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**DOMINION PARLIAMENT.**  
**The Price of Cotton.**  
MR. PARKS BEFORE THE AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE.  
COTTON AS CHEAP AS IN 1878.  
In his evidence before the Committee appointed to inquire into the effect of the National Policy of the Agricultural Interest, Mr. J. H. Hervey, the well-known Cotone manufacturer, of St. John, said he was now employing 400 hands; in 1878 he only employed 150, so that the N. P. had given employment to 250 hands in his establishment alone. The examination was continued by the Chairman, as follows:—  
Q. What class of cotton goods do you manufacture?  
A. Cotton yarns, carpet warp, warp for woolen mills, grey cottons, and shirting.  
Q. Can you provide the Canadian consumer as cheaply as before the tariff came into operation?  
A. Our prices are as low as they were considering the price of raw material has increased, it must be borne in mind, since 1878. The cost of raw cotton in the American market in January, 1878, was ten cents per pound. In January, 1882, the cost was twelve cents per pound. In 1878, the cost of the same quality of cotton was 2 1/2 cents. To these prices one-eighth of a cent has to be added as freight to the mill. Our prices, comparing 1878 with 1882, are as follows:—Cotton yarns from numbers 7 to 10, for weaving purposes, were in January, 1878, 23 cents per pound, less our discount of 10 per cent. The price now is 24 1/2 cents. The same article cost 40 cents per pound net cash at Morse, Kneely & Co.'s mills, New Hampshire, in 1878. The price now is 45 cents. In those there is an increase of 10 per cent. Therefore, in view of the increase in the price of raw material, the manufactured article is 2-10 of a cent cheaper relatively than it was in 1878.  
Q. So that compared with the prices in 1878 the prices are really cheaper?  
A. A shade cheaper. I have lately commenced the manufacture of ball knitting cotton, and I am selling it at the same price at which it is sold by American manufacturers in the United States. Number six which sold for me, taking the discounts into consideration, at 39-61 cents per pound net cash in Toronto, London, Hamilton, &c. The same article cost 40 cents per pound net cash at Morse, Kneely & Co.'s mills, New Hampshire, in 1878. The price now is 45 cents. In those there is an increase of 10 per cent. Therefore, in view of the increase in the price of raw material, the manufactured article is 2-10 of a cent cheaper relatively than it was in 1878.  
Q. Do you think the Canadian consumer would obtain the classes of goods now at the same price as he does if there were no manufacturer of such goods in Canada?  
A. No, I am sure he would pay more.  
Q. Why?  
A. Well, take this article of ball knitting cotton, in which there is a good profit. The price of the article, the price had not been changed for several years, but since we have commenced to manufacture, the American manufacturer has struggled to keep the Canadian market by increasing his discount to Canadians from five to ten per cent, so that the consumer is enabled to purchase goods as cheaply as he does if there were no manufacturer of such goods in Canada.  
Q. If the American manufacturer gives a discount to overcome the duty he virtually pays the duty?  
A. I think so.  
Q. The board of tariff makes the same discount to Americans as to Canadians?  
A. They make a larger discount to Canadians than to Americans.

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**The Steamship Peruvian.**  
Quebec, May 23.—The steamship Peruvian, which has been 25 days out, arrived in port at 5 p. m. to-day in tow of the tug Rocket, and the steamship Acadia from St. Pierre Michelon. Her passage was both an eventful and a tedious one, owing to ice, snow storms, fog, and damage to screw, and at one time she owed her safety to a providential change in the wind. Off Cape Bay her difficulties began. A few days previous icebergs were seen, but on the morning of May the 7th, the tenth day after sailing, nothing was seen, but an immense field of ice as far as the eye could reach, and about a dozen ships were passed during the day which had come to anchor, waiting for the ice to break. At 11 o'clock that night the Peruvian was unable to proceed any further. The next morning she put on all steam, and made a desperate effort to break her way through  
THE ICE BARRIER,  
but had not gone far before she broke her screw and lay helplessly fast. The SS. Lake Huron lay in sight behind, and two other steamers, one of which was supposed to be the Polynesian. On May 9th a snow-storm set in, whose dispiriting effect it took all the efforts of the most persistent Mark Tapleys on board to counteract. On the 10th the outlook was still far from cheering. The storage passengers were reduced to SHORT RATIONS.  
In the event of the vessel being detained in the ice for a month, which then appeared to be by no means an unlikely event, biscuits were ordered to be served out every other morning and oatmeal gruel was allowed for the remainder of the time, which was keenly felt by the women and children. On the 11th the ice began to move, but the vessel made very little progress. The weather was beautifully clear, and at night the northern lights made a magnificent display. Nothing eventful occurred to disturb the monotony on board until the 14th, when  
A COMMOTION AROSE  
over the apprehension of a man who had been caught rifling some trunks. Some of them would have lynched him had it not been for the intervention of the steward, and the remainder of the trip the man had to be escorted to meals and go on deck for safety until he was landed at St. John. The Lake Huron had by this time got up steam, and cleared her way through the floating ice. On the 16th not a vessel was in sight, and the ice became thicker than ever, and she was blown so close to land that it was  
FEARED SHE WOULD GO ABOARD,  
but the wind veering round she was enabled to get out into the open sea again. On the 19th a schooner hove in sight and was signalled. A boat was lowered, and the purser got on board, with the purser to make for the nearest telegraph station to send news to Quebec. At 8 p. m. he had not returned, though anxiously expected, and rockets were fired every ten minutes. On the 18th the schooner came in sight, but could not get alongside, owing to the ice, and the captain and purser were fired every ten minutes. ENTHUSIASTIC Liberal Conservative Meeting AT OTTAWA.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD was received with loud and enthusiastic cheering, which lasted several minutes. He referred to what had been done by him for Ottawa, and told how Ottawa had stood by him in the evil days when his party were overwhelmed with calumny...

