U.S. AND CANADIAN POSTAL CONVENTION

Increase in Maximum Indemnity for Loss of Registered Articles.

Ottawa, Dec. 4—A new postal convention between the United States and Canada to supersede the existing convention concluded in 1888, will, it is expected, be the outcome of the International Postal Conference that opened here this morning.

The first decision reached by the conference was in favor of an increase in maximum indemnity for loss of registered articles between the United States and Canada. The present maximum is \$9.65. The conference agreed that it should be increased to \$25.00.

CAMPBELLTON SCOTS CELEBRATE ST. ANDREW'S

Real jolly time at Princess Palm Room Last Thursday
Evening—Program of High Order Rendered
Good Speeches—Good Music.

Last Thursday night was a "brave night" in the Princess Palm Room here when the Caledonian Society of Restigouche celebrated with a turkey dinner the anniversary of Scotland's patron saint. A large representation of the local St. Andrew's Society was present together with many friends of the organization and the festival was replete with songs, speeches, numerous stories, Scottish reels and reminiscences both historical and personal. The speeches were colorful eulogiums of the Scottish race and glowing tributes to the land of the heather, flavored always with snatches of Scottish wit. A splendid musical programme was provided for the occasion. Piper Harry McLennan was on hand and the resonant strains of the pipes stirred the large gathering perceptibly and evoked prolonged choruses of merited applause. Two members of the Palm Room Orchestra did themselves full justice at piano and drums, while Mr. Arch. McEachern of Chatham supplied numerous selections on the violin. Mr. Mc-

Eachern, who is an artist of no mean ability, appeared to be in his best form and injected in these selections a true Scotch rhythm that won pleased smiles from the most staid and sober Scotchmen present. The dinner itself was a faultless spread and speaks well for the new management of the Princess. Much credit is also due Mrs. Edward Alexander who tastefully arranged and decorated the tables for the host of diners, thereby contributing very appreciably to the unalloyed success of this annual event. After the winner had been disposed of the assemblage was called to order by the new president, John Bissett, who made brief but appropriate remarks. He then proposed the King's health and this was responded to with the National Anthem. After a brief and fitting address by the president a toast was drunk to the society. Greetings from kindred societies in other places and the replies sent out were then read. In proposing the toast to "The Day We Honor", H. A. Carr made a speech which rivaled any of the evening. In responding R. B. Rosborough rose to the occasion in an admirable manner, giving a short address full of good thoughts. He spoke of ideals and declared that, in order to get the best out of life it was necessary to have ideals and live up to them. The speaker also paid a tribute to Scottish patriotism and expressed himself in believing that without patriotism we cannot build a nation nor produce a race worth-while. He also spoke in glowing terms of our national pride of race and expressed the hope that all Canadians will always seek to perpetuate the glorious traditions of the Scotch. At this point of the programme solos by Messrs. H. V. Musgrave and H. B. LeRoy delighted the gathering. Dr. D. Murray proposed the toast to "Our Country" and performed the duty in his usual satisfactory way. In closing his remarks he assumed a deep sobriety of mind and cautioned all who desired to be law-abiding citizens to drive to the right on their way home. W. F. Vorstan, Chaplain of the society responded to the toast with a fitting speech. He recollected famous tales of Scottish courage and chivalry and of their prominent part in the making of history. With this he linked the history of Scotch pioneers in early Canada and of this country's present fame won a Vimy Ridge by descendants of those hardy, fearless pioneers. In words pregnant with patriotism the speaker pleaded for all to lend their aid to make Canada a nation that we can be justly proud of and worthy of the sacrifices that have been made for her. The speaker ended his remarks with fitting verses of a patriotic nature. This was followed by appropriate pieces by the orchestra. "O Canada" and "The Red White and Blue" were rendered in admirable style. In proposing a toast to "Our

