A Cabinet Shuffle, in Which Mr. Bowell Goes Under.

Divided Counsels as to Proposed New Blood.

Remarkable Declaration by a Chapleau Organ in Quebec.

Liberal Candidates Meet With a Cordinl Reception

Ottawa, April 28.—Sir Mackenzie Bowell, having been squeezed out of the Conservative leadership, Sir Charles Tupper has been asked to form a Cabinet to act until the general elections. He is now engaged in endeavoring to get together his ma-terial. He has been making a great effort to have Chief Justice Meredith and Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick lend their aid to patch up a Ministry, but it is believed here that the attitude of La Presse, the most influential Conservative newspaper in Quebec, will prevent the consummation of the deal, even were it probable that either of the gentlemen named were willing to ally their fortunes with the disorganized and dying cabinet. La Presse, which is edited and controlled Mr. Chapleau, in its issue of last night, begins by saying that the Conservative press all over Canada has been advising the new leader at Ottawa to infuse new blood into the cabinet, but it appears to have been forgotten that the operation of infusing new blood in politics is as dangerous in politics as in surgical operations. If it required to infuse into the Premier's right arm the blood of the Merediths and the Kirkpatricks, and in his left arm that of the Angers and the Chapleaus, God only knows what the mixture of these fluids would result in when they met in the heart of the unfortunate chieftain of the Conservative party. Contagion would be immediately followed by paralysis. The task devolving upon Messrs. Meredith and Kirkpatrick would be to rally the Wallaces, the McNeills, the Macleans, the Sproules, the Tyrwhitts et al., and to bring about the acceptance of the Government's school policy by the Province of Ontario. Is it believed that in such company Chapleau, with all his eloquence and diplomacy, and Angers, with all his firmness, even if they were supported by the clergy and three-quarters of the population of this Province, could redress our wrongs, vindicate our rights, and strengthen our influence at Ottawa? The Militia Mismanaged.

The case of Col. Hamilton, of the Queen's Own, furnishes another example of the way in which the Dominion Government exploits the volunteer service of Canada to further its party ends. According to this report it appears that a non-commissioned officer made a vague charge to the Department against his colonel, and that certain other officers were dissatisfied or some cause, which nobody has been able to state or explain clearly, unless it be that some one of them vanted the colonelcy for himself. U. S. TREASURY DEFICIT. Washington. April 28 .- Officials best qualified to make an estimate say the treasury deficit for the year ending June 30, 1896, will be over \$25,000,000. The treasurer's estimate of \$172,000,000 from customs will fall short at least \$7,000,000, and the receipts from internal revenue sources will be \$12,000,000 below the estimate. The expenditure for the year will agregate \$352,000,000 leaving a shortage of \$25,162,423, making the deficit for three fiscal years, ending June 30, 1896, \$136,861,812.

BIG BREWERY BURNED. Dartmouth, N. S., April 27 .- Oland's brewery, at Turtle Grove, was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday. It was one of the largest and best equipped in the Maritime Provinces, and was one of those acquired a short time ago by the English syndicate, which purchased all the breweries in the Lower Provinces. The building was valued at \$40,000, the machinery at \$45,000, and the stock on hand worth about \$40,000 more. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Months of Flerce Fighting for the British Probable,

The Relief Corps Expected Daily at

Buluwayo-Boers Still Arming.

Cape Town, April 28.-The dispatches which filtered through from Buluwayo yesterday increased the feeling of anxiety felt here regarding the fate of the besieged town. According to the latest advices the circle of fierce warriors behind the mound fortifications has again been drawn closer to Buluwayo, and at the same time extended. The Matabeles, when this news was sent out from the endangered town, havi been further reinforced, and another large bevy of men was leaving the Matoppo Hills in order to effect a junction with the other bodies of hostile natives, and completely surrounded the place from all sides, while keeping south of the fortified pass, which is the key to the situation in that direction. In addition, another strong force of hostiles has gone in the direc-

tion of the route, being closely fol-lowed by the relief corps of about 600 men and nine machine guns, advancing from Mafeking. Consequently, it is believed that there is severe work out out for the advancing force, the advance guard of which, it was hoped, would reach Mangwe by about May The tactics of the Matabele are real-

ly admirable. When the uprising commenced, only a few hundred hostiles were reported to be in the field, and it was announced that the native police would soon reduce them to subjection. But the police deserted with arms and all the ammunition they could lay hands on, the Impis gathered with wonderful rapidity in the Matoppo Hills, which are evidently their rallying point, and base of operations, and the investment of Buluwayo commenced. If this report is correct, and there seems to be no reason to doubt the British will not see the end of the Matabele war for many months to come, and much blood will be shed

