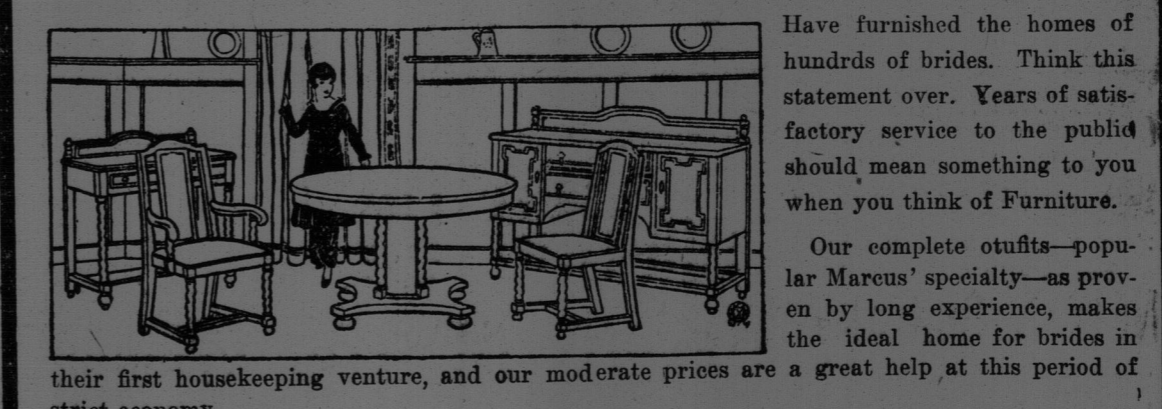
GOOD THINGS COMING TO THEATRES OF ST. JOHN

ADMIRE CANADIANS FOR WHAT THEY'VE DONE

Bishop Kinsolving, of Texas, in City Today Speaks of U.S. and War "We are proud of the Canadians and of the fact that we share the same continent with them. It is a splendid thing that you men are doing, in leaving their homes and crossing the seas to fight for the principles in which they believe," said Bishop G. H. Kinsolving of Austin, Texas, who arrived in the city today. "Although I am a Democrat, I am quite willing to express my belief that our own country has made a lot of our foreign relations, in both Mexico and Europe. We have allowed our citizens to be slaughtered and our property to be destroyed with nothing more than a protest. I recognize the right of every man to his own views and I sympathize with the president in his desire to avoid plunging our country into war, but there is a point beyond which war cannot be averted, if the national honor is to be saved, and that point has passed. "Canada and the other overseas Dominions could do as we have done and have found excuse to keep out of the war, but they did not do so. Their Anglo-Saxon blood would not permit such course and the part they have played in this war will be their everlasting credit. I love peace as much as any man, but I believe in fighting for what we believe to be right when there is no other way left. And I happen to know something about fighting, being as I am a clergyman. As a boy of fifteen I fought through the Civil War, on the Southern side of course, with the rest of my folks from Virginia. We believed we were in the right and, although we were licked, we did not have any one in doubt about our attitude. Bishop Kinsolving has been a frequent visitor to St. John during almost the last thirty years, as he has spent many summers near Digby at the summer home of his brother-in-law, the late Bishop Lagard of Southern Ohio, whose daughter accompanies the bishop on this trip. His son, the rector of an Anglican church in Summit, N. J., and the latter's wife are expected to join them this evening. It is a family of clergyman, and the other missionary bishop of southern Brazil. A younger brother died while still a theological student. His father and maternal grandfather also were clergymen.

THE NEW PATRIOTISM

Rev. Dr. W. H. Thomas, speaking recently in the First Methodist Episcopal church in Norwalk, Ct., made a deeply impressive address, as he is so capable of doing, on "The New Patriotism." Dr. Thomas thrilled the audience by exhibiting a battle-scarred flag and saying, "This flag is from the battlefield of Gettysburg. I got it there myself. I spread it here, not merely because it is darkened by the powder smoke of that decisive conflict, but because it is stained with the blood of the patriot who held it up and because it is filled with bullet holes made by those who killed him in the name of their own patriotism. What is the lesson of that flag to us? Patriotism, like everything else, has more than one side to it. It has a good side and a bad side. The good side history has made glorious. The sacrifices of the present will make us honor men. We honor our young men who now respond to the call of patriotism. But there is as much, and I think more, heroism in common life now and here. In our homes and shops are as great heroisms as in the trenches."

