WAY OF THE PACIFIC STREAMS THICK WITH THORNS

Number of Divergent Reports to Be Presented to United States Senate, and More Springing Up Over Night—Some Talk of an Adjournment.

NEW YORK, June 11.—The Washington correspondent of The Herald writes:

"Canadian reciprocity will come to the senate from the committee on finance on Tuesday with an escort of reports favorable and unfavorable, the number of which seldom has been equaled. No less than four are promised from as many members of the committee, and they are springing up over night. Plaintiffs as they are, they do not represent all shades of political opinion on the bill in the senate. These will be disclosed in the debate to begin next week.

"Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania, chairman of the committee, will make the majority report on the bill, which will simply hand it back to the senate without recommendation. This is not considered a satisfactory result of four weeks' hearings. From Senator La Follette will come a report which will attempt to balance the question nicely in the middle and give the stand on. They have been flustering in the air, so far as reciprocity is concerned, for several weeks. Senator Cumber of North Dakota, who voted against the Root amendment, with the remark that he would appear to make the bill better," will also have views to file. This report will purport to represent the view of the farmers of the Dakotas and the northwest. It will be, it is said, a particularly sharp paper.

"Something for the senate Democrats to think about is a party policy on reciprocity and the 'farmers free list' bill, with a few notes on the wool tariff, will be prepared by Senator Williams of Mississippi, who probably will have company, as Senator Stone of Missouri plans to sign this report if it meets his views. Senator Williams' report will be for reciprocity, but also will suggest a policy toward the other tariff measures.

"When Senator Penrose makes the reciprocity bill the unfinished business in the senate it will have right of way. There was much talk of adjournment about the White House to-day. Senators of Utah, suggesting the date as possibly late in July.

HULL DOCTOR ARRESTED ON A CHARGE OF MURDER

Ottawa Woman Believed to Have Died as Result of Criminal Operation.

OTTAWA, June 11.—Charged by the police with the murder of Edith Mary Spain of Ottawa, Dr. J. Alexander Quimet, a well known physician, was arrested this morning on a charge of murder. He is charged with the death of a woman who died after an illness of only a few hours.

The mysterious circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. Spain, who died after an illness of only a few hours, were brought to light when the result of the postmortem examination of the body by Doctors Quinn and Caskey was made known to the coroner.

The Storm in Pennsylvania. CHAMBERSBURG, Pa., June 11.—A severe windstorm swept down last night, falling trees, unroofing a dozen buildings and prostrating the lines of telephone, electric light and trolley companies. One hundred feet of the new shops of the T. B. Woods Sons Company was blown in. No one was hurt.

Damage in London. LONDON, Ont., June 11.—Lightning struck in several places during a storm which continued over this city about 6 o'clock this morning, but no person was injured. The clock on the customs house was shattered and the roof of Bishop Cronin Memorial Church damaged.

To Pole

LONDON.—Australia is the latest aspirant for the honors of Antarctic discovery, and as tentative preparations are being made for the expedition which Dr. Douglas Mawson will lead with the ship Aurora, now bound for London from New Zealand. From Hobart, her last port of call, the Aurora will proceed toward the Antarctic regions in November. Some of the best known British explorers will be in the landing party, which will muster twenty-five men.

ONE KILLED TWO INJURED

Severe Electrical Storm at Owen Sound — Men Were Standing By Tracks.

OWEN SOUND, June 11.—(Special.)—John Murphy was killed and Robert Hulton and Arthur Yurman were seriously injured in a lightning storm which occurred here late this afternoon. Murphy was standing on the street close to the railway tracks and the other two men were about 50 feet away from him when the bolt descended. After killing Murphy, the electrical fluid shot along the rails to where the other two men were standing. Both were stunned and thrown to the ground. All three are well-known residents of the town. Murphy was a married man and leaves a family.

Storm Havoc at New York. NEW YORK, June 11.—An electrical storm of unusual intensity swept down upon the city of New York last night and for hours played havoc with wire communication in all directions.

