tempted to go there. Milltown is very far gone in dissent and there seems little hope of reviving Church principles. I walked out between our morning and evening service here regularly last Autumn for two months to hold service and always gave the people notice beforehand. The average number was 9, three or four of whom came from the other side of the river. The present rotten building is calculated to hold I should think between 300 and 400 persons.

"In the Parish of St. James also I have had little encouragement, but I think ere long something more may be done in that part of this Mission. During the winter months it is next to impossible to get out to the Church and not being in the possession of a horse precludes my visiting amongst those at great distances."

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield reports as follows:—

"During the year I have solemnized nine Marriages, and attended seven Funerals. I have endeavoured to keep up a constant visitation both of the sick and the healthy. At Black River I have a class on Saturday evenings for teaching Church music to about thirty young men and women. Last summer the Bishop confirmed nine persons, four

others were unexpectedly prevented from uniting in the same service. Several young persons recently confirmed and children of members have been added to the Communicants and I have great reason to be thankful for the good feeling which prevails in the Parish."

Contributions amount to \$48.45.

**SHEDIAC.**—Rev. George S. Jarvis, D. D., writes that he has enclosed to the Treasurer the amount of contributions from this Committee amounting to \$47.60.

"I have to report," Dr. Jarvis writes, "another legacy of \$20 to the general purposes of the Diocesan Church Society by the late Alexander Willing. This will, I am told, require some time for collection, as it will arise from proceeds of land. This will make the fourth bequest in Shediac to the Society in a few years past. The \$80 bequest by the late Miss Bell is not yet collected, but the persons liable are well able to pay."

**SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.**—Rev. G. Rogers reports a large increase in the amount of contributions from this Mission. This, he says, shows an increasing interest in the work of the Society, and may be considered as a proof of their gratitude for the kind response their appeals for assistance have always met with.

"I am thankful to say," Mr. Rogers adds, "that a kind Providence has enabled me to perform the duties of this Mission during the year without any interruption. Throughout the Spring and Summer of last year, Divine Service was held every Sunday in the Parish Church at Springfield. Thus, from March 8th 1863 to May 22nd 1864, I have performed Divine Service at Springfield 64 times, and at St. John's Church, Johnston, 34 times, at the Irish Settlement 18 times and at other Stations 41 times,—making a total of 157 Services within the above mentioned period. I am happy also to report that through the kind assistance of Mr. W. B. Scovil, Mr. Boyd and other friends, whose aid in a good cause is never sought in vain, I was able last summer to open a Sunday School, at which there was an attendance of more than 60 children and young persons.

It affords me very great pleasure to say that a beautiful School House has been erected by the Episcopalians of Springfield for the purpose of carrying out the system of the Madras Board.

Last August we received a visit from the Lord Bishop when 38 persons were confirmed, several of whom are now regular communicants and I fully believe are endeavouring "to advance the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things."

At the meetings of the Local Committee at Johnston resolutions were passed thanking the Society for the grant of books, and requesting an additional supply this year."

Contributions amount to \$85.24.

**STUDHOLM.**—Rev. R. Simonds reports a considerable increase in the contributions. They amount to \$57.

"I only hope," Mr. Simonds adds, "that we may continue to be progressive in future years, and that an increasing interest in the Society's operations may be everywhere felt and may be substantially manifested by increasing contributions."

**SUSSEX.**—Rev. C. P. Bliss reports that having since the month of May been very busy preparing candidates for baptism and confirmation, he cannot promise from this Parish a larger sum than that reported for the last year.

"I have had," Mr. Bliss writes, "increasing and laborious work during the past year. In this Mission alone there are six stations, at a distance of from 25 to 8 miles from my place of residence. It is a satisfaction to me to be able to say that there has been no cessation in my services throughout the whole year."