ROUMANIANS WANT TO JOIN THE ALLIES

London, July 20.—(N. Y. Times cable)—The Daily Telegraph prints the news in Bucharest under Monday's date: This morning there was a great public gathering under the auspices of the Unionist Federation. Filippesco and Take Ionesco both spoke. The former declared the victory of the allies was sure, and that Roumania would enter into the war. He went on to accuse Premier Bratianu of having failed both ways, and said he had decided even Germany into believing that Roumania would march with the Central Powers. In the presence of him (Filippesco) and Ionesco, Bratianu had proposed to enter the war with Italy. He had made the situation difficult even with the king by the promise he gave to the Central powers. Ionesco declared every soldier given to a greater Roumania—the tree of the royal dynasty could not flourish in the little Roumania. It must strike its roots deep and wide if the future occupants of the throne were to be safeguarded. The Roumanian was now neither for the king nor the people. "The speeches were wildly applauded, and the afternoon there was an enthusiastic demonstration in the streets, the people crying "We want war." Sir Edward Carson strongly denounced the proposed course, and took exception to the view of the government that it was inadvisable to hold elections during the war. He stoutly opposed the idea that a parliament elected to abolish the House of Lords and to do away with armaments was a proper one to represent the country when peace is eventually declared. He characterized the government motion as a farce.

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Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of War Trade, declared in the House of Commons that he did not think there was any reason to suppose the censorship now exercised regarding press messages to the United States was at all likely to interfere with the continuation of the friendly relations of the two countries. He made this statement in reply to a question by Arthur Lynch, member for West Canada, who asked: "If, in view of establishing between this country and the United States complete confidence and cordial relations, he would advise the abolition or the modification of the present censorship of news?"

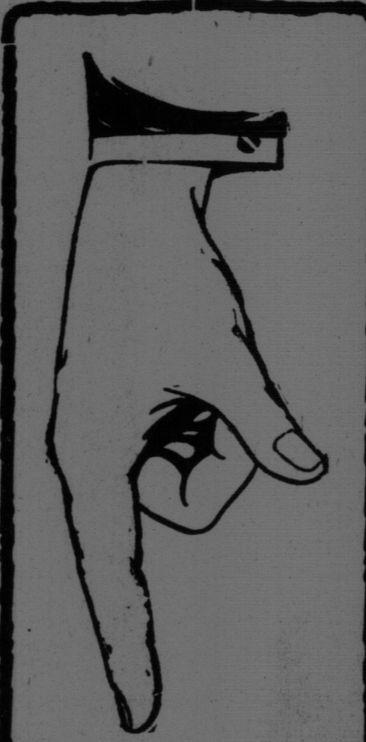

MANY MAKING MISTAKES IN "SEEING SHARKS." (Boston Globe.) Many dogfish, which have floated ashore have been mistaken for baby sharks. They were clubbed or killed by fishermen who caught them in their trawls and killed them. A dogfish has a fin on its back and is gray above and white underneath, but it is not a shark. So many of them are found in these waters that the government has been asked to put a bounty on them. Besides, porpoises are not at all unusual hereabouts in the summer. As they go along they raise themselves out of the water and dip into it in graceful curves, describing an arc. Some have mistaken porpoises for big sharks. Some of the shore residents who claim to have a knowledge of fish say that a big shark dislikes a sandy shore beach. They say it would have to turn on its side to bite, and when its side fin scraped the bottom it would turn seaward again. So much has been read about sharks recently that every commotion in the water is attributed to them by nervous people. At Penberton some bathers scampered ashore when the untraveled end of a rope holding the raft was tossed up and down by the waters. An investigation by a bathier dispelled that shark scare. That there are sharks about the coast is not disputed, but bathers should remember that not all fish swimming in these waters are "man-eaters."

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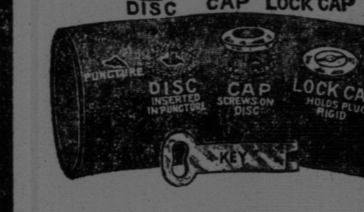
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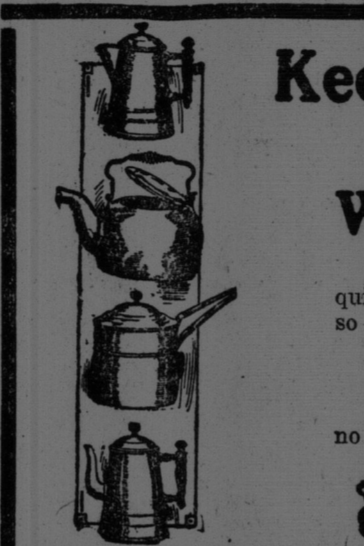

### Annual Reports of Home For Incurables

### WORK OF YEAR REVIEWED

#### Receipts From Paying Patients Greater Than in Previous Year But Donations Not So Large—How Capital Fund Stands

The reports presented at the annual meeting of the subscribers to the St. John Home for Incurables, which was held in the home this afternoon, are as follows:

#### Board of Management.

St. John, N. B., July 1, 1916. To the Subscribers of the Home for Incurables:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—The annual report of the Board of Management of the Home for Incurables is hereby presented.