A survey of the battle-field over which the elements raged from 10 o'clock last night until 4 o'clock this morning showed to-day that it was more than a mimic war game. The havoc of lightning and wind and fire and water was widespread in and around New York, including the loss of at least three lives and damage amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Losses aggregating more than \$100,000 were caused by fires set by lightning. It is estimated that \$50,000 damage was done in a five block enclosure in Flushing, L.I., where twenty-five thousand men and women were attending a society picnic. Twelve large tents were blown down and in the stampede which followed, six women were trampled upon and taken to the hospital for treatment of injuries. Innumerable queer pranks, many of them exceedingly costly, were played by the wind and lightning in the city and in other suburbs. A typical instance was furnished at Coney Island, where tents and shacks erected on the site of the recent fire were blown down and some whirled out to sea.

Another was at Paterson, N.J., where two hundred big trees were uprooted, carrying down with them electric lights and trolley wires, leaving the city without light or car service for several hours.

The British tramp steamer Susquehanna and the coastwise schooner Nellie W. Craig, did not disentangle themselves until to-day from the collision into which they were brought by last night's storm. The Susquehanna, being without even ballast, was swept from her anchorage down Long Island Sound. The schooner was driven ashore and the cargo of lumber was scattered about.

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Ross Winger, a resident of this place, came in contact with a live wire and may die. The damage is estimated at \$50,000. The storm also killed a fall of fifty feet from a telegraph pole in the Cumberland Valley.

QUEBEC BRIDGE CONTROVERSY

British Firm Replies to Sir Wilfrid's Letter to Times—Contract Awarded Without Competition.

LONDON, June 11.—(Special Cable.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, in a letter to The London Times, replies to the statement made last week at the annual meeting of the Metropolitan Amalgamated Railway Carriage and Wagon Co. by the chairman, who declared that the contract for the construction of the big bridge at Quebec had in reality been awarded by the government to a Canadian company without any competition. Sir Wilfrid, in his letter to The Times, says:

"On behalf of the Canadian Government, I think it is only fair that I should state to the British public that the construction of the Quebec bridge was placed in the hands of the board of engineers, who received and opened tenders and reported on the same to the government. Unfortunately, the members of the board were not unanimous and the government, at every stage, was guided by and acted upon recommendations of a majority of the board.

"I leave it to the British public since they are appealed to, to decide if this be satisfactory. The chairman of the Metropolitan Amalgamated Railway Carriage and Wagon Co. had declared at last week's meeting of the stockholders that the company had been treated very shabbily by the Canadian Government, inasmuch as it had been requested to submit a bid for the construction work, and did so in accordance with the specifications, but that subsequently the contract was awarded to the Canadian concern under an entirely different set of specifications."

Reply to Sir Wilfrid. Following the publication of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement, The Times publishes the following reply by the chairman of the Metropolitan Amalgamated Railway Carriage and Wagon Co. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not personally acquainted with all the circumstances, and I would suggest to him that he kindly enquire first, whether or not the members of the board of engineers unanimously signed reports after fully considering the tenders, conforming to the practicability and efficiency of their own design and stating their reasons therefor in accordance with the conditions of the contract, and whether or not the board unanimously reported that the alternative rail and bridge design was more satisfactory than the one submitted by the Canadian company, and that the contract was awarded to the Canadian company without any competition."

