AGAINST THE EXPORT DUTY ON NICKEL

Henchemen of Americans Thick on the Ground at Ottawa.

Canadian Copper Company Wants the Present State of Affairs to Go On, But Mr. S. J. Ritchie Wants the Smelting and Refining Done in This Country - What Will Government Do?

Ottawa, March 20.—(Special).—The opponents of an export duty on nickel, who consist of the henchemen of the American Sidbury mines, are thick on the ground these days. Among them are two especially representative citizens of Sidbury, Dr. Struthers and D. L. McKinnon, but their disinterestedness will be readily realized when it is explained that Dr. Struthers is physician of the Canadian Copper Company, which is putting up the fight against an export duty, while Mr. McKinnon is a gentleman who has the contract to roast the nickel ore for the Canadian Copper Company. Then there is also here Mr. J. G. Huestock, one of the legal representatives of the company. The other day there was distributed to every member of the House a copy of an anonymous pamphlet prepared in advocacy of the maintenance of the present condition of affairs. A copy of this circular fell early into the hands of Mr. S. J. Ritchie, who has large interests in Canada and who is anxious to see the smelting, refining and manufacturing of nickel ores done in the Dominion. Mr. Ritchie, in a few hours prepared, and has caused to be issued, a telling indictment of the Canadian Copper Co. which was granted in the House of Commons by a vote of 12 to 10, and is believed cannot fail to influence the Government to improve the full amount of the export duty, which was authorized by the Tariff Act of last session, namely, 10 cents per pound upon nickel and 2 cents upon copper.

A Heavy Point Chalked up. A heavy point is scored against the Canadian Copper Company, which is put down by the fact that they have failed to carry out the conditions of their Dominion charter, which was granted in 1888. Hon. W. B. Ives makes the following statement: "I was the chairman of the Private Bills Committee of the House of Commons at that time, and have to-day refreshed my memory by looking over the original records of the bill, and such as brought before the committee asked power to establish treating and smelting works in any province of Canada elsewhere."

The words or otherwise were stricken out by the committee by the view of forcing the companies to treat and refine their ores in Canada. And yet, according to this provision, the company has been sending all its product in the shape of matte, to New Jersey for treatment.

Can Slow Either Way. That the opponents of an export duty on nickel can blow hot or cold as it suits their convenience, is abundantly verified. One of the warmest champions of the Sidbury company is a member of the committee on the subject, the Canadian Mining Institute, which was appointed at the recent meeting in Montreal to secure an efficient import duty on lead and lead manufactures. The circular this committee has prepared says: "It would seem that all patriotic Canadians, irrespective of party lines, should be united in opposing the bill as a prohibitory duty, similar to the one levied by the United States on Canadian lead at the present time. It would be the means of making the Canadian market for Canadian lead, and establishing a highly important industry for Canada."

Brantford, March 19.—W. F. Allen, foreman of the Fire Department, passed away at noon to-day. Deceased was one of the first to join the firemen under the present system, and was highly respected. He leaves a wife and two children, a boy and a girl. Deceased was out on his bicycle Tuesday afternoon, when he was thrown violently to the ground, but he proceeded to the hospital, and he was taken to his home on Wednesday night to go home. It was supposed he was doing well until this forenoon, when he became worse, and died at noon.

A Comet With a Tail. Cambridge, Mass., March 20.—A telegram has been received from the Harvard College Observatory stating that Dr. Curtis has just discovered a comet, its position March 20, 0h 53m 52s, Greenwich time, 21h 15m 30.8s, declination north, 16 17' and 79° longitude, 111° 41' and 79° longitude, plus 3m 41s; daily motion in declination, plus 1 degree 4m. The comet is 2 1/2 in diameter, and has a very bright, but with strong central condensation and a tail 1 degree long.

THE VOLUNTEERS OF CANADA

Will Be Interested in the Report of Dominion Rifle Association.

To Send the Bisley Team Across the Pond and Back Oct 6th 1898. Receipts From Ordinary Sources Amounting to \$16,816 in Fact the D.R.A. is in a Flourishing Condition.

Ottawa, March 20.—(Special).—The report of the Council of the D.R.A. to be presented to the annual meeting of the association on Wednesday is an admirable statement of the work done last year.

