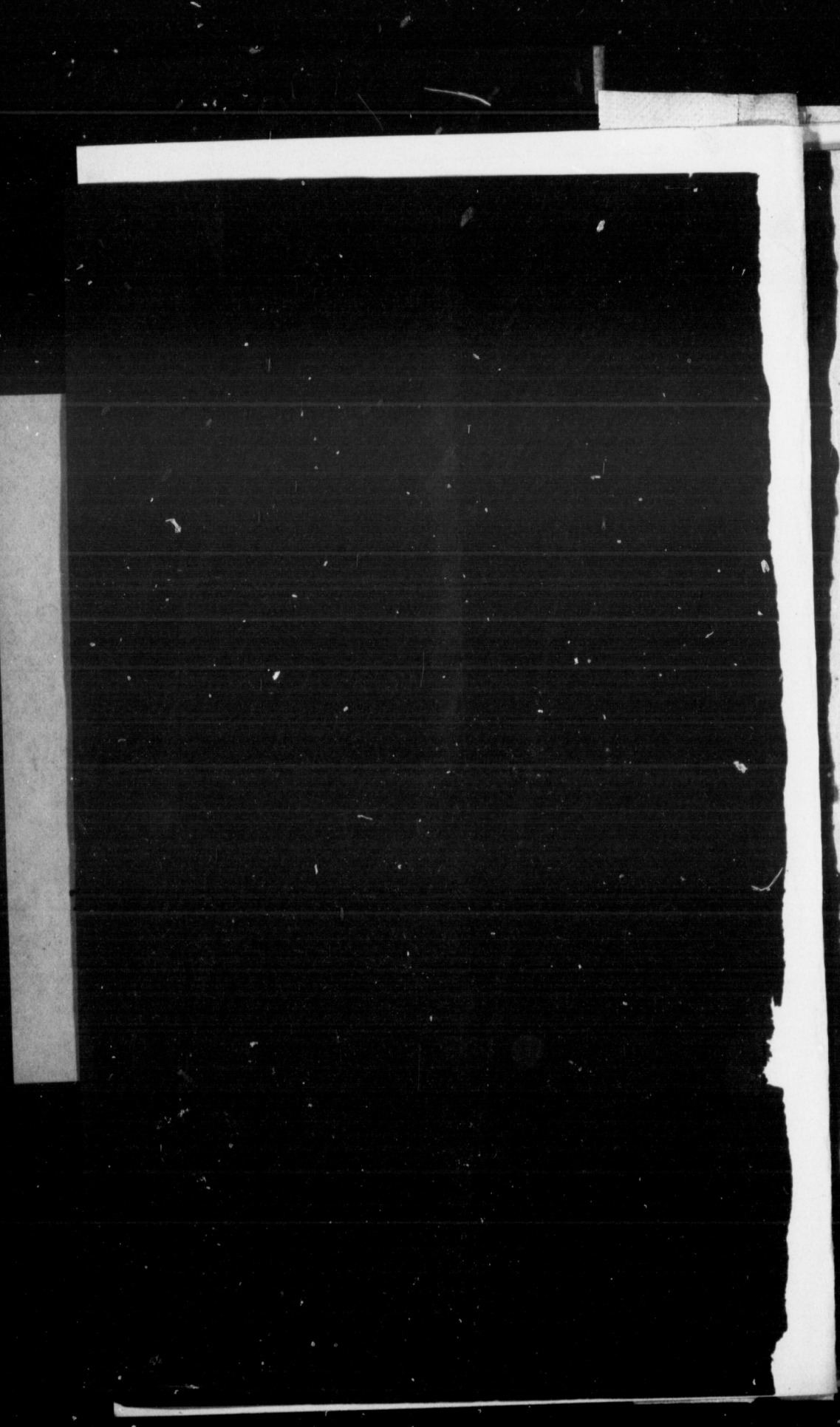

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

ISSUED BY THE TORONTO DIOCESAN COUNCIL, ACTING
FOR THE PRESENT AS CENTRAL.

