# Inspector's Annual Report.

To the Public School Board of the City of Toronto :

#### GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to present the following report regarding the Schools under your charge, for the year 1890.

Appended to the Report will be found Statistical Tables which give in detail all important particulars relating to teachers, pupils, attendance, absenteeism, tardiness, studies pursued, cost of maintenance, etc.

#### ATTENDANCE.

The total number of pupils registered during the year was 30,011. Last year it was 28,287.

The average daily attendance was 20,019. Last year it was 18,926.

It is very satisfactory to note that the increased attendance is chiefly made up of those who attend School between 150 and 200 days.

The Average Monthly Registered Number was 24,342. This shows an increase compared with last year of 3124. (See Table A.)

The average of Monthly Average Numbers was 20,688. This shows an increase of 1,764 when compared with the corresponding number of last year. (See Table B.)

The average of Monthly Averages was 85 per cent. of the Average of Monthly Registered Numbers.

The best average for any month in the year was 89.9 per cent.

The largest number, 24,523, was registered in October, and the smallest number, 21,858, in January.

#### TEACHERS.

#### REPORT OF THE EXAMINERS.— COMBINED EXAMINATION.

The Examiners have the honor to report that the Combined Examination was held on June 25th and 26th, in Dufferin and Ryerson Schools.

The pupils sent up to the Examination from the Senior Fifth and Senior Fourth Book Classes were examined at Ryerson School, and those from the Junior Fifth and Junior Fourth Book Classes at Dufferin School, on papers prepared by the Examiners.

The names of the pupils entitled, according to the results of the Examination, to receive Medals, Scholarships and Prizes are herewith submitted, and also detailed statements of the marks obtained in the various classes and subjects.

The Examiner in English Grammar, Composition and Writ-

ing, reports that a general view of the examination shows that the Analysis is very good in all the classes; Etymology generally good; Composition from excellent in the Senior 5th Book to very weak in the Junior 4th Book, as might be 'expected; Puncthe tion generally very faulty—the weakest point in the examination; Syntax not accurate enough; very few appeared to have paid sufficient attention to this portion of Grammar, being for the most part satisfied with a vague statement of the relation between words. In the Junior 5th Book, especially, there was a tendency to a vicious style of abbreviation in the Parsing, which often became a mere string of initials. In the Senior 4th Book the parsing was poor as a rule. In the Junior 4th there was considerable weakness in the parsing and the composition was generally bad. The universal neatness, clear, concise methods of answering questions, show most careful training.

The Writing was very neat indeed. It is recommended that in future each copy-book should have the name of the School from which the pupil comes on the outside, and that the books should be written straight through, to enable the Examiner to select series of pages in each for comparison. Thus, many of the candidates omitted the harder pages, lists of capitals, etc.

The Examiner in Spelling and Derivation reports that he has read the papers in this department with greater pleasure than formerly, owing to the excellent character of the work generally, and the very manifest improvement in some of the smaller schools.

In Geometry the work is well done in some schools, while in others it appears to have suffered in consequence of the large number of subjects more in the range of the pupils. The Reading was satisfactory, that of the Girls of Wellesley School being worthy of special notice in the Senior Fitth Book Class. In the Senior Fourth Book Class that of the Girls of Dufferin School was best. In Book-keeping the results in the Senior Fifth Book Classes were better than last year, but they were not satisfactory in the Junior Fifth Book Classes; Park School ranking first with an average of 31 per cent. The course should évidently be confined to attention

fined to business forms, with single entry struck out, or greater attention should be given to the teaching of the subject.

The Hygiene and Temperance have been well taught and the results are very creditable.

The Arithmetic and Mensuration on the whole was good. The pupils in the advanced classes, in many cases, did not finish the work of the questions, but contented themselves with simply indicating how it should be performed.

Too much stress should not be laid upon mere examination results, but they are frequently valuable indications of work done. The Examiners believe that the Public Schools of Toronto are doing great and important work, and that the Public School Teachers deserve well of our citizens.

The Examiners desire to acknowledge the valuable assistance rendered to them in the discharge of their duties by the Inspector and the teachers.

I have much pleasure in submitting the reports of the special supervisors of Music, Drawing, Writing and Drill and Calisthenics, and in reporting that these gentlemen are very faithful in the performance of their duties. They have held meetings of the teachers regularly throughout the year, with the result that the teachers are better qualified to teach these subjects, and are much more enthusiastic in regard to them than they were formerly.

