Commissioner Bullock Brings Home Word of Rhode Island's Concern

ATTENDED PORT MEET IN NEW YORK

U. S. Coast Cities Sending Scoula West to Drum Up Business

Commissioner T. H. Bullock, of the city harbor department, arrived home from New York today, where he had been attending a convention of the American Port Association. While nothing immediately pertaining to the Port of Saint John was introduced, he said he had numerous private conferences and casual conversations with officials and delegates from other ports.

U. S. MAYOR ANXIOUS The commissioner's most notable interview was with the Mayor of Providence, R. I. He enquired of the Saint John delegate what he knew about the C. N. R.'s intentions concerning the Rhode Island port. The Canadian government had for years held interests in the state and had gone so far as to acquire property rights for the extension of its lines to the coast waters as at Portland, Maine, but so far no definite move had been made to run Canadian trains into that territory.

The Mayor of Providence confessed to Commissioner Bullock that he was beginning to believe their case was a hopeless one, an opinion in which the Saint John delegate concurred. Mr. Bullock briefly outlined to the Providence mayor how strenuously the Ports of Saint John and Halifax were pressing their claims for business upon Canadian government transportation lines, both on land and sea.

THORNTON'S SUGGESTION. THORNTON'S SUGGESTION.

The Mayor of Providence said he was sensing this condition more every day and two recent interviews with Sir Henry Thornton were not only barren of promises, but the C. N. R. general manager suggested about the only way to cover up the Canadian government's obligations in land damages, etc. in the Rhode Island territory would be to put a mortgage on their holdings there and pay them off. To the people of Rhode Island this looked like the grand finale of Canadian government railways operation in that State. They were greatly disappointed.

Pioneers on the frontier of science expect that eventually it will be possible to predict the time and place of an earthquake.

A survey has been undertaken of the establish definitely any "creep" of the land.

to predict the time and place of an earthquake.

Within a reasonable number of years they hope to be able to do that for the California earthquake region.

For the most comprehensive study of such a region ever undertaken is now under way in California.

The Carnegle Institution of Washington is carrying on the study with the aid of the U. S. Coast Survey, the U. S. Geological Survey, the Bureau of Standards, the University of California, Leland Stanford University and the U. S. Navy.

Navy.

The first task, as Dr. Arthur L. Day of the Carnegie Institution points out, is to find out exactly what is happening inside the earth in the California region.

For students of the earth now agree that an earthquake is merely the releasing of strains and stresses which have been accumulated through the shifting and movement of the layers of rock.

Many geologists believe that there is an actual movement or "creep" of the whole San Francisco bay region and that the land here, covered as it is with busy cities, villages and farms, is slowly moving northward at the rate of about one foot a year.

The U. S. Geological Survey is cooperating in the study by making the structure of the rock layers in the region so that surface movements may be interpreted in the light of this knowledge.

With the aid of the new sonic depths inder, the U. S. Navy has plotted the topography of the floor of San Francisco bay so that the scientists will have this addition, specially delicate seismos graphs have been set up in California so that a record of the slightest tremore will be had.







Declaring that Canada needed a portfolio of Public Health with a minister untrammeled by the duties of any other department until he has solved the great problem of saving the 100,000 good and worthy Canadian lives that today are being sacrificed because of conditions that can be righted, and advocating an executive of Public Health for the Dominion, Dr. W. F. Roberts, former provincial minister of public health, addressed a large meeting in the Portland United church last evening.

He said that the governments had built railways and canals until the map of Canada looked like a cross-word puzzle. In the political campaign now being carried on the leaders were discussing the tariff, transportation and immigration, but there was no word from any of them concerning the conserving of the health of the people and saving lives that are needleesly sacrificed today.

IMPORTANT QUESTIONS.

In opening his address Dr. Roberts asked three questions: What is Public Health? Whe needs it? Who is re-

In opening his address Dr. Roberts asked three questions: What is Public Health? Who needs it? Who is responsible for it? Then he proceeded to give the answers, declaring that the federal administration should be the leader in Canada in this work.

For he said many people in middle life suddenly heame aware of the fact that they were suffering from some disease which had been growing on them for years and were in an incurable state. Proper examinations would eliminate this and save many lives for useful work.

He pointed out that through the workings of the health act the human life had been prolonged during the last 50 years by 15 years.

PLACING RESPONSIBILITY.

In placing the responsibility for the public health he said that first there was the state (in Canada, the government at Ottawa), then came the provincial authorities, then the municipality, and finally the individual. There must be co-operation by all these in order to cut down the wastage of disease and save lives of infants, which were now being sacrificed through ignorance.

He quoted figures showing what good health regulations did in the larger centres of population.

In New Brunswick, he said, 80 per cent. of the school children had been found physically or mentally deficient, but this percentage could be greatly reduced by proper care, he said.







NO SECURITY UNTIL **GERMANY IN LEAGUE**

Italian Correspondent Describes Draft of Proposed Agreement.

ROME, Oct. 7 .- The Locarno correspondent of L'Epoca today describes a draft of the proposed western European security pact to which he claims he has had access.

He said that the pact consists of a preamble and 11 articles. The most important articles are númbers 6 and 11, the correspondent asserts. The latter provides that the pact shall not take provides that the pact shall not take effect unless Germany is admitted to the League of Nations. Article six states that the agreement reserves to all parties the rights granted them by the treaty of Versailles and also guarantees to the same nations the rights acquired with their Allies and guaranteed by other powers. The correspondent explains that by this article France intends to have Germany acknowledge France as guarantor of the knowledge France as guarantor of the treaties of arbitration which the German Government, according to its note of September 2, is about to conclude with Poland and Czecho-Slovakia.


