TELLS HER STORY

A Distressing Scene in the Police Court This Morning --- Clark Denies All Knowledge of the Affair --- The **Evidence Submitted.**

A large and curious crowd gathered at the police court this morning to hear the evidence in the case against Wm. E. Clark, charged with committing rape on little Ethel Train, on the Millidgeville road on Saturday last. They were doomed to disappointment, however, for after the ordinary cases had been disposed of his honor ordered the court to be cleared.

Shortly before eleven o'clook the victim, Ethel Train, arrived, accompanied by her father and little May Short.

Ethel seemed weak and very nervous, and cried through nearly the whole session of the court. Both children were attired in white dresses and pretty straw hats.

Clark set alone on the puisoners' bench, and looked occasionally around the court room, but for the most part looked straight ahead of him. He had no questions to ask the witnesses and when he said he knew mothing about it he was directed by his herror to sit down.

The wheat harvest has started around High Bluff on Pontage Plains, and they will unquestionably be heavy there. It would appear that nothing short of some unforceseen and improbable calamity could prevent realization of the farmer's hopes for a most bountiful crop.
