LOUIS KOSSUTH IN HIS OLD AGE.—An American in Europe furnishes the following sketch of "a shape or shadow rather," visible after taking the Austrian boundaries:—

"It is at the Gate Florian—a man of hair so white that you do not note their thinness, bowed down and meek and silent, yet very kindly-eyed, but never flushed by any period to which he comes, past the young dreams of a grand free state, but waiting yet, though death seems closer than freedom reading—the Journal all apart, so respected that not the busiest intruder does more irreverence than look with mild and loving assiduous toward where he sits, alone, aged, very thoughtful—

This is Louis Kossuth, the man of glory when I was a little boy, resented, praised, assisted man, whose thought toward our country is childlike yet, although one warm welcome made him to hope too well. I sit in a sort of affectionate fear looking at this grand, almost worn out champion of Hungary. I wonder if God is just and men are more than Ingrates in their worship, when I note how long he has lived, in sorrowful indigence a forgotten man, whose cannons humbled the Austrian so a little while gone by, and made Kaiser sliver at the forwarding of the degradation now upon him.

And as I see his sunken eyes, white lips, thin hands, half-blindness, groping amid the news for that which will cheer his eye, I remember that the Hungarian element now exceeds the German element by more than two millions. To combine these, a dualistic government is to be continued, as if the South and the North, in America, were called upon to constitute one qualified power with the inevitable fissures at the head. The end of this it is not for me to guess. Who knows that the Magyar may not build deep, strong, and popular, his republic upon the ruins of this ancient empire?"

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand and eight hundred and sixty six, and in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

Three colonels of Engineers have arrived here, it is supposed with a view of fortifying the city.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5. The war ship Niger has arrived here.—Weather clear and cold with sharp frost last night.

TORONTO, Oct. 5. Preparations are actively progressing for the trial of the Fenians, captured last June, at the approaching assizes. The best legal talent of the city is engaged on both sides.

LONDON, Oct. 6th. By the treaty between Italy and Austria, the former acquires the territory of Venetia, as it existed while under the dominion of Austria, and the debt of Venetia amounting to thirty five millions of florins is assumed by the Italian Government. A complete amnesty has been accorded by Italy to political prisoners.

TRIESTE, Oct. 7th. The insurgent movement among the Croats is spreading rapidly. The Cabinet of Greece altogether.

BERLIN, Oct. 7. The proclamation taking possession of the kingdom of Hanover was promulgated by the government yesterday, 6th. The loyalty of the people in all cases is demanded.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9. The steamer "Evening Star," from this city for New Orleans, founded at sea 180 miles east of South Carolina coast by which nearly 300 lives were lost.

The President has issued a proclamation for a National Thanksgiving November 29th.

British steamer "Queen Victoria" founded at sea on the 4th inst., lat. 33 03, long. 70 30. The passengers and crew were picked up by the brig Pomfort New York. The Engineer died from exposure and the mate was washed overboard.

A Boston paper gives a melancholy account of the present condition of the United States oil regions:—"The great oil sensation has died out. We longer hear of fortunes being made in a day, and a ten-acre tract of land selling for a fabulous price. The oil regions of Pennsylvania are all but deserted, and property which sold for thousands and thousands of dollars a year ago, can now be had for a song. The failure of Cal-

ver, Tenn. & Co. pricked the bubble, scattered the speculators to the four winds, and ruined hundreds in a financial point of view who had invested their 'all' in the prospect of striking 'oil.'"

The London Daily News of the 13th ult., says:—"The Delegates from New Brunswick, who are now in London arranging with Her Majesty's government the terms of Intercolonial railway, were recently entertained at dinner by the directors of the New Brunswick and Nova Scot Land Company, at the Star and Garter hotel, Richmond.

QUICK DISPATCH.—The steamer New York, Captain Chisholm, arrived at this port yesterday from Portland with a large cargo of flour. This, Mr. Boyer of the Custom House states was discharged at the rate of seventy barrels per minute. It is said the New York will bring several cargoes of flour from Portland this season.—[Telegraph.

THE WEATHER IN ENGLAND.—A very favorable change has (September 18) taken place in the weather in the north of England, and harvesting is going on with amazing activity in Northumberland and Durham. The reaping machine is in active request and the stackyards are beginning to fill rapidly. It is thought that no very serious damage has been done to the corn crops by the rains.

FIRE.—About half-past 8 o'clock last evening a strong reflection as from a large fire was thrown up against the sky in a north-easterly direction from the city, the wind blowing a gale at the time. The fire bells rung; but no information was obtained as to the whereabouts of the fire until this morning, when information was brought to town of the destruction of a new vessel on the stocks in the yard of Messrs. Maynes, Rothsay. She was being built under the contract for Messrs. F. Tutts and others. She was well on towards completion, the caulkers having just commenced operations, and all the joiner work, blocks, rigging, etc., was ready for launch which would take place in two or three weeks. Not a vestige of the vessel was to be seen this morning; the charred and smouldering ground strewn with bolts, only showing the destruction that had taken place. The vessel was about 400 tons burthen. The contractors will be the heaviest losers, the owners having nearly \$6000 insurance on the craft in different offices in the city which will partially cover the immediate outlay.—[Globe.

THE HUDSON'S BAY QUESTION.—The Daily News says the Hudson's Bay Company are understood to ask two million pounds for the sovereignty and the bulk of their freehold while the Imperial Government have long undertaken to guarantee one million pounds.—The shareholders may therefore look to a bargain being struck at some intervening price. The latest proposal appears to be, that the company sell with the sovereignty three-fourths in the hunting grounds. For this fourth of the fee-hold the company may exercise the right of issuing land warrants on the Stock Exchange. It is further calculated that this transfer will not interfere with the trading interest of the company, the colonisable lands being quite distinct from the hunting grounds.

It is reported that the soldier's body discovered on Blise's Island was found on the shore and buried there by two men belonging to Eastport. His belt was marked No. 29 East Riding, York.
