- The herring fishery in the neighbourhood of P. E. Tsland is turning out very successful. The cod fishery is also said to promise well.
- A first and tinal dividend of 10 cents on the dollar has been dechared on the estate of Freeman I. Daniels, hotelkecper, Prescott.

-Mr, Kelley, the missing contractor, is supposed to be all right, having been heard of in New York.

- It is reported that the Canada Sonthern Railway is abont to lease the Port Dover and Lake Huron road.
- The Oredit Valley Railway Company are surveying and pushing forward the work of construction in the vicinity of Ingersoll.
- Edward Mackay, Esq., of hisis city, has been appointed $\Omega$ Harbur Commissioner, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Jolm Young.
-Twenty-four cars, built in Detroit, for the New'York Elevated Railway, passed over the Canada Southern Railway a few days ago. Their wheels were made of compressed paper.
-The book debts of the estate of James Henderson, general merchant, Elora, amounting to $\$ 1,470$, were sold by the assignee, a few days ago, for $\$ 208$.
-The name of the Eric Railway has been changed, by the new regime under which it bus passed, to the "New York, Lake Erie and Western Railvay."
- An Uttawa grocer, named McAmmond, disappared mysteriously a few daysago, and has not since been heard from. It is said he had some notes falling due shortly.
- For the year ending December 31, 1877, the fish catch at the port of Goderich, according to the Government returns, was ralued at \$20,9.40.
- A seventh liquidation dividend of two per cent. Las been diclared in the Metropolitan Bank settlement, reducing the paid-up capital stock to fifty-live per cent.
-The spring fleet is rapidly leaving Quebec, and in $n$ few days very few vessels will be left in port. A long and exceptionally dull midsummer is unticipated.
- The liubilities of T. W. Currier \& Co.
flaning mills, Ottawa, amount to over \$150,000 It is understood that an offer of 35 cents on the dollar, unsecured, in five equal pryments, has been made by the insolvents.
- Thomas Stephens, hotelkeeper, Scaforth, offers lis creditors 35 cents on the dollar, in 0 , 9,12 and 15 months, secured. A meeting of creditors will be leld on the 1 th inst, to take the offer into consideration.
- The Union Bank of Lower Canada has declared a dividend of 2 per cent. for the current half year. Referring to the dividend of the Bank of Commerce, the types last week made us say the dividend was for the current year instead of the current half year.
- The New York I'ribune says the insurance companies have agreed upon uniform rates on gatain cargoes between lake ports, based on 40 conts on all A steam vessels, and 50 cents for each 100 on suiling vessels, between Chicago and Bullulo.
- Counterfeit half dollars are in circulation at Brantford. The coiners have been arrested. Counterfeit notes of the following banks and denominations are also in circulation : Dominion \$4's, old issue; Bank of British North America, \$5's, stamped Kingston; Ontario. \$10's.
-Statements of the business done at the principal Custom Houses for the month of May show a considerable increase over jlast yeat. At this port the receipts this year were S324:434.52 and last year $\$ 311,927.20$, showing an increase of $\$ 12,507.32$. At Toronto the receipts this year were $\$ 140,062$, an increase of $\$ 8,541$.
- Where hats been a large increase in the number of vessels arrived in the port of Montreal up to the end of May this season over previous years. The number this year foots up to 109. Up to the same date in 1877, the arrivals were 73 . In 1896 they were 85 , and in 1875 they were 78.
-It is very gratifying to notice the decrease in the number of insolvencies, which shows two things, that busines; is improving, and that the umeliable houses luve been pretty well weeded out. The Official Giazelte of 1st June contained only five nen notices of failure in the Province of Quebec, and none of these were in Montreal.
- Competition is the life of trade, but sounetimes one of the competitors gets outwitted. Two Otfawa nerchants competed with each other in "marking down" ready-made pantaloons. When one had reduced his goods to thirty cents below cost, the other sent agents and bought up the best portion of them.
- For the eleven months ending 31st May, 1878, Uttawa imported flour and grain as follows; Whent 4,963 bushels, value $\$ 7,012$; Indian Corn 5,351 bushels, value $\$ 2,051$; Oats $.3,233$ busbels, value 5777 ; Flour 5 barrels, value $\$ 37$; Meal i4 barrels; value $\$ 39$. Total value, S10,825.
-Some time argo we anticipated failures among the boot and shoe men of Peterboro' on account of the numberengaged in the business. We have already had to record several, and now come two more, those of Thomas Rountree and Jolin W. Miller. Neither of them are very large dealers, and their liabilities will not be heary.
- The Supreme Court at Ottawa gave judgment a few days ago to the effect that bankruptey and a decd of nssignment in the United States could not affect real estate in Canada. In some insurance appeals it was held that a wrong description of the property did not void the policy, when the mistake was made by the agent of the company.
- One dealer in Chatham, Ont., shipped to England and Germany during March and April, thirty-seven car loads of clover seed, which is equal to about 13,000 bushels, costing some $\$ 50,000$.

-The improvement made in ressels within the last tiw years is very remarkable. of two Atlantic steamers, one buitt in 1840 and one built to-day, the later carries fifteen times as much as the fommer did, with donble the speed, aud an immense saving of fuel.

- There is on exhibition at Messars. Savage d Lyman's, in this city, a bar of gold from the Jennings mine, near Truro, N. S., and some specimens of ore. The bar weighs abont fifypine ounces, and is worth between $\$ 1,100$ and $\$ 1,200$. It is said to be the result of the labors of eighteen men for twenty days at a cost of $\$ 435$.
-The failure of S. R. Wickett, leather deater, of Toronto, is aunouncel, a writ of attachment having being issued, and Kerr A Anderson, assignees, being in possession. Mr. Wiekett is the security for John Holmes' recent composition, and his fature is rikely to aullify the arrangement.
- The dispute between Messrs. Baylis and Drummond of this city, arising out of an attempt of the former to force the latter into insolvency, has been amicably settled. The suit for damages against Mr. Baylis has been withdrawn, and the $\$ 12,000$ in bonds in the hands of Mr. Drummond, have been handed over to Mr. Baylis.
-Dr. Cammichael, a young physician of Ottawa, who commenced mactise there some four or five jears ago, and started in the drng business about the same time, has friled, with liabilities amounting to between 84,000 and 55,000 . A doctor who has anything of a practise, generally finds that he has enongls to attend to without selling drags and dye-stutis as well.
-The Sardiniun appears to have suffered very little by the explosion which recently took place on board. A Liverpool paper says she

Heretofore, it has been the practied to clear for any port, whether there was a Castom Honse there or not, but now collectors have been apointed at all the priacipal ports, and there is a penalty of $\$ 800$ imposed, with the forfeiture of the gocis, if landed elsewhere.
- A fur dealer of Adams, N. Y., who has been pursuing bis business at Kingston, recently shipped from there over a ton and a-balf of furs, consisting of 19,000 musk rats and some other fine furs; and $a$ few days later shipped three tons, consisting of over $3 \overline{5}, 000$ musk rats, with a good proportion of tine beaver, mink, martins, otter, Sc. Jlany of the furs were procured from North Frontenac.
- A writ of attachment has issued against Albert Odell, the Sherbrooke jeweller, whose case we noticed last week. His creditors seem disposed to make a searching enquiry into his athins, and if fraudulent practices are proved, it is to be hoped they will not be covered up by a subsequent compromise, but that the cause of commercial morality will be vindicated.
- Louis Ratelle, of Terrebonne, a storekeeper of long standing, some sixteen years or move, has suecumbed to the long-continued depression, and an attachment has been served on him. He has been reported as hard up and pushed to meet his engagements for some months past, and his failure is therefore not altogether unexpected. Liabilities about $\$ \mathrm{C}, 000$ to $\$ 8,000$.