Mr. Bliss earnestly calls the attention of the Society to the Mission of Harvey, in the County of Albert, the importance of which it is impossible to overrate. This County is the richest in the Province in mineral wealth, and daily attracting the attention of foreign capitalists, and yet its *three Churches are shut up*, and the little flock of Church people almost despair of hearing the words of our loved liturgy. Mr. Bliss states, that since in charge of Sussex, he has been called to make frequent visits to Albert in the case of sickness and funerals, travelling a distance of 70 miles, and has, during the past year, spent 4 Sundays in the mission, preaching three times on each occasion. The people were exceedingly grateful for these services, and expressed much anxiety for the advantages of a resident Missionary. This extra duty, Mr. Bliss finds very laborious, but he desires to perform it, having been formerly in charge of this Mission, and he believes that his visits have been the means of keeping the Church people together.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. J. Hanford writes to thank the Society for the grant of books, and regrets that the Depositories are not more fully supplied with books suitable for libraries, and also with Bibles and Prayer Books. The collections, which will shortly be completed, fall off a little this year. There have been special calls for local purposes. "We are now engaged," Mr. Hanford adds, "in repairs at the Quaco Church at an expense of nearly \$200."

Contributions amount to \$94.56.

VICTORIA, ST. JUDE'S.—Rev. J. Armstrong reports \$19 as the contributions from this Parish.

WELDFORD.—Mr. James P. Sheraton, Lay Reader at this place has forwarded to the Treasurer \$34 as the contributions to the Society. He adds that the Parish stands in much need of a grant of books.

Rev. N. A. Coster writes as follows, "I am not certain whether four baptisms on 31st May 1863 were included in my last report or not, but if not, I have baptized 29 at Weldford and within the past year twice I have administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to sick members of the Church, have paid four visits to the sick, and likewise attended one funeral in Mr. Sheraton's absence.

"For some months past, I deemed it prudent to decline Sunday Services at Weldford, more especially as it occasioned no privation to the people, Mr. Sheraton having Service regularly at the Church every Sunday, besides one or more at distant Stations. My practice has lately been to have a Service in any part of the Parish where I heard of unbaptized children, and by this means have afforded no trifling convenience to the poor, who would have had many miles to carry their children to the Church, and I have reason to know that many appreciated the convenience.

"In consequence of a little misunderstanding on the part of Mr. Sheraton some months ago, I felt it my duty to request the Lord Bishop to exonerate me from the charge of Weldford at the expiration of the year, but as it has not been in my power to visit the place since the river began to break up I beg leave to offer (if his Lordship the Bishop shall see fit to retain me in charge until the intended Confirmation in September) to train the candidates for this rite, and supply any other clerical ministrations without any appropriation from the Society."

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman writes as follows:—"Our urgent necessities compel us to ask for a grant of \$40 towards the completion of the new church. During the winter months we were compelled to abandon the old church and hold Divine Service in the Parsonage. By the middle of September we hope to have the new church fit for service."

The Local Committee trust that some plan will be devised by which a sufficient quantity of books may be imported to enable them to receive the grants made by the Society.

Contributions are \$63.87.

WESTMORLAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss, reports \$58.15 as the contributions from this Parish.

WOODSTOCK.—At the annual meeting of this committee, resolutions were passed thanking the Society for the last grant of books of which a great want is felt in this mission, and also renewing the application for a grant in aid of the Parsonage at Richmond in case any appropriation be made towards this object, and also the following:—

“That this Committee would again urge upon the Society the importance of opening a new mission in the Parish of Richmond, comprising a population of over 2000 and between 500 and 600 church people. This subject has been frequently brought to the notice of this Society, but as yet no action has been taken upon it, we hope therefore that the important claim of that Parish may now meet with the favorable consideration of the general committee, and the necessary means may be adopted towards carrying out the earnest and reasonable desires of the members of the church in Richmond.”

The Rev. S. D. Lee Street in inclosing the foregoing resolutions writes that he fears from the actual want of means in the case of many subscribers to the Society, the amount of their contributions will be smaller than usual.

