The OTTAWA YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION invites young men to take advantage of its privileges, and to assist in its work.

The Annual Fee is only one dollar; and any young man unable to pay this amount will be gladly welcomed free.

The work carried on in and by the Association may be summarized as follows :—

INTELLECTUAL AND SOCIAL.

1. A well equipped Reading Room, supplied with a large number of daily and weekly papers.

2. A comfortably furnished parlor, in which are the leading illustrated, scientific, and other papers, and a number of secular and religious magazines.

3. A Lending Library, to which large additions are made each year.

4. Lectures, literary, musical and social entertainments.

5. Evening Classes.

RELIGIOUS.

A well conducted Bible Class, and weekly religious meetings at the rooms.

Weekly meetings at the Jail and Hospital, and at Mount Sherwood, Stewarton and other places when possible.

GENERAL.

A register of boarding houses is kept. Assistance is afforded in securing employment. Every attention in the Association's power is shown to sick young men. The Secretary will be glad to be made aware of cases of young men in sickness. When possible, watchers will be provided.

All are cordially invited to visit the rooms of the Association, and to make full enquiries into its operations.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Ottawa Young Men's Christian Association has now completed its eighteenth year. However checkered its history may have been in the past, the year just closed has been one of marked progress, in which we have witnessed the inauguration of movements which promise a strength and stability to the Association such as it has never before enjoyed. Due mention is made of these in the reports of the various committees. Suffice it to say at this point that the leadings of Providence have been such as to call for our hearty thanksgivings to the God of all bounties, and to lead us to a fuller trust in him for future direction.

We have been called upon in the Providence of God to lament the death of Mr. Jas. Campbell, a member of the Association from its earliest days and for many years one of its Board of Managers.

We wish herewith to perpetuate his memory by an expression of our appreciation of his efficient services to the Association, and of our highest regard for his christian character.

During the past year the Association has been duly incorporated according to existing laws. The Board of Managers have met in seventeen various sessions for the transaction of business. Most of its members have taken a hearty interest in the Association, manifested by their frequent presence at these meetings. The Standing Committees of the Association have met for consultation thirty-two times and have done faithful work in their various spheres. Our membership, regular and sustaining, now numbers 456, an increase of 82 during the year. In addition, complimentary tickets conveying all privileges of the Association have been presented to the non-resident students who have come as strangers among us.

The Association has been served six and one-half months by a General Secretary, whose work has necessarily been of such a nature that much of it cannot be presented in statistical form. So much time is spent in devising plans and methods of work, that the energy expended cannot be accurately estimated.

The simple fact that in less than six months over four hundred calls, both business and social, were received at the office, shows how little a Secretary can hold his time at his own disposal.

But so far as can be presented, the Secretary has attended all but one of the meetings of the Board and Committees; has been present at 98 religious meetings of the Association; has received 103 letters and written 89; directed 10 to boarding houses, and secured employment for 9; made 428 business calls; issued 5,000 written and printed notices and invitations; introduced a number of young men to resident pastors; furnished letters of introduction to members leaving the city; induced a number to sign the pledge; has given advice, both temporal and spiritual, to many; has dealt personally with a number of cases of destitution, and has spent much time in a social way among visitors at the rooms. During this time, also, he has taken one month's vacation.

It is with regret that he takes his departure at the end of the present month, being compelled to resign because of a protracted eye difficulty which demands rest and treatment.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

I.—Finance Committee.

This Committee can render an account of its stewardship in a very few words.

The expenses of the Association during the past year have been somewhat heavier than usual, \$1,611.74 having been expended in the work. This is owing to the enlargement of the work in various directions, coupled with the fact that the deficit of last year of \$131.14 has been raised, so that in reality only \$1,480.60 have been devoted to current expenses, and the Association closes the year free from debt. It is the constant endeavour of the Committee to keep the running expenses of the Association at the lowest possible point consistent with the best interests of the work.

Hitherto our main sources of revenue have been the annual dues, donations, and sub-letting of hall. During the past year, however, these have supplemented by the establishment of a Sustaining Membership of \$1000, which has thus become a fixed source of income to the Association. We have need to be grateful to the people of Ottawa for their hearty response to our appeal for better support and for the substantial manner in which they have manifested their appreciation of our work.

II.—Mission and Devotional Committee.

The work of this committee has been of a varied character. Under its supervision have been maintained, as formerly,

1. A YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASS,

conducted regularly by our president, Mr. James Gibson, every Sunday morning, for one hour, beginning at 9:45 o'clock and closing in time for the services of the churches. Mr. Gibson has been assisted from time to time by Rev. R. Gavin, by the Secretary and others. We consider this one of our most successful meetings, resulting in much good. The attendance has varied with the season and with the sessions of the schools, ranging from twenty to forty-five. The total attendance for the 53 Sundays has been 1447, with an average of 27. We cannot but feel that this class is destined to reach, with its influence, a still larger number of the young men resident and strangers in our city.