- J. G. Gill, a stove and coal dealer of Fredericton, N B., has surprised his creditors, not agreeably, by proposing to pay them 20 cents on the dollar of their claims. This, in the face of the generally held opinions of his good standing, is surprising. His record up to the lest moment was a good one, and there is an impression that an investigation would be en reyle before accepting his offer. One of his principal creditors for $\$ 2,200$ is secured.

## CHARGES ON COLLECTING DUTIESS.

It must be admitted that some explanation is due to the public, in addition to what is given in the public accounts, with reference to the deductions from the customs revenue, and especially at the port of Montreal, under the head of charges. Our attention was first drawn to this subject by Senator Macpherson's speech in the Senate on the public expenditure, and if any reply was made, it escaped our notice. The Senator did not deal unfairly with the subject, for he admitted that it would be wholly impossible to reduce the expenses of collecting in the proportion of the decrease in the revenue. He complained chiefly of a large increase in the face of a declining revenue. The reduction in the revenue at the port of Montreal in 1877 is in round figures $\$ 2,000,000$ as compared with 1875 , while the cost of collection has increased by about $\$ 18,000$. The Montreal Gazette, in a very elaborate article on the same subject, includes five
years revenue and charges, while Senator Macpherson took threc. The increase in 1877 as compared with 1873 is about $\$ 30,000$. The fact that this very extriordinary increase has been attributed to the creation of subordinate oflices in order to reward political adherents renders it the more incumbent on the Government to offer satisfactory explanations if in their power. Our own belief' is that it will be found on investigation that one cause of the great increase is owing to a change in the mode of keeping the accounts, and if wo are correct in what we admit is a mere surmise, we think that a considerable improvement has been effected. We find that in the year 1877 the amount disbursed through the collector as charges connected with the examining warehouse was upwards of $\$ 14,000$. In 1876 the examining warehouse charges were over $\$ 12,000$, of which $\$ 5,645$ was for cartage. Now in 1873 there is a charge of $\$ 3,952$ for "excess of expenses over collections at examining warehouse., Our surmise is that from 1873 up to 1875 , it was the practice to pay expenses out of receipts, and to charge only the balance of expense, and that the present rule is to creditall receipts and chargo all expensesShould we be correct, it would, we are assured, be admitted by Senator Macpherson that the modem practice is an juprovement. We have not been able to satisfy ourselves that the examining warehouse receipts have been credited, though we do not doubt that it will prove so. The mode adopted by Senator Macpherson and by the Gazettc of blocking the charges does not convey a correct idea of facts. It will be found on examimation that the year 1875 was that of the largest revenue at the port of Montreal of the five years in the Gazette's table and of the three in Senator Macpherson's, and it is the year that the Senator contrasts with the other two to show the great increase in the two latter while the revenue was decreasing. Now it so happens that in the year 1875 the number of employees and the amount of salaries were greater then in either 1876 or 1877 , and instead of there being a progressive increase in salaries there has really been a reduction in the number of cmployees and consequently in the salaries. The true mode of ascertaining the charges is to separate the disbursements for salaties, which are furnished in detail to each individual, from the incidental expenses paid through the collector. It will appear, unless we are much mistaken, that in 1875 there were 110 employes, receiving $\$ 88,308,58$; in 1876, 102 employes, receiving $\$ \$ 1,024$. 93: and in 1877,97 employes, receiving
$\$ 80,513.33$. The number of employes in 1877 is precisely the same as in 1873 . In 1874 there was a general increase in sala. ries. Tide waiters were raised from $\$ 500$ to $\$ 050$, appraisers from $\$ 500$ to $\$ 900$, and clerks and other subordinate oflicers in like proportion. We are not aware whether this was under instructions from the present Government or the one which preceded it, as it was in the very year of the change, but it is not a point of much importance. We clo not think there is anything in the sahary buach of the charges which even calls for explanation. The disbursements through the collector have increased from $\$ 14,525$ in 1873 to $\$ 37,476$ in 1877 . We have given what we believe to be a correct solution of one branch of charge. There is another formidable increase under the hend of wages of lockers. The other large item is the cost of insurance, fivel, water, gas, postages, telegraphing, etc., eic., but there is $n 0$ very material variation in it. It has been usual heretofore, when explamations are required upon such items of expenditure as those which we have been considering, to demand it in the committee on public accounts, whero it can always begiven promptly by offeers acilua inted with the details. List session there was more discussion in the Senate on the public expenditure than in the Honse of Commons, owing to the fact that Semator Macpherson has deroted a large share of his attention to the subject.

