Spokane, Wash., July 14.—The best information obtainable here to-day is to the effect that reports of a massacre at Old Mission were greatly exaggerated, only one man being killed, and he accidentally.

Wallack, Idaho, July 14.—The situation remains quiet. All the miners went home to the various mines last night. The Poor Man and Tiger mines, which have been deserted since Monday, started up again this morning, also the Mammoth and Custer mines. Work at the Morning and Hunter mines was also reaumed this morning. A ripple of excitement was created last night among the remaining miners when it was learned that the Granite mine force had not left. A delegation of miners immediately started for the mine, four miles from Wallace, and brought the non-union men down. They were ordered out of Cour d'Alene. The miners declare Delashmutt and McAulay agreed to discharge the men and had not done so. They are the last non-union men in Cour d'Alene. It is said they will leave to-morrow.

Lava Flowing From Nine Different Openings.

President Carnot, who inspected the troops, received an evation.

Robbing the Wreck. A quantity of bottled beer and tools were stolen. A salvage steamer yesterday succeded in saving a large quantity of provisions, rope, chain cable and other articles.

Mount Ætna Means Business.

Rome, July 14.—Mount Ætna has eighteen openings, nine of which are active. The lava is flowing in the direction of Nicolosi at the rate of 50 yards an hour. It has already passed the lava deposits formed by the violent eruption of 1886. The subterranean rumblings and the loud and startling explosions continue. A Gritty Princess.

VIENNA, July 14.—The story is going the rounds, and is pretty generally accepted as true, that at the time Prince Pismarck paid his memorable visit to Vienna, Prince Reuss, the German ambassador, did not see fit to literally obey the Kaiser's suggestion to absent himself from the Austrian capital. The Princess Reuss not only went further and saw the ex-Chancellor, but she declared that she and her entourage would not obey the spirit even if they did the letter of the orders from Berlin, and therefore she was glad to see him, and she would not hesitate to tell him so. She added that she was the daughter of a sovereign prince, the Duke of Saxe-Weimar, and she would not allow the Berlin council to order her about.

Madrid, July 14.—The report of the Spanish medical commission, sent to Paris to inquire into the nature of the epidemi to inquire into the nature of the epidemic of the so-called cholerine, has been received. The report declares that the disease is the Asiatic cholera. In consequence of this report the Government has ordered that precautions be immediately taken along the Pyreneean frontier to prevent the introduction of the disease into Spain.

PETERSBURG, July 14.-Since the last dispatch twenty new cases of cholera and eleven deaths from the disease have been reported at Simbirsk on the Volga

River.

St. Petersburg, July 14.—An official cholera report issued to-day shows that on July 8 and 9 there were 459 new cases of the disease and 139 deaths throughout all the Russian districts affected. The heaviest mortality at any single, place was at Baku, where there were 62 deaths. While there were 191 new cases in Astrakhan, there were only 32 deaths there. All the private schools in the Caucasus will be closed owing to the prevalence of cholera. Black smallpox is epidemic among the troops in the great camp at Kraskoe-Szelo, eighteen miles southeast of St. Petersburg.

The agreement which the Bell Telaphone

The agreement which the Bell Telsphone Company desire the city to enter into came up again for consideration last evening at No.\*2 Committee. The company, as has been already stated, want a monopoly for ten years and will pay the city \$800 a year for the privilege.

City Engineer Graydon explained that this was 20 per cent. of the net annual profit of the company according to their last statement. The benefit to the city as a result of the agreement would be a better telephone service and changes for the better along Dundas street. They would remove their present poles and erect higher ones and probably they would put their wires underground on Dundas street to Wellington street. The assurance of permanency would induce them to do this. The engineer recommended that the offer be accepted.

Ald O'Meara opposed it. The charter or patent of the company would expire in two years. It would be selling the rights of the citizens for ten years. There were dozens of companies ready to jump in and lower the price to \$16 or \$20 a year, likely \$15. The agreement would take \$8,000 a year out of the citizens' pockets in return for \$800.

The great territorial magnate, the Duke of Buccleuch, who has a castle for every month in the year, and who controls 459,550 broad acres, saw to it that the Conservative candidate was elected. Sitting in Dalkeith Palace, in the heart of Midlothian, the bold Buccleuch was the arbiter of the political destinies of the famous and fertile shire. To many it appeared a bootless task when in 1880 appeared a bootless task when in 1880 Gladstone marched northward to personally "beard the Douglass in his hall," and to dispute the right of the Buccleuch to pro-vide, from generation unto generation, a representative for the county. Up to the general election in that year, the owners of Del Vuite, Paleae were invincible. But Dal Vuitle Palace were invincible. But the Grand Old Man, after a contest the Grand Old Man, after a contest unexampled for its intensity in modern political campaigns, put to route, by the narrow majority of 281 vote, the young Earl of Dalkeith, the son and heir to the Duke of Buccleuch. It was a great feat, and almost unralleled in the annals of Parliamentary ontests.