In issuing this our Fifth Annual Report of the Girls' Friendly Society in Canada, we feel, that while we have cause for thankfulness and encouragement at the measure of success which has attended the work of the Society during the past year, there is also room for

regret. The reports of progress in the localities where the work is established are on the whole encouraging, but no new Branches have been formed, and the growth of the Society is therefore less satisfactory than it should be. The work is crippled everywhere throughout the country from the same cause, viz., the lack of efficient Associates, *i.e.*, of earnest, devoted Church Women, who will take the trouble to acquaint themselves thoroughly with the Society's objects and methods of work, and who are both willing and able to give time and thought to it. Without these qualifications no Associate can hope to accomplish any successful work in the G. F. S. Too often the office of an Associate is undertaken by those whose hands are already full, and who are unwilling to give up their work which they know, for the (to them) untried possibilities of the G. F. S. Yet we venture to say that if the Associate is to accomplish any real good she must make this work first and chief; that is, she must take it up as her particular branch of work in the Church. We should have no difficulty in obtaining Members if we had Associates capable of enlisting their interest and sympathy, and we cannot believe that among our older Church Women there are not many who are fitted to undertake this service in the cause of Christ, and for love of their younger less experienced, and perhaps less fortunate sisters.

There is no doubt that the work is to be done, and if the Women of the Church hold aloof from it, it will be accomplished by others whose energy and perseverance will put our lukewarmness and faint hearted

efforts to shame. A farther hindrance to our work comes from the many false ideas which have got possession of people's minds, in regard to the objects and scope of the G. F. S. It is not an employment society, nor an emigration society, nor even a benefit society, though all these may incidentally become part of the work of the G. F. S. We can only repeat what has been often said before that it was designed to be a bond of union in the highest sense between young women of all classes by their working together in some way for the one Master the common Lord of all, and that the primary "object" of the Society is the binding together of its Members "for mutual help for sympathy and prayer."

From this highest source will naturally flow much pleasant social intercourse and enjoyment, but the basis of the Society must be a religious one, and as was said last year it is "only by each separate Member and Associate regarding herself as one link in a great chain of sisterly love and fellowship under the guidance of God's Holy Spirit, that the living stream of energy and success can flow through our operations."

A hopeful feature in the work of the past year is the increased attention given to the formation of candidates classes, which are much recommended as a means of future strength to the Society, and the most satisfactory source from which Members can be drawn.

We have to announce with great pleasure that the Montreal Diocesan Branch has joined the Canadian G. F. S., and we hope to derive mutual help and benefit from this Union.

The Montreal Report will be found printed with those from other Branches.

IMMIGRATION.

Although by a resolution passed at a Meeting of the Central Council on February 1st, 1886, this Society stated that Immigration could no longer be continued as a distinct branch of G. F. S. work, still all Members from England or elsewhere, who have sent us notification of their coming, have been met and looked after on their arrival, and as far as possible situations or other work found for them by the Immigrants' Associates.

The Immigrants' Associates for 1888-9, are Mrs. J. D. Cayley, St. George's Rectory, Toronto, and Mrs. Kenrick, 179 John St., Toronto.

"FRIENDLY HELPERS."

It has been a source of regret on many occasions that members who marry should, under the rules, cease to belong to the Society. Acting upon the suggestion made by the Central Council in England, we have issued "Friendly Helpers'" cards with the Associates' prayer on the back. These can now be supplied to married Members, who wish to retain their connection with the Society. No fee is required from a Friendly Helper. Cards to be obtained from the General Secretary.

Clergy would consent to become Working Associates, so that in every Parish throughout the Dominion there should be at least one person fully informed of the work and aims of the G. F. S., to whom Members could be commended, and who would be interested in organizing the work in her neighbourhood, should an opportunity present itself.

The General Secretary will be glad to furnish information regarding the Society, specimens of its publications, &c., to any persons applying to her for the same. A fee of 60 cents a year is required from Working Associates, to be paid to the Central Fund, if they are not attached to a Branch.

THE "FRIENDLY MESSENGER."

Although the Council has not altered its opinion as to the need and value of having some means of communication between our widely scattered Branches, such as is afforded by the small monthly paper of our Society, the effort has been so insufficiently encouraged by the different Branches that not only has it been found impossible to enlarge and improve upon it, as it was proposed to do, but it is feared unless some special effort is made this year, that we shall not be able any longer to carry on the Friendly Messenger. The reserve fund which had been appropriated to supplying the deficit in its expenses, will soon be exhausted, and the venture is as far as ever from being self-supporting. We cannot help thinking that many more Associates might take the paper, passing it on to those Members

of their Branch, who do not or cannot subscribe for it. The chief reason for the existence of a special monthly paper in our Society (we quote from the Girls' Friendly Magazine for America) is, that "we should have some way of becoming acquainted with each others ways, and methods, and undertakings, and thereby better accomplish the work we have been doing before in an isolated kind of way. In what surer manner can we learn to realize that we are Members one of another united in one large widely extended organization, with one aim and desire to bear one another's burdens, and raise the standard of womanhood." If such an enterprise is to succeed, each one of us must feel ourselves in a measure responsible for the undertaking, must individually exert ourselves to secure subscribers, and forward items of interest and suitable original contributions for use in its pages.