During the year just ended your board, to the best of its ability, has carried on the work, and desires to record their gratitude for the continued prosperity and usefulness of the home. The building is now in a very good condition, and, we trust, for some time to come will not need any very heavy expenditure for repairs.

At the beginning of the year there were thirty patients in the home, sixteen males and fourteen females. Eleven applications were considered, four males and seven females. Nine were accepted, four males and five females. Two females were refused. Ten patients died during the year, six males and four females, and three patients were removed, two males and one female, leaving in the home twenty-six patients, twelve males and fourteen females. Twelve regular meetings of the board were held during the year.

The financial position of the home will be fully shown by the report of the treasurer.

We desire to return our heartfelt thanks to our generous friends who during the year have aided us with money, donations of food, and articles and with sympathy. We would again remind our friends that, owing to the increased cost of food, fuel, and other necessities, a continuance of their practical charity will be most acceptable.

To the medical staff we desire to tender our heartfelt thanks for their valuable services, always cheerfully given.

The Woman's Aid Committee, during the past year, has rendered most valuable services, for which we desire to express our gratitude. The manner in which they have carried on their work, and that it is a token of their active work, and through them we desire to acknowledge our indebtedness to the visiting clergymen of the various denominations.

There is one thing which we desire to draw your attention to, and that is the difficulty of getting on the board ladies who during the summer months are able to give sufficient time to the work of the home.

#### Treasurer's Report.

St. John, N. B., July 20.

To the Subscribers of the St. John Home for Incurables:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—The sum of \$40,700—a life membership fee of \$24 from H. B. Robinson and \$2470 request of Elijah Carr—were the only additions to our capital during the previous year, a striking contrast with the previous year, when our capital was increased by requests and donations totalling \$10,000. The capital funds of the home now are \$112,806.88. Other moneys in the treasurer's hands are \$7,269.28, making the total holdings on all accounts \$120,076.21.

The expenditures of the year were \$8,171.84, and the balance on hand is \$2,985.75, an increase of \$1,781.10 over the amount on hand at the time of the last annual meeting. The increase is due to the fact that our receipts are \$1,064.86 greater and our expenses \$696.24 less. Expenditures of one kind and another for repairs and improvements added \$1,229.50 to the general maintenance account of a year ago, while there were no heavy expenditures of that kind during the last year.

For wages and maintenance the expenditures of the year were slightly in excess of the year ending July, 1915, and the balance on hand is more abundant than real, for our coal bill will take upwards of a thousand dollars.

An increase of \$895.84 in the income of paying patients is most gratifying and offsets the decrease in donations from \$688.09 to \$165.

Many citizens might help the good work of the home with an occasional contribution or by becoming an annual member. Were it not for the paying patients, a very uncertain revenue, the home would be compelled to appeal to the public for aid to carry on the work. Many and deserving are the patriotic appeals the fact that the home must be maintained should not be overlooked by those who in the past have stood its friends, and by those who know the good it aims to do.

Business In Canada July Commercial Letter of The Canadian Bank of Commerce

The July commercial letter of the Canadian Bank of Commerce says orders for manufactured goods are larger than last year, and scarcity of raw material has in some lines forced manufacturers to ask customers to reduce their orders. It is estimated the western grain crop is 90 per cent of that of 1915. Crop conditions all over the country are good, except that the fruit yield may be below normal. Continuing the circular says: 'What Canada Has Done for Her Allies. In addition to having already sent more than a quarter of a million men to the front, with another hundred thousand now in training, Canada has rendered distinguished service to the Empire by exporting large quantities of material essential for the war. Her exports to the United Kingdom for the fiscal year ending March last amounted to \$462,081,241, as compared with \$222,322,706 for the year ending March, 1914, and to all the countries of the Empire were \$464,554,197 as compared with \$246,061,994. Her services to the allies in this regard increased proportionately greater than to the United Kingdom, exports to France being ten times greater than before the war, and to Italy fifteen times greater. Russia is less dependent upon us for food supplies, but our exports of manufactured products to that country have increased fivefold within two years. The value of our exports to countries within the Empire, to our allies and to other countries, is as follows:—'

