EUROPEAN SITUATION SUMMARIZED

Premier Lloyd George at Newcastle yesterday announced a part of the British policy at the peace conference. The British Government, if returned to power, will bring the Kaiser to justice for the invasion of Belgium, will punish Germany for submarine warfare and wanton destruction in invaded regions. The costs of the war, will be made her pay as far as possible by the harsh policy of the present system of paying the taxes in the city. The premier also strongly hinted at exact vengeance, but to prevent further war. The British Government would not allow German immigration, because before the war, As to Britain's future local policy and free trade, the premier said that he was willing to discuss old prejudices and consider the views of an open mind. This means, of course, that the premier is laying aside his former free trade theories, now termed prejudices.

The allies thus appear to have adopted the policy of making Germany shoulder a heavy financial obligation so as to prevent her from ever being able to make limit of her ability to pay, and will compound that she will not normally expend this policy is effective as far as it goes, but Germany tried the same policy with France after the Franco-German war, but had been won Bismarck thought that history of the ages recover from her history of the ages shows a steady advance in prices and incomes, so that the present age may seem a moderate safeguard which the allies intend to member of the league of nations to impotent recovery of the treasure expended by Britain and France in the war. Germany will place the two countries in an enviable economic position.

An echo of what will come before the peace conference in larger form is heard in the demand for incorporation with Greece. Epirus lies between Greece and Albania, and shortly after the outbreak of the war King Constantine, aided by German money, financed a pro-Greek party in Epirus, who are Greek-speaking. The allies looked upon this movement with suspicion, if it violated former obligations of Constantine, and when Greek troops occupied the country the allies decided to counteract the manoeuvre. The elements of this region now seek union with Greece, and it is probable that the allies will concede this demand. All thru the Balkans are peoples who each assert the right of self-determination. Safety will not permit their abandonment, dependence, so the best policy appears to be the creation of large states as is possible with justice to the inhabitants.

DANFORTH

RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION MEET.

A splendid meeting of the Amalgamated Ratepayers' Association of York Township was held in the Oddfellows' Hall, Bathurst street, Thursday evening, T. H. Hutchinson, president, was in the chair. 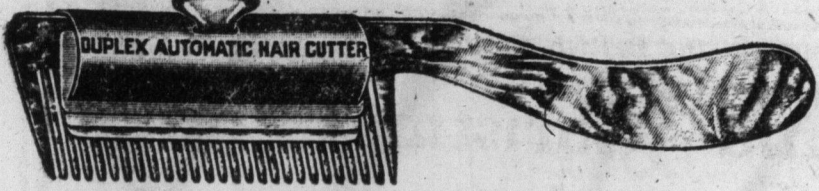

RURAL EDUCATION AT CITY COLLEGIATES

Need for Higher Education for Rural Scholars at Cheap Rates.

Rural education at city collegiates was the subject discussed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the county council. The Toronto school board proposes to raise the tuition of outside students to \$100 a year, which the York Council feel will be prohibitive for many people in the townships. The resident pupils in the city get their first year at high school free, the second costs \$9, the third \$15, the fourth \$21 and the fifth \$27. The cost of educating a pupil for one year, as estimated by the educational department, is \$131.05. This includes outlay of capital, teaching, etc. The statistics provided that the county may not make a grant to the city collegiates, the reason being that there would be a rush to attend city schools, and more buildings, capable of teaching staff and appliances could not be afforded for the smaller towns. The law, however, does allow the township to make arrangements with centres like Toronto, whereby the township scholars may be taken care of.

Continuation classes are being started in Mimico. Here for the first two years there is no tuition cost, and the classes are a success. Mr. Chadwick of Halington goes to arrangement could be made with the city then continuation classes would have to be started there, too. J. D. Steward, a Stouffville farmer, thinks that a new high school system is necessary for the entire county, and it is the council's duty to do it. Mr. Edmunds of the Toronto School Board was present in an unofficial capacity, and very emphatically emphasized the need of providing high school education for every boy and girl who wished it. He thought the county council should approach the city for any arrangement whereby county pupils would be charged the same tuition as resident ones.

Mr. Pearson, chairman of the educational committee of York, advocated either the leaving of the matter to the townships to make arrangements with the city individually or the establishment of high school districts throughout the county. Finally it was resolved: "That a committee composed of Messrs. Pearson, Griffith, Cornell, J. M. Gardhouse and Danbridge be appointed to confer with the Toronto council, chairman of the City of Toronto re fees charged county pupils attending the city schools. The question of sewage disposal of the house of refuge was discussed, and a report made by County Engineer E. A. James. It was also decided that a practical nurse be hired to assist the matron of the home in the care of the sick. Other minor reports were heard.