Deducting the balance in hand from the year, the number of rifle associations is 77, and other rifle associations thirty-two, a decrease of five associations as compared with 1896.

The expenditure on account of the Bisley team amounted to \$20,000, an increase of \$400. This is accounted for by the team sailing a week earlier than usual, and the consequent expense entailed for subsistence in England prior to the opening of the competition at Bisley.

Receipts from ordinary sources for the year amounted to \$16,816, which, with the balance of \$18,449 carried forward from last year, shows a total of \$35,265.

The general expenditure amounted to \$15,000, leaving a balance at credit of \$20,265. Against this, however, the Bisley building claims outstanding (which include \$20,000 due the Ontario Bank), have to be taken into account as liabilities, amounting in all to \$20,000.

Deducting the balance in hand from this amount, the net liabilities of the association under the heading of Bisley building are \$20,000. To offset this liability there is the Bisley building and its valuable contents.

Halifax, N.S., March 20.—The Osborne, a freight steamer chartered by the Atlantic Transport Line, was towed within sight of the harbor to-night by the Petroleum Tank Steamship Company's boat, the Duffield. The Osborne is a fine steel steamer, running between London and Philadelphia.

TURNKEY SHOT A PRISONER.

Desperate John Glassford Brought Down From the Jail Wall.

London, Ont., March 19.—A sensational incident occurred at the jail here to-day. About ten minutes before 1 o'clock this afternoon Turnkey Stickles took John Glassford, a prisoner, to the yard for exercise. They had been there only half an hour when Stickles, happening to look around at the river, Glassford took advantage of the momentary opportunity and "shinned up" the water pipe with the agility of a cat. When Stickles again saw him, Glassford was at the top of the wall. The turnkey shouted to him to stop, but he paid no attention. Stickles fired over Glassford's head, but still the prisoner headed him not.

Shot Him in the Back. Stickles then saw that extreme measures were needed, and shot Glassford in the back, the bullet entering the shoulder. Just below the shoulder blade, the prisoner fell over on the roof of the building as though dead, and was removed by way of the skylight into the Court House, and thence to the cell, where he was attended to by the medical staff.

The wound proved to be of a serious nature, and there are still slight hopes of Glassford's recovery. The victim is a desperate man awaiting removal to Kingston Penitentiary, to which place he was sentenced for seven years, at the last Assizes, for robbing the bank of Hales, near Wardville, on Oct. 4 last.

Glassford, after his first arrest, awaiting trial, escaped on Oct. 23, when he climbed up the same pipe as he did to-day and leaped from the walls. He was at liberty for ten days before being re-arrested near Chatham.

KLONDIKE DELEGATES APPEAL TO THE SENATE

Say the McKenzie-Mann Road Will Not Benefit the Miners.

Will Address Members of the Upper House on the Subject on Tuesday in Room No. 8—English and French-Canadian and United States Delegates on Hand—Moonshine Despatches.

Ottawa, March 20.—(Special).—The three delegates selected by the miners of the Klondike, to come to Ottawa and solicit amendments to the mining laws, have arrived here and interviewed the Minister of Justice. They are Mr. Maxime Landreville, representing the French-Canadian, Dr. A. E. Wills, the English-speaking Canadian, and Mr. E. J. Livermash, representing the alien or American miners. Of course, since their departure from Dawson the regulations have undergone considerable change in the right direction, so that upon their first visit here a few weeks ago they were able to congratulate Mr. Sifton to that extent. Since then the weighty question of communication has been taken up, and the Government has bound itself to the Mackenzie-Mann road, so that the delegates have a subject quite as serious as Minister Sifton's absurd mining laws, in that they are to deal with in the interest of those who sent them to the capital in the first instance.

Appeal to the Senators. As the bill has passed the Commons by force of the Klondike's partisan majority, the delegates have determined to plead their case before the Senate, and to urge the bill before it. To this end they have issued the following circular to the members of the Upper Chamber:

"We had Parliament in considering a bill providing for the extension of the Yukon railway between the Stikine River and Teslin Lake, and for the granting to the Yukon territory of the trade and of great passing moment. Through the courtesy of the Government, we were able to attend our disposal, where, on Tuesday, the 22nd inst., at 10 o'clock a.m., those who attend upon matters bearing on the Yukon mining laws, before Parliament. You are cordially invited to attend. (Signed) M. Landreville, E. J. Livermash, Edward J. Livermash."