on both sides before order is finally restored. But the Matabeles may be able old out or harass the British until the great struggle, which cannot be long delayed, commences in South Af-The Boers dream of a United States of South Africa, and they are bold enough to say that the realization of this dream is among the possibilities of the near future. In any case, the work of arming and fortifying in the Transvaal, and also, to some degree in the Orange Free State, is going steadily on, and the slow but sure policy of President Kruger, said to be dictated from Berlin, is pursued relentlessly, night and day. The Boers already have a small army under arms, well supplied with rapid firearms and ammunition, in the vicinity of Lichtenburg, where, it is reported, a fortified camp is being con-This location is admirably structed. selected for a strategic movement, calculated to cut off the British in Matabeleland, Khamaland and Bechuanaland, and from communication with Cape Colony, and this, it is understood, would be done in the event of serious complications. The Boers would promptly occupy Mafeking from the camp near Lichtenburg, which is only a short distance from the present

British base of operations for the relief of Buluwayo. At present the relief of Buluwayo is the main point of interest, and a dispatch from Buluwayo yesterday evening said that Dawson's troop was starting for a fort situated six miles along the Tati road, with the object of guarding the telegraph line and keeping the road clear for the relief corps on its way through King Khama's country, by arrangement with the latter, who is particularly friendly to the British, having only recently returned from a visit to England, where he was treated with great distinction, wore a high hat and Prince coat, hobnobbed with the Albert Prince of Wales, and actually rode to the hounds. Another dispatch from Buluwayo says that a coach, laden with arms and ammunition, reached Buluwayo yesterday from the south. Earl Grey, one of the administrators of the territory of the British Chartered Company, is expected to arrive at Buluwayo today, with a strong es-cort of troopers. It is now announced that Sekonbi, one of Lobengula's leading chiefs, was among the killed during the fighting about the Umbuza River, which followed the second sortie of the British, when about 500 natives were slain. Late last evening it was reported here that there had been further and severe fighting about Buluwayo, and that the Matabeles were defeated with great loss.

Monster Rabbit Drive. Human Line, 24 Miles Long, Containing

10,000 Persons, Corralled Some 30,000 Rabbiss.

Fresno (Cal.) Correspondence of the San Francisco Chronicle.

The great rabbit-drive, which was so elaborately planned, was today carried suit that thousands of rabbits met their fate from the merciless clubs of farmers and townspeople. Estimates as to the number killed vary, ranging from 10,000 to 25,000. It was impossible to count them, and the best estimate is no better than a guess. But the slaughter surpassed anything of the

kind ever seen here before. Ten thousand people took part-footmen, horsemen, wheelmen and vehicles of all sorts. When the line was formed ready for advance it was in a huge crescent, one horn near McMullan station and the other near Caruthers, on the west side of the raffroad. The line of people was 24 miles long. It was after 10 o'clock when W. F. Rowell signaled a general advance, and the line moved forward across orchards, fields, vineyards, and, finally, emerged on the open plains. The best of order was maintained. The marshals galloped along the line, giving instruc-Toward noon the north south wings began to fold inward to the center, and when within three miles of the corral the line of men had contracted till it was less than three

miles long. All this time the rabbits had been driven forward, constantly increasing in numbers. At first they had not shown much concern, but when they began to be crowded they grew excited Several coyotes were started. were shot and others died later Many rattlesnakes were killed. When the rabbits had been driven into a comparatively small space they covered the ground, and soon grew excited and tried to escape by rushing through the lines. Then the slaughter began. A solid line of men dropped on their knees and clubbed the rabbits. From this point to the corral men advanced on their knees, leaving the ground heaped with the dead behind them. Fully 10,000 were thus killed, and the others were forced into the corral, where they rushed to and fro, frantic with fear. They trampled and smothered one another to death by thousands. A coyote that entered the corral was actually trampled to death by the rab-

bits. Fifteen minutes with clubs finished the work. Many good judges place the total killed at \$0,000. Farmers hauled wagon-loads away to feed hogs. The best of order prevailed. Only one person refused to obey orders. He was beaten and driven off the grounds by the crowd. The drive was the best managed, the largest and most satisfactory ever held in the county.

The circumstances attending the outbreak in the Transvaal are scarcely such as to warrant the hanging of these men. They had been deprived of their rights as freemen, and they had come to look upon Jameson as the only man in whom they could hope for succor. If his raid had succeeded. doubtless instead of being on trial toay for invading the territory of a riendly power, he would have been crowned hero, and mayhap the Pretoria jail would have been his Cabinet Ministers. As the Boers were successful, everything is changed, and the most that can be expected for the unfortunate Uitlander leaders is that they will get off with long sentences of imprisonment in a decidedly unhealthy penitentiary.