The annual subscription to the "Friendly Messenger" is 25 cents, and may be sent to the Editor, 11 Grange Road, Toronto, or to the General Secretary.

The Toronto Diocesan Council still continues to act as Central, which position it naturally holds as the originator of the work in Canada. A Central Depot, for the purpose of receiving and imparting information on all points connected with our work, has been found absolutely necessary, and until a Centre more satisfactory to all is agreed upon, the Toronto Council will retain its present position, and perform the duties which it entails.

REPORT OF WORK AND PROGRESS

OF THE

GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY IN CANADA.

DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

Although there are still but two Branches in this Diocese, the reports are as usual very satisfactory. The Fredericton secretary writes that several of the Members have married, some died, and others gone to the United States since the last report was received. She adds, "Last Friday we attended the funeral of one of our Members who was seldom absent from our Weekly Meetings so long as her health allowed her to attend. For several months, however, illness prevented her from doing so. She always welcomed the Rector's visits, and received Holy Communion very shortly before her death. Only last Sunday she was so afraid her sisters would oversleep themselves, that she made an effort to call them up to go to the early celebration. Two of our Members who had joined the Salvation Army have come back to us.

Our Tea Meeting, on the Festival of the Holy Innocents, passed off very pleasantly; our Rector as usual being present. We now have two sewing classes; two of the Working Associates are generally present at each meeting. The result of the year's work by the class, which meets at the Guild Room in the Church Hall, has been sent to Richibucto, and that of the class at the Secretary's house, has been given to the Mission at Ludlow. Sometimes the interest of our Members seems to flag, and the number in attendance is small, but we try not to be "weary in well doing."

ST. JOHN.—This Branch again sends a good report, both as regards work and membership. The Secretary says, "Our Branch has to report a slight increase in the numbers of Working Associates; the

number of Members averages about the same. We meet every week at the pleasant rooms of the Church Institute, where the Members have the advantage of seeing the illustrated papers and magazines as well as the use of the piano. On the alternate evenings a Bible Class is held, and lessons are given in different kinds of plain and fancy work, knitting and writing. In the Autumn we made a donation of articles made by the girls to the Orphan Asylum sale, and at Christmas some presents were given by them to the children.

On December 21st, 1884, an Anniversary Celebration was held at the rooms, to which the Clergy of St. John and Portland, with their wives, and several other visitors, were invited. Addresses were given followed with music. Tea and cake were provided by the Associates, and a very pleasant evening concluded with the benediction by the Rev. Canon DeVeber.

This year we have provided ribbon badges for the Members to wear at the Quarterly Meetings: red for Members, and blue for Associates, with the G. F. S. monogram printed in gold.

DIOCESE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

We have only received one Report from this Diocese, namely, St. Stephen's (Bishop's Chapel) Branch, Halifax. We trust the new Bishop may take as much interest in the Society as his predecessor did, and that next year we may report the formation of additional Branches.

The Secretary writes: "This Branch is, on the whole, in a satisfactory condition, although there are fewer members than last year to report. Some have gone away, some married, and others left for various reasons. Meetings are held once a fortnight. A book is read while the girls sew; their work generally goes to the poor, but at present they are preparing for a sale in aid of Home Missions.

"At the Quarterly Meetings new Members are admitted, and music and other amusements engaged in. The Honorary Associates are invited to these Meetings. A pic-nic was given at Mrs. Binney's Country Cottage, in October, and the Anniversary Services were held on February 2nd and 3rd. The late Secretary, Miss Mary Almon, left in August for England, and has been greatly missed, the Members being much attached to her.

"In April our Bishop was taken from us, and his loss was felt by none more deeply than by the Associates and Members of our Branch. He had introduced the G. F. S. into Nova Scotia, and formed this Branch in connection with his Chapel. His interest in each, and his kindness to all, were unailing, and can never be forgotten."

The Secretary adds, that they have lately added a Candidate's Class to their Branch.

ACADIA MINES.—No Report has been received from this Branch.

DIOCESE OF TORONTO.