## REPORTS OF THE MUSIC TEACHERS.

James L. Hughes, Esq. :

DEAR SIR,—The Senior Third, Fourth and Fifth Book Classes under my supervision, with some few exceptions, are showing a satisfactory progress under their respective teachers, most of whom are taking an increasing interest in understanding and preparing the lessons to be taught.

I am justified in anticipating in the future a more general improvement in the singing, as the teachers become more and more familiar with the work, and also on account of the increased attendance at my Saturday morning singing-class for teachers, one-third of whom now attend.

## James L. Hughes, Esq., Inspector Toronto Public Schools:

DEAR SIR, — In presenting my annual report on Music in classes under my charge it gives me much pleasure to be able to state that the results secured during the past year, have been, in many respects, much superior to those of previous years. At the

proper

beginning of the year we had to contend with a serious difficulty in the fact that a large number of teachers had just entered the service of the Board, nine-tenths of whom had never previously taught music in public schools, and were mostly unfamiliar with the subject. Classes for the training of teachers were formed in the Mission Hall during the spring session, and in Elizabeth Street School during the fall session. These were attended by all of the recently appointed teachers, and by many others who had formerly attended similar classes and were desirous of further improvement in teaching the subject. The classes were well attended, and considerable interest was manifested by the teachers in the work. During the autumn session I made a careful examination of the three hundred and forty classes in my department, in order to ascertain the comparative degrees of success with which the various subdivisions of the subject were taught. In nearly all classes I found that modulator-drill, sight-singing, and time exercises were exceedingly well taught, the results in many instances, exceeding my expectations. Voice training showed considerable improvement, the quality of tone being more mellow and sympathetic than in any previous year. Shouting, which was formerly the rule, has now become the exception. Although satisfied with the improvement in this direction which has thus far been made, it would be unwise to remain so, as we have simply succeeded in repressing the tendency to produce coarse, strident quality of tone by a negative effort. This must be followed by a positive effort to build up a tone of pure, clear resonant quality without which there is a danger of being content with a small volume of merely soft tone which invariably proves depressing alike to hearers and singers. The results in ear-training have proved least satisfactory of any. This is attributable to two causes. These are, first, a lack of appreciation of the educational value of ear-training; and second, a want of confidence, on the part of teachers, in their ability to conduct the exercises by using their voices in the presence of the classes. These exercises are intended not merely as a means of ear training, but are invaluable in training pupils to observe musical effects and gain a clear conception of musical tones, and phrases without which it is impossibly to make successful readers of music or intelligent singers.

During the present year I purpose making a special effort to improve the teaching in this respect, and am confident that with the same enthusiastic co-operation on the part of the regular teachers which I have experienced in the past, the results will be as satisfactory as in the other branches.

During the first three months of the year I conducted classes for chorus practice in the Western and Eastern districts of the city which were attended by about four hundred pupils from the various schools. By the kind permission of the Board of Trustees a concert was given on the evening of March 21st, which was pronounced by the press a complete success. Captain Thompson's Broom Drill Corps and Calisthenic Class rendered valuable assistance in adding to the success of the entertainment.

During the month of June the chorus was enlarged to fourteen hundred, and rehearsals were held on four afternoons per week, after school hours, in order to prepare for the school children's concert on Dominion Day in connection with the Summer Carnival. 'This concert was admitted to be one of the most successful events connected with the celebration. The honors were equally shared by Captain Thompson's Calisthenic classes which were represented by two hundred girls drawn from various schools. When it is considered that all of the choruses were prepared in the short space of four weeks, without interfering in any way with the regular studies, it must be admitted that this is a most satisfactory proof of the excellence of the teaching done by the regular teachers in the short time allotted to the teaching of music in curriculum.

Too much cannot be said of the value of such chorus pracice as a factor in the education of the young. Music is not a nere amusement or recreation, but is one of the most refining gents that can be used in the development and formation of haracter. Space will not permit of the enumeration of the nany benefits arising from a thorough training in the art of nusic, mentally or physically considered. I would urgently ecommend that chorus classes be formed annually in order hat all pupils musically inclined may have the opportunity of tudying music of a standard as high as compatible with the bilities of the pupils. Many of the children in the poorer

localities have little or no opportunity of intercourse with music after leaving school, and every effort should be made to make the musical training as complete and thorough as possible during the time when this is available.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF DRAWING.