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FIGHTING JOE MARTIN WILL FIGHT AGAIN

If a British Columbian's Statement Proves to Be Correct.

Mr. Greenway's Old Colleague Will Enter the Political Arena in British Columbia. It is Said, as Attorney-General in Premier Turner's Cabinet—D. G. Fraser to Have That Judgeship.

Ottawa, March 20.—(Special).—A prominent British Columbian is authority for the statement that at the close of the present session of the British Columbia Legislature dissolution is to take place, and it is currently reported that Premier Turner will appeal to the province with a reorganized Ministry, in which Joseph Martin, the ex-Manitoba, will be Attorney-General.

It seems to be settled that D. O. Fraser, M. P., will get the vacant British Columbia Judgeship. The members from the Pacific Province are divided on the subject, but the advocates of the appointment of a local man have no good name to suggest, the two best available men, Messrs. Bodwell and Davis, each having declined the position.

MATTERS AT DAWSON CITY. A Settling Man Arrived at Seattle Says Stampede Are Frequent—Winters' Work Turning Out Well—\$45,000 in Drafts.

Seattle, Wash., March 20.—W. G. Wallace of Saguinaw, Michigan, arrived here yesterday from Dawson City, which place he left Feb. 15.

Concerning matters at Dawson, Mr. Wallace says that stampedes to the several creeks are frequent. Word does this winter is all turning out well. There is a reason, said he, why the country west of the Yukon should not prove to be as rich as that on the east side. The west is practically all unworked territory. Discoveries have been made on Swedish creek that promise well.

There have been several quartz ledges located and the indications are that the copper content in the field of operations in quartz work.

There need be no anxiety about the food supply, the companies that are operating here will furnish ample supplies; besides, the winter has been unusually long, and the passes calculated on carrying a year's supply.

Mr. Wallace is credited with having brought out \$45,000 in drafts with him.

THE EASTERN SITUATION. French Demands on China Said to Have Been the Occasion of a Special Conference in London.

London, March 21.—The Chinese Ambassador visited the Foreign Office Saturday evening by special invitation. It is supposed that the French demands on China were the subject of discussion. There are some doubts as to the extent of the demands.

A despatch to The Daily Mail from Nagasaki mentions a report that the Yangtze valley is included, which tends to confirm the report from Peking that France has demanded that China shall not cede any portion of the Province of Kwai-Chow, which province belongs within the valley.

The Times has a despatch from Peking, however, which explains that the demands apply only to the three provinces, Kwang Tung, Kwang Si and Yun Nan, in Laotia.

Discussing the matter editorially, The Times suggests an expansion of those discrepancies that M. Duhal, the French Charge d'Affaires at Peking, has demanded more than was authorized to demand, and that M. Hanotaux, in consequence, had disavowed him in the statement issued yesterday, saying that there was no connection between the demands of the French Government in China and the Chinese loan.

The Paris correspondent of the Times reports passages of a conversation with a diplomat in the course of which M. Hanotaux, the French Foreign Minister, disavowed that he had intended to join in any scheme for the disintegration of China.

A BATTLE IMMINENT. Anglo-Egyptian Troops and Dervishes Coming to Close Quarters on the Nile.

Kumar Camp, Nubia, March 20.—A battle is imminent between the Anglo-Egyptian column and the dervishes.

The combined forces have started to advance up the Atbara to meet the enemy, who are also advancing, but who, it is believed, are not aware of the proximity of the British.

Formed a Strong Zeebren. Athara Camp, March 20.—The whole force has arrived at the Hudi Forts after a splendid march of five hours from Kunar, partly through a dust storm. There is no sign of the enemy. The Anglo-Egyptian army has formed a strong serai for the night. All the forces on the Atbara are held by the cavalry and the camel corps.

A NEW WAR CLOUD. Boer Organ at Johannesburg Says England Must Abandon Sundry Claims or Fight.

Johannesburg, March 20.—The Standard and Diggers' News, in a recently inspired article, says: "War is almost inevitable unless England abandons her claim to sovereignty."

THERE WERE 22 CANADIANS

On the U.S. Warship Maine When She Was Wrecked.