Industrial Activity. The activity in the manufacture of ammunition, which has been reported for some months, is fully maintained in volume by orders now being placed. The result is shown in the increase of exports under the head of iron and steel manufactures. In the fiscal year ending 31st March last these exports aggregated \$80,000,000, as compared with \$19,745,981 in 1914. Of last year's product the United Kingdom took 87 per cent, the United States 10 per cent, and all other countries 2 per cent. In the textile industries generally, wherever there is a revival of trade, expansion is taking place in the form of additional buildings and plant and in the case of manufacturers unable to obtain labor for existing factories there is a disposition to erect mills in districts where operators can be obtained. The immediate future promises to afford the textile and related industries, all the business that can be handled at a satisfactory margin of profit. The additions and improvements now being made to the plants of many manufacturers in the steel and textile industries are designed to serve not only immediate demands but also those of the

ASSESSMENTS IN THE COUNTY Letter From Taylor & Sweeney Brings Some Matters to Public Attention

St. John, N. B., July 20, 1916. To the Editor of the Times: Sir—In the course of our appeal before the Appeals Committee of the county council, at their meeting on Monday last, in the matter of the assessment on the sub-division of Fairville Centre, conditions were brought to light that we believe, should be brought to the public notice. When certain admissions were made by the assessors who were present at the meeting on Monday last, we were surprised to find that the assessors had no knowledge of the extent of either the Davidson farm, Hatheway property, and Wood property, or in fact any other property; the assessment books simply referring to them as a piece of land which would seem no one could say, except as we have stated by guess work or otherwise. Furthermore, there was no answer to the question as to why another man should be assessed but \$2,500 on a property for which he paid about \$8,000 to our certain knowledge. It would seem to us to put it mildly that some one has a pull, but of one thing there would seem no uncertainty that we have not. It must be borne in mind that we are not asking that the assessment remain at \$7,000, but have expressed the willingness to be assessed at \$16,000. The strongest argument and the only one made by the assessors to the appeals committee against our appeal was that it would result in numerous other appeals, and when Coun. O'Brien, who is one of the assessors was asked why not do away with the appeals committee, his answer had about as much reason as his appeal when he said "might just as well." We regret only that Warden McLellan and Coun. Wigmore both of whom supported strongly our appeal and expressed surprise at the information brought forth, did not remain at the meeting until the vote was taken, as the vote was a close one of but four to three.

In conclusion, we might say that we propose carrying our case further in this matter, as we are unable to believe that the decision of the appeals committee will stand. The vote was the result of a personal canvass by a councillor among the members, and we rather fear that county politics had much to do with the result. Thanking you for your valuable space, we trust only that what we have said may result in some being made to place assessment matters in St. John county under a better basis. ## Two Good Men In Sunbury

Opposition Convention Nominates Robert B. Smith and D. W. Mersereau

Burton, N. B., July 19.—Sunbury county opposition electors would not be jailed today. They held a convention at Burton, the shiretown of the county, in their historic court house, and in spite of his doctor's orders, and the natural reluctance of an obedient patient to disobey the instructions of his physician, they selected Robert B. Smith, of Oromocto, as one of the opposition candidates to contest the county when the general elections are announced. In doing so they paid a great compliment to Mr. Smith and one that he and his friends must recognize and be proud of. He has been in ill health for some time, but at a conference of opposition county leaders at Oromocto two or three weeks ago, he consented to lead the opposition ticket, in the county, if his health permitted. Today the electors are willing to take him at his word and they showed it by nominating him. If, as they said, "this government holds on to the last gasp," Mr. Smith may be as healthy as any of them by that time.

So the ticket nominated today was Robert B. Smith of Oromocto, and Councillor David W. Mersereau, of Fredrickton Junction. Both of these gentlemen are well known in the county, where Mr. Smith has large business interests, and Mr. Mersereau, through his railway and other connections, a wide and popular acquaintance.

