





Competent critics declare that the railways are steadily ruining rural England by their excessive agricultural freight rates. This same policy, it is pointed out, is largely responsible for the existing depression in English industrial centres. While the program of the railway companies up to date seems to be to make up for the diminished volume of traffic by charging higher freight rates on what remains, it is argued that a radical change of policy towards their customers, as well as a mechanical reorganization, are necessary to put home rails upon a basis of permanent prospersty.

For the present, however, the stock exchange is enjoying the year and revival to the utmost. Promoters of mining securities are carefully nourishing a boom, but it is said that a considerable undercurrent of realizing by outsiders, for fear of some sudden reverse in South Africa, may check the welcome rise. 