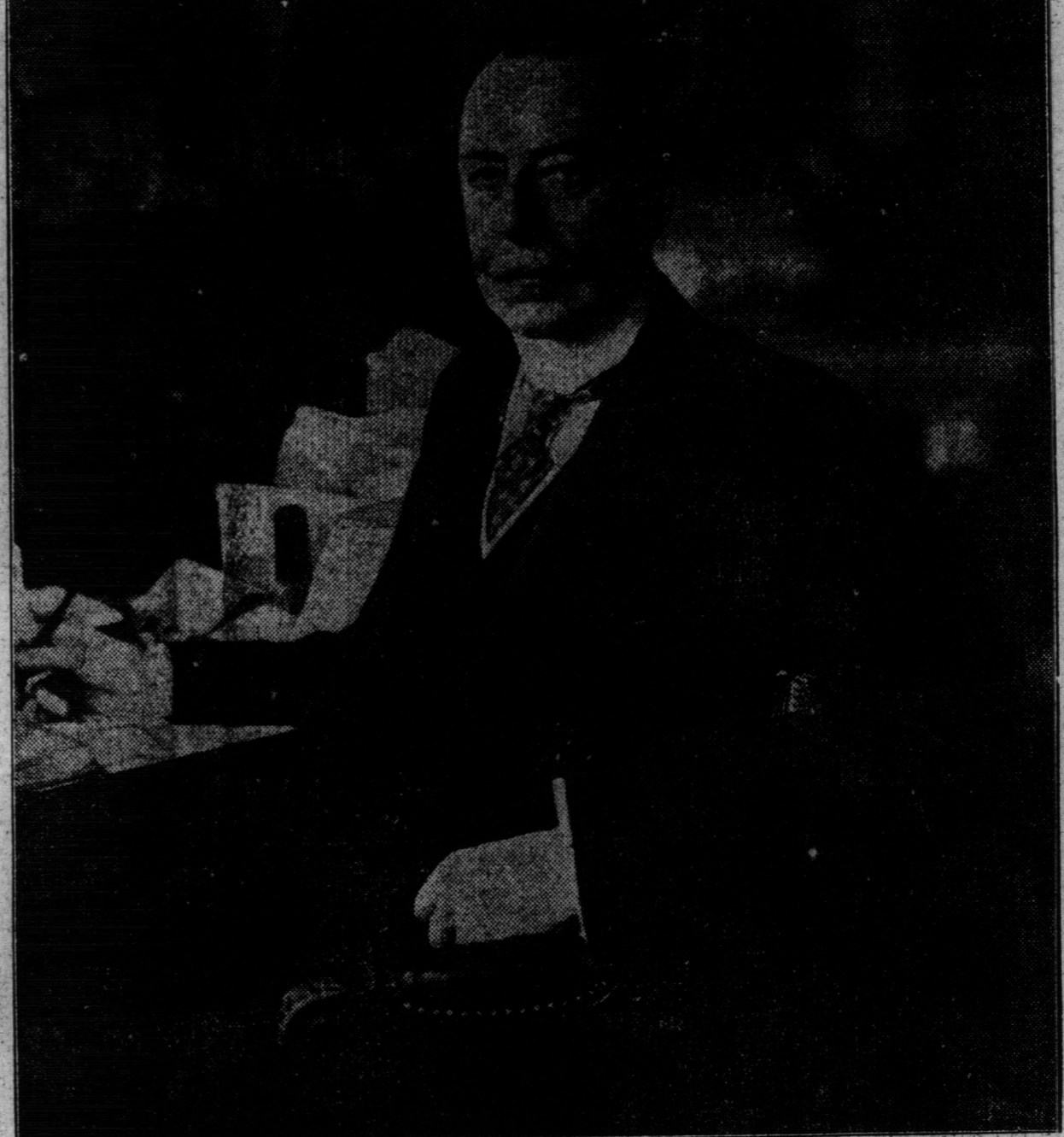
HILL AGAIN INVADES CANADA

SUDDEN GALE CAUSED PERIL FOR SMALL BOATS

Young Englishman Rescued From Skiff When Almost Exhausted—Lightning Played Pranks.

The citizens who lolled in the clammy atmosphere yesterday welcomed the cool breeze, but those who enjoyed the cool zephyr which floated over the waters were filled with terror by the stiff gale that swept across Lake Ontario about 4:30. Rumbblings of thunder followed by flashes of lightning made the sailors of little craft hasten to shore and shelter.

Toronto Bay seemed literally covered with white sails and within five minutes the dark clouds, not a single boat was to be seen save those propelled by other power than wind. Clinging to the edge of his little 12-foot sailing skiff, with the boat half full of water and in imminent danger of sinking, a young Englishman was rescued about 4:30 p.m. yesterday on his return journey from the point on his return journey when the accident occurred. Crowds gathered along the pier, and women were waving their hands frantically, thinking that the skiff and its occupant was about to disappear. He was afterwards taken to Hamelin's Point.

J. H. DEWITT, M. L. A., CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

Will Be Standard-Bearer in West Durham—Wanted to Resign.

BOWMANVILLE, June 11.—(Special.)—The delegates in attendance at the convention of the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Durham yesterday tendered J. H. Dewitt, M.L.A., the unanimous nomination for the coming provincial election.

A vote, showing only one dissenting ballot, was taken. Mr. Dewitt then asked the convention to reconsider, as his health would not stand the strain of a campaign. After speeches by many of the stalwarts, expressing the belief that Mr. Dewitt should consent, and the hope that he would again be a candidate, a unanimous standing vote was taken. Mr. Dewitt, in view of this, accepted.