A SMALLPOX CASE. Judge Wm. Elliot presided at a sitting of the weekly high court for London this morning and disposed of the case of Mary McCallum, of Strathroy, against the board of health of that town, the individual members of the board, and also the town council. The action was for damages, and was brought owing to the alleged negligence of the defendants in not properly caring for plaint-iff's husband while in the smallpox pest house at Strathroy during the smallpox epidemic of 1894, and also for the burning of her dwelling house and its contents from which smallpox patients had been removed. By consent the action was dismissed, the defendants agreeing to award the plaintiff \$525, of which sum \$100 was paid a year ago. ## A Sensation

Caused by the Sentence of the Transvaal Prisoners.

Chamberlain Believed to Have Been Too Hasty-Commutation Expected.

London, April 28.-Mr. W. J. Galloway, Conservative member for Southwest Manchester, asked whether the law under which the leaders of the Johannesburg reform committee were tried does not provide for the confiscation of their property in the event of conviction and not for the imposing of the death penalty. Mr. Chamberlain said he was unable

to answer the question. The announcement that the reform ers have been condemned to death has caused a profound sensation, although is not believed that the sentence

Will be carried out.
CHAMBERLAIN'S FAUX PAS. The sentencing of the members of the reform committee to death has produced a great sensation in Lon-don. In well-informed circles, however, the sentence has caused little surprise as the laws of the Transvaal prescribe death for high treason, and the prisoners having pleaded guilty, the judge could only pronounce the sentence which the law provides. It has also been long understood that very severe sentences would be passed in order that the clemency which President Kruger is certain to exercise might appear greater. It is thought probable that the sentence of death will be commuted to a short term of imprisonment and a big fine, unless Mr. Chamberlain's dispatch to President Kruger, read in the House of Commons, irritates the chief magistrate of the Transvaal. Mr. Chamberlain's telegram is regarded here as being precipitate, and as leaving President Kruger no time to act on his own account, and as having, moreover,

London, April 28.—Mr. Chamberlain in the House today said that upon hearing the news of the death sentence of the Transvaal prisoners, he cabled to the Governor of Cape Colony, Sir Hercules Robinson, to communicate the following to President Kruger: "The Government have just learned that the sentence of death has been passed upon the five leaders of the reform committee. Inspector Miller began his special work of giving instruction to cheese makers at a number of central factories on April 17, and in connection with this work has spent two days each at the Dorchester, Mapleton, Strathallan and Elmo factories. Over 50 makers met him at these places, fine cheese and in other matters con- pany. nected with successful cheese factory operations. Mr. Millar's engagements for the next two weeks are as follows: Black Creek factory, April 28; North Bend, April 29 and 30; Brownsville, May 1 and 2; Attercliffe Station, May 4 and 5; Walsh, May 6 and 7, and Birnam, May 8 and 9. Makers who are convenient to these places should make a special effort to spend a day or two with Mr. Millar. In this age in the house occupied by Mr. Sumner. of cheap food products, only the very finest qualities of cheese will meet the wishes of the English consumer, and command the higher prices, and this fine quality can only be had by adopt-

ing the very best methods of manufacturing. The City Council held a special meeting last night, which was largely given up in the consideration of the Springbank agreement between the city and the street railway company. The 41 clauses contained in the covenant had been gone through one by one, and at 12:30 the aldermen were ready to put the cap-sheaf to a good night's work by passing the bylaw empowering the mayor to sign the agreement. At this point Manager Carr ascended the dais and whispered to the mayor.

"Gentlemen," said the latter to the council, "it is no use passing the bylaw, because Mr. Carr says the street railway company cannot postibly accept the agreement as it stands." "Well, we will pass the bylaw, any-

how," said several aldermen, and pass it they did. The discussion of the agreement occupied three hours and a half, and by working in relays, a la House of Commons fashion, the smokers about the board managed to consume their usual

pipe or eigar in the ante-room, taking department. care that there was always a quorum present. Solicitor Ivey, Manager Carr, Director Smallman, Superintendent De Harte and Cashier Currie represented the company, and City Solicitor T. G. Meredith was present on behalf of the

Bennet spoke in favor of its adoption. And after 45 minutes had been spent in discussion the clause was lost, Ald. John Heaman, Armstrong, Bennet, Nutkins and Parnell supporting it.