## THE SUGAR DUTIES.

We copy a second letter from Mr. Alexander MucGibbon on the interesting subject of the sugre cluties, and shall avail ourselves of the opportunity to make a lew additional remarks. Before doing so we must explain that, in referring to Mr. MeGibbon's formerletter as being " obviously intended to serve a political object" we did not at all mean to imply that he had any personal object to serve, nor indeed did we mean to convey more than that the political bias of the letter was calculated to detract in some degree from the force of the argument. With regard to his present letter we are glad to observe that the writer admits framkly that the question is not free from difliculty. Mr. MeGibbon camnot, we presume, be unaware of the fact that the export trade in "American whites" has been largely stimulated by the importation into the United States, at very low rates of duty, of sugar of the best quality artificially colored, so as to enable it to oome in under the Dutch standard test of color below what it ought to have paid. A special treasurycommission has been
sitting for some time on the subject, and a new description of test, the polariscope, hat been suggested, The latest information on the sulyuret is flat the commission has unanimously agred to a report recommending that the polariscope be discarded as a test for sugars, and that specific duties be levied. 'Ihe rates suggested are to be based on the Dutch standird, the number being fourteen instead of thitteen, which is our number for the fall in duty, and are to be uniform, jnstead of graduated as with us, and are to be double on all sugar exceeding No. 14 Dutch standard. 'This will be a new policy. Before the Imperial Government abandoned all duties on sugar there were graduated rates on five classes, the highest rate being if) per cent. over the lowest. In the United States there have been six classes, and the highest rate has been rather more than double that of the lowest. The new proposition would be to leave the highest rate at what it is at present, aul to increase by fully 50 per cent. or more the duties on sugar yanging from fourteen Dutch standard to twenty and upwards. On the other hand, the duties on the grates above seven and up to fourteen would be considerably reducod. Onv Cumaclian policy as established in LStiS, when Sir Johin Rose was Minister of Finance, and Mr.'Tilley, Minister of Customs, was based chielly on ad valorem mates ; and Mr. Dustan has admitted in his last letter that he is favorable to this system. The reason for placing an additional specific duty was that it was held, and wo think correctly, that the tempta tion to fyud when ad valorem rates ex ceed 25 per cent. is too great to render it expedient to adopt them. On this ground a rate was fixed of 1 cent. por lb. on the quantities equal to or above No. 9 Dutch stanclard, $\hat{a}$ of a cent. on all below No. 9 and $\frac{8}{8}$ on melado. The lowest rate of the combined ad $v a l o r e m$ and specific duties has been estimated to be about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cent per lb., whilo the highest camot be much if at all, short of 3 cents. 'The variation in the duties between the lowest and highest grades would therefore appear to be about double, or equal to what is proposed according to the recommendation of the United States commission, and 50 per cent. greater than the variation between the highest and lowest grades for a number of years previous to the abolition of the English sugar duties. The question of the sugar duties must be discussed without reference to frouds or to exceptional circumstances, which we are; nevertheless, ready to admit, may requine special legislation. The tariff however must bo finned in accondance with prin-
ciple, and wo are gratified to find that Mi. Medibloon admits that the nomount of encourgement or protection which is really a tax on the consumers should receive the sedious attention of all parties We were for some time urging Mr. Dustan who has of late been the special advocate of the refining interest, to state precisely what would satisfy him, and in his letter of the lith, published in the Jounval or Commerme of Joth April, he has specified what the refiner's would be contented with. Now Mr. Liustan daims that the specific claty on sugar under 9 Dutch standard, which is at present one half cent per $] b$. or 50 cents per 100 lbs. should be reduced to $37!$ cents per 100 lbs. Now this is a demand immeasumably beyond any protedion that has been clamed by the refining interest in the United States. It is to be borne in mind that these sugars have the pro tection of the ad calorem duty of 25 per cent., which is equal to about 50 cents per 100 lbs. beween very high and low grarles, so that high-priced refined sugars woukl pay in round figures $\$ 3$ per 100 lbs , while low-priced would pay, under Mr. Dustan's sclame, BT ${ }^{3}$ eents per J 00 los., specitic, and 3 joer cent. ad valorem, equal to 57 : or in all $\$ 1.25$, or a protec tion of 81.75 per iun lus. If our calculations are erroneous we feel assured that Mr. Dustan and Mr. McGibbon will believe that they are umintentionally so, and that we shall be only too realy to acknowledge and correct any error that may be found in them. MLr. MuGibbon expresses the opinion that "it makes no difiorence to "the treasury whethor the duty is col" lected on the raw article or the refined." Now, in round figures the consumption of imported sugars may be estimated at 100,000,000 lbs., which at $\$ 3$ per 100 lbs. according to our own estimate above, would y ield $53,000,000$. If the same quantity were to go into consumption at $\$ 1.2 \overline{2}$, which is Mr. Dustan's proposition, it would yield $\$ 1,250,000$, entailing a loss to the revenue of $31,750,000$. It must be understood that we are dealing with extreme prices on both sides. If we take the averages, under the prosent tarill the loss to the revenue would he about $\$ 1,000,000$ if the sugars imported were to pay the rates in the lowest instead of in the highest scale. If a tariff were adopted more favorable to the refiners the loss to the revenue wonld, of couse, be materially increased. In considering the suga duties it inust be constantly borne in mind that they constituto a most important branch of on revenue, and that they cannot be trifled with even to secure the establishment, of what we admit would be
a most beneficial industry. Had Mr. MoGibbon confined himself to $a$ censure on the Govermment for having pormitted the introduction of foreign sugars under a bounty we should not have interfered in tho discussion, for we maintain that it is not sound policy to permit foreigners to force goods upon our consumers in violation of the natural laws of trade. Concur ring entirely as we do with Mr. Dustan and Mr. McGibbon in the propricty of imposing a combervaling duty on foreign sugas equal to any bounty granted to them, we are well aware that England has not acted on that principle. Mr. Dustan referred to the Convention between England, France,Belgium, and the Netherlands as enacting a surtax. This is an error. We believe that the Convention authorizes the contracting parties to impose a surtax, but England has not imposed it, aurl in a very late English paper we observed that a deputation of West Indian planters had been remonstrating. as vigorously as Mr. Dustan las been doing. here, against the importation of beet-root sugar in its crude state on which bounty is granted in Franee, and which, of course, has material advantages in the English market over the sugar of our own colonies, It is the produce of this very specially favored sugar that we receive in the form of "Scotch yellows," and which Mr, McGibbon lins the candor to admit is a "difficult subject" to grapple with. He is of opinion that the Scotch" have a secret in adulteration" noi known to the A'mericans. We should imagine that a chenical amalysis of the Scotch yellow would at all events disclose the mature of the adulteration. We confess that after a full consideration of Mr. MeGibbon's letter wo do not discover that he has suggested any other remedy than a countervailing duty on American sugrars equal to the bounty, a proposal to which wo see no objection, but which, wa are much inclined to think, would not lead to the re-opening of our refineries, nor to the abandonment of the trade in Scolch yellows. The subject, although not free from difficulties, has undergone so much discussion that it cannot be very difficult to arrive at an equitable solution, and more especially if it should not be further complicated by altempts to establish beet sugar manufactories, which we should hail with delight were it not that their sole lope of success would be based on an enormous protection under which consumers would have to pay high? prices, while the sugar revenue would be completely destroyed.

## TRADE PARALYSTS.

The most recent accomsts of the principal British and Continental industries are most discouraging. In Lameashire there has been a complete paralysis in the cotton trade, and the disputes between the employers and the operatives have culminated in serious riots and the wreck ing of several mills. Blackburn seems to have been the place that has suffered most. In Preston the operatives had resumed work at the recluced rates, bint owing to the refusal of the East-lancashire operatives to aecept the reduction, the 'Preston members of tho Masters' Association ordered their mills to be closed, thus throwing thousands on the streats. The society of the Operatives Association had issued a manifesto appealing for public help, the conclusion of which is as follows:-"Whatever destitution, " crime and immorality may emanate " from the lock-out of so many thousands "of men, women and children in Preston " will not have been brought about by any "action on our part. We have umre"servedly submitted to the employers" "terms. Can human naturo be expected "to do more than make entire submis"sion." The Preston case is calculated to excite grent sympathy, owing to the unconclitional submission of the operatives and to the absence of amy serious rioting. In South Wales large numbers of men are being discherged from the steel works, and in several collieries, also, hands are being discharged. The pig iron trate is said to be deplorably bad, and the French and Belgian coal and iron trades are all better off than in England. It is much to be regretted that, not only an the leading trades in the British manufacturing districts, bui likewise those on the continent of Europe, are in a state of the greatest depression. In Lancashire, especially, the stoppage of the mills mast produce distress of the most areravated character, and must lean, it may bo Teared, to calamitous resulis.

Tho results of the year's business, as shown in the statement, are the more sitisfictory when we consider the chameter of the period through which the comtry has been passing, and reflect the highest eredit upon those who have the control and direction of its af. fatrs. Canadians in all puts of the Dominion, and people in all parts of the word who have any basiness relations with us, naturally look to the bank of Montreal as the great index of our worth and progress as a people. The remarks mate by the president, Mi. Geo. Stephen, one of our foremost merchants and manufacturers, of Mr. Thomas Workman, M.P., sonior partner in the lending hardware firm of Frothingham \& Workman, of the robust veteran financiar, Sir Alex. T. Galt, and of the Hon. Thomas Ryan, will commend themselves as repleto with sound practical wisdom. The romarks of Mr. R. B. Angus, the Gencral Manager, in reply to the resolution tendering the thanks of the mecting to himself, the managers, agents and other ofticers of the bank, contain a condensed and comprohensive view of the financial and business situation, which will be read wilh interest far and near. Fortunate aro the sharehollors of the Bank of Montreal.