He adds as follows:—“Since the last meeting of the Society, and during the last Autumn, we were favoured with a visit from the Bishop of Fredericton, on his triennial tour through this portion of his Lordship's Diocese. The holy rite of Confirmation was administered both here and at Richmond—the total number confirmed was 47—and at St. Luke's Church the holy Communion was administered on the same day, and 25 of the newly confirmed came forward and partook of that holy Ordinance. Among those confirmed were 7 colored persons, the first that had ever presented themselves for that holy Rite in this Mission, some of these were shortly before Baptized as adults, and four of them also were received at the Lord's Table on the same day. Such visits from our respected Diocesan are most cheering—and have a tendency to encourage us in our work and labour of love—and indeed, we sometimes stand in need of such encouragement, for we often meet with much to try our faith and patience—and cause us almost to feel that all our labour is in vain; still we must not despond, but go on, knowing that we are doing God's work, and that though we ourselves may not perceive the fruits of our labour, yet God, who alone can give the increase, may, in His own good time, bless our labours and cause the fruit to spring forth, it may be, when and where we least expect it.

“Within the last few months, the Church here has met with a severe loss, in the sudden and unexpected death of three of her most devoted members—the Messrs. Bedell, three brothers, who were all present at Church on Easter Sunday, and united in the holy ordinance of the Lord's Supper, but within a fortnight from that day, they were numbered among the dead; all three, one after the other, left us here to join the Church triumphant in heaven, and their place among us on earth is known no more. Their departure has caused a blank in both the community and in the Church, which will be difficult to fill, and I myself have lost in them three of my best friends and most firm supporters in all my endeavours to promote the interests of the Church committed to my Pastoral care.

“I need not say much of the Curate's work, as his report will speak for itself. I may add, however, that he continues to be much esteemed



and respected, and I find in him an able and willing assistant in the work of the Mission, which is carried on in the same manner as heretofore; we still continue the five Services on every Sunday with the same distance to travel. Each of us has two full Services, and we are together at the fifth or Evening Service at St. Luke's Church, by this arrangement there is Divine Service once on every Sunday at St. John's Church, Richmond, St. Peter's Church, Jacksontown, Christ's Church, Woodstock, and twice, morning and evening at St. Luke's Church; we have also a Service at St. Luke's on every Friday evening, and the Curate has monthly Services in the Settlements around. Still both Mr. Nelson and myself are deeply conscious of our own inability to perform all that is required to be done in this extensive and populous Mission. But if the Parish of Richmond, which according to the last census contains over 500 Churchmen, were made a separate Mission, with a resident Clergyman, the wants of that Parish would be far more adequately supplied, and we should then be enabled to perform the duties of the other portion of the Mission more fully and satisfactorily, and many places which are now necessarily neglected, could then be attended to. I believe the Bishop is fully aware of the importance of this. But the chief difficulty at present, is the want of a Clergyman and the necessary provision for his support. These, I admit, are serious obstacles, still they are not, I hope, insurmountable. The people of that Parish, will undertake to provide a house, which in fact, is now commenced, and the outside partly completed; and they will also give \$200 and it may be more, towards a resident Clergyman's support, and if the Church Society can be induced to make up the remainder, I cannot but hope some Clergyman may be found willing to undertake the work of that Parish. I have also been led to believe, that if he would extend his Pastoral care to the adjoining village of Houlton on the American side, the Bishop of Maine would see that he was fully remunerated, this would be some addition to his income."

Contributions amount to \$197.89.

The Rev. R. C. Nelson, Curate of Woodstock reports that he takes on Sunday always two full Services and assists at a third. He encloses a printed list of the services which is circulated in this Mission, and by which the arrangements are rendered plainer. At the two Stations maintained in connection with Richmond, about 12 miles from the mouth of the Maduxnakick, there is an average attendance of about 40. Here Services are held once a month in Winter, and once in three weeks, in Summer.