Friends Across the Border," H. F. McLatchey made a suitable speech. He reminded the gathering that the life and progress of Canada and the United States are inseparably woven together both industrially and socially. Each country has received money and material from the other until now these two progressive young nations both descendants of a great Mother Country are progressing virtually hand in hand. The speaker declared that for these reasons this toast ought to be heartily drunk. Mr. A. A. Barry, American Consul here, responded to the toast with fitting words of appreciation. He declared that the spirit of hospitality and kindness is shown wherever Scotch folk meet, and extended the goodwill and friendship of his brothers across the lines. A vocal selection by Mr. F. C. Schurman was the next feature of the evening, and was a number which won much applause. Rollcalling Scotch selections on the violin followed and added much to the gaiety of the hour. Following these came a lengthy recital on numerous subjects of local interest by H. R. Smith, who was in his most jovial mood. After keeping the assemblage in a high state of excitement for some time, Mr. Smith closed by giving some advice to members of the medical profession on how to collect uncertain bills. In proposing a toast to "Our Town" D. A. Stewart, the vice-president of the society, took a retrospective glance of the history of the town and touched on the principal points of progress during past years, and spoke optimistically of the outlook for the future. In closing he advocated a town club for men which he felt to be a necessity to the social life of the men of the community. In responding to this toast His Worship Mayor McKay paid a glowing tribute to Campbellton and its citizens and declared that we have every reason to be proud of the town in which we live. Touching on various phases of local government he showed that all problems were being coped with in a satisfactory and beneficial way and spoke in hopeful terms of the town's promise of advance and growth in the future. In closing he reminded the gathering that a good town was even more desirable than a big town or a busy town and declared that this resolution was the sentiment of the citizens. Although time had now progressed into the wee sma' hours, President Bissett requested a cane of the pipes and Piper McLennan responded with true Scotch graciousness, after which the gathering formed a huge circle and sang Auld Lang Syne. GAME OFFICIALS TO HOLD CONFERENCE

To Discuss Ways for Co-operation in Wild Life Conservation.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Game officials representing every province in the Dominion, together with federal officers, will meet in conference on Dec. 6, 7 and 8 to discuss ways and means of securing further co-operation in wild life conservation. The conference, which has been called by the Department of the Interior, will be an informal one, taking the form of round table talks and it is hoped that it will result in bringing out valuable suggestions with regard to wild life problems in Canada.

GUARDING NOAH'S ARK



Bacon Dickson, of this city, who is commissioner appointed by the Attorney-General's Department, conducted an investigation into the recent execution of Dennis Swim, who had to be twice hanged at Woodstock on October 5th before the death penalty had been carried out, was tabled at this morning's meeting of the Provincial Government.

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NEW ALLIES ARE NOW OPEN

Bowling Allies and Pool Room in the Boudreau Basement Opened.

With the completion of the Boudreau bowling alleys and pool room in the spacious basement of the new J. I. Boudreau building on Roseberry St. Campbellton enjoys the distinction of having one of the finest bowling alleys for its size in the eastern provinces. Many citizens who are familiar with various pleasure haunts of this kind in Montreal and other large Canadian cities declare that they possess nothing in this line that excels the Boudreau alleys for completeness of equipment and distinctive finish. The new alleys which were opened to the public on Tuesday afternoon are modern in every respect and obviously no expense has been spared to the place, one which those who bowl and play pool will be proud to visit. The apartment contains three up-to-date pool tables, one English billiard table and four regulation hardwood alleys finished and polished in apparent No. 1 style. The floors are of steel gray concrete as is also the wainscoting with the upper wall, pillars and ceilings done in a pleasing contrast of white. The lighting arrangements are also a feature of equipment for, aside from their splendid illuminating capacity, the electric light shades are of the "milky white" variety and are adjustable and of very pleasing design. The other necessary equipment is all modern as can be procured. The basement or first story of the Boudreau building is of massive concrete structure with a handsome brick front and when the additional three or four stories are added it will be a credit to the town. It is to be hoped that next summer will see its completion.