## THE VANDAL IN THE FOREST.

Such is the caption of an articlo in a recent issue of the New York Times prefixed to a communication from Mr. James Little of this city, lumber merchant, addressed to Mon. David A. Wells, on the all important subject of the timberstuply. Mr. Little has sounded many a note of waming to Canadian lumbermen through the press and in pamphlet form, with but little effect it is feared, and now he makes an appent to the reckless destroyers on both sides of the line to patuse in their devastation and think of the future. As Mr. Litite is a gentleman considemably adranced in years he can have no selfish object in pursuing this sulyect to the extent noted, and the not fir distant future will probably prove that in this case he might reasonably sny :
"Tis the sunset of life gives me mystical lore, And coming crents cast their shadurs befure.
Doubtless the majority of lumbermen in Camada as well as in the United States are fully aware of the value of Mr. Little's words, but in too many instances these later years stem necessity has compelled them to take the short cut in order to save themselves from total destruction. The lumberman in this despect often resembles the robust youth who heeds not. for the future, but squanders, or mather
dissipates, that abundant strenglh and health which he should conserve to make provision towards a "green old age." As the Jimes says, Mr. Jittle goes over the ground thoroughly in his letter, which should commend itself for its combined terseness and comprehensiveness, and for tho vital importance of its sulject to all legishators and public-spirited citizens. Although the subject from this point of view has been repentedly disenssed in the pages of the Joumath of Commence, the following lengthy extract from Mr. Little's letter will not be found valueless. After reforring to his own experience of half a century in lumbering oprerations, and witnessing how rapidly one extensive timber section after another in Western Ontario, where he mostly operated, was stripped of its commercial woots, as the cause of his being led to an investigation of the sources and extent of the supply to meet the everincreasing consumption of the United States and Canadn, he says:
I find of the 26 Sintes comprising the New Eugland, the Middle, the Western and Nurthwestern to the Rocky Monntains, only four, numuly, Muine, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesona, are now able to furnish supplies leyourd their own reçurements, and I will now pint out the combtion these Sintes are reduced to. toueching their sulphy of building timber, and how long they may be expected to stand tho draill on theirf resis at the rate of comsimption going on of this indispensable material. The Sitate of Muine which, not long since, could boast of most extensive pine forests, is now mit but stripped of that valunhe wood, and is luesides so fir denuded of its once-snpposed inexhanstible suphly of spruce that the lumberers are forced to the head-waters and tributaries of every river in the Sute to hant for supplies, and are stocking their mills in a harge measure -with logs cut from sapling poles of from six to eight inches in diameter, and ihis reckless and wasteful slaughtering is carried on to such an extent to supply the neighboring Slates and for shipment abrond, that ia few jears will find the people of that State without buidding timber, either pine or siruce, for their home consumption. The northern sections of Bicligam, Wisconsin, and Minnesota are the only jocalities of the whole 26 States that are able to furnish supplies of white pine beyond the wants of their own respecive states, and the demand on them is so heary for all sections of the country that it will not be possible for them to respond to it fir more than six or seven years longer. Their manin streans are all stripped, and the lumberers me now oferating at ind head-waters of their tributaries, where they are forced to bank many of their logs in dry gullius, depeudang on the Winter's show and Spring rains to podace freshots suflicient to flout them to the main streans, and whicin often fiil, as will be the case with many of them this season, for wat of water to move them frum where the loggers have hauled them. A number of railways have also been built to secure the lumber traticic of these timber sectivas; no less than six are now running through every path of timber otherwise innecesstble to the loggers on the lower peniusula of Michigm, hitherto the greatest lumber-suphying State of the Union, and the mill-uwners themselves laving miny of liem exhatsed their timber withis ie em- hanling distance, are busily at work building milwhs on their own acconnt to enable them to reach what are now the ontskirts of their once supposed inexhaustible tunber resources. And lere, in these three timber sections, and in the positions Thare pointel out is to lie foude the whote
white pine supply for the consumption of your whole country enst of the Pacific slope, and were the whole of that supply brought to one point it could all be covered with the palm of one's hand on any ordinary map of the United. States; and yet, notwibstanding this state of the ease, the lumberers keep slanghtering nway as if life depended on how soon fhey: could rob the conntry of its timber wealth and bring about a timber famine to the biter ruin of the wood industries of the conntry, in which evers member of the community is deeply interested. member of the communty is deeny interested. Not satisfied with the havoc they are making
to lieep their own markets continunly lergely overstocked, they have also made extensive prepmations by fitting up their mills for the manufacture of deals, to drive, as their lumber papers boast they will, the Camadian supply out of the British markets, and they are besides at work using up the best of their white pine in at work using up the best of their white pine in
the manufacture of boardwood and square tmthe manufacture of board wood and symare tam-
ber for the same markets, a course most destracber for the same markets, a course most destrite-
tive to the forests. In fact, lighting the candle at both ends would fitil to fitly describe the utter recklessness and tolly of their proceedings - they are casting it bodily into the lire.

We shave theories and speculations on the forests as influencing the rain-fall, nnit their yalne as reservoirs to keep up a supply of water for your rivers, water-courses, and canals, and aftord power for maehinery, but who has given considerition to the consequences to your whole country of a dearth of tinber? Who of your statesmen has given his mind to think on its eflects on the 174,400 industrial establishments, and the $1, n 93,202$ operatives, who, ns shown by your consus returns, ns far back as 1870 , are engaged therein, providing your people with the finished wood materals so ind gipensatble to their well-buing? Who of the delegations from the North-western timber sections, that are now praying Congress to prevent Canada from giving any assistance to proloag the life of these giving inny assistance to prolong ane the consequences of a fature in their timber supply on the settlement of your boundess, treeless prainie country, or the deprivations it will entail on its inhabittants, and the millions who are to make it heir home? Who of your whole people has given himself the trouble to understand that it would require you to raise $\$ 500,000,000$ to send abroad 10 purcluse an amount of lumber equal to your present consmmption for a single year, or that all the tonnage of the whole world would fall far short of being nble to freight it from your Pacific Territories to your Athatic seabuard? The aggregated freighting capacity of the world is only about $18,601,000$ of tons, while the 12,755,000,000 feet of lumber shown by your census returns of 1870 to hare been sn wn in 1569 would make a wanage of $21,000,000$, from which it will be seen that, without taking into account the thotsnnds of millions of shifugles and the milliois of feet of timber of all kinits consumed at the same time, there is not tonnige enough in existence to lieeight that single item of snwn lumber alone aromad Cape Horr, and bow inadequate it would be to meet the shipping reguirements for the whale cousumption of all kinds of building timber and wood for other industrial purposes of the present duy, und how minch more so by the time your present stock is exhmusted with so many more millions ot consumers to be supplied?

And what have jour authorities been toing to meet this state of things? Wave they been making provisiou to keep up the supply by trecplanting, as in Northern Europe? Have they been husbanding their forest wealthond preServing it from spoil and waste? On the contrary, have they not been predigal in their efforts to get rid of it by making presents of it to corporations and disposing of it for a tritte of its value to individual speculators-one of Whom, in the West, boascing that he owns theefifths of the cork pine in. Ifichigan, Wisconsin, and Ninnesota, and anothre in the East, chaming to be the owner of over 000,000 acres of land selected for its timber value? Have they not been standing quietly by looking on at the extensive robberies committed on the public dumain that have been carried on for years in the South and Nuth-west; by which not only
the home markes have been kept largely overstucked, to the ing i. 1 oi all legitimate operaturs, but the foreigun nutikets as well have been kept glated to such an extent that even beat plungluted to such in extent that even the phunber, nad but litite for the labor expended in preparing it for market? And have they not, for the sole bemetit of these corporations and speculators, and to the injury of every other individual of the commonity, been forcing Oanada to find makets abrond for her timber and lumber by the imposition of dutics? And are they not even now, with the preseat condition of things stating them in the fice, prepring a tarifl in which the same obstructions nre to be continued to prevent this comntry from giving assistance 10 mitigate or protrace to any extent the impending deluge su soon to sweep over your whole cuantry?
From the utter indifitence and neglect with which this momentons question of the supply and consumption of timber is treated by your people, it might be supposed you could dispense ultogether with its use, or that you could reproduce it as easily as rusing a crop of com, or that you wonld have no dificulty in finding a substitute, but it lakes a century to grow a slandard pine saw-log, and if there is a country on earth in a position 10 do without or tind a substitute for timber, that conntry is Great Britain, und yet she increased lee whot consumptionat an trerage rate of 10 per cent. a year tim the last 14 years, and last ycar, as shown by her trade retinins, it was 31 per eent. more than in 1875, and the import of that island, not hatf the area of your Siate of Texas, and being, as the area of your Sate of Texas, and being, as
it were, thoronghy. finished up throughovt its whole extent, showing no further room for improvements, amomed to no less than $\oint 100$,600,000, Jut large as that sum is, it is comprratively amall to what the United States will soob yearly 1 p called en to supply for its own wood consumption, and it is nota luxury that cun be thrownaside at will; it is indispeusable to the national well-being.