## To James L. Hughes, Esq. :

DEAR STR,—Regarding the drawing in the Toronto Public Schools, it affords me much pleasure to report that the work of the classes from Junior First Book to Senior Fifth Book during the past year has been most satisfactory, and the results obtained were in most cases even better than I had hoped for.

The drawing books now are remarkably uniform as to neatness and careful execution, and the prospects are that next year every class will do better work than ever before. The teachers heve, without exception, worked with me and helped me to the utmost of their ability, and the present satisfactory state of the work is due to their faithfulness and enthusiasm.

. In some Junior First Book Classes drawing books have been used by way of experiment, and the specimens of work obtained from them are sufficient to prove not only that very young children are capable of drawing with pencil on paper, but also that in schools where it is commenced so early a beneficial influence is exerted over the work of the other classes.

The Junior classes have been using the Kindergarten practice drawing books, and the Senior classes the ordinary blank drawing books, and in my estimation these books have been instrumental in bringing about the great improvement that has taken place.

Owing to the large number of classes under my charge, I, find it impossible to do much actual teaching outside of the Fourth work of any assi

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF WRITING.

James L. Hughes, Esq., Inspector Toronto Public Schools:

During the past year I have had the supervision of Writing in the City Public Schools, and have given instruction and directions in the various classes, from Senior I. to Senior III. inclusive.

The progress of the pupils in this subject has been satis factory, and in many classes the improvement has been quite marked; this improvement should continue, and become more manifest as the pupils, trained systematically from the beginning, rise from grade to grade.

My aim is to teach (1) correct pen-holding, (2) freedom of movement by means of gymnastics in writing, (3) the proper forms of letters, and (4) legibility and rapidity of writing.

In connection with this work I have endeavored to impress strongly the necessity of neatness and legibility in Exercise and Dictation Books, and of assuming a proper position of body, hand and pen in doing all work, and am pleased to be able to report a decided improvement in these respects. For the good results obtained great credit is due to the teachers of the classes, who have performed their work diligently and faithfully, and have attended in good numbers the Saturday classes organized for the purpose of perfecting them in the art, and of discussing and illustrating the best methods of teaching it. Without their hearty co-operation my efforts would have been of little avail.

## REPORT OF THE DRILL INSTRUCTOR.

## To James L. Hughes, Public School Inspector :

DEAR SIR,—I respectfully submit for your consideration the following report on Military Drill and Physical Culture in the Public Schools for the year 1890.

In the year great progress was made in this branch of education. The principals and teachers have not only assisted me, but have entered into the real spirit of the work, thereby greatly increasing the good effect military drill and physical exercises have on the body and the mind. The improvement in discipline in our schools is in no small degree due to regular systematic drill and physical exercise, and teachers very generally admit this to be true.

Every class in the schools from the Junior Third Book class up has had instruction in military drill or physical culture by me twice in each month during the school terms.

The following is an outline of the work in Drill and Physical Culture :

Third Book Classes (Boys): Squad drill in single rank and physical training.

Junior Fourth Book Classes (Boys): Squad drill in two ranks and physical training.

Senior Fourth Book Classes (Boys) : Rifle exercise, company drill and physical training.

Fifth Book Classes (Boys): Rifle exercise, company drill, physical training, with and without arms.

Junior Classes (Girls): Free calisthenics.

Senior Classes (Girls). Free calisthenics and marching.

In addition to free calisthenics the following forms of gymnastics have been introduced into some of the schools :

Dumb bells, Wellesley School.

Rings, Ryerson School.

Wands, Victoria School.

During the year sixteen instruction classes in drill and physical culture were held for the teachers, at the Victoria Hall. They were well attended, and the teachers expressed their pleasure at being granted the privilege of attending the classes. I would respectfully recommend that the classes be continued, so that all teachers who wish may be able to attend, and that certifisates be granted.

During the year the Public School Battalions were on parade as follows: The annual games, June 28th; Dominion Day; School Children's day at the Exhibition, September 12th; and the Anniversary of the Battle of Queenston Heights, October 13th.

The senior companies of Dufferin, Ryerson and Wellesley schools had the honor of forming a Guard of Honor to His Excellency the Governor-General at the Exhibition. His Excelency evinced great interest in the boys, and made particular nquiry as to their training, and was so well pleased with their ppearance that he ordered that they be formed into squares, then he addressed them, complimenting them very highly.

