



TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

In last year's report the Board expessed a very strong hope that the grant of \$1,000 would be increased to \$1,500 by the civic authorities, but that hope was blighted, and this season we received no addition to the former one. But hope may be blighted and yet not killed, so ours survives as we look forward to next season.

Notwithstanding the visible decrease in the number of applicants this winter, the finances would have been totally inadequate to cope with the needs of those we helped, had they not been augmented by most kind and most liberal unsolicited subscriptions.

Each season the Board has a difficult corner to turn. This occurs in January. The City grant has been disposed of in stocking the fourteen Depositories, in the purchase of coal, in special grants of rent and passage money, etc. The collectors have begun to canvass for subscriptions, but returns have not yet come in. Midwinter and poverty are stern realities to those who visit the poor. Realities that forced the Board this year to send an appeal through the Press, which was most kindly responded to by the generous-hearted.

The Superintendents report more illness in their divisions than in any previous year, and more deaths have occurred in the poorer districts than ever before recorded. A number of poor incurables, who will not be persuaded to go into the Home for Incurables, also require constant attention. We have been forced to look after several families in the greatest destitution, living just across the C. P. R. track. In one family the man was dying of consumption, the woman a confirmed inebriate, and several starving children in rags. The Superintendent described the home (if such it could be called) as one of the most wretched she had ever visited. In another case the house had been burned down and the family found without an article of bedding. These people live beyond the City limits, and are therefore beyond our lawful boundary.

The proper authorities have been notified and requested to look after them, but no action has been taken.

We have helped a number of deserving and, in some cases, educated and refined people, who have not applied, but have been discovered in great trouble, as a rule, over the rent they have been unable to meet. This indebtedness is a heavy load to carry, accompanied by the threat of the landlord or the presence of the bailiff. We have been able to relieve several of the presence of the last-named individual, by the only means which appeal to him. However, we must say that we have always found him most reasonable and humane.

The soup tickets sent to the Superintendents from the House of Industry have been the means of giving warmth and nourishment to many. The Superintendents speak very highly of its quality—and quantity, and count it a great boon in their divisions.

In conjunction with Mr. Taylor, the City Relief Officer, a number of families have had their passage paid, in some cases to England, and in others to places where they would find either work or relatives. One woman whose husband had deserted her, after making a strenuous struggle to keep herself and child by sewing for a shirt factory, where the remuneration is almost nominal, found her strength failing, and being forced to remain at home for a few days, lost her employment. Seeing starvation staring her in the face, and being importuned by her landlady for arrears in rent, she went to the City Hall for assistance to get home to Scotland. The Society was applied to, and the amount was collected, and she got away before the winter set in. She has written to express her thankfulness and gratitude.

The impostors have not been so numerous as in some previous years, but they are still most persevering. One family was exposed, who plied this most lucrative trade. The man stays at home in the winter and looks after the house and children—who are warm and comfortable—the woman goes out with a basket of small household wares and a piteous tale. The kind-hearted become interested and sympathetic, and she goes home laden with clothing and comforts. At Christmas baskets filled with good things were sent to her by people who believed her story. One of our Superintendents was asked to visit them. Her report, on a postal card, was fatal to the woman and convincing to the Board. It ran as follows : "The man is known to have got two new bicycle suits and a wheel last summer. The house is comfortably furnished, warm, with plenty of fuel. There is no sign of poverty."

The nurses belonging to the Nursing-at Home Mission are messengers of mercy to many of our sick ones. Their kindly ministrations and the untold benefits which are derived from their care of the sick poor are much appreciated by the Board.

* What must it mean to some of these poor creatures who mayhap never hear a tender word—who never feel a loving touch (poverty kills affection in most cases), to have the skilful and tender hands of these nurses, making their days less weary and their bodies more comfortable.

We would like to record our kind remembrance of Mr. Pell, who has retired from the office of Secretary of St. George's Society. We had many cases in common with St. Georges' Society, and Mr. Pell was always most willing to help us with the English applicants, and most courteous and painstaking in getting information for the Board.

The Relief Society is altogether managed by women, although it has a most efficient committee of gentlemen, who help when difficulties in management occur. This Society is in its twenty-fourth year, and that

seems respectably elderly for a society ; but it may be interesting to note that there is in Philadelphia a grandmother society, we cannot well call it a *sister*, organized in 1795—over a hundred years old. It is called the Female Society for the Relief and Employment of the Poor. It was organized by Anne Parrish, a Quakeress. The home of the Society has been for over fifty years in the same building and there during the winter months employment is given on five days of the week to about 100 women of all denominations. In our own young Society work is also given, as you will hear in Mrs. Richardson's report.

Mrs. Richardson is untiring in her energy and loses no enthusiasm for the work, although she has held the position of Convener for many years.

REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOM COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have to report that owing to the prevalence of so much sickness among the poor during the winter, the attendance at the workroom was not as large as in former years. Nevertheless there was a good deal of sewing done and done well.

There is great improvement in the way the work is done, the women are more than ever thankful that they have an opportunity of doing something for what they receive instead of having to accept charity.

Your Committee would strongly urge upon those who have the management of our public schools the necessity of teaching the children hand-sewing, so that as they grow up they will be able to make their own clothes neatly as their grandmothers did, and not be dependent on sewing machines. Many a poor woman could, if properly taught when young, earn a good deal by hand-sewing, when, as often happens, she cannot afford a machine, or perhaps is too weak to run one.

REPORT OF DIVISIONS.

FIRST DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Ayers. 40 families helped, English in the majority; several cases of aged and sick people. \$55.15 paid for fuel, also 42 bushels of coke. Rent \$12. Work test satisfactory; 32 garments made by applicants in exchange for groceries. Number of impostors, 4.

SECOND DIVISION.—Superintendent, Miss Carlyle. 139 families helped, many sad cases of aged and sick people. \$25 paid for rent. 280 bushels of coke distributed, besides 32 orders for coal. English in the majority. Chief causes of distress, sickness, old age, and scarcity of work. Thanks are due Dr. Carlyle for kind attention in cases of sickness.

THIRD DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Littleford. During the season 38 families, including 107 children, have been assisted. In one instance a mother and two children were assisted by the Society, with a sum of money toward their passage to British Columbia.

FOURTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. E. Hobson. Forty-four families were helped with groceries and thirteen orders for fuel were given; in some cases rent was paid to the amount of \$12. \$3 were paid for railway fare to enable a poor woman to reach home, and \$5 expended for bedding for sick persons. Not many garments were made in this division, only about twenty, the women being mostly aged and not capable of work. The men relieved were out of work, willing to work but could not obtain employment. The division this year had about the average number of cases to look after, the relief given being to those suffering from sickness, old age, and want of work.

FIFTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. C. Morrison. 75 families helped, English in the majority. 25 orders for fuel were given. Sickness and old age the chief causes of distress.

SIXTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Daniel Rose. We have our rooms open every Tuesday morning during the winter, and 146 families have been helped with groceries, and 96 orders for fuel have been given. Under Mrs. Richardson's careful management the work test has been carried out successfully. A great number of garments have been made by the women for the help given them. \$5 have been paid for rent. Causes of poverty, want of work; sickness and old age.

SEVENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Page. 25 families. 15 fuel orders. Sickness and old age causes of poverty.

EIGHTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. S. J. Johnson. 67 families assisted, including 101 children. \$8 was paid for rent, and 55 fuel orders were given out. Inability to procure work, old age, and sickness are the chief reasons of poverty. Thanks are tendered to Dr. Rice for his kind attention. 15 garments made in exchange for fuel.

NINTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Davis. 235 families helped. 80 fuel orders. \$7 for rent. We have had so much sickness, and our best thanks are tendered the Nursing-At-Home Mission and their nurses for their kind attention when called upon. Lack of employment and sickness are the chief causes of poverty.

TENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Hughes. Assistance was given to 43 families, including 71 children; \$24 being paid out for rent, 30 fuel orders sent out, and about 30 pieces of sewing were done by the women. The class of people helped this year seemed on the whole more respectable, with fewer cases of intemperance. As usual, lack of work and sickness were the chief causes of poverty with several cases of extreme age. Our most grateful thanks are tendered to Dr. Freeman who so kindly and skillfully treated one of our cases through a long illness.

ELEVENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Hughes. Assistant Superintendent, Mrs. Thomas Crawford. Forty families were assisted, including 107 children. \$9.50 was paid for rent. 38 fuel orders were sent out, and about 35 pieces of sewing were done by the women.

TWELFTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Currelley. 46 families, including 80 children, have been helped, majority English. 25 fuel orders; \$11 paid for rent. We beg to acknowledge the parcels of clothing for which we were most grateful, also the paper bags from the Cowan Chocolate Company. Inability to get work, old age and sickness causes of poverty.

THIRTEENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Valiant. We have held weekly meetings commencing December 6th, 1898, and closing April 11th, 1899. 32 families, with 58 children, have been helped. 97

garments have been made by applicants. 14 fuel orders were given, and \$15 paid for rents. Want of work, old age, and widows are the chief causes of poverty.

— FOURTEENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. C. Bowbeer. There were 36 families, 86 children, helped weekly. \$50 spent for coal. \$15 paid for rent for Depository. \$10 given to send one family to the Old Country, also special grant to help family in distress. Causes of poverty, lack of work, intemperance, and old age.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO RELIEF SOCIETY.

