



HIGH-HANDED PROCEEDINGS

Chairman Griffith of the Sewers Committee Will Neither Resign Nor be Kicked Out, SO SOME ALDERMEN ALLEGE.

Hamilton, June 19.—(Special.)—The fight which has been going on for months in the Sewers Committee between the chairman, Ald. Griffith, on one side, and the members, Ald. Neilligan, McAndrew, Reid, Nicholson and Pettigrew, on the other, ended today by the members resigning. They did so because of "high-handed proceedings" on the part of the chairman. They first gave him an opportunity to resign, but he would not do so. The "anal straw" was the purchasing of a foot pump for the sewerage disposal works. The resignation of the members, although at the last meeting the committee refused to pass one, and the matter was referred to the Board of Health, was not passed by the Board. Ald. Griffith said he would not resign. "I wish you to take that back," requested the chairman. "Why because it's right," replied Ald. Reid.

Mr. Neilligan said he intended to resign, as Griffith ran the whole works, or words to that effect. "I will second it," asked Ald. Reid. "I'll second it," Ald. Reid moved that the chairman be asked to resign. Ald. Neilligan seconded the motion, but the chairman would not put it. "I rise to object," he said. "All kinds of questions were fired at the chairman and the discussion at last pasted out. Finally Ald. Neilligan moved that Ald. McAndrew take the chair, and when the chairman said it was out of order, His Worship said he did not think the committee could resign. He is chairman, who should promise to mend his ways. JOUBERT HAS 20,000 TROOPS The Plan of Campaign of the Boers in Case of War With Great Britain. THEY WILL MARCH ON KIMBERLEY.

British Diamond Mines Will be Blown, and All Sorts of Things Will Happen. London, June 19.—The St. James Gazette this afternoon claims to have received from an absolutely reliable source at Pretoria, capital of the Transvaal, the plan of campaign which will be followed by General Joubert, commander in chief of the Boers, in the event of war between the Transvaal and Great Britain.

Help Expected From Free State. With these troops and help expected from the Orange Free State, Joubert expects to take the offensive immediately after the declaration of war, enter the Orange Free State and march on Kimberley, the British diamond mining centre in West Griqualand and which forms four of the seventy divisions of Cape Colony. Kimberley is about 100 miles northwest of Bloemfontein. In his march on Kimberley Joubert will use the railroad as far as available, expects to capture the town with slight loss and blow up the De Beers diamond mine.

Will Destroy Railroads. Simultaneously, it is added, the railroad from Cape Town to Bulawayo will be destroyed by Boer forces. The British Cape Colony, who will also destroy the Port Elizabeth-Pretoria line, south of Bloemfontein to prevent British troops from using it. Finally, immediately after Kimberley is captured, General Joubert will advance on Cape Town, the capital of Cape Colony, through the western provinces, where the Dutch pretensions and are expected to join the Boers. Joubert calculates he will be master of Cape Town a fortnight after the declaration of war and that he will then be able to dictate terms of peace.

Ald. Hallam will have little definite to lay before the new City Hall opening special committee to-day. Of the two dates, July 15 and Exhibition time, it looks more than ever as though the latter would be chosen. The Exhibition Association prefers it as being an additional and an unexpected attraction, and everyone who wants to see unveiled a finished City Hall would prefer it that late or even later, too. Ald. Hallam himself confesses it to be impossible to have the work anything like finished by July, and although he wants to have the pleasure of anticipation turned into reality as soon as possible, he does not want a premature ceremony himself. But the chief argument will be as to who shall pay the shot and also how large the shot is to be. The idea of having the big variety of which variety has been laughed out of countenance. It is even becoming popular at City Hall and on the outside popular at the Mayor and Ald. Hallam, who are to get all the glory out of it, should "settle." On this question of the providing of the shot, these two big guns are at variance. The Mayor will hardly take it upon himself to suggest that he pay the bill; he would rather see Ald. Hallam do it, and vice versa.

SLOW DAY AT CITY HALL.

Nothing But a Little Parish Business Was Transacted in Civic Circles Yesterday. A petition was presented by Mr. Horton Walker to Acting City Clerk Littlejohn for an asphalt pavement on Spadina-avenue from Knox College to Bloor-street. It contains the names of 101 out of 140 owners, many of the signatures being those of the heavier ratepayers, so that the petition will likely be declared sufficiently signed.

The Old, Old Story. Brunswick-avenue ratepayers between Usher and Harbord streets, it would seem would sign for anything in the shape of a petition for a pavement. They have been sowing for about a year over the relative advisability of having asphalt and cobble block, and strange to say almost a two-third majority can be counted for either. A petition against block had 34 out of 65 signatures, but was \$5000 short of the property qualification.

A Goody Delegation. The Toronto City Council deputation, which left to assist Mr. Tarte in reference to the grain route and Hudson Bay Railway lines yesterday, was composed of Mayor Shaw, Ald. Lyne, Franklin, Saunders, Bowman and Henlan. The latter will join him at the capital for a couple of months.

Ring Her Up, Number 8224. Miss Redden, the switch-board operator at the new City Hall, assumed duties yesterday. She has a cosy little apartment on the fourth floor facing the north.

City Hall Notes. The Harbor Commissioners and the C.P.R. have both applied to the Government for certain harbor waters. AME Spence suggests that the city should step in as a dark horse and beat out the two contending concerns.

The Sunlight Soap Co. negotiations are now related to the G.T.R., the city agreement having been accepted.

Who is Responsible? Editor World: The Ontario Government has appointed Mr. Fisher Inspector to enforce the San Jose Seal Act in the County of Halton. Mr. Fisher found the pest in trees in this vicinity and ordered the owner to destroy the infested trees. The owner has not destroyed the trees, nor has Mr. Fisher, although he says he should do so. The pest has this year spread to adjoining orchards. Now, I would like to know if the Government or the Inspector is liable for damages from the spreading of the insect from the trees that should have been cut down and destroyed according to the Act, to trees in my or other orchards to which it may spread. As this is a serious matter to all tree owners in this and other vicinities, you would do great service to the public by making a few ideas in the Government in regard to this pest. W. E. Babcock.