Why do not men rush to their tailors as women to their dressmakers on the occasion (highly appropriate occasion!) of a death in the family, and order coat, vest and trousers of the latest style in mourning goods, each gament to be finished with crape trimmings and embellished with crape trimmings and embellished with crape trimmings and embellished with crape buttons? Why are they denied the relief of wearing a suffocating veil, and of advertising the extent of their grief by the amount of black margin on their collars and cuffs?

Remarks of this nature will probably lay us open to the accusation of "imaking fun of sacred things." But the fashion of wearing mourning is not a sacred thing, it is an absurd thing, and if it could be ridiculed out of existence we would make a point of spending secon upon it for many a mouth to come. Doubtless dress should reflect the mood of its wearer, but there are plenty of subdued times for sad hearts without resorting to the depressing gloom of deep black, Dress is a curlously impressionable, not to

say mediumistic, material. It can be mad to express gaiety, and severity, coquetr and prudishness, pride and humility, good taste and every degree of tastelessness; but to try to make it express unmitigated, and it is to be presumed unmitigatable, woo pushing its capacities entirely too far. Mr. Gomme seems to be of the latter opinion. It has been proved that there was, perhaps, no dirty, savage trick which did not exist in the Greek religion. A civilized people, they danced about with snakes in their hands, like the Moquis; they worshiped obscene images and and kept flithy sacred pictures in their temples they adored stones, they performed unpleasant rites with pig's flash; their sacrifices were often rediculous and revolting; they told highly discreditable stories of gods who went about disguised as dogs, serpents, ants, awans and wolves. All these things the lowest savages also do, and the conclusion is that Greeks, too, had once been savages, and that the conservatism of their religion retained customs which puzzled and annoyed their common sense and picty. Nothing but Christianity made an end of these myths and manners, and even Christianity did not cralicate all of them among country folk. Folkiore, peasant custem, is full of traces of sacrifice and of savage beliefs in local spirits. Here Mr. Gomme, as we understand him, demurs and tries, as others have tried, to save the credit of cur ancestors. They were "Aryan:" an Aryan was a gentleman, he never could have invented and initiated all these stupidities and abominations. Where he practiced them (that is everywhere) he must have merely adopted the customs of savages whom he had conquered.

Hamilton, July 14.—A couple of men who claimed to represent a large wholesale concern in Toronto similar to the Patrons of Industry stores, successfully swindled a number of farmers in Nelson township yesterday. They carried samples of groceries, drygoods, etc., and said they were taking orders for goods, which would be delivered to buyers at wholesale prices. They succeeded in selling many job lots, the farmers giving their notes, ranging in value from \$48 to \$65, at four months in payment. The alleged wholesale concern would also send along tailors to make up the clothes. The firm has no existence, and the victims have been duped into buying goods worth less than half the value of their notes. The men secured several hundred dollars worth of notes in the township of Nelson alone.

THE CUP USED BY JESUS.

THE CUP USED BY JESUS.

Probably of Glass. Though for Centuries Supposed to Be an Emerald.

The sacred cup, the traditional "sacro catino," belonging to the cathedral at Genoa, which for centuries has been supposed to have been carved from a perfect emerald, has lately been thoroughly inspected by a jeweler, who pronounces it simply green glass, says the St. Louis Republic. The cup, which is more pan than oup shaped, is fourteen inches wide and five inches deep, and it is by many believed to be the identical cup used by Jesus at the institution of the Lord's Supper. After the crucifixion it is said to have fallen into the hands of King Herod, who used it in a triumphant way at many wild banquets. According to tradition it came into the hands of the officers of the Genoese republic in the year 1101, having been given as an equivalent for money due from the crusaders, who had captured the relic during their famous expeditions to the east. At the beginning of the fourteenth century the Genoese Government pawned the cup for the magnificent sum of £200,000 and afterward redeemed it, more on account of its supposed value as a gem than for its historical worth. Had the officials known what now seems to be the fact that the cup was simply an exactinary specimen of the glass worker's ret the £200,000 would no doubt have been slow in fortheoming. When the French captured Genoa the sacro catino was a part of the spoils. Their chemists, jewelers, glass workers and others tested the sacred cup—the majority of the experimenters concurring in the belief that it had been dashioned from a genuine emerald of great size and extraordinary fineness. Among the dissenters was Chevri, who contended that the sacred relic was made of glass. Since that time the genuineness of the cup has been doubted. The testimony of the American jeweler mentioned adds weight to the supposition. Many believe, be it glass or gem, that it is really what the church claims—a relic of our Saviour.