2. A YOUNG MEN'S PRAYER MEETING,

every Friday evening, at eight o'clock, with a single exception has also been regularly held, with a varying, though small attendance. The average during the year has been but 15, a number of whom attend regularly, night after night. Dodgers have been distributed on the streets, cards announcing the subjects have been issued and widely circulated, and other means employed to increase the attendance, but without marked success. Those who come however testify to its having been to them a continuous means of grace.

3. A MEETING AT THE JAIL

has been held every Sunday morning, at 9:45 o'clock, with but three exceptions. Most of the prisoners are usually in attendance, and opportunity often presents itself of dealing with them individually. Many have been looked after upon their dismissal, and helped to secure such work as will yield them immediate support. Mr. W. J. Topley has been especially active and efficient in this direction.

4. A HOSPITAL SERVICE

has been conducted every Sunday evening at 6 o'clock. While the service at the jail has been confined to the male inmates, this service has been for the benefit of patients of both sexes. Extra hymn-books have been provided during the year for both of these services, so that now all who will can join in the singing. The efficacy, as well as enjoyment of

the hospital service might be greatly increased by the addition to the working force of a few consecrated Christian ladies to aid in the singing and join in the conversation with the female inmates who may desire a word of comfort and cheer.

5. A COTTAGE MEETING AT MOUNT SHERWOOD

has been regularly maintained throughout the year, under the leadership of Mr. W. Hollington, assisted by Messrs. Heath, McCracken and Kerr. A number of conversions have occurred to cheer the hearts of the workers. The attendance during the year has been 1,116, with an average of 21.

In addition to these meetings, the Committee has authorized the establishment of

6. A COTTAGE MEETING AT STEWARTON,

where the Sunday School building belonging to St. Andrew's Church has been kindly granted for the purpose. This meeting was begun in March, and has been conducted mainly by Messrs. R. W. Harrison, F. A. Coffin and E. Rice. The average attendance has been 20.

7. A COTTAGE MEETING ON THE "FLATS"

was started at the same time, at the residence of M. Thos. Hill, and has been under the supervision of Rev. R. Gavin, who has been assisted by various members of the Association. The attendance has averaged 13.

The Cottage Meetings are all held on Thursday evening, at 8 o'clock.

"In a city like our own, with its eight suburbs, most of which contain no churches and are far removed from the centre, a work of this nature is urgently demanded." It might be further remarked that these extra meetings were undertaken in the hope of reaching the railroad men who dwell in the vicinities where they are held, with the intention of a more definite work for them in the future.

8. A GOSPEL SERVICE

in Bolton Street Schoolhouse was begun March 23rd, and has been held every succeeding Sunday evening, at 7:30 o'clock.

The attendance from the start has averaged 42, while the attentiveness of all to the truth presented has been gratifying in the extreme. The former meetings in this place, held some years ago, were attended with many blessings, as the following extract from a letter to one of our members, among other testimonies, will show :

"Glad to read in your letter of the re-opening of the Bolton Street Mission. There is an immense harvest in that location. I pray that God in his mercy will prosper you and the rest of the Association in its noble undertaking. I can never forget you, for it is to you I owe all my prosperity in Boston, and to you I owe the peace of my soul. In fact I owe all to God through you instrumentality."

Many are the results that can be expected in this quarter, if with faith and prayer we persistently sow beside all waters.

In addition to these meetings, we would note the fact that a number of open-air meetings have been held during the summer, under the direction of Mr. W. J. Wilson; daily prayers at the rooms have been maintained during a portion of the year, and several thousand tracts have been distributed at the various services and upon the streets.

III. Rooms and Library Committee.

The province of this Committee is to have general superintendence over the library and reading room, and to regulate all matters that pertain to the premises which we occupy.

Its report naturally divides itself into three heads:

1. The library has been increased during the past year by the addition of 169 volumes, 119 of which were the result of a very successful Book Reception, while the rest have been added from time to time. Many of these are valuable additions to our literature. A card index of the library, which has been undertaken by the librarian and secretary, is nearly completed, and is to be put in position for reference at the rooms. Effort has been made to secure volumes that have been a long time lost to the library, which resulted in the return of a large number of them. There are now 1006 volumes in the library, and 345 were drawn during the year, besides those used for consultation and reference at the rooms.