WONDERFUL CAVES. A Recent Discovery in the Nevada Forest. The Lehman Caves, in the Nevada National Forest, have been designated as a national monument. Their discovery by a ranchman, after whom they are named, was quite recent, and it may fairly be said that they make a most important addition to the list of the natural wonders of the United States; for, although less in size than the famous Mammoth Cave of Kentucky, they far surpass the latter in scenic beauty. They are located in the foothills of one of the loftiest mountains on this continent, Mount Wheeler, whose snow-capped peak towers 13,034 feet above the sea level. The formation is of limestone and is a maze of intricate and of ages hollowed enormous subterranean caverns, hung with myriads of stalactites and so fearfully carved as to present to the eye extraordinary effects. To get into them one must descend from the ground level a series of steep flights of "stairs" which lead down 125 feet to a cave called the Gothic Palace. This, only one of many spacious underground chambers, is also interesting enough to repay a visit, its roof being hung with stalactites resembling huge chandeliers, while a weird silhouette of a mastodon in limestone offers a rude contrast to a "fairy rookery."

Leaving the Gothic Palace, one enters the gateway of the Temple of the Gods, 180 feet long by sixty feet wide, with a vaulted ceiling forty feet high. From the ceiling are suspended great numbers of stalactites, fluted and so colored as to resemble onyx. Next comes the so-called Crystal Palace; then the snow room, with walls of dazzling white; then the Pine Room, which has a ceiling of alabaster pink hue; and, further on, the Coral Room, where the surroundings suggest the corals of the sea. From the Coral Room opens a small passage with an alcove containing a "fairy bridal altar" and partly barred by what looks like portieres beautifully draped. Just beyond there is a chamber, a Grecian theater of antique pattern with a little stage all set for a play. In the next chamber the visiting tourist beholds the semblance of a great pipe organ seventy-five feet high. Its pipes, of course, are stalactites, which, when struck with the cloth-wrapped end of a stick, give forth different notes, unusual and suggesting chimes. Liberty Hall is 150 by 80 feet, and in the middle is the Liberty Column, an enormous stalagmite fourteen feet in diameter which is beautifully reflected in a quiet pool of water at its base. Yet another chamber, or even greater size, 200 feet in diameter, is called the Amphitheatre, oval in shape and with a dome-like ceiling 150 feet high. Other curiosities are the Echo Chamber, the Cypress Swamp (with counter-rot pond in it) and the Parachute chamber, in which two immense white parachutes seem as if hanging from aloft. "Niagara in Winter" looks like a frozen cataract. The Vegetable Garden exhibits beets, turnips, carrots, parsnip, raw potatoes, etc., all neatly executed in stone. In one chamber is a curtain of what looks like Japanese art carving, most elaborate. The so-called Madonna resembles a statue of the Virgin and Child. "Wavy blankets," hung from aloft, are woven by nature in varied colors; and in one of the aches there is even a gigantic angel's wing, feathery and exquisite. The entrance to these wonderful caves is six miles west of the little town of Baker, Nevada. Tourists are beginning to go there in flocks. All around them is green and beautiful country, with trout streams full of fish; and close by is a little ranch-house, where folks can get waffles and chicken if they are hungry. There is also an outdoor camp, with stoves, etc., ready for use by anybody who happens to come along.

OUR SHARE OF THE BLOOD MONEY

Province Makes About One Dollar a Head on Rum Traffic.

(Fredericton Gleaner.)

Profits to the extent of more than half a million dollars have been realized by the province of New Brunswick during the past fiscal year from the distribution of liquor under the Prohibition Act by the New Brunswick Liquor Commission and receipts under the New Brunswick Liquor Exporters' Tax Act.

Estimates presented in the last session of the Legislature showed \$250,000 as the anticipated receipts from each of these two sources during the fiscal year and it is understood that the gross amount has now been reached, although no figures have been made public and officials are diffident about discussing the matter.

Some time ago, however, it was said that more than \$220,000 had been received under the Liquor Exporters Tax Act and there have been considerable receipts since that time as well as a judgment by the Court of Appeal sustaining the principle of the Act and ordering the Security Export Company to pay in over \$60,000 of disputed taxes upon a shipment of about 49,000 gallons of liquor.