TORONTO.—We are sorry not to be able to announce an increase in the number of Toronto Parochial Branches, though the work in the existing Branches, especially that of Holy Trinity and St. Matthias, is carried on most prosperously. The plan of uniting in one Branch all the City Parishes, has had a fair trial, and has not proved as successful as we hoped would be the case. We think the chief cause has been the great distance of some of the Divisions from the Central Room, the Members not caring, after working all day, to walk so far. In short, we decided that the amount of success did not warrant our keeping up the expense of the hire of the room.

During the past year we have had three Devotional Meetings, at which twenty-one Members were formally admitted by the Chaplain. The Business and Associate Meetings were also held in the Room as long as we retained it. They are now held in a bright, cheerful, and well-furnished room appropriated to our use by the kindness of the Rector, in the new Holy Trinity School House.

The Annual Pic-nic took place at Erlescourt on June 25th. A special train was provided for the large number of Members, Associates, and friends, who accepted Major and Mrs. Foster's kind invitation, and a most enjoyable day was spent in their beautiful grounds.

The Holy Trinity Branch has two Weekly Meetings, one on Monday evenings for the Members, and on Tuesday for Candidates. All have been busily working for some months, as have the other Parochial Branches, for the sale coming off early in June, the proceeds of which are to go towards a sick fund, and also for hiring and furnishing rooms, where Members out of work, or strangers in the city, can lodge.

The head Associate writes : "The St. Luke's Division have lately joined us in our cheery room on Monday Evenings, and are quite a pleasant addition to our gatherings, making us feel stronger regards numbers, and setting us an excellent example as diligent workers. Our good President Mrs. Wood usually reads aloud what we work, and the evenings are all too short. Still the cry is for more earnest help, more suitable Associates, each one taking in charge five or six girls, and really looking after them, hunting them up when absent, visiting them in their homes from time to time, and making the girls feel she takes a personal interest in each one of them. Here we are with twenty-nine Members, and thirty-seven Candidates, and only six Associates, it stands to reason the work cannot be thoroughly done."

The report from the St. Matthias Branch is very good ; the number of Members has increased, and there is a large Candidates' Class. Before Christmas the Members worked diligently at quilts for the St. John's Hospital for women, and since that time for the sale of The Guild of Perseverance, to which all the best Members belong. It grows steadily.

CARLTON.—The Carlton Branch have met regularly summer and winter, and have been busily engaged in working for the proposed sale.

Last Autumn Ambulance Lectures were commenced, and the Members have taken the greatest interest in them. They have thus gained information which it would be difficult for them otherwise to obtain, as to the treatment of accidents which occur from time to time in their own homes or among neighbours before medical aid can be obtained.

The Candidates Class meets once a month. The Girls' Friendly Room at Erlescourt, which is set apart for Members requiring rest or change of air, was in constant occupation from June till the end of October.

Mrs. Kirby's departure for Norwood, Peterborough, is a subject of very great regret, she has taken a deep interest in the Society, and her place will be impossible to fill.

The Annual Picnic was again held at Erlescourt, where Major and Mrs. Foster not only lent their grounds, but provided refreshments for the 200 Associates, Members and friends who were present.

UXBRIDGE.—During this year the Uxbridge Branch has held nineteen regular Meetings, besides giving a Supper and Concert in April, a Strawberry Festival in June, and a sale in December. The average attendance at the Meetings, has been good, an increase of three on the previous year.

The proceeds from the entertainments here were \$123.30. Of this \$100 has been paid to the Church Building Fund. This makes a total of \$400 paid by the Society to the Fund, leaving \$100 yet to pay of the sum promised.

The reading done during the year has been more varied than usual, amongst other books the "Life of Bishop Patterson," and "Maidens of Scripture," have been greatly enjoyed by the Members.

The Meetings have been held regularly excepting during July and August when, as in other Branches, a holiday was taken by the Class Associates.

Three new Associates have joined during the year. Of the Members, six left for various reasons, and eight others joined, making the present number 26.

Two "Social Evenings" have been given by the President, Mrs. Davidson, a very successful one before the summer holidays, and a smaller one at the end of the year.

PORT PERRY.—The Secretary of this Branch does not send a full Report. The Meetings are held fortnightly at the houses of different Associates, and the Members are now occupied in making articles for a sale of work. A very successful concert was given in the autumn, the proceeds of which, amounting to \$30, were spent on Church improvements.

ASHBURNHAM.—The Secretary of this Branch says the working of the G. F. S. in the Parish has been much affected by establishing a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and that they cannot work both organizations effectively.