The convention was a very representative one and included representation from every parish in the county with the exception of Northfield. The delegation from that Parish intended to make the long journey by driving over the county highways, but if the roads between the shiretown and Northfield compare in any degree with those in other parts of the county the reason for their non-arrival is fully explained. As it was, H. H. Smith was elected from Blisville, Captain Ferris, Robert McSheffrey and Trimble McSheffrey from Lincoln; David Wood, Wm. Jones, Moses Smith and Charles Gilmour from Burton; Percy Duplisse, Luke M. Gallagher, John Sanderson from Gladstone; David W. Beley and Geo. W. Foster from Maugeville, and J. R. Randall and C. S. Burpee from Sheffield. These delegates formed a nominating committee of the convention, and after considerable deliberation their chairman, H. H. Smith reported to the convention that Robert B. Smith and David W. Mersereau had been selected. The convener, Milton A. Smith, put the question of adoption to the convention at large and the vote was unanimous. In addition to the speech of acceptance by Mr. Mersereau, W. E. Foster, of St. John, chairman of the leadership committee, and provincial organizer E. S. Carter, delivered addresses that were listened to with great attention and applause.

The principal part of Mr. Foster's speech was devoted to an explanation of the crown land policy of the opposi-

tion, and commenting upon the Standard's statement that he had too much to say, said that it could be easily understood why the Standard preferred that opposition men should remain mute. Mr. Mersereau got a great reception from the convention and his speech was warmly applauded.

Attorney-General Baxter supplements the statement with a further statement regarding the work to be done in St. John county, which, he says, will include a permanent highway from the One Mile House to Brookville, extensive work on the Upper Loch Lomond road, repairs to the Spruce Lake road and work on the road between Musquash and Lepreau.

## MAKE AUGUST 4 A BIG DAY FOR PATRIOTIC FUND

That Friday, Aug 4, the second anniversary of the declaration of war by Great Britain, be made a day for special religious and intercessory services and that the several branches also utilize the day as an occasion to stimulate increased interest in contributions to the Patriotic Fund was the substance of two resolutions passed at a meeting of the executive committee of the provincial branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, held yesterday in the board of trade rooms. The meeting was attended by representatives from the various local branches in the province. Among those in attendance were His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Wood, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Senator Thorne, Dr. A. P. Barnhill, ex-Mayor J. H. Frink, Miles E. Agar, J. Carr Allen, Premier Clarke, Hon. E. J. Tweedie, E. A. Schofield, J. T. Hawke, C. B. Allan, secretary-treasurer of the St. John branch, and Professor DesBarres, provincial organizer.

## NATIONAL LIBERAL ADVISORY COUNCIL

Ottawa, July 19.—Owing to the importance of the subjects under consideration by the National Liberal Advisory Council the agenda was not finished today as expected and the council will meet again tomorrow. The resolutions agreed upon by the council acting upon the reports of the various committees will then be finally reviewed before being made public, as embodying some of the principles of constructive legislation which Liberalism advocates. Today the subjects under discussion included agriculture, social legislation, rural credits, education, etc. Tomorrow the main subjects to be considered will be railway, sea and taxation problems, national finances and land settlement conditions following the conclusion of the war. The committee on social reform and health legislation which reported through J. E. Atkinson, of Toronto, recommended immediate legislative action for old age pensions and mother's pensions and that national systems of health insurance and unemployment insurance should be established as soon as possible after a thorough investigation so as to effect as wide an insurance as possible against the suffering poverty and economic loss which is consequent upon sickness and unemployment. The committee of rural credits which reported through John Bain, of Ottawa, strongly urged the adoption of a comprehensive system of rural credits to assist agricultural development. Hon. Edward Brown, of Manitoba, and Hon. J. C. Calder, of Saskatchewan, gave some illuminative data showing the benefits of such a system and the council endorsed the committee's recommendations. The establishment of a federal bankruptcy law and more adequate control of limited liability companies was recommended by a committee under the chairmanship of S. W. Jacobs, K. C., of Montreal. Hon. Sydney Fisher presented the report on agricultural questions and several legislative proposals were adopted by the council looking to the encouragement of land settlement and more equitable conditions for the agriculturalist. This evening the members of the council were entertained at dinner by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