"I have," Mr. Nelson adds, "a class for religious instruction in Woodstock on Friday afternoons, with an average attendance of about 40, and also a class of colored adults every Tuesday evening. I am very much pleased with the attention and uniform good conduct of these colored people, who seem to be deeply grateful for any interest taken in their moral and spiritual improvement. On Friday evenings, after the Service the Choir practice is held, when the chants, hymns and anthems for the following Sunday are rehearsed."

It will be noticed that these reports are in some instances incomplete, and from a few of the Parishes, no returns have yet been received. The gross amount, however, will considerably exceed that of the past year.

We should, first of all, express our thankfulness for being permitted to do even so little of the work which our Blessed Master has assigned to us. This Society has been enabled to

make its usual appropriations to carry on its Missionary work. But is another year to come and go without any special effort to increase this sphere of usefulness? The proposed plan for a general endowment seems to have been abandoned. Something may be done by endowing particular parishes, but that will probably be limited to few. It cannot then but be seen and felt that there is a call, it may be said, from Heaven itself, upon this Society at this very time. The general fund must be increased, or shortly much of the ground now occupied by the Church will be abandoned, and no new Missions opened for years to come.

To preserve the Church from so frightful a condition, it is only required that each man, and woman and child admitted into her fold should be enrolled upon our lists as members of this Society. Small sums by every one,—scarcely felt in the giving, but fraught with large blessings in return, would in the aggregate, supply the present wants of the Church and many of those which must be anticipated.

And what is there in this Society—its objects or its mode of carrying out these objects, to hinder its increased means of doing the work alluded to? What is requisite but more love and zeal and self denial on the part of the members of the Church, which would be the best security for its endowment? During the ensuing year then, each one connected with this Society, should make special exertions in its behalf. Each one should try and give a little more, and obtain some new subscriptions. Well tempered zeal and fervent charity should meet and overcome all those hindrances, and those excuses and charges, by which Satan would oppose a work for the glory of God.

The importance of early and prompt payment of the annual subscriptions cannot be too strongly urged. Some inconvenience in keeping the accounts has arisen from a delay in payments to those who undertake the self-denying task of collecting for the Society. The annual subscriptions should be considered to be due in the month of May, or at least, early in June, and it would spare the Clergy from a great amount of

Hindered of late by advancing years from attendance at the meetings of the Society, he still took a deep interest in its operations. In the Parish where he lived the venerable Judge has left a blank which cannot easily be supplied.

On motion of Mr. L. H. DeVeber—Resolved unanimously that the sum of \$5,982 be granted for the payment of the salaries of the Missionaries as mentioned above, subject to the general regulations regarding any alterations which may be found necessary. The following grants were then passed:—

To the Executive Committee for contingencies, for the current year, \$220.

To the Lord Bishop for aid in the education of the children of certain clergymen, \$160.

Balance of appropriation of last year re-granted, \$26.60.

To the widows of the late Revs. J. M. Sterling, T. W. Robertson, and T. McGhee, each \$100.

It was then moved that there be granted to the Treasurer and Secretary each \$100; to which it was moved as an amendment by Mr. W. Jack, that the Salary of the Secretary and Treasurer for the year ending on the 1st day of April, 1865, be £25 each, payable quarterly.

To which it was further moved as an amendment to the amendment by Mr. C. H. Fairweather, that the sum of \$100 be paid to the Treasurer and Secretary for their services for the period ending 1st April 1865, the sums to be paid immediately

after the Anniversary Meeting, which latter motion was carried in the affirmative.

To the Book Depository Committees of Saint John and Fredericton, for the importation of books \$400. Books of the value of \$60 from the said Depositories to the several Local Committees, to be appropriated by the Executive Committee.

To the Rev. J. S. Williams in aid of a Church School at Campobello \$40.

To the Lord Bishop to enable him to pay certain costs in the DeWolf case, \$119.10.