DIocese of MONTREAL.

In presenting this our Second Annual Report, we feel that we have every cause for congratulation and thankfulness at the progress the work has made during the past year, although with two excep-

tions, of Waterloo and St. Lambert, the Society has not extended its Branches outside the city ; this fact is not due either to any lack of zeal on the part of the Diocesan Council, nor to want of interest in the work, in the country Parishes, but simply from lack of material with which to organize a Branch. For the same reason several of the City Churches to whom no opening has presented itself as yet have appointed Branch Secretaries, who are ready to take up the work whenever opportunity offers.

At the beginning of the year, our first Annual Service was held in the Cathedral, and was well attended by Associates and Members. The Bishop, who has taken a warm and active interest in the work of the Society, preached an excellent sermon full of helpful and practical suggestions. After the service the President invited all present to adjourn to the Synod Hall, where, through her kindness they were regaled with refreshments. Many of the Clergy were present, and addresses were delivered by the Bishop, Rev. J. G. Norton, and Rev. R. Lindsay. Some of the Members contributed songs and choruses, and all agreed that they had spent a pleasant and profitable evening.

Last winter the idea was suggested of renting a room where G. F. S. girls, who were temporarily out of place, could find a home at a much cheaper rate than would otherwise be possible, and where the surroundings would be better than in the ordinary class of boarding house, to which alone their means would enable them to resort. By the kind permission of Miss Moffat and the ladies of the W. F. I. S. Committee, a suitable room was obtained at a very moderate rent in their building ; and through the exertions of one or two Associates it has been decorated and made to look quite home like. The Members of the different Branches seem to appreciate what has been done for them, and willingly contribute their mite towards the payment of the rent.

Between twenty and thirty girls from England and Ireland have been commended to us during the past summer. Of these a good many have merely passed through the city on their route westward, but were visited while here, and commended to the Branches of the G. F. S. where they intended to settle. Those who remained in Montreal have been sought out, and wherever possible attached to a Branch.

Before closing our Report, it is due to the Branch Secretaries to acknowledge how much the success of the work under God, has been owing to their energy and faithfulness, seconded by their respective Associates.

The Reports from the Parochial Branches are appended :

REPORT OF THE CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL BRANCH OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY FOR 1886-87.

There are now on the books the names of 29 Members, and there are five new Members who have attended over a month regularly waiting to be enrolled.

During the winter the attendance ranged from 10 to 18 Members. The falling off being due to two causes, the inclemency of the weather, and an attack of measles at the Ladies' Benevolent Home, from which 12 members attend regularly.

Of those members who have attended the fortnightly meetings, a most favourable report can be given, their interest is assured ; five of them have been confirmed since joining the Cathedral Branch ; many of them have made donations during the past winter to the Algoma Mission box, and some of them subscribe 10 cents per month to the room (taken in conjunction with St. George's, Trinity, and St. John's,) at the Emigration Home on Mansfield street.

Besides Members there are 14 Working Associates, who attend most of the meetings, and 12 Honorary Associates, some of whom attend the meetings, and are kind in sending requisites whenever called upon.

ST. THOMAS'S CHURCH.

Mrs. Lindsay writes that work was continued during the winter with increased interest. One Member married and continued as Frindly Helper." All had been confirmed, and attend the Holy Communion. The Members are engaged in working to support a little Indian girl named Fanny Jacobs.

ST. MATTHIAS'S CHURCH.

Mrs. Everett says that owing to distances no evening meetings were held, but all the Members attend Mrs. Everett's Bible Class. Two Members were confirmed during the year.

ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST.

Owing to the fact that Miss Geddes, the late Secretary for the Parish being called away by other duties, Mrs. French will continue the work for the ensuing year.

TRINITY CHURCH.

There is at present no work in connection with G. F. S. in this Parish, lacking in material. Mrs. Bone remains an unattached Associate, ready to take up the work when occasion offers.

ST. LAMBERT'S CHURCH.

There is little to report in connection with G. F. S. in this Parish at present. There are three Associates and one Member, but with prospect of increase in numbers, as there are several probationers.

ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH.

Mrs. Skelton, says:—The fortnightly meeting of the St. George's Branch of the G. F. S. were resumed on October 12th, and continued through the winter without intermission, with an average attendance of about 15 members.