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be called the "TORONTO RELIEF SOCIETY," and it shall be in connection with the "YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION."

ARTICLE II.—The object of this Society shall be to obtain and dispense assistance for the really needy; it shall investigate all cases of distress reported to it; it shall endeavor, by consultation and co-operation with other Societies, to prevent imposture; it shall seek to discourage a pauper spirit by helping people to help themselves, and it shall aim at the moral and spiritual improvement of those assisted.

ARTICLE III.—For the furtherance of above objects, the city shall be divided into Divisions, each of which shall be under the care of a Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. Each Division shall be divided into not more than twelve districts, each of which shall be under the care of a Presiding Lady. There shall be also a Secretary for each Division. These shall constitute the Committee of the Division.

ARTICLE IV.—As it is one of the objects of the Society to discourage a pauper spirit by helping people to help themselves, there shall be an Industrial Department, its object being to provide work (in so far as possible) for women who are receiving aid from the Society. This branch of the work shall be placed under the care of a Committee (to be known as "The Industrial Room Committee") composed of a Convener, Secretary, Treasurer, the Superintendents and the Central Committee which shall be appointed by the Convener of the said Committee.

ARTICLE V.—All members of the Board and workers in the Industrial Room, and all persons contributing \$1.00 to the funds of the Society, shall be considered members.

ARTICLE VI.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Managers, composed of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Assistant Treasurer, if necessary (who shall be members of the "Young Women's Christian Association") the Superintendents and Secretaries of Divisions, The Presiding Ladies of Districts and the Convener, Secretary and Treasurer of the Industrial Room Committee. Of these Managers, the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions and the Convener of the Industrial Room Committee shall be elected by ballot, at a public meeting to be called annually for the transaction of business in the beginning of May. (The Board shall have power to fill any of these offices not filled at the said annual business meeting, or any vacancies occurring in their number during the year.) Each Superintendent shall nominate her Assistant Superintendent and Presiding Ladies for appointment by the Board. The Secretaries of divisions shall be chosen by the Division to which they belong. An Advisory Committee of gentlemen shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE VII.—There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions and the Convener of the Industrial Room Committee. One Presiding Lady shall vote from each Division at the Executive Meetings, in the absence of the Superintendent. This Committee shall have power

to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board of Management. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII.—As this Society is in connection with the Young Women's Christian Association, the annual report shall be read at the annual public meeting of that Association.

ARTICLE IX.—A special meeting of the Society may be called by advertisement in the daily papers, at such a time and place as shall be agreed upon by the Executive Committee, notice of the object of such meeting to be given. A special meeting of the Managers may be called by the President at the request of three of the Superintendents of Divisions, each member of the Board of Management to be notified of the object of such meeting.

ARTICLE X.—Notice of any proposed addition, or amendment of, the Constitution or By-laws, or the By-laws, of the Industrial Room Committee, must be given in writing at the meeting of the Board in April. These proposed additions, or amendments, must pass the Board by a two-thirds majority of those present at the monthly meeting in May, and must then be brought before the Society for ratification at the ensuing Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.—The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings at such time and place as it shall appoint. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Weekly meeting shall be held in the Divisions, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon.

ARTICLE II.—The President shall have general supervision of the work, and be *ex officio* a member of all committees. She shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Board of Managers, and shall perform such other duties as are incident of the office.

ARTICLE III.—In the absence of the President and two Vice-Presidents, the Superintendent of a Division shall be appointed to preside, and shall perform all the duties of the office.

ARTICLE IV.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered bank, all the moneys collected, and shall disburse them as the Board of Management shall direct. She shall report the state of the treasury at each monthly meeting. Her accounts shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Board of Managers. She shall at a proper time, each year, provide the Superintendents with the collecting books required, and with the necessary number of reports and cards. The books shall have "Toronto Relief Society" printed on the cover, and be numbered according to Division and District, with the boundaries of the District clearly defined in each book: these shall be endorsed by the President and the Superintendent of the Division. The Treasurer shall keep a list of these books, and the boundaries of Districts, and shall receipt each book as it is returned to her.

ARTICLE V.—The Secretary shall send notice of all meetings to the General Officers and Superintendents of Divisions, keep the minutes of the same, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers. She shall also keep an alphabetical book in which each case, with such details as are considered necessary, shall be recorded.

ARTICLE VI.—DUTIES OF A SUPERINTENDENT :

SEC. 1.—She shall divide the Division into Districts, and if possible obtain one Presiding Lady for each District.

SBC. 2.—She shall secure a room for the Depository, and see that it is properly supplied with such things as are necessary for the relief of the needy.