On the motion of Mr R. D. Wilket that the sum of \$40 be granted in aid of the new Church at Burton, it was moved as an amendment by Mr. C. H. Fairweather, that owing to the state of the funds, it is impossible to make upon this occasion, any grants in aid of churches, which amendment was carried in the affirmative.

On motion of Rev. W. Jaffrey—Resolved, that the sum of \$40 granted last year for the payment of a catechist at St. Mary's be re-granted and appropriated in aid of the endowment fund of the said Parish.

The Lord Bishop read the following letter from the Rev. E. H. Wkins, B. D., Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel :—

My Dear Lord,—

I am directed to communicate to you the result of the Society's recent consideration of the grants made to your Diocese.

It was Resolved—

1. That while the several grants, amounting in all to £1050, P. A., payable to certain of the elder missionaries, under agreement with the Colonial Office, will be passed as heretofore, they will cease on the death or removal of such missionaries.

2. That in lieu of the grants amounting in the aggregate to £575, viz. The Rev. Messrs. Williams £50; Dowling £50; DeVeber £25; Street £100; Woodman £100; Schofield £75; Bliss £100; Pickett £75; a sum of £500 be placed at the disposal of the Bishop and the Diocesan Church Society for the year 1865.

3. That after the year 1865 the Society will be compelled to make a considerable reduction (not less than £400 per year) in the grants to the Diocese of Fredericton.

The Society shares your disappointment at the backwardness of the laity to support the clergy in their efforts to raise an endowment fund.

Hawkins read by the Lord Bishop to this meeting, and the committee beg to state that already at their meeting held July 1861, they expressed their readiness to accept a former proposal, of the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, after the details connected therewith were satisfactorily arranged between the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and this Society; this committee therefore beg the venerable Society to re-consider the subject, with a view of carrying out the original proposal.

On motion of Rev. S. D. Lee Street, That in future the clergy and other collectors of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society be required, in their list of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication, to insert in such lists only the names of such persons as have either paid the amount subscribed, or who have so secured the same as to enable the clergyman or collector to become personally answerable that the whole shall be paid before the expiration of the year. To which it was moved as an amendment by the Rev. Canon Gray to strike out the word "either" in the foregoing resolution, and all the words after "the amount subscribed," which amendment was carried in the affirmative.

The Lord Bishop left the Chair, and on motion the Rev. Canon Harrison took the same, whereupon on motion of the Rev. Canon Coster, seconded by Mr. L. H. DeVeber, it was Resolved unanimously that the cordial thanks of this Committee be tendered to his Lordship for his kind and patient attention in the Chair.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE  
COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY  
FOR THE PAST YEAR.

The Minutes of the Meeting of this Committee, held at Fredericton July 3rd 1863. may be found in full in the 28th Report, pages 38-40

The next Meeting of this Committee was held at St. John on the 1th October.

The account of Barnes & Co., for printing the Report, amounting to \$134.84, was passed, and ordered to be paid.

Rev. Canon Coster, from the Committee on the Treasurer's Accounts, reported certain deficiencies in payment from the Local Committees, and the Secretary was requested to write to the said Committees to secure the payment of any deficiency as early as possible, and that they be requested in future to adhere to the resolutions of the Executive Committee passed on the 7th of March 1860.

Mr. W. Jack, from the Loan Committee presented the following Report, which was received and ordered to be entered upon the minutes :

With reference to the letter of the Secretary of the 9th July, and its enclosure, the letter of the Rev. Charles P. Bliss, of the 30th June last, the Committee are of opinion that the devise of the late Peter Ketchum to the Church Society, not being for the general purposes of the Society but upon a special trust, the Society have no power to treat with the owners of the life estate for a sale to them of the rights of the Church Society in the property, but are bound to carry out the trusts according to the terms of the will. 5th October, 1863.

An account of the Secretary for incidental expenses from July to this date amounting to \$12.33 was read, and ordered to be paid.

