

CANADA AND TREATIES

Asquith Says Dominions Wishes Re-

ceived Fullest Presentation London, March 9.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. John G. S. Nationalist South Donegal, asked Mr. Asquith whether the time had not now come for the concession to Canada by the Imperial Government of all the necessary powers to enable the Government of the Dominion to enter into direct communication with the other powers for the purpose of extending the trade and commerce of Canada The Premier replied: Canadian Government already does negotiate with the other British posessions. Sir Wilfrid Laurier about a year ago in the Canadian Parliament expressed himself as quite satisfled with the present practice of negotiating treaties with foreign Governments through his majesty's Government. 





A DAY IN THE SPORTING WORLD

CANADIAN CURLERS HOME AND TELL OF MANY VICTORIES

Lack of Ice in Quantity and Quality Accounts for Scotland's Defeat by Canadians---Pay Little Attention to Turn---Old Countrymen Play Straight Shots-Secretary's Report of Trip.

Toronto, March 9.—The return of the sweepingly victorious Canadian curlers yesterday confirms the conviction that ack of steady ice, and consequently want of practice, in Scotland was the raws of the superiority of the tourists. While there is an artificial ice surface in Glasgow, the other centres have to depend upon outdoor ice, and it lacks in quality and in quantity.

Ald. Garratt thought that the aldermen of the different committees should be included in the deputation. Ald. Coper and Ald. Moorhead objected to the chairman going and insisted that if any should go besides the mayor and the chairman of the committee, then all of the power committee should go.

Ald. Garratt explained that the chairman of No. 1, the financial committee, should go. The chairman of the board of works, under whose direction the work of the streets would be done should go, and the chairman of No. 3, the fire and light committee should be in attendance.

A Good Jaunt. Ald. Saunders pointed out that the committee might visit Niagara Falls or Merritton to consult an engineer, but if there was any other work to be inspected, such as underground wirework and the like, this would be done by the power committee later.