C. Jonas Thornton, M.P., denounced the extravagance of the Ottawa government, and especially the \$2,000,000 naval expenditure. He compared this with the \$1,000,000 spent on agriculture by Hon. Sydney Fisher's department, and declared that ministers were hypocrites, who held their office by strong partisanship. Reciprocity, he declared to be a scheme to cover up the awkward position in which the government found themselves as a result of the railway question, and the navy matter a result of the Grand Trunk Pacific wire.

The 400-ton Nova Scotia appropriation passed just before the recent adjournment, the Laurent and the Grand Trunk Pacific grant, and other misdeeds of the government were exposed. Mr. Thornton expressed his pleasure at Mr. Dewitt's decision, his high regard for the M.L.A., and his confidence of victory at the polls.

Evan H. McLean also added to the prevailing sentiment, and assured the nominee the active support, not only of himself, but of every Conservative in the riding.

BONDS SAVED LINDSAY FROM NIGHT IN CELLS

Long Missing Vendor of Farmers' Bank Places Himself in the Hands of Police.

Late Saturday night bondsmen were secured for Wm. J. Lindsay, erstwhile seller of stock in Halton County for the defunct Farmers' Bank, who gave himself up to the Toronto detectives early in the same morning. The charge against him is one of conspiring with J. R. Stratton, M.P., C. H. Smith and Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, provisional directors of the bank, to secure the certificate of the treasury board of Canada, which would enable the bank to do business.

Lindsay came thru from Buffalo Saturday morning. His finger prints were taken by the Bertillon system immediately after his arrival. An order was made out for \$4000 bail as well as Lindsay's bond for the same amount. Dr. John Noble was willing to be one of the \$2000 bondsmen, but it was thought for a while that the latter would not be forthcoming, and that Lindsay would have to spend the night in the cells.

SAVED BROTHER LOST OWN LIFE

Arthur Hewitt, Son of the Manager of the Consumers' Gas Co., Drowned Off Lorne Park.

Attempting to swim to shore when the sailboat in which he and his companions were sailing capsized, Arthur Hewitt, the 15-year-old son of Arthur Hewitt, general manager of the Consumers' Gas Co., met death by drowning yesterday afternoon just a few hundred yards off his father's cottage at Lorne Park. Young Hewitt was the eldest of the party of three lads, including his 3-year-old brother Gordon, and Edward, son of Charles Booth of the T. Eaton Co., both of whom clung to the boat until rescued.

The three had been out some time, and the Hewitts was a good sailor, the squall came with such suddenness that he had not time to right the boat. Once over, however, he seemed to retain confidence, and placing the younger members of the party in safe positions, he started to swim for the shore. He had not gone far when he was seen by onlookers to turn back, and then suddenly he disappeared. Boats soon rescued the other two, but the body of the daring swimmer was out of sight. Malt Aykroyd was notified and will assist in the dragging.

Hewitt was a student at St. Andrew's College, and was well liked for his quiet but fearless character. He was one of the best athletes of the college, being a member of the first Rugby team. He was successful in passing his junior matriculation last year, and was making preparations for writing on the honor matriculation.

HAVING THEIR TROUBLES. Liners Delayed in Sailing by Demands of Labor. NEW SEA FIGHTERS. Germans Launch Second Turbine Battleship. HAMBURG, Germany, June 11.—The second turbine battleship of the German navy, the Frederick the Great, was launched here yesterday, being christened by Princess Auguste Wilhelm. The dedicatory address was delivered by Gen. von der Goltz. The battleship will be completed in the winter of 1912.

The Frederick the Great is a sister ship of the Kaiser, which was launched at Kiel on Aug. 22, the birthday of Emperor William.

All details regarding the construction and equipment of the new battleships are withheld, in accordance with the custom of the admiralty. Neither the tonnage nor the number of guns they will carry have been made public. It is thought that the Frederick the Great, like the Kaiser, will have a displacement of between 21,000 and 24,000 tons, and she probably will be armed with new fourteen-inch guns.

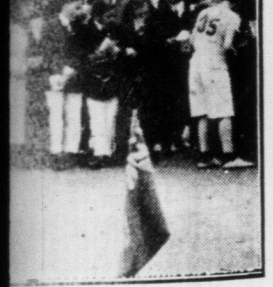

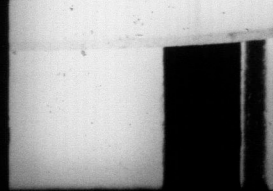