The number of members now on the books is twenty-four (24), and three (3) probationers. The number of Honorary Associates has increased from two (2) to nineteen (19), and two married Members have become Friendly Helpers. Ten Members have been lost through marriage or removal, and ten have been struck off from the roll, as they have not paid their subscription. In order to avoid enrolling Members before they are sure that they wish to join, and also to ensure suitability for membership, a probation of three months has been adopted, at the end of which the new Members are admitted by the Dean, with short service, in which they undertake to keep the rules of the Society, and to use its prayers.

Two large bundles of clothing have been contributed from the Society to the Young Ladies' Missionary Boxes for Algoma, many of the articles being the gifts of Members both in work and material. Many Members brought in, at the opening of meetings, work that they had done in the summer for this purpose. A donation of clothing made at the Industrial Rooms, from Mrs. A. F. Gault, is gratefully acknowledged.

Song-books have been bought, and are found very serviceable.

Some "rounds" have been learnt, and very nicely sung.

The Members have been interested in securing a room to which any of them out of employment could go at any time for a few days. Such a room having been rented from the Women's Protective Immigration Home, 131 Mansfield street, by the different Branches of the City, jointly. Some of the Members have contributed regularly towards the rent, and one or two things have been made specially for the room. One Member, obliged to go to the States on special business, was assisted by the Society, and very kindly received and looked after by the ladies of the Branches to which she was commended and the friendliness thus shown has been one of the most encouraging things met with during our winter's work.

It is very largely due to the subscriptions from the Honorary Associates, that we have been able to buy material for work, song books, and presents for Members on their marriage, to pay our proportion of rent for the room at the Home, and to give the above mentioned assistance; and we would wish to thank them very warmly for their help. Since the room has been secured at the Home in Mansfield street, the G. F. S. Registry has been removed there also, and is now kept by the resident Secretary of the Home. One Member was confirmed at Easter.

Since writing the above report, I have to add that I have 29 Members on my books, and 11 on probation. Average attendance 23. A box of useful articles made by the Members, was sent to Algoma on the 23rd of December. Much interest is taken in our meetings.

SECRETARY'S REPORT OF THE WATERLOO BRANCH.

Meetings have been held regularly during the past year, once a fortnight, with the exception of two months, during the summer. A Bazaar was held on June 28th, the receipts at which were \$67.20. Previous to that date the work had been chiefly the making of fancy articles for the Bazaar. On September 23th, when the Meetings were resumed, it was decided for the future that the energies of the workers should be chiefly directed towards clothing the children in the Girls' Indian Home at Shingwauk. In pursuance of this arrangement, a number of useful articles of clothing and bedding are now being made, and one quilt and \$2 in money have already

been sent. A Chandelier was purchased for the Chancel of the Church; \$10 was given towards the S. S. Library, and \$10 was devoted to completing the work on the basement of the Church. A very pretty and comfortable room has been fitted up in which the G. F. S. Meetings are held.

DIOCESE OF ONTARIO.

We are sorry to report that the Branch at Cornwall, in this Diocese, has ceased to exist, and that no new Branches have been formed.

KINGSTON.—This Branch continues to prosper, and though the membership is somewhat reduced, the girls who attend are very regular, and take much interest in the Society. Four members have married during the year.

The Branch has sustained a great loss in the death of its valued President Mrs. Valliers, who took a warm interest in the work from its beginning. Her place is still unfilled.

Twenty-eight Meetings have been held during the year. Thirteen Members are now formally admitted with an appropriate service after a probation of three months.

A Missionary Meeting is held once a month in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary, when suitable readings are selected, and a collection given to some object chosen.

The Branch Anniversary was observed by a Celebration of the Holy Communion on the Sunday before the 2nd February, and by a social gathering on February 12th. This was held in the room where the girls have their fortnightly Meetings. Music, readings, and refreshments were provided by friends of the Society, and a very enjoyable evening was spent. The Branch numbers 18 Honorary, and 17 Working Associates, and 40 Members.

BROCKVILLE.—On account of domestic affliction in the family of the Secretary, no official report has been received from this Branch. The President, however, writes that the interest in the Society has not been well sustained, and that many of the Members have been drawn away by the Salvation Army. We have heard this complaint from other quarters, and cannot help thinking that where such is the case the energy and the zeal of the Working Associates must be at fault. It is hoped that the work in this Branch may be resumed

with fresh vigour after the summer; and already the girls are beginning to tire of the Army and its excitements, and perhaps also of the very real self-sacrifice which it demands of its adherents.

DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

The Cooksville Branch continues the only one in this Diocese, but, as usual, a favourable report has been received from it. The Chief Associate of the Branch, however, complains of the difficulty of maintaining a sense of union with the general body of the Society when working thus in an isolated position. In consequence of the absence of the Rector and his wife last July, the usual Anniversary Service and Festival of the Branch were not held.

A very successful sale of work and entertainment, however, took place in February of this year, a full account of which appeared in the "Friendly Messenger" for March. It is the custom of this Branch for the Members themselves to choose the object for which they wish to work. This year they have decided to give the result of their efforts to the Sustentation Fund of the Parish. The President of the Branch, Mrs. Judge, has removed from Cooksville, and her place has not yet been filled.

DIOCESE OF HURON.

LONDON.—We are very sorry only to receive one report from this Branch. The Diocesan organization seems to have collapsed, and the Secretary of the only working Branch, that of St. Paul's Church, does not give an encouraging report. She says the interest in the Society is dying out owing to the difficulty in obtaining suitable Working Associates. The same cry comes to us from other Branches, although there is the same need as ever for earnest work among girls.

CENTRAL RULES.

I. Associates to be communicants of the Church of England (no such restriction being made as to Members); and the organization of the Society to follow as much as possible that of the Church, being Diocesan and Parochial.

II. Associates (Working and Honorary) and members to contribute annually to the funds—the former *not less* than 60 cents a year, the latter *not less* than 24 cents a year.

III. No girl who has not borne a virtuous character to be admitted as a Member, such character being lost, the Member to forfeit her Card.

General Business Regulations.

I. Every Branch to organize its own work, manage its own funds and make its own rules subject to the Central Rules and Regulations of the Society.

II. Where there is a Diocesan organization, Branch Secretaries to obtain Cards, Members' Guides, and other printed matter from their Diocesan Secretary. Where there is no Diocesan organization Branch Secretaries obtain Cards and Guides from the General Secretary, Mrs. Kenrick, 179 John street, Toronto.

III. Where no Branch is established, Associates obtain their Cards and Members' Cards and Guides from the General Secretary, forwarding subscriptions direct to her.

IV. Members' subscriptions to a Branch should be at the rate of 24 cents a year. Where there is no Diocesan organization, half the Members' fees and one quarter of the Honorary Associates' fees go to the Central Fund for printing expenses.

Where there is a Diocesan organization, half the Members' fees and one quarter of the Honorary Associates' fees go into the Diocesan Treasury, and the Diocesan Secretary pays to the Central Fund, in lieu thereof, \$2 annually for every Branch in the Diocese, towards the printing expenses of the General Society.

V. Working Associates' subscriptions are at the rate of not less than 60 cents a year. Honorary Associates, not less than \$1.00 a year.* Working Associates subscriptions belong to their Branches.

VI. Members' Cards and Guides to be furnished to Diocesan and Branch Secretaries on application to the General Secretary, at the rate of 25 cents a dozen for Guides with Cards. Associates' Cards supplied gratis. Secretaries sending for Cards will please state whether for Working or Honorary Associates.

NOTE.—The Diocesan President countersigns all Associates' Cards issued in her Diocese.

VII. Where there is no Diocesan organization of the Girl's Friendly Society, Associates wishing to organize Branches in their own neighbourhood are asked to communicate with Mrs. Wood, President of the Toronto Diocesan Council (acting at present as Central Council), and

*It is hoped that Associates will consider this *minimum* not the *necessary limit* of their subscriptions. The more funds are placed at the Society's disposal the more work will be accomplished.

When Diocesan Councils are organized, the following notices.

N.B.—All correspondents are requested to indicate their communications.

Rules for

I. Associates to be very careful in the selection of young women whom they admit to membership, in most cases a short delay for proof of character.

II. Associates, on Admitting a new Member, to send a Card, duly filled out, and a Guide-book.

III. When a Member leaves a Branch, she should, if possible, transfer her Card to the Branch to which she goes, to whom she should forward her subscription. If a Member goes to a place where there is no Branch, her subscription must be sent twice a year to the Branch to which she shall continue to keep up her subscription.

NOTE.—It would be well for Branch Secretaries to retain a certain responsibility for the conduct of the Branch.

