Poteen Manufacture Becomes Almost Industry;
Laws Not Adequate.

Dublin, June 2.—The manufacture of poteen, or illicit whiskey in the Free State has grown from an occasional adventure into an industry. The loss in revenue is much the least part of the consequent damage. The matter has been the subject of numerous denunciations by the bishops, and many crimes are attributed to the effect of this fiery spirit on young men. But the real extent of the evil has never been so fully set put as in The Irish

Statesman, a weekly journal founded by Sir Horace Plunkett.

A writer explains that the industry has baffled the efforts of the government to suppress it. The profits are widely distributed. Malsters trading openly as such sell the materials to local shopkeepers who supply the poteen makers. Railway companies carry tons of corn into the remotest parts of Connaught and every railway official, says the writer, knows that the consignments are for shopkeepers who supply the poteen makers.

"The whole population is aware of this industry, and scarcely one in a hundred will give information regarding the illegal end of it."

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