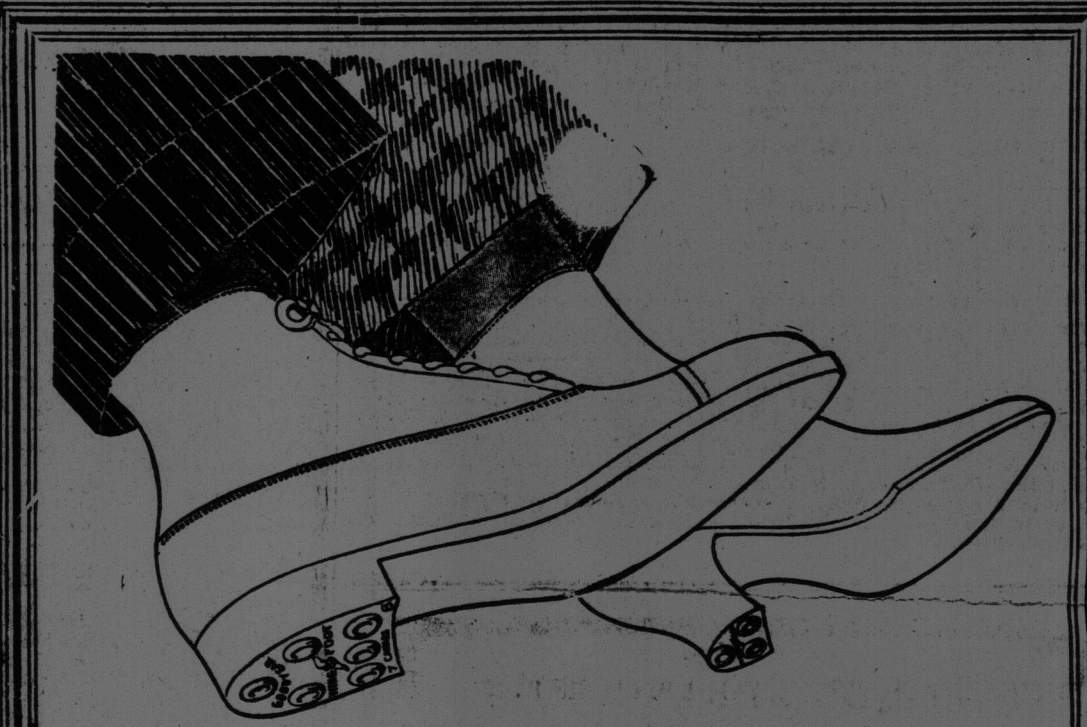

In putting the motion, Chairman Emerson said: "It doesn't follow that the board is to be more extravagant, but it is to expend only where absolutely necessary." Following a general suggestion, Dr. Bridges and Dr. Manning were added to the committee to appear before the government. As a closing bit of business, the board through its chairman, extended a welcome and best wishes to Mrs. Dever on her re-appointment to the board, and Chairman Emerson was in turn, congratulated on his re-appointment.

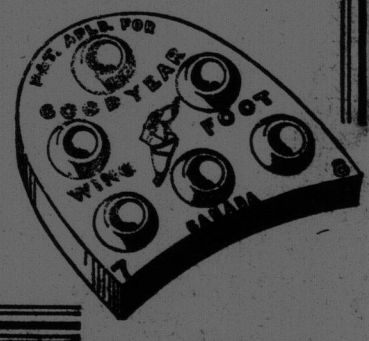

**GERMANS LOSE GROUND THEY WON;  
STRENGTH IN WEST DIMINISHING**

London, July 19.—When General Haig's afternoon report was despatched from headquarters in France, the violent fighting which had developed from the German counter attack and had been going on all night long and given the Germans a footing in Delville Wood and Longueval, was still in progress. The German attacks on the Waterlot Farm and other points were repulsed.

In a brief despatch tonight, General Haig conds the announcement that most of the ground thus lost has been regained in both places and that the British fire had dispersed the Germans massing for a further attack on Waterlot Farm. These despatches seem to confirm the opinions constantly expressed by the correspondents at the front of the dwindling strength of the German counter attacks.

The operations on the French front are still impeded by rain, and comparative quiet prevails.

The Russian operations are again becoming interesting. The Russian military critics dwell on what they describe as "the mechanical regularity" of the strategic and tactical blows dealt by Russia on her various fronts and the absence of any indications that the enemy forces are able effectively to parry them. The recent Russian successes have brought them much nearer Vladimir-Volynski and Kovel, and the German communications between Kovel and Lemberg are threatened by the Russian advance to Stoyanoff and Sokal, preliminary to the investment of Lemberg.

In Transylvania the Russians have secured two important eastern passes in the Carpathians, Jablonitz and Kiribaba, while they also hold command of the Delatyn-Budapest railway. Their cavalry is moving in the rear of General Planzer's forces between Kimpolung and Kutu, and apparently the invasion of Hungary has begun.

According to one report a Russian force is already one day's march into Hungary, threatening the Austrian rear in the mountains.