IV. When a Member leaves a Branch, her Card or Guide-book should be returned to the Branch (or Diocesan) Secretary.

V. Associates, or Honorary Associates, wishing to withdraw from the Society, to do so through the (Diocesan) Secretary.

VI. Unattached Associates are requested to forward their new address to the General Secretary.

VII. When a Branch is formed, the Branch Secretary should call at a Branch Meeting.

Rules

I. No girl who has not borne a virtuous character to be admitted as a Member of the G. F. S.

II. Girls and young women to be admitted to membership from the age of 14 years and upwards, on the recommendation of the Branch Secretary.

NOTE.—Age to be determined by the Branch Secretary.

III. Members to pay not less than 60 cents a year, if they refuse to pay the full amount, they are not to be considered as Members.

NOTE.—Members belonging to Branches should pay their subscriptions to their Branch Secretaries.

When Diocesan Councils are organized, they will please forward to their Secretaries the following notices.

N.B.—All correspondents are requested to write "G. F. S." outside their communications.

Rules for Associates.

I. Associates to be *very careful* as to the character of the girls and young women whom they admit or recommend as Members. In most cases a short delay for probation is advised.

II. Associates, on Admitting a Member, to give her a Member's Card, duly filled out, and a Guide-book.

III. When a Member leaves town to live elsewhere, Associates should, if possible, transfer her at once to an Associate of the place to which she goes, to whom she shall in future pay her subscriptions. If a Member goes to a place where there is no Associate, her subscription must be sent twice a year to the Associate who admits her, who shall continue to keep up communication with her.

NOTE.—It would be well for the Associate or Branch that first admits a girl to membership, always to know where she is, and to retain a certain responsibility about her till she ceases to be a Member.

IV. When a Member leaves the Society, from whatever cause, her Card or Guide-book should be returned by her Associate to the Branch (or Diocesan) Secretary.

V. Associates, or Honorary Associates wishing, for any reason, to withdraw from the Society, to return their Cards to the Branch (or Diocesan) Secretary.

VI. Unattached Associates changing their residence are requested to forward their new address to the Diocesan Secretary.

VII. When a Branch is formed, every new Associate to be elected at a Branch Meeting.

Rules for Members.

I. No girl who has not borne a virtuous character can be admitted as a Member of the G. F. S.

II. Girls and young women may join the Society, from the age of — and upwards, on the recommendation of an Associate.

NOTE.—Age to be determined by each Local Society.

III. Members to pay *not less* than six cents a quarter to the Society, if they refuse to pay their subscription, they lose their Card.

NOTE.—Members belonging to a Branch Association pay 6 cents a

quarter; half of this sum being retained for the Branch Fund, half sent to the Central or Diocesan Fund.

IV. Members to make their payments quarterly in advance to Associate in the place where they may be living; the receipt for the Guide-book to be signed by her. If not able to do this, should send their payments twice a year to their Associate, with Guide-book, which will go in a letter and be returned receipted.

V. Members must always let their Associates know at once if they change their address, and must be careful always to keep the Society's Card and Guide-book in their own possession.

VI. Members cease to belong to the Society on their marriage, unless they continue to be connected with it as Friendly Helpers.

VII. Members leaving the Society, from whatever cause, to return their Card and Guide-book to their Associate.

A few Words about Branch Secretaries.

First, the Secretary's own heart must be in the work; unless she has confidence in her cause, it is quite impossible to inspire others with confidence.

The Secretary must be business-like. It may seem a small thing, but it is not, for there must be method and arrangement in the work, as no Branch can prosper where the Secretary is unbusiness-like. The Secretary should be very careful about her accounts to enter in her list *at once* every fresh Member and Associate; to be punctual in sending the percentage on Members and Honorary Associates' subscriptions, and the Report Forms annually to the General or Diocesan Secretary, and to be very accurate in keeping her books.

A few rules may be added:

I. Branch Secretaries to be elected for one year, by the Associates of the Branch and to be eligible for re-election.

II. Branch Secretaries to give notice to the General or Diocesan Secretary on giving up office.

III.—Branch Secretaries to send a list of all the Working Associates of the Branch, with their address in full, to the General or Diocesan Secretary, and the number (only) of the Honorary Associates, BEFORE MAY 1ST.

N. B.—It is important for Branch Secretaries to promptly fill out the Report Forms and send them in time, also to write the Associates' names and addresses in a legible hand.

Communication with England

Members passing from one country to another established, may, if they so desire, work as a Working Associate whose local office is in the country to which they have enrolled in the country to which they have moved. Any country may transmit their names to another country, to the Referee. In writing to the referee, Working Associates should give the Member's new address, and should receive an answer from the referee who transmits her communications to the new country.