A statement of the Treasurer's account made up to 1st Oct., was read and received.

At the next meeting of this Committee, held in Fredericton, January 6th, 1864, a letter was read from the Secretary, stating that he had attended to the direction given him at the last meeting of this Committee, respecting certain deficiencies in payments to the Treasurer, and that he trusted the amounts due would shortly be paid.

The grant of \$40 made to the New Church at New Mary-

land, was ordered to be paid upon the certificate of the Rev. C. S. Medley that the conditions had been complied with.

The Committee met at St. John on the 2nd March, 1864.

A statement of the Treasurer's account made up to 27th February, was read and received.

Rev. Canon Coster from the Committee on the Treasurer's Accounts, read a report which was ordered to be received.

On motion of the Rev. Canon Gray, D. D. it was resolved that the Clergy in forwarding the amounts of subscriptions and collections for the Society to the Treasurer, be respectfully requested always to send therewith a list of the amounts actually received, and of the parties who have paid them, and that the Secretary shall ascertain from the Treasurer the precise amounts paid in by the said parties, before he allows any lists to be printed in the Report, and that a printed copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Secretary to each of the Clergy.

An account of the Secretary for postage, &c., travelling, and other expenses incurred at the Special Meeting of the Society, from October to this date amounting to \$18 04, was ordered to be paid.

At the meeting of this Committee at Fredericton, on the 1st of June, the accounts of the Treasurer, made up to the 1st of May, were submitted, showing a cash balance in favor of the Society of \$758 81.

A report of the Committee on Accounts was read, showing a small balance due on the contributions reported for the past year.

The Secretary submitted a report of the proceedings of this Committee for the past year, which was received, and he was requested to add thereto an abstract of the proceedings of this meeting and to lay the report before the General Committee.

It was resolved that the Rev. Canon Gray, D. D., Mr. H. W. Frith, and Mr. W. M. Wright be a Committee to assist in making arrangements for the Anniversary Meeting.

An application was made by the Rev. G. Rogers, for an order for payment of the grant made in 1863, in aid of the Church at the Irish Settlement, it was resolved that under the exceptional circumstances of the case, the said application be referred to the General Committee.

The Hon. J. A. Street, laid before the Committee, an account for costs in the DeWolf case, amounting in all to \$109.77; it was resolved that the said accounts be laid before the General Committee, and recommended for payment.

Rev. W. Jaffrey, read a report with reference to two lots of land in the Parish of Stanley, given to the Society by the Rev. James Neales, stating that the land had been sold under the directions of the Bishop,—that the sum of \$132 had been received and paid to the Treasurer, and that the balance still due is \$166 55, together with a small balance of interest.

The Committee met at St. John on the 8th July, 1864.

An abstract account of the Book and Depository Committees of St. John and Fredericton, was read, and ordered to be received.

On motion—Resolved, that 3000 copies of the Annual Report be printed, and that the Revs. Canon Coster, W. H. DeVeber, and Mr. H. W. Frith, be a Committee to act with the Secretary in the performance of that duty.

On motion—Resolved, That the Revs. Canon Coster, Canon Harrison, W. E. Scovil, W. Armstrong, W. H. DeVeber and Mr. Joseph Fairweather; Mr. W. Wright, and Mr. W. Jack, do compose the Saint John Book Depository Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion—Resolved, That the Rev. C Lee, Rev. J. Pearson, the Hon the Master of the Rolls, Mr. J. Wilkinson, Mr. W. Carman and Mr. E. Simonds, do compose the Fredericton Book Depository Committee for the ensuing year.

And further Resolved, That Mr. W. Wright, Mr. F. A. Wiggins and Mr. W. Jack, do compose the Loan Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion—Resolved, That the Treasurer's Accounts be from time to time referred for examination to a Committee, to report thereon to the Executive Committee; and that the Rev. Canon Coster, Mr. C. H. Fairweather and Mr. L. H. DeVeber do compose the said Committee.