Two of Them Were Lost and the Balance Are at Key West—Report of the Court of Inquiry Not Yet Handed in—War Preparations Continue, However, on the Part of the States and Spain.

The following information has been furnished to The World by Commander Knowlton of the Toronto post of the Grand Army of the Republic:

(Official Copy.) Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, March 17, 1898. Dear Sir: There were twelve Canadians on board of the cruiser Maine at the time of her destruction.

Several Survivors of the Wrecked Warship Arrived in Washington Excepted Only on Saturday—Divulged Nothing.

Washington, D.C., March 19.—The arrival of several survivors of the Maine and their extended conferences with President McKinley and Secretary Long, furnished the most interesting feature in today's developments on the Spanish situation.

Another interesting arrival of the Maine was Constructor Hoover, the technical expert sent to Havana to identify the wrecked plates in the Maine wreckage.

GEN. PANDO A CAPTIVE. Cuban insurgents Defeated the Spanish Forces and Made a Prisoner of Their Commander.

FARMERS' LOAN MORTGAGES Alleged Unfair Treatment of Mr. McLaren at Ottawa.

Statement of the Facts—Mr. McLaren's Tender, on Which He Spent Several Hundred Dollars—Whist Notification is Postponed Central Canada Gets the Purchase—Mr. McLaren's Grounds of Complaint.

Mr. McLaren of Ottawa complains of the treatment he has received at the hands of the liquidators of the Farmers' Loan Company in respect of the sale of the first lot of the company's mortgages.

The advertisement and its results. The company advertised for tenders for the purchase of \$108,000 of farm mortgages to be in by the 12th of Feb, 1938.

On the 28th of Feb. Mr. McLaren's solicitor was told by the liquidator that his client's tender had been accepted, but that the Master-in-Ordinary had reserved formal ratification till after the 15th of March.

On Monday Mr. McLaren wrote, objecting on the ground that he had fulfilled the terms of the advertisement, and that he was informed that Mr. George A. Cox, a member of the Board of Directors of the Farmers' Loan Company, was the new tenderer.

On the 14th of March Mr. McLaren learned from the World that these mortgages had been purchased by the Central Canada Loan and Savings Company, of which Mr. George A. Cox is president.

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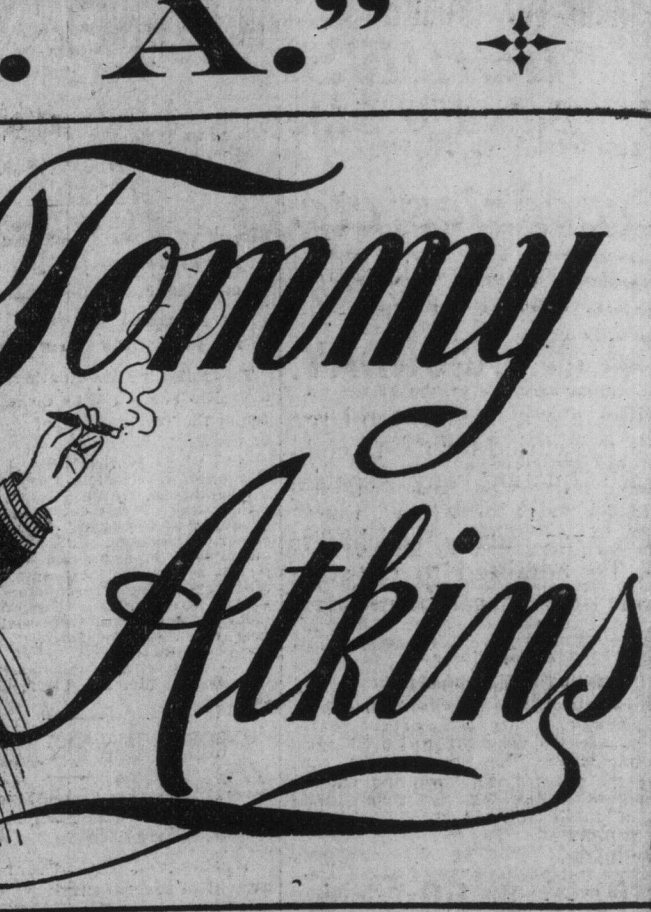