The parade held on the 13th October deserves special menon, it being the largest and best parade of the school battalions ver held, there being on parade 27 companies, nearly 1200 boys. oo much credit cannot be given to the principals and teachers or the able assistance given me in making this the finest celebraon of the anniversary of the Battle of Queenston Heights, so reat a success.

In conjunction with Mr. Cringan's pupils 300 girls of the nior classes took part in a concert held in the Main Buildings, chibition Park, on Dominion Ivay. The work done in physical lture was admitted by competent judges to be the best exhibin ever given by school children in Toronto.

I strongly recommend that a similar entertainment be given nually, as it is a great inducement to the pupils to become pficient in their exercises; as the boys have an annual exhibin of their work, why not the girls?

I would very much like to see in connection with our school talions a fife and drum band. Mr. Cringan has had expe-

rience in conducting similar bands, and would no doubt be willing to take charge and instruct them.

## SPECIAL SCHOOL FOR NEWSBOYS.

The special work formerly conducted in Mission Hall by Miss H. How and her assistants has been much more satisfactory in every respect since it was transferred to Elizabeth Street School. There are now three departments of work under 'Miss How's supervision. The ordinary classes conducted by Miss How and Miss Sims, the Kindergarten under the care of Miss Bolton and Miss Hegler, and the new class for Newsboys taught by Miss Fortune. All these departments are doing excellent work. The city now requires every newsboy to attend school at least two hours per day. Most of the Protestant newsboys attend our regular Public Schools, and those who do not do so have to attend Miss Fortune's class in Elizabeth Street School or forfeit their licenses.

The arrangement is working well. The boys have accepted the duty laid upon them gracefully. There are 39 boys now in attendance at Miss Fortune's class, several of them attend for more than two hours per day, and the conduct of the class has been respectful and submissive.

## THE VICTORIA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

The attendance at the Industrial School has steadily increased. There are now one hundred and forty-three pupils in the Institution A new cottage was opened during the year, and it then becaus necessary to appoint an additional teacher. The boys have been making rapid progress in their studies under Mrs. Warburton and Miss Brown, and have entered heartily into the performance of their duties in the various workships and on the farm. Mr. McKinnon's kind management has secured their hearty co-operation, and the institution will now compare favorably with much older schools of a similar character in the United States. The new school building will soon be ready for opening. The pupils are rapidly attaining to a high degree of efficiency in music and drill under the training of Mr. Cringan and Captain Thompson.

## THE CITY TRAINING CLASS.

The most important work in connection with a school system is ecuring a supply of well trained teachers. In Ontario all teachers ave to attend one of the Provincial Normal Schools before they can eceive second-class professional certificates. The previous training given in the County and City Model Schools. The usual term in a Model School is four months. In Toronto the term lasts a full year. n all model schools the students receive professional training only. n order that the training may be as practical as possible, and so that he students may apply the principles taught to them, and thus learn hem definitely, the students in training teach the advanced classes the twenty-four Kindergartens in the afternoon, under the superision and direction of Mrs. Arthurs. This plan is working admirably. he students receive instruction and criticisms each school day in he forenoon from Mrs. Arthurs, and once a week from Mr. cAllister, Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Doan, Mr. Hendry, Mr. wis and myself. In the afternoons they teach the senior pils from the Kindergarten in the rooms occupied by the Kinderrtens in the morning. This arrangement makes the transition om the Kindergarten to the Public School easy and natural. Durthe early part of the term the students visit the Kindergartens d primary classes as much as possible to learn the methods of ining practised in them.

# SUPT. OF BUILDINGS' ANNUAL REPORT.

#### To The Toronto Public School Board :

GENTLEMEN,—In compliance with Clause 2, Section 15, Bylaws and Regulations of the Board, I have the honor of submitting my Second Annual Report.

Appended to this report will be found Statistical Tables showing the total value of Public School property, and giving in detail all important particulars relating to Sites, Buildings, Furniture, Fuel, etc.

#### NEW BUILDINGS, ETC.

During the year just closed there have been five new schools opened which were in course of erection and completion at the time my Annual Report was made one year ago. These were Hamilton Street, Crawford Street, George Street, Huron Street, and McCaul Schools.

Enlargements have been made by three additional rooms to Brant Street School, and four additional rooms to Phoebe Street School. These rooms are all now occupied and the work in connection with the two schools practically completed.