The Russian advance also continues successfully in Asia Minor, and it is reported from Rome that the Turks have again evacuated Kermanshah. There is no confirmation, as yet, of the interesting statement made by Professor Paul Milkoff to the Duma that Russia has reached an agreement with the Allies, in which she is promised both banks of the Dardanelles. The meetings now being held between the minister of munitions and the representatives of the various trades indicate a general acceptance of a postponement of the August holidays, as requested by the government, in order that full munitions supplies for the men at the front may continue.

**WITH THE KILTIES**

Sergt. Instructor Edward Bayers, formerly of the R. C. R., and lately carrying on instruction of overseas units in Nova Scotia, reported in Fredericton this week to start his duties as Battalion Sergeant Major of the New Brunswick Kilties.

One of the Kilties platoon sergeants is Sergeant Harold A. Seely of Hampton. He was a former member of the 8th Battalion, having been blown up by a shell and buried in a dugout while on the firing line with the unit near Mesines on July 1, 1915. For some weeks his condition was critical. Sgt. Seely was formerly a bank clerk.

Among others who have reported for duty with the Kilties is Corp. Ronald Robinson, son of Alexander Robinson, of Marysville. He has been at the Amherst Internment Camp with the guard.

There are now upwards of thirty on the roll of the 28th (C. N. B.) Kilties Battalion.

Among the N. C. O.'s of the 28th is Sergeant Howard Whitcomb of St. John. He went overseas with the 28th and was wounded in late November. He was, prior to this, promoted on the field to sergeant and returned to Canada on

March 24. His leave will expire on July 24, after which he intends to join the Kilties.

Another St. John man is Garfield G. Brown, who went over to the firing line in the machine gun section of the 28th Battalion under Major Carter. He was wounded on January 28 and is now waiting for his discharge when he, too, will become a member of the Kilties.

On Monday two volunteers were sworn in in Fredericton as members of the Kilties and yesterday one other enlisted here for Colonel Guthrie's battalion. William G. Graham, 18, of Ripley, Sunbury county, and James R. Murphy, 22, of Boston, joined the Kilties and yesterday Gerald Howard, of Waltham, Mass., formerly of Fredericton, enlisted. He is a son of C. K. Howard, representative of the Canadian government railways in Boston. He may join the Kilties Pipe band.

### Major McKinnon's Story Of King's Review of Our Troops

Describes Scene in Camp in England on Dominion Day—Lieut. Teed of St. John One of Major's Officers

(Halifax Mail.)

Major McKinnon formed the 11th Ammunition Column in Halifax and went overseas with that unit, but was almost immediately given command of the 86th Howitzer Battery in succession to Major Walter Crowe. Major McKinnon was high praise for the officers and men of the 86th.

Witley Camp, Surrey, Eng., July 20, 1917.

Last Saturday, July 14, we were part of a great pageant having the honor of being reviewed by His Majesty King George V. It was a splendid sight and one which I can never forget, to see 24,000 of Canada's finest drawn up to salute and march past their king. The review took place in an ideal spot, being a depression, surrounded by four magnificent hills. The scenery in this part of the country is very beautiful, and the bright sunny day, the glittering bayonets, the hundreds of well-groomed horses, guns and gun carriages, and the personnel of Canada's manhood, spectators, and the most important of all the presence of the king and his suite, contributed to produce a lasting impression on those who were privileged to see it. The troops were drawn up in a hollow square forming three sides, spectators on the right, in the centre of which was the Royal standard and on the left, the artillery forming the bottom of the square and the engineers and other units the top.

The king arrived about eleven o'clock, the signal for his arrival being the blast of a trumpet. When the royal pennant was observed everybody came to attention, heads were uncovered, and three cheers and a tiger were given for His Majesty. The king then rode down through the ranks of the officers who were posted in front of the troops. Accompanying him were many distinguished generals, notably Lord French, whose breast was liberally covered with decorations, mementos of the campaigns he had been through. Sergeant McDonald, late of the 24th Nova Scotia Battalion, has been attached to the staff of the New Brunswick Command. Sergeant McDonald was wounded October last in the battle of Loos and suffered from shrapnel shell wounds. He is a Springhill (N. S.) boy and has an excellent record as a soldier.

### Ontario Gov. Thinks It Has Nickel Process

It is an Electrical Process, But Premier Hearst Will Not Say Much Until the Nickel Commission Reports

Toronto, July 17.—That the Ontario government has proceeded, through the Nickel Commission, what is believed to be an economical process of refining nickel within the province, was admitted by Premier Hearst this week. While the premier would not say so, it has become known that the process is an elaborate treatment of the nickel ore and it is calculated that it is a much cheaper method than the one used by the International Nickel Company at the New Jersey plant.

