A FORWARD IMMIGRATION POLICY.

The Telegraph professes to be much concerned over The Telegraph professes to be much concerned over the immigration policy of the Hazen administration and asks when the local government is going to enter seriously upon a campaign for bringing settlers and farm hands in large numbers to New Brunswick.

If the Telegraph had taken the trouble to secure the information it would have learned from the figures available that the policy of the Hazen government in placing the immigration department on a practical basis has resulted in a steady increase of desirable settlers to this province during the past eighteen months, in striking contrast to conditions under the old government, which had no immigration policy, kept no records and left the few immigrants who found their way to New

ing contrast to conditions under the old government, which had no immigration policy, kept no records and left the few immigrants who found their way to New Brunswick to shift for themselves.

Since the office of superintendent of immigration was created eighteen months ago, the department has been instrumental in placing \$15 persons in different parts of the province. A large percentage of these new comers have been men with small capital, and not a few have purchased land and started farming on their own account. Many have gone to work with provincial farming methods in this country before putting their money into land. Others have landed here with little money, "the name of the people of South Africa, a cordial in-

THE EMPIRE AND THE CROWN.

In a notable article in the last number of "Theteenth Century and After," Mr. J. A. R. Marriot discussed the place of the Crown in the constitution. One extremely important point he touched, but did not lillate upon, is that it is to the Crown the loyalty of he dominions attaches. They have no representative n the British parliament and no ministers in the British cabinet, but they owe and yield strong allegiance to the Eritish Crown. The Crown is the copestone of the

As the Empire becomes greater and Imperial or

As the Empire becomes greater and Imperial or ganizations more nearly perfect, the place of the Crown in the Imperial system will become more important. In his admirable work on "The Government of England," Mr. Lowell ventured the opinion that the Crown is deciving in political importance. That opinion he would doubtless revise if he were issuing a new edition of his book, for it is now generally admitted that King Edward, though a strictly constrational monarch, readered great service to the country by his able and tactful statesmanship. In the person of a wise and strong king the Crown is bound to be a very important instrumentality in the actual business of national government. But however writers on the constitution may differ as to the part it plays in the political affairs of the United Kingdom, they will probably agree that in the government of the Empire it is a real bond.

If Britain were to become a republic, as men like

If Britain were to become a republic, as men like Lloyd-George and Kier Hardie desire, the Empire would break up, and the dominions become independent. Socialism and anti-Imperialism are, as they would be expected to be, associated ideas. It is known that the present King of England takes a very warm interest, as his father before him did, in the building up of the Empire. In other words, he reciprocates the feeling of loyalty the dominions and other outlying parts of the Empire freely render to the Crown.