RETURNING SOLDIERS UPSET RED COUNCIL

Four new labor bureaus have been opened by the government in addition to those now at Toronto, Ottawa, London, Hamilton, Brantford, Port William, Port Arthur, St. Thomas, Walkerville, Kitchener and Kingston. The new bureaus may be formed at Sudbury, the Soo, Windsor and a new one in Toronto. These have been formed to meet the demands of the returning soldiers, and the soldiers' civil re-establishment will take care of those men whom the bureaus cannot handle.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC APPOINTMENT.

H. Hulatt, manager of telegraphs, Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, announces the appointment of W. E. Bell as acting division superintendent of telegraphs in Alberta and British Columbia. Mr. Bell has been associated with the Grand Trunk Pacific telegraphs at the headquarters in Montreal since 1915 in the new position of increased responsibility to which he has been called he will have jurisdiction over all matters appertaining to construction and maintenance of telegraphs and telephone lines, and operation of railroad and commercial telegraphs in the two western provinces, making his headquarters in Edmonton. He succeeds W. J. Rooney, who has been granted leave of absence.

MORE THAN HE ASKED.

Walter Miller, a teamster employed by the British Imperial Oil Co. was yesterday awarded \$12,500 instead of the \$10,000 sued for before Mr. Justice Lenoir and a jury. The suit was against the Toronto Railway Company and in respect to an accident in November, 1917, in which a street car was struck by a street car and he himself seriously injured.

WOMEN'S PLACE AFTER THE WAR

Miss Wiseman Addresses Business Women's Club on After-War Problems.

Miss Wiseman, president of the Business Women's Club, had an enthusiastic audience at the Electric Club luncheon yesterday, when she spoke on "Women's Place After the War." Kenneth Dunstan presided. The first problem to be faced, Miss Wiseman thought, was the returned man returning after four years, expecting to find women as he left them. Women who never earned money before were now drawing their own pay cheques. They could never go back to the entirely dependent position. Women had a vote also, and they must learn how to use it. Mothers would have to be recognized, and their ideas on sex considered. The mothers might find it difficult to settle down to the different life of the home, but they would probably maintain their interest in outside affairs and in civics. The training of women hitherto had made them petty and personal in their outlook. Women who experience in business tended to rid them of this. Bank managers complained that a girl would be huffy all day after being shown some error. A good girl would appreciate advice given by her employer. Women must be taught to think in a large way. Girls have been inclined to be frivolous, she said, and failed to take an interest in their work because they thought they might be getting married and leaving it. But if they make their living in a city they should take some interest in its affairs. Business experience would enable women to be more appreciative of the worries and trials of a business man, and incline them to make it pleasanter for him at home, she thought. She hoped that employers would recognize the claim of women for equal wages for equal work. She recognized the difficulty where a woman who did not expect to retain her position competed with a man who would stay with it all his life. She advanced the case of a man appointed under a woman in an office but would not tolerate this, and Miss Wiseman thought she was right. Women should be given place on committees and other boards. The more men and women co-operated the better it would be for both.

IMPERIAL ESSAYS NEED COMPETITORS

Hon. H. J. Cody, minister of education, received a letter yesterday from H. F. Wilson, secretary of the Royal Colonial Institute, London, asking for co-operation in securing competitors for an imperial British essay contest. The letter stated that the council of the Royal Colonial Institute, with a view to encouraging the progress of imperial studies in the schools of the empire, had decided to award, in the spring of 1919, medals and prizes of books for the best essays sent in by boys or girls who were pupils at schools, either in the United Kingdom or the "outer empire." The essays will be adjudicated upon in two classes--candidates above the age of 15 and under 16 years, and candidates of 16 years and over. For the juniors the first prize will be a bronze medal and prize books to the value of two guineas, and a second prize, books to the value of one and a half guineas. The first prize for the senior division will be a silver medal and books to the value of three guineas, and the second prize, books to the value of two guineas. The subject of the essays for class A is "Sea Power as a Basis of Empire," for class B "The Life and Work of Clive as an Empire Builder." These prizes will be distributed next spring.

\$2500 NOT LIVING WAGE, SAY SCHOOL INSPECTORS

Twenty-five hundred dollars a year is not a living wage, according to a deputation of public and school inspectors which waited on the Hon. H. J. Cody, Ontario minister of education, at the parliament buildings yesterday afternoon. The deputation included Inspectors Jordan, Mosely, Power, McNab, Marshall, Conn and Campbell. The deputation stated that it appeared on behalf of the inspectorial body of the Ontario Educational Act, which includes about 90 inspectors, to ask that the present salary scale, which starts with a minimum of \$2500 for county, district and separate school inspectors, be raised. The plea was made that the increase of the minimum made at the last session of the Ontario Legislature of \$2500, was not adequate to meet the cost of living with the prevailing prices which were likely to continue for a long period. Careful consideration was promised by the minister of education.