The Liquor Commission, it is said, have had their balance sheet completed for the fiscal year and it was said today to show profits of somewhat more than \$250,000, the official estimate. Just what the figures actually are has not been stated but it is said they are under \$300,000.

So Opposition Journal Published At Quebec Will Say.

Quebec, Nov. 30.—The Quebec Chronicle will say tomorrow: "At a caucus of the Liberal party held tonight, the principal questions discussed were: The liquor law, the roads' law and the election. "It is understood that the government would like to prorogue the session Dec. 23, and that eighteen days later the legislature will be dissolved and the general elections fixed for about the middle of February."

LUSITANIA CARRIED NO GUNS OR TROOPS

Official Report of Cargo Made Public—Shows Some Ammunition Was Carried.

New York, Dec. 8.—The Cunard liner Lusitania, sunk by a German submarine in 1915 off the Irish coast, carried neither guns, troops, nor explosives, but did carry 5,400 cases of ammunition, but the official report of the vessel's cargo made public by Dudley Field Malone, collector of the port at the time, shows, according to a copy-righted story in the New York World.

The cases of ammunition, the report stated, were carried by specific permission under rulings of the department of commerce in force since 1911.

BISHOP OF GASPE QUEBEC STUDENT

Was Born in Matane, But Received Classical Education At Quebec.

Quebec, Dec. 4.—Monsignor Francis Xavier Ross, who has been appointed Bishop of the new diocese of Gaspe is at present vicar-general of the diocese of St. Germain of Rimouski, and which comprises parishes in the counties of Bonaventure, Gaspe, Matane, Rimouski and Temiscouata.

The bishop-elect was born at Grosse Roche, Matane, in 1869, and is now in his 53rd year. He is the son of Joseph Ross, a farmer, and Madeline Gendron, being a descendant of a Scottish soldier who settled along the coast following the abandonment of the regiment after the capitulation.

Mgr. Ross received his classical education in Quebec and completed his studies in Rome. He was ordained at Rimouski on the 19th of May, 1894, by the late Mgr. A. A. Blais, then bishop of Rimouski. Following his ordination Mgr. Ross acted as secretary to Bishop Blais until 1898 when he was appointed parish priest at St. Laurent de Matapedia, remaining here until 1898. In that year he was transferred to the parish of Anse-au-Caseaux in Bonaventure, where he remained until 1901. The then Father Ross was next moved to St. Louis de Ha! Ha! in Temiscouata, and there he built a church and the priest's residence.

In 1906 Father Ross returned to Rimouski and was there appointed principal of the Normal School. He was named titular canon and became vicar-general to Bishop Blais on the 10th of Dec. 1910. Mgr. Ross, the death of the latter and the accession was appointed vicar-general to the present incumbent.

Bishop-elect Ross has been noted for his interest in educational matters and has contributed numerous articles as well as a volume, on that subject.

CURRIE HELPED WIN THE WAR

Gave Advice Which Was Adopted By Foch in Great Drive.

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—Official reports of the Canadian corps and a highly important chapter to the Foch-Haig controversy—aroused by the publication "Sir Douglas Haig, Command" by A. E. Dewar and Lieut.-Colonel Boraston. The theme of the book is that it was Haig and not Foch who planned the counter-offensive that won the war. Records of the Canadian corps do not touch on the sharp clashes between Haig and Foch alleged in the book, but they show that suggestions made by Sir Arthur Currie, commander of the Canadian corps, were adopted in the plan of attack that led to the first crossing of the Hindenburg line.

New York, Dec. 2.—The Sun publishes the following: "Evidence of the return of Canadian coins that have begun to appear again in the small change of New York. Canadian paper was at one time as much as 15 per cent. discount, and has gradually come back until within the last few weeks American money has actually been at a slight discount in Canada.