Alterations and additions have also been made to the Board Offices by ensarging the building to provide new rooms for the Inspector's Offices, and an entire re-arrangement of the interior of other offices, providing an additional room and other much needed accommodation for Secretary-Treasurer's Offices.

Caretaker's residences have been erected and are now occupied in connection with the following schools :—Bolton Avenue, Duke Street, Huron Street, Lansdowne, Ryerson and Wellesley. Residences for oaretakers have also been purchased and fitted up in connection with Brant Street, Gladstone Avenue and Dufferin Schools.

With these improved accommodations, the Board has been enabled during the year to entirely abolish the bad and long continued custom of allowing caretakers and their families to reside in the basements of school buildings.

Committee have received and recommended acceptance of tenders for the erection of this building.

Plans and specifications have also been prepared for the erection of a two-room school in connection with the Girl's Home, but instead of proceeding with this, an agreement has been decided upon by which the building is to be erected by the managers of the Girl's Home and the School Board to pay rental of \$220 per annum for the use of same.

Repairs have been made at the various buildings amounting to \$22,000.

There is now in course of erection the new twelve-room Church Street School, immediately in rear of the old building, and an enlargement to Dovercourt School by four additional rooms.

These are both well advanced, and will be completed ready for opening next September.

A caretaker's residence is also in course of erection at Pheebe Street School, which will be occupied early in the spring.

The total expenditure for the year in this Department, including sites, new buildings, repairs, furniture and supplies, amount to slightly over \$150,000; and the total value of property now owned by this Board, as shown by Schedule G appended, is \$1,366,716.

A very noticeable change for the better is being rapidly brought about in the general appearance of our School premises, by the work of setting-out trees and shrubs and sodding yards and boulevards when grounds and streets are in shape to permit of such work, s During the year 1890, the Board furnished 277 ornamental or shade trees, 249 shrubs, and 4.740 foliage and flowering plants, and did 5,500 square yards of sodding at the various schools. This work of beautifying school premises

meets with a hearty response from teachers and pupils in further carrying it out by good care generally being given to flower beds, etc.

A most striking change in the appearance of many of our school buildings, and undoubtedly one of the wisest expenditures ever made by this Board, by reason of its far-reaching influence, has been made by the placing on them of thirty flag-poles, and providing new flags, so that on suitable occasions no less than thirty-nine Dominion flags may be seen proudly floating from our school buildings.

By a careful study of the various Schedules of Statistics, many items of information are to be found which would suggest changes, some large and some small, desirable and necessary to place the different schools on a fair basis with each other, in point of accommodation and equipment.

I shall not undertake to call particular attention to each or all of these various points, but will endeavor to touch only on the more important matters calling for immediate or rapid changes in the procuring of the best appliances and most economical and efficient service in the work of this department, and in its co-operation with the other departments.

#### HARDWOOD FLOORS.

A great saving is becoming conspicuous in the use of hardwood floors, which have been laid the past few years. While the life of a pine floor is only three to five years, the wear on our maple floors during this same time is scarcely perceptible, and the advantage is not only seen in the difference in wear but in cleanliness as well. The ease of sweeping and almost entire immunity from dust of rooms having hardwood floors is of the greatest assistance to a good degree of neatness, and becomes at once an important factor in the healthfulness of the class rooms. By the regular application, during holidays, of a light coat of oil to these hardwood floors, which was begun last midsummer vacation, there seems to under we when eve class hard have hard

seems to be a constant improvement rather than deterioration under wear and such treatment. I trust the day is not far distant when every class-room in our school buildings will have a firstclass hardwood floor. As will be seen by Schedule D, we now have hardwood floors in 195 class-rooms.

#### BLACKBOARDS.

One of the most important matters and, at the same time, a most difficult one to deal with in school buildings, so far, has been the question of blackboards.

While most of our Schoois are well and even splendidly equipped in this respect, still the fact stands out that good, permanent boards are expensive. As to the quality and durability of slate there is no question, and on the point of economy I would favor a continuance of its use as the only kind suitable for what we term the working boards.

With the composition boards, while their cost is much less than slate, and we have of late had some really excellent boards of this kind put in, still their durability is not to be compared with slate, inasmuch as it becomes necessary with much use to coat them over in some way to renew the surface. So the composition boards would have to be classed as expensive.

