London, July 3.—King Constantine, of Greece, in a statement to the British public, after stating that in spite of the agreement the Bulgarians neglected to evacuate most of the points which it had promised to abandon, says:—Ever since the coordination of territories in Thrace and Macconia, where Greeks are in the majority, by the Bulgarian army the population has suffered the harshest treatment.

The news received at Salontki of the fight at Cuevgheli and of the passage of the Bulgarian army through villages in the neutral zone, contains terrifying details of the treatment meted out both to the Servian prisoners by the Bulgarians and to the population of these regions.

The Bulgarians have burned villages and have massacred old men, women and children. By the capture of the Bulgarian fropp in Salontki and the order given today to the army to advance and make its openion safe, the Greek army, in the face of daily attacks delivered in flagrant violation of a sworn compact, seeling under its eyes atrocibles committed on population of the same race, has done no more than make the necessary measure of defence to insure its own security and to safeguard humanity.

IRON AND GLASS CLOTHING

Strange Materials.

It has remained for the 20th century to show us the advantages of garments made of minerals. Incredible as it may seem, stone, iron and even glass are now being manufactureds into clothing. The latest novelty in women's dresses is represented by robes of spun glass, in shades of white, green, lileo, pink and yellow. The inventor is an Australian, and the goods are as bright and flexible as silk. The first lady to wear a glass dress was of royal rank. It was of a delicate shade of lavender, short with pink, and its peculiar sheen reminded observers of the sparkle of diamond dust.

The Russians are manufacturing a fabric from the fiber of a filamentous stone from the Siberian mines which is said to be of so durable a nature that it is practically indestructible.

The material is soft to the touch and pliable in the extreme, and when soiled has only to be placed in a fire to be made absolutely clean. Iron cloth is largely used to-day by tailors everywhere for the purpose of making the collars of coats set properly. This cloth is manufactured from steel wool and has the appearance of having been wown from horsehair.

"Wool," not the product of sheep, is being utilized shroad for men's clothing. This kind is known as "limestone wool" and is made in an electric furnace. Powdered limestone, mixed with certain chemicals, is thrown into the furnace, and after passing through a furious air blast it is tossed out as fluffy white wool. When it comes frorm the furnace the wool is dyed and made into lengths, like cloth. A pair of trousers or a coat made of this material cannot, it is claimed, be burned or damaged by grease and is as flexible as cloth made of the ordinary sheep's wool.

Paper clothes were worn by the Ispanese troops during the war with Russia, and they were found to be very serviceable and much warmer than those of cloth. With the scientific methods, made possible by modern invention, a vessel can always be salved if the prospect of reward be sufficiently great to justify such measures.

The salvage steamer is a personality among ships. Most of those working from the British coast are composite built — i.e., wooden hulls on steel frames. The wooden hull possesses many advantages, principal of which is that it is far less likely to be damaged by bumping against the wreck than is a steel one, and so can stay by the wreck during weather which would compel a metal-hulled vessel to stand off.

Shooting Up the Rock. Shooting Up the Rock.

An eye-witness of one of the big blastings undertaken a short time ago at the Grand Trunk Pacific terminal yards at Prince Rupert describes it as one of the greatest blasting feats ever undertaken in Canada. Where a day before there stood a ridge of solid rock, as long as a city block, more than 60 feet wide, and 45 feet in height, there lay, after this blast had been fired, tons uppor tons of shattered stone.