SEC. 3.—She shall attend each week at the Depository when it is open, and superintend the relief there given.

SEC. 4.—She shall, whenever practicable, require each applicant to undertake some work from the Industrial Room.

SEC. 5.—She shall run only monthly bills, these she shall check over, certify to their correctness by her signature, and hand them to the Treasurer before the ensuing monthly meeting. All payments for rent must be paid directly to the landlord, and these and other receipts must be returned to the Treasurer without delay. She shall not overdraw her appropriation without the sanction of the Board.

SEC. 6.—She shall receive reports of their Districts from her Presiding Ladies, and make a synopsis of these, with a list of those found undeserving, for the monthly meeting of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 7.—She shall arrange for a sufficient number of collectors in the Division, and see that the collecting is done *systematically and promptly*.

ARTICLE VII.—DUTIES OF A SECRETARY OF A DIVISION :

SEC. 1.—She shall attend at the Depository weekly, see that the books of registration there are properly kept, and take notes of any orders sent in by Presiding Ladies since last meeting. She shall also keep a list of the names and addresses of those out of work, and of the kind of work they can do.

SEC. 2.—She shall render the General Secretary monthly a list of the names and residences of those who have been relieved, with remarks as to character and and also names of imposters.

ARTICLE VIII.—DUTIES OF A PRESIDING LADY :

SEC. 1.—She shall thoroughly investigate all cases of distress in her District, and report them to the Superintendent. None but those visited shall receive systematic aid.

SEC. 2.—She shall collect, or provide a collector, in the District assigned to her, and render to the Superintendent the moneys collected, with a list prepared for the printer, of donations and subscriptions. Contributions from "Friends" and amounts under 25c. being added together as "Friends and small sums." In collecting, each person subscribing 25c. or over, should be furnished with a report.

ARTICLE IX.—Appropriations shall be made by the Board of Management to each Division in Proportion to the number reported as requiring relief.

ARTICLE X.—Care shall be taken to find out whether applicants for relief are receiving aid from any other sources, and no one receiving aid from this Society shall be permitted to beg from door to door.

ARTICLE XI.—As it shall be the object of this Society to dispense charity on the same basis throughout the city, *delicacies* shall not be given from the funds collected, except in cases of sickness, which must be specially reported; also the Society shall, as far as possible, avoid undertaking maintenance of applicants, seeking rather to obtain permanent assistance for them from the charitable institutions of the city.

BY-LAWS OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOM COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE I.—The Convener shall call regular monthly meetings of the Committee during the winter months, the first meeting of the season to be held not later than the last week in October. She shall take the superintendence of all work done by the Committee. She shall present a monthly report to the Board.

ARTICLE II.—The Secretary shall send notices of all meeting of the Committee to each member, keep the minutes, and prepare the annual report for the Board. She shall also keep the lists of the names and addresses of the women receiving work, and present a copy of such lists with her monthly report to the Board.

ARTICLE III.—¹³⁸ The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered Bank all moneys connected with this branch of the work, and shall disburse them as the Committee (subject to the veto of the Board) shall direct. She shall report each month the state of the treasury to the Committee, and present a copy of this report at the monthly Board meeting. Her accounts shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Committee.

ARTICLE IV.—During the winter the Committee shall meet for the transaction of business on a stated day in the last week of each month. Three members shall form a quorum. The Committee shall have power (subject to the approval of the Board) to make its own arrangements as to methods, or rules of work, and as to the disposal of the garments made, so long as the object of this branch of the work is kept steadily in view. The Board shall, however, have power to change, by a vote of the majority of those present, these methods or rules, should it seem best to do so, notice of such changes having been given one month previously both to the Committee and the Board.

ARTICLE V.—A special meeting of the Committee shall be called by the Convener, or by the Board, at the written request of its members.

ARTICLE VI.—The Committee may annually add to its membership such other ladies as it shall consider necessary for the work under its care, by submitting the names of such ladies to the Board for appointment. The ladies so appointed shall not be members of the Board, but shall have in every other way the same privileges as the other members of the Committee.

ARTICLE VII.—All moneys raised by, or donated to, this part of the Society's work, shall be under the control of the Board, and shall be used for the object set forth in these by-laws.

ARTICLE VIII.—The rooms shall be as near as possible in the central part of the city.

ARTICLE IX.—Work shall be supplied only to those who are really destitute.

ARTICLE X.—A scale of prices shall be fixed by the Committee.

ARTICLE XI.—As each Depository Committee will insist, when practicable, on some work being done by all applicants for assistance, the Industrial Committee shall not refuse work to inferior workers.

ARTICLE XII.—The annual report of the Committee shall be published in the annual report of this Society, so that the public may know that this Society is striving to avoid pauperizing those who are the recipients of its aid.
