High Insurance Rates.
Everybody is crying out against the ruinous rates imposed by the fire insurance companies. The increase of rate, since the Boston and Chicago fires, is 25, 50 and even 100 per cent. As the companies, at former rates, had made money enough to withstand the calamities of the great fires, the enormous profits that accrue to them now may be imagined. A very slight percentage, in addition to paying rates, increases the profit rapidly, and when the addition is fifty per cent. the entire capital invested in the business is lost.

Westmorland Circuit Court.
DORCHESTER, Oct. 2.
Court resumed the case of Curry vs. The Bank of N. A. and J. S. Locker, on the 24th ult., at 2 o'clock, p. m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr. Thompson was supported by Mr. Weldon on behalf of Locker to the same effect. Mr. Duff replied. Nonsuit refused. This occupied Monday and Tuesday. The defendants did not call any witnesses. Mr. Thompson called the jury on the part of the plaintiff, and Mr. Thompson on the part of the defendants. The Judge left several questions to the jury, all of which they found for the plaintiff and \$2,300 damages. It will of course be carried to the Court above.

King's County Board of Trade.

The council expressed themselves in favor of the idea of the Dominion Government to establish a Canadian Lloyd, and R. Marshall, Richard Titus, and Hon. W. P. F. Fiewelling were appointed a committee to look into the fact, make suggestions, and go to Ottawa as a delegation from the Board of Trade.

The question of an early train from Sussex to New Brunswick was discussed, and it was decided to enquire into the wishes of the people, and the extent of patronage said train would receive.

Shipping Notes.
Total Disasters in September. - The number of vessels lost, or bound to, or from ports in the United States, reported totally lost, and missing, during the past month is 52, of which 29 were wrecked, 8 abandoned, 1 burned, 1 captured, 1 sunk by collision, 4 foundered, and 8 are missing. They are classed as follows, viz.: 1 steamer, 1 ship, 10 barkes, 8 brig, 31 schooners, and 1 sloop, and their total value, exclusive of cargoes, is estimated at \$604,000.

In this list there are only four Provincial vessels. The ship Assam Valley, of this port, abandoned on her voyage from Pencoils for Liverpool; the brig Oak, of Halifax, capsized on her voyage from Boston for Halifax; the schooner Sappho, of this port, abandoned, and the Veritas, of Annapolis, N. S., grounded.

Ship on Fire. - The steamer Hibernian, at Liverpool 19th ult., from Baltimore via Halifax and St. John's, N. F., reports: Sept. 11, 4 a. m., lat. 46.10 N., lon. 53.57 W., sighted ship on fire, bore away for her, proved to be the James Jardine, of Liverpool, in flames fore and aft; found no one on board the wreck.

The brig Conquest, Kirkpatrick, master, at Boston 29th ult., from French Cross, N. S., reports ran ashore at 5.30 a. m., Sunday, in a thick fog, on the West end of Phillips Beach, Swampscott, where she lay till the high tide in the afternoon, when she hauled off with apparently no damage done.

The schooner Mary Louise, of Newcastle, N. B., from Chatham for Pictou, N. S., on the 20th ult., with a cargo of deals, became waterlogged off the Kent coast on the 21st.

New Vessel. - A fine bark, named the Hants County, was launched from the yard of Messrs. Harvie & Co., Arundale, N. S., on the 24th ult. She registers 64 tons, measures 147 feet length of keel, 38 feet breadth of beam, 15 feet depth of hold, and classes 8 years French Lloyd's.

Fine Spars. - The schooner Susie Prescott, which arrived this morning from New York, has brought three splendid pine spars, each measuring 98 feet in length. They are intended for a new vessel building at Black River for Messrs. Luke Stewart, McLeod and others.

The schooner Kedron, Houston, master, from this port for Liverpool with deals, went ashore on the morning of the 29th ult., below West Quay Head, between the Carrying Place and Boot Head. Her crew deserted her, but the Captain having procured assistance managed to get the vessel off and taken into Eastport, where she was examined. It is thought that her damage is not of a very serious nature as she does not leak much.

The schooner Nelson, Wright, master, from New York for this port, before reported ashore at Mac's Bay, has been got off and is now afloat. Two tug-boats were despatched this morning to tow her to this port.

Concealed Birth.
A servant named Phoebe Douglas, was delivered of a still-born child, on Wednesday, the 1st inst. The child was concealed at the time, and the child was afterwards found in a clothes basket in the house where she lived. There was an inquest held yesterday, and from the evidence of Dr. Christie, the child was supposed to have been born dead, and to have died during delivery. The concealing of a birth is an offence against the laws, and the Police Magistrate should certainly not allow this case to go unpunished. As the mother is known, an examination into the affair might have the effect of deterring others from the commission of a similar crime. It is a step from concealing a birth, to infanticide, and there have been too many instances of the latter in this city, to allow this to pass.

Lacrosse.
A meeting of the St. John Lacrosse and Snow Shoe Club was held last evening in THE TRIBUNE building. The affairs of the club were discussed and found to be in a very satisfactory state, and a number of new members were elected. The club decided to hold their practice two afternoons each week, and selected Wednesday and Friday at 3 o'clock as the days and hours of practice. The first practice will be held to-morrow at the hour named. A resolution was passed providing for the close of the Lacrosse season, by a field day, when medals will be offered for competition amongst members of the club, in running and walking races. This will be a very interesting way to close the Lacrosse season before the snow falls, not only to members of the club but to outsiders. The club was formed for the purpose of encouraging athletic sports, and the members are determined to carry out such intention. There are several very fast runners in the club, one at present holding a medal for having run a quarter of a mile in fifty-four seconds.

The winter season, when the snow-shoeing comes on, is also looked forward to with interest by the club, and there will be a number of races and tramps under the auspices of the club.

The valise contained about \$100 in cash and some valuable papers. It was a piece of gross carelessness on the part of the coachman to leave his coach with property left in his charge, and even go down to the boat, and if it is not found, he should certainly be held responsible for the loss.

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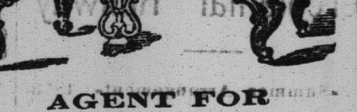
