Two Hundred Minors Entombed Alive—Rescued After Many Hours' Imprisonment.

London, April 20.—A serious accident during which the lives of 200 men were imperiled took place near Longton, Staffordshire. Two large cages or care are used for hoiseing and lowering men and materials in a colliery in Longton district. While one of them was being hoisted and the other lowered they came into vident collision and were smashed to pieces. The result was the shaft was badly damaged and choked up with debris, thus outting off communication with 200 miners whom the accident imprisoned in the mine below.

For fourteen hours the miners were shut up. This was a period of terrible suspense for their families, who crowded about the pit in a state of great agitation and distress. Eventually a small hole was pierced through the mass of wreckage and earth, and it was found possible to lower food by means of a rope to the imprisoned miners. Further work on the passage enabled those engaged in the rescue to haul the 200 miners one by one out of the mine by using buckets, to which ropes were fastened.

Rioting Renewed in the Coke Region of Pennsylvania A Furious Fight -Other Labor News.

Scottdale, Pa., April 18.—The coke region is again the scene of lawlessness. Last night a band of about 100 strikers assaulted the Leisinring No. 2 plant, of the Frick Coke Company. Shots were exchanged, and for a time the fight waged furiously, but finally the mob beat a retreat. One of the deputies was dangerously injured, and, it is thought, cannot recover. Throughout the region all last night the earth fairly trembled with a succession of shocks, following the explosion of dynamite bombs. At Leisinring (No. 3, of the Frick works) a crowd of strikers gathered on the hill and at one time 30 bombs were exploded simultaneously, tearing great holes in the earth, breaking windows in many houses and frightening the people for miles around. At Leisinring Deputy Sheriff Crawford and posse were serving writs of ejectment when they were captured by an angry mob and harshly treated. One deputy named Sanner was knocked senseless.

A PERFECT RELIGION, In Its Exactness, Symmetry

and Transparency. Brilliant Beauty_"The Crystal Cannot Equal It."

NEW YORE, April 19.—Dr. Talmage preached to an immense audience in the morning in the Academy of Music. His text was: "The crystal cannot equal it"—Job, xxviii., 7. Many of the precious stones of the Bible have come to prompt recognition. But for the present I take up the less valuable crystal. Job, in my text, compares saving wisdom with a specimen of topaz. An infidel chemist or a mineralogist would pronounce the latter worth more than the former, but Job makes an intelligent comparison, looks at religion and then looks at the crystal and pronounces the former as of far superior value to the latter, exclaiming, "The crystal is the star of the mountain; it is the queen of the cave; it is the ear-drop of the hills; it finds its heaven in the diamond. Among all the pages of natural history there is no page more interesting to me than the page of crystallographic. But I want to show you that Job was right when taking religion in one hand and the crystal in the other, he declared that the former was of far more value and beauty than the latter, recommending it to all the people and to all the ages, declaring: "The crystal cannot equal it."

In the first place I remark that religion is superior to the crystal in exactness. That shapeless mass of crystal against which you accidentally dashed your foot is laid out with more exactness than any earthly city. There are six styles of crystallization and all of them divinely ordained. Every crystal has mathematical precision. God's geometry reaches through it, and it is a square or it is a rectangle or it is rhomboid or in some way it hath a mathematical figure. God's attributes are exact. God's law exact. God's decrees exact. Hower counting wrong, though he counts the grass-blades and the sands and the cycles. What would you do without the crystal over the watch, the crystal over the telescope. But there is nothing so transparent in a crystal as in our holy religion. It is a transparent religiom. You put it to your eye and you see man—his sin, his soul, his destiny. You look at God and you see something of the grandeur of his character. It is a transparent religion. It is a transparent Bible. While reading this Bible after our eyes have been touched by grace, we find it all transparent. The Providence It is a transparent religion. It is a transparent Bible. It was to put you in the glorious company of such men as Ignatius, who, when he went out to be destroyed by the lions, said: "If am the wheat and the teeth of the wild beasts must first grind me before I can become pure bread for Jesus Christ." Ah, yes, it is persecution to put you in glorious company; and while there are many things that you will have to postpone to the future world for explanation, I tell you that it is the whole tendency of your religion to unravel and explain and interpret and illumine and irradiate. Job was right. It is a glorious transparency: "The crystal cannot equal it."

While Job in the text takes up a whole vase of precious stones and takes out of this beautiful vase just one crystal and holding it up until it gleams in the warm light of the eastern sky, he exclaims, "The crystal cannot equal it!"

Again, religion is superior to the crystal in its transformations. The diamond, is only a crystallization of coal. Carbonate of lime rises till it becomes calcite of aragonite. Red oxide of copper crystallizes into cubes and octachedrons. Those crystals which adorn our persons and our homes and our museums have only been resurrected from forms that were far from lustrous; but in the gospel of the Son of God there is a more wonderful transformation. Over souls, by reason of sin black as coal and hard as iron, God, by his comforting grace, stoops and says: "They shall be mine in the day when I make up my jewels." Wonderful transformation! There she is, a waif of the street; but she shall be a sister of charity. There he is, a sot in the ditch, but he shall preach the Gospel. 

MASHONALAND,

MASHONALAND,

Prospects of a Pending Rupture Between the British and Portaguese Anthorities.

London, April 20.—Dispatches from Durban, South Africa, show that the Portuguese are taking a high hand in Mashonaland, and are likely to cause further tension in the relations between the Governments of Great Britain and Portugal. A number of British colonists have settled in Mashonaland, and mails are carried via Beira, a Portuguese settlement. A short time ago, upon the arrival of the British mail sacks at Beera, the Portuguese authorities refused to allow them to be carried to their destination, causing great indignation on the part of the British colonists. Further details regarding the firing upon the British steamer Agnes engaged in conveying the expedition under command of Cal. Willoughby, and seizure of the Congo boats engaged in the same service show that Willoughby endeavored to secure the release of his vessels by paying the usual customs duties of 3 per cent. Imposed by Portuguese. The officer commanding the forces which seized the boats, refused to accept this payment, and ordered the British flag hauled down, and hoisted the Portuguese flag in its place. The Portuguese declare the British are excluded from the Pengive River, which the boats werenavigating when seized, and which is the chief water route about Mashonaland. Several of the British colonists have been imprisoned and most of the British employes have returned from Mashonaland on account of the arbitrary action of the Portuguese. There is every evidence that a serious rupture is pending between the Portuguese and British authorities.


