





How to Reach Mine Centre

Wheat—At opening this morning—an easier feeling prevalled owing to increased receipts of winter wheat at primary points and larger offerings from first hands. Weaker cables also aided in the decline. The weakness was, however, of very short duration and the market was influenced by recovery of Liverpool cables, strong French cables, owing to somewhat smaller crop than expected, and good foreign buying orders developed an advancing tendency and ruled very firm during the latter part of the session. The close was strong at 2c advance over lowest prices of the day. There were also several bullish items that helped the market along, viz.; the decrease of 1.285,000 bushels. In visible supply, which was more than double the estimate, decreases in amount, on passage and English supply of 1,200,000 bushels and 1,360,000 bushels and light world's shipments of 3,900,000 bushels. Foreign situation "per contra" is remarkably strong, and it seems probable that the market will experience some lively fluctuations.