2. About 80 papers and periodicals are now on file, of which the following have been added during the year: By subscription, or through kindness of the publishers;— *Bible Treasury*; *Canadian Baptist*; *Canadian Magazine*; *Commercial, The (Winnipeg)*; *Herald, Calgary*; *Literary News*; *Musical Monthly*; *Real Estate Review*; *Rescue, The*; *Sword and Trowel*; *Tonic Sol-Fa Reporter*; *Trade Reporter*; *Week, The*; *Presbyterian Record*; through kindness of Mr. J. B. Halkett, *Independent Foraster*; of Dr. R. J. Wicksteed, *The Dominion Churchman*, and *The Canadian Missionary*.

A resolution has been passed by the Board that their thanks be conveyed to those publishers who so generously supply the Association with their publications free of charge.

3. Few improvements have been made upon the rooms during the year, aside from ordinary cleaning and repairs. Nevertheless the attendance has been large, the aggregate having been 25,825, with an average of 83.

In addition to this, the rooms of the third storey have been largely used, eight societies and associations having met there regularly for the whole or part of the year. The French Presbyterian Church has met in the hall every Sunday afternoon; the Coffee House directors on several occasions, and the city ministers in our parlor during the winter.

The fact that the rooms are so largely used and are so ill adapted to our purpose, has led your Committee to make such recommendations as have resulted in the appointment of a special Building Committee, in negotiations for the purchase of a building site on Sparks Street,* and in steps being taken towards securing the funds necessary for the erection of a building of our own. With proper effort the object aimed at will no doubt be attained before a great length of time.

IV.—Lecture and Entertainment Committee.

The programme adopted and carried out by your Committee for the entertainment of the members and friends of the Association was as follows:

1. Lecture by Rev. W. Moore, D. D. on "*The New Hebrides*"; by Rev. B. Longley, B. A., on "*Burns*"; by Rev. A. P. McDiarmid, M. A., on "*Wm. Carey*"; and by Rev. J. S. Trotter, M. A., on "*Sierra Leone*"; or "*The White Man's Grave*".

2. *Musical and Literary Entertainment* under the direction of Prof. Werkman.

3. *Social Reception* at St. Andrew's Church, and a *Book Reception* at the Baptist Church. This series of entertainments proved enjoyable in the highest degree, and our thanks are due the above named gentlemen for their kindness in so freely yielding to our requests. Our thanks are also extended to the ladies of St. Andrew's, and the Baptist Churches, who spared no pains to make the evenings spent in their respective churches so highly enjoyable. The attendance at the lectures has ranged from 60 to 100; at the socials from 100 to 200.

As in previous years, Evening Classes were sustained during the winter months; in *French*, under Prof. J. A. Guignard; in *Arithmetic*, under Mr. C. S. Heinrichs; and in *Shorthand*, under Mr. H. C. Ross. The thanks of the Board have been extended to these gentlemen, and especially to Mr. Ross, who served gratuitously in this connection.

V. Sick Visitation Committee.

This committee organized for work during the winter, dividing the city into sections, and allotting each section to two individual members.

In addition to this, letters were addressed by the Secretary to the resident pastors and physicians, requesting them to report such cases of sick young men as seemed to demand attention or aid from the Committee. Answers were received in a few instances and service rendered. As definite reports have not been rendered, the exact extent of our ministrations cannot be presented. But it is known that in all the cases that have come to our notice every attention has been shown, and occasion taken to point the suffering one to the great Physician of the soul. Some have expressed themselves gratified with these visits.

VI. Printing and Publishing Committee.

We beg to submit that during the year many thousand publications have been issued under our supervision. In connection with the annual reports, petitions soliciting better support were circulated. Programmes of the year's work, cards of invitation to the rooms and to the meetings, have been prepared and largely made use of. Circulars of information and invitations to be addressed to young men recently arrived in the city, dodgers for distribution on the street, cards announcing subjects for Bible study and prayer meetings, lecture tickets, notice of socials, and the book receptions, of cottage meetings and the gospel service, newspaper items—these and other similar means have been employed by your Committee for the purpose of bringing the Association in contact with the public mind.

In addition to this, with the first of April the *Association Reporter* was resumed. A thousand copies monthly have been issued. About fifty copies have been sent to absent friends and to sister associations, and the remainder have been distributed among the members and friends resident in the city.

VII. Reception Committee.

The Reception Committee organized for work at the opening of the winter, and have had representatives in attendance at the rooms on fifty-seven separate evenings. These did much toward making members feel at home and strangers welcome. We will better realize the importance of this work when we remember how much often depends upon first impressions. The work of this Committee is to extend a kindly welcome to all who attend the rooms, to introduce members to those with whom they are unacquainted, to give information in regard to the Association and its work, and in general to contribute to the pleasure and profit of all who seek for a pleasant hour at the rooms.
