## WORTHY POINTERS

Wisdom is more necessary than learning to a leader of men.

The difference between a preference for the "open shop" and a preference for the sweat shop is the difference between twaddle and wisdom.

As publicity is the greatest ally of safety, so secrecy is its greatest menace.

The history of the world, and particularly the history of labor, proves the folly of trying to destroy error by mere suppression.

The building trades' strike is called off. Better luck next time for the right wing union, the Builders' Laborers. It has been a mistake in connection with this fight, we believe, it was in withdrawing the permit and forcing all under the streets. However, the lessons learned from this fight will be remembered for the future, and the trade workers go against the employers again.

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An ignorant, foolish, and little-minded man in office can, and sometimes does, do more damage to the cause of trade unionism than a thousand wise members can do straight in a month of Sundays.

The moral of this is so obvious as to need no special pointing out.

Speaking generally, the objection to the "open shop" system is rather lack of system, not upon the patriotic or sentimental grounds, but upon the practical, nothing to the creation of support of the institution, which alone makes a joint agreement possible, should not be permitted to share the benefits arising from trade unionism.

The slightly "broad base" of hungry men and women along Broadway, New York, is due to the early features of our civilization that the long blowers of the present "era of unprecedented prosperity" find exceedingly awkward to explain away. To admit that it proves that the social balance is wrong somewhere would be tantamount to admitting that the "stand-pat" policy of the House is wrong.

"Keep cool!" This is first and foremost of the genus. Presumably it is intended for women who have to tend over hot stoves and for men who work in the rolling mills.

"Avoid cold drinks. That is, if you see a man coming toward you who looks as though he might buy, do not cough violently if he tries to pass without noticing you."

"Avoid work." There is a rule that you may safely take under advisement. "Take a daily plunge into the sea." This is specially recommended to the inhabitants of Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska, and it would not be safe to the residents of the Indian Territory.

"Over Such Things." Down through a long dark tunnel. The train a-haul took. Girl at his side was pretty as a picture. But still he did not try to kiss. The lady fair and plump.

Movement is a movement for the preservation and extension of individual liberty; up at the very top, individual liberty is merely the right to put work without the "by your leave" of any one.

The right to live and the right to die, charge are the necessary complements and corollaries of each other; they must be preserved together or they will be destroyed together.

Here is an incident in the bull-pen methods vouch'd for by eye-witness at Cripple Creek: An old prospector named Page was brought into the department from his cabin, eight miles distant. After four days in the pen he was brought out for a medical examination.

He had never belonged to a union; never expected to do a day's work in a mining camp; didn't want to mix in these troubles; wanted to prospect in peace. "Don't you want to join the alliance?" was asked. He shook his head. "Take him back to the bull-pen till he finds out where he is!" was the sentence of the court.

Those fellows who have a full stomach and no landlord to dodge, i.e., the prospective miners, who start life with nothing save a word and that's all they can, anyhow, should glance at the following from a New-York daily, and also note that the man of forty is on the scrap-heap, like an old machine. A great host of men, numbering one thousand or more, applicants for positions in the new subway, stood before the offices of the Interborough Rapid Transit Co. yesterday, in response to an advertisement for "gatemen," porters, engineers, hand-sweepers and trowel-men. Fully three thousand have secured application blanks. Taken altogether, they were a creditable representation of the American workingman, and all filled the conditions of being between 21 and 40 years of age. Many of the men came from out of town, not only from distant cities, but from such distant points as Denver, Chicago, New Orleans and San Francisco. Of the 10,000 applications, probably one in ten were successful. Wages offered range from \$1.75 to \$3 per day, according to position and length of service.

## WAGE SLAVERY.

If the toilers wish to find the cause of all our industrial trouble they will find it when they only think over the "wage slavery," as it is called today, is the great fundamental cause of all our industrial troubles wherever they exist.

## NOT UNTIL.

And not until the toilers organize and organize are prepared to strike at the great cause, "wage slavery," can they hope to find a solution of our industrial trouble.

## THREE WAYS.

There are three ways open to the toilers. The first is the present method of the organized toilers, namely, that of trying to make the present owners of our industrial relationships not harmonious, on every side there is discord, dissatisfaction and distrust.

## BUILDING STRIKE.

The building strike that is now on in this city is evidence of this. There never was a time in the history of Toronto when there was more building waiting to be done, yet we read in our papers that builders are leaving the city by hundreds.

## THE SECOND WAY.

For the second way we have to look to the path pointed out by enthusiastic social reformers. They believe that by it is possible to set the wage slave free by law.

## HAD LUTHER.

Third plan, we have every reason to believe that it cannot have failed, but he did not. He succeeded in getting his money, and it was because more responsible he was successful, not in abolishing Roman Catholic churches, but in establishing Protestant churches in the same community.

## THE TROUBLE.

The present trouble among the building interests has been caused by the employers thinking that the wages they pay are not enough for the work done, part 1, not enough for the work done, while the employers and those who are in sympathy with them think it's quite sufficient.

## A HOD-CARRIER.

I heard a man say the other day, "Just imagine a common hod-carrier demanding the rate of nearly fifteen dollars per week. Why, it is simply ridiculous." I thought at the time that the hod-carrier, after all, was a man, but I remembered that, under the present money standard, manhood does not count, because to-day we place a higher value on wealth than we do on the needs of humanity.

If our organized toilers want to solve the present industrial problems they will have to probe down deeper than the question of a few cents an hour. When they continue to fight for an increase of wages they are only dealing with one of the effects of the present wage system.





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