I know that the impression prevails, nud it is ofien stated by interestrd partieg, that it matters litale what is the condition of your supplies, as you have but to look to Canada, where can be found "enough for the most exacting poppulations of the world for centuries," which is the statement usually made by those utterly ignorant of its true condition, or those who dosufor a purpose; and I will here assert, from a persomal knowledge of most of the timber sections of Camada, and tustworthy reports from others, that we hare not, from the far-oti Province of Nanitobil to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, as much pune, spatuce, hemlock, onk, ash, elm, as mith pme, sphte, hemlock, onk, ast, elm,
white wood, and other cominercini noods as White wood, and other commercini wouds as
would suphly the whole consmption of the United States for a period of three jears, and the whole accessible pize localities have besides been run over to such an extent for such pine and board-wood timber as would pay to shil, that many of our lumberers have been forced to seek for these descriptions of wood foods to supply the English demnnd in your North-westeru timber Territories, where they may now be found cutting down on an nyerage three trees to get one stick of timber, and learing the others fromn some tritfing defect to rot in the woods-a waste of this valuatele material that you can ill afford. I will further venture the prediction that the uear future will reveal such a state of things in regard to the timber question as will bring your Governmeat fully to realize it would hare been a wiser policy on its part to have paid a bouss for the importation of our lumber, it by such means it could have been sared for the use of your people, than the course it has ndopted in driving it away to fureign markets by the imposition of duties to any amount.
I have now given the condition to thich sour country, from the east of Maine to the Upper Mississippi is brought in respect to its tipuber resources, and I ani prepared with data to substantiate its truthfulness against all the wild and fallacious estimates and statements put forth by interested parties to mislead and bolster up opposition to reciprocity in lumber with Canada, and prevent her from linving access to your
markets to give assistance to protenct to any extent the uttarly ruinous state of things which a timber fimine is sure to bring on the country, and which will begin to be teet in the next three or fund yeurs, nud will be fully reached througlsout. the Eastern, Midde, Western, and Northwestern Sintes in the short period of six or scien years, it the present wasteful course is kept. up; and when the pitch pine of the South, a deseription of wood unsuited formany purposes, deacription of wood unsuited for many purposta,
is called on to supply the whole consumpion, all the buidding und saw-log timber from the eastern Boundary of haine to the Rocky Morntains aud the Gulf of yexico will be sweptaway in as short a time as has passed since the close of the wor with the South, a mere moment in the fature of your comutry.

## THE CONSUHLDATED BANK.

The report of the Consolidated Bank which we publish elsewhere is well worthy the attention of our readers, as another evidence, amid the general depression from which it is generally hopod the country is emerging, of the extraordinary vitality and strength which so eminently characterize our Canadian banking institivtions. The conservative policy of the management and directorato has resulted in a fait profit for the year, and, although the dividends were not large, it is satis. factory to know that they wero paid out of the absolute earnings of tho bank, that the rescrve fund has not been in. trenched upon, and that ample provision lias been made for all losses: The principal fenture of the report is tho speech of the president, Sir Francis Hinclss, who, however, did not appear to give a very glowing account of the affairs of the bank, and, although he is in a position to judge, we must say that, on the similar principle that a man of sense and modesty nover praises his wife, is usually reluctant to proclaim the merits of his own property syen to its just deserts, he has scarcely done justioe to the bunk in charactexizing the report as not being satisfactory. Sir Francis was doubtless thinking of some shareholders who expected higher dividends, dividends of the good old times, but we fancy that each and every shareholder is less dis: satisfied than he imagined, and reasonably so when they look around and see how the property of othershas been dissipated in other stocks, land speculations, dic. Considering the losses on all sides during the year, the directors and shareholders of the Consolidated Bank should congratulate themselves on having their property so little affected, and so full of promise for the future.

- The Quebec Legislaturemet on Tues day, when Mr. Turcotie was elected speaker by 33 to 32, the house being full. Mr. Turcorte bimself and Mr. Price voted with the Government, thus giving a bare mnjority so that, unless some change shall take place, the house is equally divided. The lieutenunt-Governor's speech will be found elsewhere. The most importinit feature is the recommendation to abolish the Legislative Council, which seems to be received wilh great favor.


## ONE OF TME RETLRING

The Life Association of Scothant, to the surprise of many of its friende, appears fully resolved to discontinue further ellorts for new business in Caunda. Mr. Richard Bull, for many years managey in this city, has received notice that his cange dates from the 5 th prox. The accomes of the compnay under his control showed on the lst uhtimo a completeness of detail, and a clearness of record seldom, if ever, winessed in the best managed institutions, proving that the business of the Association was well kept in hand, and that it was little, if any, less forfunate in the chameler and control of its Canadian sub-agents than in the choice of its manager in Montreal. Mr. Bull, apart from his scholarly acquirements and the qualities which are genernlly met with in the successful and experienced life insurance man, is the fortumate possessor of the suaviter in modo to guch a well-tempered degrec, that his serrices are not likely to remain loug unsecured.

The refusal of the Association to reduce its rates will enable equally reliable competitors in Canadn, who have wisely lowered their tablus in accordance rith the reguirements of the period, to offer inducements to polieyholders which must ere long make a large hole in the business of the compuny in this country. Patriotisn will prompt polierholders to give their patronage to those who make inrestments among us in preference to the more selfish concerns who drain so much anmually out of the country. For cxample, any of the British Companies continuing to do business in Canada can, under their reduced rues, take over every policyholder of four or five jens stancling in the life Asscciation of Scotland, abd contime his assumace even at the adranced age. Policgholders of one, two, thee, and evenfour yenrs standing will, we inagine, tind it more ceonomical to allow their jolicies to lajes and join other companies. At this 'distante from hend-quarters it' may, we think, he dunbted whether the step raken by the Associntion is fonded upon somnd business ; principles.

## -JACQUES UARTER BANK゙.

An adjourned mecting of the shareholders of the Jacques Cartior Bank was held on Wednesday, when the report' of the committee hpointed at $\boldsymbol{a}^{\text {p previons meting whs pro- }}$ econted. It stated that a conference had been held with the directors and eashier. The reason why a dividend had not been fand was becanso there had been considemble shrinkrge in assets beretofere estimated as good, white the relurns from the coal mine would not for the present year be equal to the estimate from that source. As a "reason for the present stato of mactivity the directors stated that the netive nicanis at the disposal of the bank were smali, that-no arrangements had been made for forcigu credits, and that, while the purchnse of the conl mine was made with the belief that it would ultima-- tely lic profitable, the payment of the large amount which was disbursed for it nlso deprived the bank of that amomit for use in its general business.. As regards the future of the Bank
the Committee felt that much rould depend, upongreater efforts leing made to extend its general business, by increasing its eireulation and deposits. They also thought fhat the directors slould mike known to the shareholders as soon as possible whether ihey hare any hope of so inereasing the earbings as to be able to dectare a divatead within the next twelve months, or whether, in their opinion, it will be neceseny for the Bank to retain its camings for a longer period to make up for the losses which may yot be suffered in the nsseta of the Bank. In regrad to the present value of the assets the Cashier stated that, in his opinion, the capital of the Bank was intact, with a surplas of about fifty thonsand dollars after all ascertaned and probable losees had been deducted.