MILITARY ASK FOR CURTISS' FACTORY

Also Plan Use of Rosedale Clearing Station for Sick Soldiers.

A recommendation has gone from Major-General Legie to Ottawa that the Curtiss airplane factory on Dufferin street, which is to be vacated in January, be taken over as a demobilization and casualty clearing station for use in handling the soldiers returning from overseas.

The announcement was made simultaneously with one that owing to the urgent demand for increased military hospital accommodation in Toronto district, the \$2,000,000 group of new casualty clearing station buildings in North Rosedale, now practically completed, the recommendation has gone to Ottawa for the clearing station buildings to be used as hospitals pending the erection of the new hospital group on the St. Andrew's College grounds.

The clearing station buildings in North Rosedale will accommodate about 5000 soldier-patients when transformed into hospitals.

GENERAL LOGIE THANKS CITY FOR CO-OPERATION

When interviewed yesterday by the press regarding his retirement from the command of Toronto military district, Major-General Logie, C.B., made the following statement:

"In laying down the command of military district No. 2, after nearly four years' work, I desire to express the thanks of myself and the officers who have been associated with me on the district headquarters staff, to the mayor and corporation of the City of Toronto, to the chairman and trustees of the board of education, and to the press and citizens of Toronto for the hearty co-operation and support which these headquarters have had during my tenure of command.

"I would ask those men who are returning and being discharged to resume their civil occupations as quickly as possible, remembering that all grievances, whether real or alleged, and can be adjusted by constitutional means.

"To the relatives of those who have fallen in this war, I extend my deepest sympathy, trusting that time, the great healer, and the recollection of their glorious sacrifices, will be their consolation and pride."

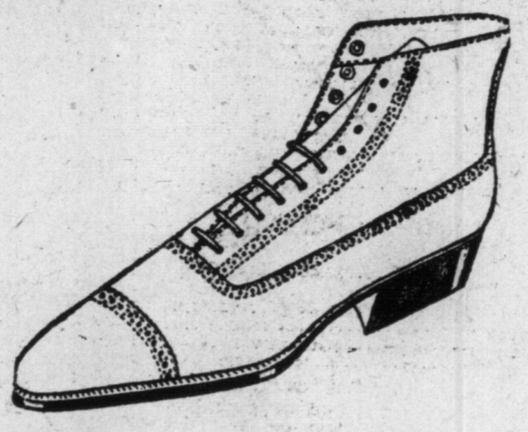

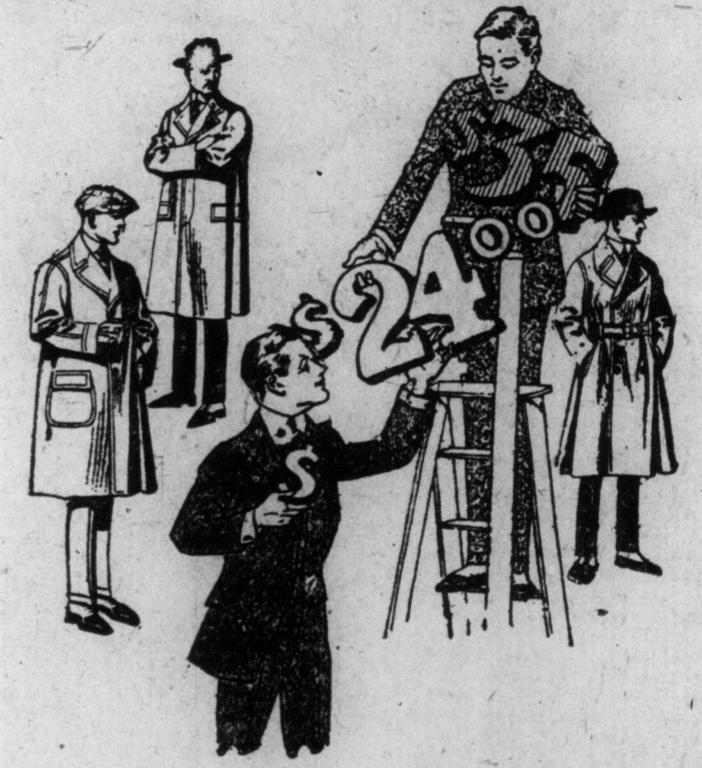