The Hon. Mr. Hearst said that so many people had thought that he had discovered processes to refine nickel on a commercial basis, only to fall to realize their anticipations, that the government did not wish to say too much for the present. The process, the rights for which have been acquired by the government by the Nickel Commission, had all the appearance of solving the nickel problem in the province, and in actual tests it had met all the expectations of the experts. Until the Nickel Commission made a formal report on the process the government did not wish to discuss it.

The contention of the nickel companies has always been that they could not economically refine nickel in Ontario because they would have to carry about six or seven tons of material here to refine one ton of nickel. Under the process acquired by the government, Hydro power would be used instead of coal, etc. Another advantage of the new process is that the discharge from the refining process is not of a poisonous nature.

Premier Hearst was asked if there was any thought of compelling the nickel companies doing business in Ontario to adopt the Ontario process and refine here, but he answered that the government would await more information from the nickel commission before deciding on any steps. The premier reiterated his statement that the government was advised that no Ontario nickel was getting to the enemy.

### Manitoba Opens Her Doors for Soldiers

Offers Opportunities to British Ex-service Men For Land Settlement; An Imperial Policy

Winnipeg, July 15.—Manitoba joins hands with the other western provinces and the continent of Australia in throwing open the doors of equal opportunities and facilities for land settlement for British ex-service men.

Intimation to this effect was conveyed from Premier Norris to the Canadian Hagard, who, on behalf of the British Colonial Institute, is seeking to secure equal treatment for British ex-service men to that which each part of the Empire gives to its own soldiers when, at the close of this war, the consequent migration from the British Isles begins.

When Sir Rider was in Winnipeg he was tendered a banquet by the Canadian Club. There were about 1,600 members in attendance and heard Sir Rider deliver a stirring address, in the course of which he reiterated his view that this war is but the "first round," and that the hatred of the German nation was so intense as to make it almost inevitable that they would seek revenge on the British Empire—the one thing which had stood between them and their dream of two generations of world domination.

Sir Rider explained that his mission was to see to it that the people of the British Empire were not allowed to migrate to foreign lands, there to strengthen an alien population. He spoke of the success which had attended his efforts in Australia and New Zealand and said that today he had interviewed the Manitoba ministers and was assured that this province was prepared to share the responsibility in dealing out even-handed justice to British soldiers.

James H. Ashdown, during the meeting, was elected an honorary life member of the Canadian Club.

C. P. R. OFFICERS IN CONFERENCE Local Men Meet With Two Hundred Others GATHERING IN WINNIPEG Important Discussions on Matters of Railway Policy Engage Attention of Department Heads

The most important official conference ever held of the officers of the C. P. R. began on Monday in Winnipeg, with something like 200 officers from all over the system in attendance. Among the subjects for discussion are: Maintenance of way standards, equipment of standards in relation to patrons of the road and regulating bodies equipment standards, distribution of power and cars, freight handling, engines, efficiency tests, regulation of speed, freight and passenger trains, stores, necessary duplication of work and correspondence, relations with the public, mental tests and examination for promotion, passenger train service, time and time tables, relations between railway lines and steamers, lines, fuel, types of snow fighting equipment, discussion of sleeping and dining car service in relation to public and operation of road, freight claims, stations and staff, relations between traffic department and operating officers, telegraph services, economical handling of passenger cars, industrial sites, uniform system of reporting accidents, etc.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT; GOING TOO FAST Automobile, No Lights Burning, Crashes Into Team Outside Fairville That the Manawagonish road is being rendered dangerous to those traveling it through the recklessness of automobile drivers was again proven a little after last midnight when a large car, which showed no lights, came in the road at about a twenty-five mile an hour clip, traveling on the wrong side. When about half a mile from Fairville, the car crashed into a team and it was only through what seemed to be a miracle that some one of the three occupants were not killed. The carriage was badly damaged and the fenders of the auto were practically destroyed. The number of the car could not be ascertained as there was no tail light on the car.

Some boys got into the auto and released the break, and the car started to go back down Church street. It had acquired considerable speed when it was brought to a standstill by colliding with a telegraph pole. The back of the car was damaged, and police are about to start a campaign against meddlesome youths, especially those who are interfering with autos left standing in the street. Several cases have been brought to the notice of the public in the last few days.