After considerable discassion the report was adopted.
Mr. W. Weir then moved, that in view of the state of inactivity in which the hanque Jacques Cartier still remains, the meeting is of opinion that the bank will not be enabled to re-establish its prestige and its hisiuess moler the management of its present President, who does not seem able to druw any amount of profitable busincss to the Bank.
© Mr. Perrant moved, in amen'lment, that the meeting is satistied with the roport mole by - the commituce that hat the intriview with the directors of the Banguo Jampes Curtier, and hopes that tho business of the institution will be conducted by the same directors hud by the same president until the next election of ofticers.

The amendment was lost, only five voting for it, and Mr. Weirs motion carried.

The Estimutes of the next dinnein vear will be sulmitted to you, They have been prepared with a view to the strictest economy, in order to attain the result to which all our efforts should be dipected, that of equalizing our receipts and expenditure withon resorting to the evying of fresh taxes on the people.
Monourvile Gentlenen of the fiegishative Council:
Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembin:
In order to pince the fmanees of the Pro
rince on a more satisfactory basis, measures will bo submitted to you tho efleet of whicl? will be to relieve the Budget of several considerable items of expenditure. A Bill will be submitted to you to transfer to the Commissioner of Public Works all the powers now vested in - the Raifwa Commissioners, find to put an eud to the oflice. A measure will be submitted to you to provide for the abolition of the Magistrates Courts. You will be called on to take into consideration a Bill for effecting a change in the Legishature of this province, so fin as regards the Legishative Comele.

- The manutacture of cigars in Chicago for exportis an innovation. A manfincturer there is now engnged on several large orders for British Anerica:
- The contionod dep.ressed state of aflime $i$ laving $a$ very bad offect upon many of the indastries in our Lower Ganadint towns and villages. Notably is this the case in enterprises of a joint stock nature. A few weeks ago we had to notico the fitione of the "detonvale Manufticturing Co.," and now, insolvency proceeding have been institated agranst the " St . Oesure Manufacturing Co." This Company, running saw, grist and carding mills, besides a foundry; was organized by local merchants and others two or three years ago, with a nominal capitrl of 830,000 ; of which 810,000 was subseribed. Recently, seveml suits have appeared against the Company, cu!minatiog ia a writ of atachment.
- Co-operation in the iron manulacture has been iried with suceess among the workingmen at l'itssuarg. A number of iron mills have heen erected west of Pittsbutg by skilled workingmen out of their own funds. Every such mill has been successful with the exception of one, which did not havo a proper bead in the mangement of its finances. These co-operative laborers understand evers detail of theiv business better than their fomer emplogers, who are feeling their competition serionsly. The workingmen have another advantage in their lighter living expenses, wheh enable them to sell on closer margits than the regular manufacturers.
U. S. Crob Prosprats - "I met three when t speculntors," writes "Bli Perkins," from Lincoln, Neb., " who, after traveling all over the Northrest, estimated the growing erop of whent in the different States as follows:


The consumption of whent in the Uniten States forbrend and seed is about six bushels per inhabitant. The popmation that will eat this year's whent in at least $45,000,000$. The domestic consumption will therefore be $27 \pi$,000,000 . This would leave a surpitus of ouly $41,000,000$ of bushels for exportation. It is doubtitul if some of tho Sintes mmed will produce the crop estimated, but we think Illinois will go five to ten millions higher. And Californin and Oregon will add perbups 25 or 30 millions to the exportable suphus.

- An observant writer says that "very fuw men can ben prosperity. It intoxicutes them, like wine. It turns their head and throws them off their balance. Others cannot bear adversity. They have no fortitude, no coutage, no
hope. They are not like the old sutilor who said he always felt happiest in the height of it storm, because he knew then that the next clunge that took place, whatever it might be, must necessnrily be for the better. They cannot realize that there will be any change. When the sky is once clouded and overeast they will not believe the sull will ever shine again. Foung men should make it a point to keep their heads cool under all changes of circumstances, to preserve their equanimity, and not to be uuduly elated by suceess or too much cast down by disapromament."

Nem Process in Smbr, Castings-A. J. Nellis, of Pittsbung, has invented a new process for making steel eistings of irregular slmpe; which consists in impregnating the mould with combustable material, which becomes ignited by contact with the melted steel, and keejs it fluid enongh to penemate to the remotest cozners of the mould, and is also at preventive of blow holes. Plowshates and other irregular castings have been very successtuly prodnced by this process. They may be forged into any suape by a blacksmith, nud, when worn out by use, converted into.smatler aticeles, such as tools, knivos, ete.

A Prospicmive Industiry for Gumem-A Marietta, Ga., chemist, has discovered a method of makiog pure brimstone dieect from the fron pyrites, which can be fount in inexhanstible qumtities all abont North Georgia. The process is exceedingly simple und very cheap. I'he brimstone chat be produced in cheap. the brimstone chat be produced in
fine quality at about one-hitd of tho cost of the brimstono which we now get. This conntry. hat relied chieftr upon sicily for her supply of brimstone. It is taken from the voleanic region there, whero it is deposited in enormons beds. lt is dug in great blocks. A man can walk over it just ag if he were walking over tacres of phosphorus. By the new method brimstone cau be produced much cherper than it can be brought from Sicily. A patent has been obtained, aud works will soon be established.

- Juhn N. "Genin, the hater," died at New York recently. He was atenamt in Barman's Museum buiding, and, to give his landlord a good send-off, bought the first sat for the first Jemiy Lind concert in 1850 for $\$$ e2s. "What mme?" said the nuctioneer. "Genin, the Hattier," replied the purchitser, who nexi daty was known all over the city, and made a fortune as the result of this advertisement.
- Tweed's diughters have been defeated in their suit to compel the knicketbocker Insurance Gompany to pay then the amount of a ten-year vadownont policy for $\$ 10,000$ on their fither's life. He had maid the prominm on it for eight years, and the Combuny resisted payment on the ground that he hat violated its conditions by escaping trom jail and tlying to Spain withour giving it nolice and obtataing its permission to travel abroad!
Burisu Smmpas Spatismos.-According to the Jall ihall Giazelle the total tonmuge entered nud cleared at pors in the United Kingtem tor
 botoms. In 1977 the total tonnage was $43,326,160$, of which $80,202,48 \mathrm{was}$ Writish. Tho merehant shipping of the British Enpire hat increased from $4,233,162$ tons in 1850 to 8, 133,837 in 1377, or more than the over-sen shipping of all the rest of the world together, the United Kingdom supplying of this British total 6,336.360 tons. Noiwithstunding this enomovis increase, the number of seamen in 1577 has not increased since 189.t, it then ansotming to some 190,000 . In 1877 the exact figurs are 173,929; Brilish and 20,036 forejgners enlisted in the British mercantile service. the canse of the uon-increase in men is annibuted to the increase in the size of the vessels; and the adoption of steam vessels, which a proportionately smaller number of men are required to havigute.

The general statement of the assets and liabilities of the Bank at the close of its finameinl yerr is printed for distribution. Its prineipal features, as compared with last year, are a docline of 52,90 , 689 in loans, most of which is accounted for by the lessened demand for accommodation at the principal commercial centres in Cunada; and a loss of S2,179,582 in deposits, cansed chiefly by reduction of Dominion and Provincina Government bulances, but also in part, by witharawnls of money induced by offers of a higher rate of interest elsewhere.