"A Canadian coin that is not likely to be familiar to New Yorkers is the penny, of the same size as the American penny. Before the war Canadian dimes and quarters were common enough in this city, but pennies from across the border seldom traveled this far."

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

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

Several ventures were obliged to hire an extra clerk and the whole staff seems to be busy. The company are loading lumber in cars and this will keep many men at work. Their planning mill is running every day and gives them all they can do to fill orders.

Mr. Isidor Day has employed about thirty men cutting logs on the Indian Reserve for parties in Campbellton. These logs will come out the Restigouche River and Mr. Day contemplates on one million during the winter.

Mr. James Comeau has been engaged by Mr. T. W. Way, representing a large lumber firm in New York to buy all the pulp wood he can procure in this district. As a fair price is offered, some three or four thousand cords will be bought during the winter.

"Would Wake Up Screaming" "The Least Sudden Noise or Loud Talking Would Startle Him."

Up to the age of eight, my boy was a strong, healthy lad, full of life and energy. While playing leap frog one day with some boys of his own age, and while in a stooped position, a big boy jumped on his back and in falling my boy caught his foot in an iron grate and dislocated his hip. The pain was so great that he fainted and the other boys were so frightened they ran away. For hours he suffered terrible pain and was very weak, with his thigh and leg swollen twice its size. The doctor set the bone but the pain and exposure were too much for the poor boy and he became unconscious. A high fever set in and for weeks he lay between life and death raving for hours at a stretch. One day he opened his eyes and murmured "Mother," but this is the only word he could utter he was so weak, but I knew the worst was over. He got stronger but for months was in a nervous condition. The least sudden noise or loud talking would startle him and he would begin trembling. He was quite lame and the swelling still remained. The doctor gave him a tonic and told me to rub the leg with olive oil. This reduced the swelling and took away the lameness, but the nervousness remained. ACQUITTAL OF JEAN F. POULIOT

Criminal Libel Charged by Dr. Parrot, ex-M. P. P. Not Proven.

Rimouski, Que., Dec. 2.—Jean Francois Pouliot, Riviere du Loup lawyer, against whom a charge of criminal libel was made by Dr. Parrot, former member of the legislative assembly for Tamicousta county, was acquitted last night in the Rimouski court when the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. The case arose out of charges made by J. F. Pouliot against Dr. Parrot and forced the latter to resign his seat in the assembly, early in the summer of 1921. Later in the summer a convention was held at Riviere du Loup to choose a candidate for the vacancy, and on the eve of the convention J. F. Pouliot published a circular entitled "The Other Side of the Case," in which he made additional charges against Dr. Parrot. The circular was made against him in Dr. Parrot's paper, Le St. Laurent, it was in connection with these additional charges that Dr. Parrot preferred the charge of criminal libel.

RATES OF PAY TO BE INCREASED

Slight Increase Granted Maintenance of Way and Shop Men.

Montreal, Dec. 2.—An agreement was concluded here Friday afternoon between the wage sub-committee of the Railway Association of Canada and the men's committee of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way men and railway shop laborers, providing that, effective as of November 1, rates of pay for employees covered by the agreement will be increased on an average rate of two cents an hour. The agreement was signed in the offices of the Railway of negotiations which have been proceeding for the past week or ten days. Before it goes finally into effect it must be ratified by the operating committee of the railway association of Canada.

Approximately 40,000 Canadian railway employees who come under the category of maintenance of way men will benefit by the new arrangement. There remains not only the dispute between the Canadian railway companies and the shop craft employees and another attempt to come to a final settlement in this long drawn out wage dispute will be made next week, the shopmen's committee representatives meeting here next Monday. As soon as they meet they will be informed of the result of the ballot to determine whether there shall be a strike or acceptance. This result which was known to union officials on November last has been kept a close secret.

LITTLE NEWCASTLE BOY SERIOUSLY BURNED

Newcastle, N. B., Dec. 1.—Deputy Sheriff Doren's little four-year-old boy Morrissey, was badly burned in his home Thursday morning. Just after the child got out of bed he got hold of a match when he lighted and set fire to his flannel night dress. Mr. Doren heard the child scream and when he reached him found his clothing in flames. The burning clothes were torn from the little child as quickly as possible, but it was found that he was very badly burned about the head and chest. His condition Thursday was very serious. Mr. Doren's hands were severely burned.