BEFORE THEIR FIVE YEARS were out, although the taxes were raised 24 per cent. by Mr. Cartwright—I beg his pardon, Sir Richard Cartwright—although he said that there would be sufficient, still by some unfortunate accident the country was left in debt. Year after year the deficit increased, and when we came in Sir Richard was obliged to maintain in power, he was obliged to increase the duties. Now all is changed. (Applause.) The five years have passed, and the workmen and their friends said, "Let us go to Sir John and ask him to work for us." He did work for them, and with good results. I am proud to be able to say that every man if he does a good day's work can get a good day's wages.

THE GREAT NORTH-WEST. Then, gentlemen, in 1873, we bought the great North-West at a price which was said by our enemies to be excessive, but you now see the consequence of our policy on that occasion. That country is blooming like a rose. A thousand men a week land at Quebec and Montreal to go to our great North-West. THOUSANDS OF EMIGRANTS are pouring in there, and many others come to us through the United States, though it must be admitted that thousands remain in that country. Now, it would have been rather an unsafe thing to have encouraged immigration before we opened that country—before we had the new policy working vigorously—because we felt that while we were bound to settle the country in some way, still so long as there was no employment for the people we were already here it was not treating the older inhabitants fairly; that it was not enhancing the prosperity or improving their position if we should bring in new immigrants who would become rivals with them in the labour market which was already overfilled. But, gentlemen when we opened that great country, and instead of the immigration which is now pouring into this country being an injury to the working man it is a positive advantage to him going to that country.

AGRICULTURE IN THE NORTH-WEST. That is an agricultural country, and will be so for the next fifty years; the chief wealth and employment of the people there must be found in the growth of cereals and other crops to send to England and to supply the eastern world, and remember, gentlemen, this advantage, under our present tariff, is kept for you, for the people of Canada. THE AMERICANS CANNOT TAKE ADVANTAGE of this market without paying a heavy duty. We have sole control of that country, and are able to supply them with many things they want. (Cheers.) WHAT OTTAWA IS ENDING TO THE NORTH-WEST. From Ottawa, even, you are already sending timber houses ready made, windows, doors, sashes, already manufactured, and every man that goes to the

North-West will be a consumer of goods manufactured in the older parts of this country. In the winter months, so that we are doing two things, we are relieving the dear old Mother Country of her excess of population, and we are placing them in the North-West, where they will become happy and prosperous settlers.

MANUFACTURING FOR THE NORTH-WEST. We are also making them purchasers of everything that they need, and the manufacturers in the older provinces can produce, from a blanket or a cotton shirt to agricultural implements, an axe, or a hammer. Everything will be made in the eastern parts of Canada that is required there, and the North-West (Cheers.)

WHY THE GOVERNMENT GOES TO THE COUNTRY. Our tenure of office would not have ended, the Parliament would have lasted until October, 1883, and we, the Government of Canada, we, the fourteen Ministers who govern the Province of Canada, who have been enjoying our salaries and holding our position until a year from next October. We have succeeded to the office of the greatest consequence to Canada, and to the future prosperity of the Dominion, and we have been told that people should have an opportunity of expressing their opinion whether our policy is for or not.