The Directors; feel that the anticipation expressed at the last aunual meeting, and their assurances as to the exceptional character of the accounts then submitted, are justified by the accounts then submited, me purnined by of S 241,591 in the net earnings of the Bank as compmed with last yen's operations. This improvement, although moderate in degre, has been achieved, it must be remembered, under the very adverse circumstances attending the prolonged staguation of business, not in Canada only, but ilso throughout the commercinl world.
The matural and enforced curtailment of business which has been tuking place in this country having diminished the volume of the Bank's operutions, has nocessarily cansed a redaction of its revente, and likewise entailed considerable losees in the process of lignidation.
The vigorous contraction practised by soind and prudent merchants is highly to be commended, and the forced withdrawal of many from the overcrowded ranks of commerce may
be viewed wilhont regret lintil we rench a point, if we have not already lone so, at which business can be conductel with some degree of confidence and with moderate prolit. Some classes of manufacturers have experienced more encoung ging results during the year, while others continue in strugrale aganat exessive compeition; and but little improvement in the lamber trade catn ret be recorded.

On the other hati, last yeares ato mdant hatvest has not only added io the wrath of the country, but also stimulated a lealifine movement of unemployed lathor from the cities ami older sethlements to the new lands of the Weslera Proviners. This movement las heen more matked in the neighboring country than with us, and it has beren accompnied there by a decided: inprovement in meremtile allitirs, which will not be without a fiwomble influence upon our condition. Whale, therefore, there may not, in the present position of aftairs, be enough to justify sanguine anticipations of the future, there sems sullicient to wamant the helief that the extrandinary depression of trade, which we have so long experienced. is being somewhat mitigated, and that it is about to be follown by a moderate degre of posperity.

Should this forecast prove to be correct, vour directors believe the bank is in an excellent condition to offer facilities for and to proft by the prosecution of a more extensive and active business.

The directors have to notice the opening of an agency at Winniperg, whe an increase of the Inspecior's staft: which appeared desimble to insure the regular and thorough supervision of the distant branch establishmenta. They have also to nssure the shareholiders that the loans of the Bank have undergone the usual careful seruting, and that all known bad and dubstin debis luve been amply povided for.

'Lie President then moved that the report be ndopted and printed for the information of shatholders, thed in doing so remarked that considering the ndverse circumstances with which the ins itution had had to contend during the yenr, the 12 per cent. dividend which had been declared could not be deemed otherwise bhan satisfactery. Referring to the great depression of the hast few years and its consequences, be said hat alrendy there vere tuo many men in business, whose numbers must be comsiderably reduced before nuy real conlidence could be felt by the wholesale and manutacturing community.
The motion, having been geconded, was put to the meeting and unanimously adopted.
Mr. Thomas Workman, M.t', having made some remarks apon the subject of lonms, and upon the heaviness with which they had borne upon the manafactaring community bere, satid that the results of the year had beenalogethen whexpected. He was sure that they bud been nltogether umprecedented, since that on a correchappreciation of the operations of the last venr the result would be most salisfactory; for notwithstanding the great depression which had occurred, it was wonderfil to see that it had been possible to dechare two 6 per cent. dividends duriug the jear, and this by taking only from eirht thousind to nine fhousand dollars from the profit and loss account. He concluded by moving, seconded by Mr. Robr. Anderson, "That the thanks of the meeting be presented to the liesident, the Vice-Presidentand the Directors for their attention to the interests of the Bank.'

The motion was unanimotaly adopted.
Sit A. 'I'. Galt congrathated the stockbolders on the resultans exhibited by the real and tene statement of atfins which had to-day been presented, and said it angured well for the success of the Bank in the coming year, and reffected most creditably on the President and otticers.

Hon. Thomas Ryan moved a vote of thanks to the general manger and lis olligers. He said, in his recollection the Bank had had no sich general manager ns it had at present. To his manarement was due the suceess of the Bunk, and in his selection of his oflicers he had showh great astuteness, and, moreover, le was one of the most popular men who had ever ruled over an institution of the kind. No ono more than le lan promoted the idea of a common feeling of interest between oflicers and shareholders. He concluded by speaking of the excellent standing of the Bank before the country.
Mr. Andrew Robertson seconded the motion, which was adopted.
Ar. Angus, in returning* thanks, remarked upon the time as being one more than ordinacily surronnded with difliculties, and spoke of the ollicers associated with himas being of high standing. There had, it was true, bem a slight decline in depositors, mincipally in the Montreal office. There was no business in which competition was keener than in banking in this country, not only with the capital of rival local banks, but with the cheap capital of England. Years since the Bank had made considurable money by transactions in New York and elsewhere, hut now the profits had been cut down to a minimum. He cautioned shareloolders against being too sanguine in the immediate fulure, adding that, unless business became more saisfactory, it would not be advisable to declare a 12 per cent dividend. He, however, entered on the ensuing year with a cobsiderable degree of hopefulness as to a prolitable business in the fiture.
It was then moved by Mr. R. W. Sheplerd,
seconded by Mr. I. W. Ritchie, Q.C.' "That the ballot now open for the election of directors be kept open to thre o'clock, unless fifteen minutes clapse without a vole being cast, when it shall be closed, and until that time and for this purpose only the meeting be continued."
Cirried unamimously and the meeting adjourned.

He was prety well :d yanced inlife, but he did not recol leet miyg freat depression lasting for such n length of ime as the present one. Not ouly thranghout this country a od the United States did it 'xist, hat lieroughout the whole continent of Eumpe. In England, especially in the cotom distriete, fo the fron thade, and in every bmuch of indusiry. In his country there whe some canse for congratuhtion-a harge and increasing portion of our population are engraged in a ricultural pursnits, and in thrir orcupation there has been no depression ; and, fortunately, within the hast few years we lave been openiag ont larce trachs of arnble land. where largenumbers of 1 cople have settled, by this means taking off a prood denl of our surpins or unemployed popatation, so that he did not think, taking everything into consideration, Camadians have any great calise for despondency ; for, althongh they were not yei able to sny that the tide has turned, we might reasonably hone that we had seen the worst. They had nlso, as a Bank, cause for congmatulation. Ar. In. Anderson, in seconling the atioption of the report, said he thought none of the shareholders could have nay retsomble feelines of objection to the adoption of the report, tand that it was cortainly as good as could be expected in the present depression of trade.

## THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

Some of the London financial journals have taken uy the cue given by Bagelot in his Lombard Street, and are calling public attention to the dangerous condition of the reserves of the Bunk of England. The London World and the Lonaon Statist are especially noticable for their plain talk aboult the mutier. The World savs
Should them be from ant conse a sudden demand for money for the Continemt or the Provinces, there is an instant drain upon the bill brokers and bankers of the metropolis, who in lurn fall hack upon the Bank of England : and man cmerwence, such as might be caused by a war with Russia, the Bank Act would have to be suspended, and there would be heary risk of the whole delicatrly-interworm network. of credit collapsing like a house of eards. Things are not us they were in 1797, when the bank was more isolited than it is now, or eren as they wore in 1817, 1857, and 1866, at ench of which dates the bank net, had to be suspended. At heses severnl periods what are called "transfer credits" by telegraphic wire an! transatiantic cable were unknown. It is obvious that the suddenness with which demands for cash can now be mede does not lenve the time there was formerly to organize menns of meeting sudden struins upon our sysiem of rredit. No doubt, the telegraph facilitites ready action on the part of the bankers in self-defense as well; bit in a case in which time is absolutely necesarytosiave of danger it vastly adds to the difficulty of pulting through. The Bankof England has virtually censed to be the prople's bank: and, while there is sueming safety in its rediscounting the parer of the bill brokers, credit companies, and joint stock banks, there is actual dancer. At one time the Bank refused even to nllow the London and Westminister Bank a draving acconnt. There ought to be entire dissociation of the Old There onght on be entire dissociation the the ohd
liom the other banks, else all maty go down togrther. Until there is the Bank of England cannot become better than it is at present, or show itself more worthy of its quasinational position and privileges. It has lost its old control over the mancy natrket, and yet has to bear all the burdens that are involved in its position as the centre of our babking system. The consequence is, that week by week the reserve is dwindling away, and yet the Brink Directors areamian to pat iphthe rate to protect it, because the outside market would not follow them, and they might lose even the smatl discount business they bave.