Within the last year or two we have used the liquid slating sufficiently to form an intelligent opinion as to its merits, and I am led to believe, that if this material continues to bear out present indications, it will be found satisfactory for use in much new work, and replacing old where we have had the more expensive kinds. Particularly will this be true for such boards as those on which work is done and allowed to stand for weeks or months and even a year without change. The foregoing comparisons will be more fairly understood, perhaps, by having with them the cost of the several kinds of blackboards mentioned, which are as follows : Slate,  $$2.47\frac{1}{2}$ ; composition, \$1.20; and liquid slating, 23c. per square yard.

#### FURNITURE.

The great improvements which have been made in the furniture of our schools is worthy of more than a passing notice.

A large quantity of new furniture has been supplied, and much more as good as new has been made by repairing and re-finishing of old work. Many of the worst old desks have been culled out and sold as old iron.

The store-room is still crowded with old furniture which is being repaired and made suitable for further use.

Still further changes are undoubtedly necessary in this line, but with the work of <sup>1</sup>repairing as indicated above, and a gradual redistribution to comply with the new regulations as to numbers to be allowed in classes of different grades, I hope soon to be able to report that there is no furniture in use in our schools but what is suitable for its place and purpose.

There is an urgent necessity for a larger supply of plain chairs to be distributed through the schools, so that each one may have a fair number and equal proportion, thereby doing away with the necessity of renting and handling large numbers of chairs for special occasions, as has been the custom in the past.

It will be seen, by reference to Schedule F, that some schools have an average of only one and two chairs per room, while others have an average of nine and eleven.

The purchase of 700 additional chairs at a cost of about \$275, would furnish an avarage of five to each class-room by re-distributing those already on hand. This arrangement would give to the larger schools ninety to one hundred chairs, which would be available at any time and convenient for bringing together in any part of the building for special occasions. Or a still better provision for this and another need together, in my oplinion, would be to fit up an assembly-room in the upper flat at Elizabeth Street School, which is not now in use, for use of

#### FUEL

By reference to Schedules I and J of Statistics, will be seen the cost of fuel for season of 1889-1890, and all details in regard to this important item in the cost of maintaining our schools.

By comparison with the report for season of 1888-89 the present report shows a more economical use of fuel, which is almost entirely due to better efforts in this regard on the part of caretakers, and their longer experience in the work.

There is every reason to believe, that in the reports of the next season or two, we shall find a very considerable reduction in the quantity of fuel consumed with as good or better results in heating than have been obtained in the past.

As one means to this end I shall endeavor to secure a more uniform standard by which the daily temperature reports shall be taken. These reports have only been taken for a short time and I do not consider them yet as having been placed on a satisfactory basis.

#### JOBBING WORK.

Many times during the past year the impression has been forced upon me that the Board could effect a handsome saving in the items of repairs to buildings and in cartage by employing regular help for this purpose, and I am now fully pursuaded that the opportunity is favorable for such a change to be made to begin the present year with.

During the year 1889 the Board paid \$149.05 and in 1890, \$336.07 direct on accounts for cartage. Besides these accounts, by far the larger part of cost of supplying ink, and a large part of tinsmith's accounts for moving stoves, etc, as well as numerous

items in jobbing and contractor's accounts are made up of cartage, all of which could be done by the Board's own help if provided. In 1800 the schools were supplied with four hundred and forty-seven gallons of ink, at contract price of ninety cents per gallon. Looking to the future we would require about five hundred gallons per year, which could be manufactured in our own store-room with an insignificant expense for facilities, at a cost of fifteen cents, per gallon, thus saving enough on this one item alone in one year to pay for a horse, waggon and harness. Good stabling for these is available without any expense at the store-house. But the direct saving as indicated above is only a small part of the gains to be realized by such an arrangement Under the present system, the caretakers are obliged to lose the forenoon of one Saturday every month in calling at the offices for supplies, and this is the time when, of all the week, it is most necessary that they should remain on the school premises in order to do the general cleaning up of buildings, yard, etc., as required by the rules of the Board. This defect in the present system would be entirely obviated by having our own express to send out supplies. Even now many times packages of supplies are too large for caretakers to handle on foot or by street car.

One trip of our own express waggon would accomplish the same work that two, three or more trips now do as divided up between expressmen, contractors and caretakers.

By the employment regularly of a good mechanic for repairs to buildings, etc., who would have the help of teamster when not otherwise needed, I believe the Board would effect a very large saving in the repair account, to the extent of avoiding almost entirely the necessity of having jobbing or repairs done except of such an extent and nature as can be satisfactorily tendered and contracted for.