BOOSTING BOY SCOUT WORK

Plans to Establish Four Big National Boy Scout Centres.

New York, Dec. 4.—The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, carrying out its programme of expansion, has announced its proposed opening four big national centres of the expert training of about executives.

Plans are on foot to establish the first of these near New York. It is hoped to establish others, probably one in the middle of the west, one in the far west, and one in the south.

This headquarters in the field will furnish an opportunity to concentrate experimental work as well as furnish an excellent training centre, especially for courses in "How to Train Scoutmasters."

From now until next February the scout organization will conduct a campaign for more members. It is hoped to increase the enrollment by 100,000 scouts, or twenty-five per cent. of the present membership.

BIG MONEY FROM THE SEA

Fish Caught in Canadian Waters During Oct Worth Nearly \$1,500,000.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—Despite unfavorable weather conditions which prevailed on the Atlantic coast during October, landings of sea fish in Canada during the month, was 679,897 cwts., as compared with 490,206 cwts. in October last year.

The total catch of cod, haddock, hake and pullock during the month was 156,848 cwts., as compared with 127,889 the corresponding month of last year.

Mackerel taken amounted to 29,051 cwts. as against 15,429 cwts. in October, 1921. The total mackerel catch for the year is 240,331 cwts. as against 141,855 cwts. last year.

Smelt and oyster seasons opened during the month. There were 2,346 cwts. of the former and 10,620 bbls. of the latter taken.

FANOU'S DWARFS

General Tom Thumb Would Not Attract Attention Now.

The first dwarf to be widely exhibited was the famous Tom Thumb. As a pigmy, he would attract little attention nowadays, his height being 34 inches.

Richard Olsson, a dwarf attached to the court of Charles I. died at 17. He was the father of nine well-proportioned children of normal stature.

Another famous French dwarf, called Joulou, who was born in 1733, died at 18. He was a Polish pigmy, Count Boruwalaski, lived to celebrate his 7th birthday.

Dwarfs are not inferior in intelligence to ordinary people. As a rule, indeed, they seem to be rather exceptionally bright.

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OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

HEAD OF W. C. T. U. HOPES FOR "DRY WORLD"

(Miss Anna Adams Gordon of Evanston, Ill., has just been elected president at the International body of the W. C. T. U. at that organization's meeting in Philadelphia.

(By Anna Adams Gordon.) (President, World's Women's Christian Temperance Union.)

Philadelphia, Nov. 25.—For 40 years the Women's Christian Temperance Union has been working for prohibition in 40 nations.

An international educational program has been conducted in practically every civilized part of the globe.

All over the world we have been imparting to peoples of all the races the fundamental knowledge of the effect of alcohol on the human system.

Discouraged and Encouraged. Difficulties and obstacles of course have beset the W. C. T. U. workers but they have been encouraged and cheered on by two facts:

One—They always have known they were a part of a great organization, that they were all banded together for a common purpose, and could count on the support and co-operation of their fellow workers everywhere.

Two—Almost from the beginning we achieved some results; and with the passing years and the extending of our efforts into newer and larger territories we have seen the work going successfully forward.

In recent years great strides toward

world-wide prohibition have been made. With these advancements many reinforcements have joined our ranks.

Many rational thinking men and women the world over who were not originally in sympathy with prohibition have come to see the sound scientific basis of our program and the necessity of our objective and have joined with us and are now lending their best efforts to our work.

To Continue Program. We shall carry on our program along practically the same lines we have followed for 40 years, and we are confident of a successful termination of our long-sought objective of world-wide prohibition.

The position of the W. C. T. U. in the matter of cigarettes and tobacco is exactly what it always has been. We do not put tobacco and cigarettes side by side with alcoholic beverages.