## TRADE IN ENGLAND.

The London Times reports that the frate und navigation acconnts of the United Kingdom tot mavigntion acconnts of the dited kingdom that have nppeared for some time. There is a rerespuring yatiation in the too prevailing gloom to the extent of an increase of $5 d$ per cent in the value of the inports. The Tine's says:

- The mass of our mports is probably rither greater for the four months of the rear now exnired than for last yeft, but so far the money value is about $£ 1,0$, won less. The export side of the neobut wonld be more satisfactory than it is. did we not find thent there, akso prices are sicadily declining. For instance, the increase in the export of cotton piece-roods is 13 per cent. while the incrense in the value is only 6 fre cent; and coton yarn has inereased over 218 per cent in quanity, but only about 15 per cent in value. If is even woree with jute yarn, at though jute piece-goods, possibly owing to the varying claracter and (pualities of the shipments. show a better outtura. Wool keeps un in price, but is much down in quintity. while woolen yarn and woolen chobls are decidedly weaker in price. It results from this that, as it whole, the increase of over 7 per cent. in the ralue of the total exports of the month does not quile represent the increased volume of the trade which has been done. It is, however. satisfactory in that the demand for iron and steel and machinery and millwark apperars to be healihier, as it certainly is larger, than in was, and thromghout the account there are indications which should eause us to be hopeful could we be sure that they are more than mere rassing phases. For the four months the value of onr exports is about $x 1,000.000$ more than for the first four months of 1875 , and this, coupled with the lower value of the imborts, indicates that our foreign trade accumbt is approaching a rather sounder position.


## NUMBERING THREAD.

The want of a common sustem for the mumbering of threads has long been greaty felt in trade. Thus, there has been one system in use in Vienna, another in same Saxan towns, and even Wortemburg and Bavatia had diferent methods of chassifiention. Besides this, each of the textile imbustries-colton, woul and silk, had its speeial methon. Conferenese were held on the stoject during the Viennat Bxhibition, and again in 1874, when the principal Continental mations agreed to accept. the metric system. A third Congress was leld nt Turin to bring the silk industry to terms, which, on accotant of the superior value of silk, wished a special notation. The Euglish ahone have hitherto held ont, but have, in theory, acecepted the change. The valte of a thread is iudicated by its fineness, which is shown by the proportiva of the weight to the length. The notition is a simple expression of this relation. Thus a thread which weighs a kilo and messures 10,000 metres, beras the number 10 ; if for the same Weight it measures sn, hoo metres, it is called No. So, and so on. The Enplish system adopts hat gard and the pound: In France there are still mumerous peculiarities which anust be abmandoned in order to arrive at the desired uniformity. The hali kilogram is used for cotton. Linen is designated by the Euglish system, and silf by deniers. The dilferent governments have not jet formally autiorized the adopion of the metrical system, and the Congress which will meet during the Exposition will give the minter duedeliberation and aceomplishits definitive adajion.-Bulletin.

## SPECULATION IX STOCKS.

The foumdation for the rise is priunaly the large enrnings of the ronds, which, together with the economics in manugement, give much harger net results than the same carmings would hatve fiven three years afro, sud which, by contrast with the mifavomble results in general business, are now unusually alhuing. The large emratigs now are, of contse, derived iudirectIy from last yar's hurvests : and, if the outho.k for the coming harvests was poor, it'mightwell be reasoned that the great adrance in prices, already secured, fully represents the actual imjuwement. The new buying. both for investment aid spectiation, is, however, encouriged by the promising outhook for this years harrests. It is understood that the acreage for cereals in the Western States is fully one-third larger
than last year, aun that the velt shat be
even one-third less per acre than lien theresult will be beter. Beside the earbings of the doads and the crop prospects, the extremely low mates for money and the high priete, as athe, for first-class investmente, opmate to tuma great deat of money into searities and shares that yield large income at current market guofations. That this byying movement will be werdone in the next threenomaths sems not at all improbable from the present temper in the market, and the phasible conciderations which "five rise to it, fad it would canse no surprise if The coming sumper should be eharacterized by at wild sueculation in stocks.-N. F. l'ost.

It says also that the mather of cost is of no conseguence to the arenment whether sugar is or is not at the noment. chenper or deater than it was some yeat's ato. It says also if the present hariff is ablat one, the blame mist lie at the door of the admiaistration who made it, atill that the presemt Government is not responsible.
14. mast be vememberea that when Sir Tohn Rose mate his tarifl there were no American bounties, which makes all the diflerence in the worh, and Redpati could carry on his business nt a profit, but when the bonny system was introduced by the Americans for the purpose of killing of yivals in the trade here, did the present Government do anything to check the evil? They did not, and Redjath was forced to cluse up. By nifbering to a policy that worked well when it was adopted by Sir Juhn Rose, the present Guvernment made it their poify in refusing to alter it when circumstances veguired that it should be allered. Ihen, as to the matter of cosi, the only way to nscertain this is to compare prices with the value of the raw aticle as a standatd, and doing this, I mainain that relined sugars are dearer now than they were in Redpaili's time. The Journat of Unambite discusses the question in a most intelligent and far mantuer. It says:-"The difficulty is to settle the amonnt of encouragement or protection which would be fair to the consumers." Tiiis is doublless the most diffcult point to settle, and it is one that shouid receive the serious attention of all parties. The Journal of Cummenee asks how we propose to deal with the Scotch sugar, sceing that the Scoteh refincrs get no bounties or the b-nefit of any drawbacks. This is another difficult subject. It is well known that neither Redpaih nor the Americans could compete with the Scoteb refiners in tuming out jelluw sugar. The Americans with all their smmetness, and ingenuity cannot compare with the Scoteh in this article, whether it is owing to superior mitchinery or not, I an not prepared to suy; but I rather think the Scotch hive a secres in adulteration not yet known to the Americius, and which was never practised by Redpath. If we had countervailing duties equal to the American bonnties we cond compere successfully na against them, and as the white and yellow sugars can be made more profitably together, 1 believe that Redpath in a very short time would tun out a puire yellow, sugar that would soon compete favorably with Scotch, if not in firtec, at all everits in quality nud value, as cunsumers are begianing to find out that what they are getting now is not equal to what they used to get in foriner yeats: The Jounial of Coy:
mence says : "Unfortunately my last letter was obviously intended for a political purpose." I have no political purpose to. serve. I never asked nor recenved the smallest favor from either party, and I discuss this question simply in the interests of the cousumer, and at the same time the interests of the count:r, and 1 will wind up by again stating that the policy of the present Govermment has been the menas of killing our direct sugar trade. It prerents us buying in the cheapest markets, at pinces of growth, from first sands. It deprives thousands of our mechanics of the means of earning their bread, and sends them ous of the comitry in semreh of work. It makes the consumer pay a higher price than there is any ocension for, besides being forced to thke an inferior articte.

There has been a slisht decline in Dontral Bank. Other secmaties unchanged.
Asmes.-Receiph of Pots fair the phst week, mices are casier, 53.75 to $\$ 3.80$ being the raure for light to crood tares ; Seconds $\$ 3.40$; no thirds oflering. There are more Pots being made than can possibly be sold at present ligures. Pearls, the last sale reported was 18 brls first sort at $\$ 5.75$. A lot of 30 brls. lirst sort were inspected on lvednesday, but have not yet been offered, the demand is not quite so active; seconds nominal. The receipts since lst January have been 4,074 brls.