Our national program on the subject of tobacco is an educational one, outlined and carried forward in the interest of the health of boys and girls everywhere.

1,200 PERSONS SAID TO BE HOMELESS

Through the Fire at Terrebonne, Que., on Friday Last.

Terrebonne, Que., Dec. 2.—Early morning estimates indicate that the situation here is far worse than supposed late last night, and that the amount of damage done by the devastating fire, which swept through the town during the night, and which even now is still burning in some quarters, rendered no less than twelve hundred persons homeless and destroyed approximately one hundred and seventy-five houses, resulting in damage estimated in the vicinity of a million dollars.

As far as could be ascertained at nine a.m. no lives were lost. Scores of firemen and a great quantity of apparatus are here, having been despatched from Montreal late last night and early this morning. The firemen are now engaged in blasting many of the dwellings in the western end of the town, in order to render it impossible for the flames to spread to this small undamaged section.

The refugees are being cared for at the St. Louis College. It has been definitely decided that the conflagration was caused by sparks from the

chimney which started in the Limoges saw mill, following an explosion.

When the firemen came to the home of a little white-haired woman and began to carry out her belongings, she begged them with tears in her eyes to leave the furniture and help her remove a trap door in the floor.

When this was done, she gathered in her arms several jars of homemade plum jam, which she had put away for her children. Without question the men assisted her to carry to safety her treasures. The rest of her things could not be saved.

Recently a party of youngsters narrowly escaped serious injury when attempting to put over some smart pranks where a number of young folks were enjoying a few hours coasting. When asked about their folly the youngsters made some retorts which were rather unusual considering their age and which gave the impression that they were not very well bred. Frequent incidents of this nature have come to our notice. We once thought it an advantage to have one's house close to the sidewalk but seeing groups of mischievous youngsters knocking on doors and rapping on windows of houses that are situated in close proximity to the street has caused us to change our mind. It must be very annoying to have your neighbors children looking in your windows and knocking at your doors and then running away. In cases where there are just two in the front room it must be especially disconcerting. When a young man is visiting with serious intentions, peace and quiet are very essential and mysterious noises about the house are apt to hinder the natural procedure of events. Proposing, according to those who have tried it, requires the full measure of a man's courage and it is unreasonable to expect a fellow to offer a lady a life-long job when he has been kept sitting on pins all evening by mysterious rapping on the doors and peeping in through the windows.

Apart from all joking, however, these young tricksters sometimes play pranks-players lost a scow, belonging but considerable loss. On all-love's night a party of youthful pranksters lost a scow, belonging to a local contractor, from its moorings below the government wharf. Amherst News.—The fact that Fred J. Somers has been elected president of the Independent Hockey League, will be a pleasing announcement to the hockey teams and the hockey fans in Moncton, Amherst, New Glasgow, and Stellarton, but particularly so in Sydney, Glace Bay and North Sydney, where Mr. Somers is extremely well known. For a number of years Mr. Somers was connected with the Sydney Millionaires, and one might safely say that all his life he has taken a profound interest in hockey.

Queen's University players by defeating the Edmonton Eskimos 13-1 at Kingston Saturday are the undisputed Sydney, Glace Bay and North Sydney.

The Club Batting Record for the 1922 season shows Pittsburgh to be the leading club in batting, with a three-point advantage over the World's champion Giants. St. Louis made the most total bases on hits, 241; Pittsburgh made the most one base hits, 250. Philadelphia led in home runs with 116, and Pittsburgh in triples with 110. Chicago led in number of sacrifice hits, and Pittsburgh in stolen bases. New York made most football champions of Canada.

The Official Batting Records of National League players for the season of 1922 show that Lou Gehrig of St. Louis, for the third successive year, won the individual batting championship with a percentage of .401, being the highest mark since Ed Delahanty led the league in 1899 with .408. Hornsby also won the season's major league home run honors with 52, and a new National League record of 250 hits during the season, thus breaking the record held by Willie Keeler, who made 243 hits in 1897.


