# HELD UNTIL DROWNED

London, May 30 .- In their initial onslaught Monday the Germans are believed to have used more tanks than ever before, says Reuter's cor-respondent with the British forces on the French front writing Wed-

The 50th British division near Craonne Withstood a gas attack of three hours, and held the Germans in the attempt to reach the Aisne until "the men were drowned under the German combers." The same fate overtook the French division to the right of the 50th. After falling back the 50th made a gallant attempt to recapture Craonne, but was defeated by machine gun fire from the enemy tanks. In the end the 50th was obliged to fall back toward the river.

Washington Advised Something May Happen in the Tampico Fields Today.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—New reports of a German plot to destroy the Tampico oil wells, from which the American and British navies draw a large part of their oil supply, reached the state department today. They said an attempt to destroy the wells was to be made tomorrow.

Many reports of a similar nature have reached Washington. Officials here are depending on the Mexican authorities to protect the wells, as a large part of the Mexican Government's revenues are derived from oil taxes.

The program feature vesterday which aroused exceptional interest was an address by the first exchanged prisoner of war to reach London, Capt. Lattimer, who went overseas with the 4th C.M.R., and was taken prisoner after eight months of service in France.

Graphically he described his experiences in a number of prison camps and

# hospitals in Germany, and conditions in Germany as he had been able to observe them. From first-hand knowledge, he was able to tell his audience about the things that will best serve the interest of the London and other Canadian boys who are prisoners of war. "The thing of first importance to send to the boys who are prisoners," he said, "is food. In some camps they practically live on the boxes which they receive. Such was the case at the Prussian camp at Schwarmstead. If that camp isn't famous in Canada now, it is going to be when some of the officers I met there come home. Built on a moor, with water six feet below the surface that smelt putrid, it was infested by fleas in the summer time. The food was impossible to eat. We were told in going there we would be treated as Prussian recruits. All the arrangements were most annoying and the buildings uncomfortable. 

# GENERAL TAXES IN LONDON FOR 1918 MILITARY HONORS LOWER THAN DURING PAST TWO YEARS

\$42,600 Less Required This Year Than Was the Case in 1917-Clerk Prepares Interesting Comparison of Figures of 1918-17-16.

London's general taxes are lower this year than they have been for the past two years, according to figures compiled by City Clerk S. Baker. In other words, \$42,600 less is to be raised for general purposes in London this Buried Here Today. year than was the case in 1917, and \$8,600 less than in 1916. The total taxes

Though London will spend \$5,000 less on war work this year than last, nevertheless this year's war expenditure shows a heavy increase over 1916, Winnett, Royal Air Force, who died Sidewalk expenditures show the effects of the war, but the paving cost is \$3 higher than last year and \$14,000 higher than 1916. It might also be noted that the taxes this year include a tax on all spending bodies for their local improvement taxes. The amount thus charged is \$5,719.





# **BRITISH TRANSPORT** STEAMER TORPEDOED IN MEDITERRANEAN

101 Lives Lost, Including 13 Officers, 79 Soldiers and 9 of Ship's Company.

LONDON, May 29.—The transport ship Leasowe Castle has been sunk by an enemy submarine, the British admiralty announced tonight, one hundred and one persons being drowned. The Leasowe Castle, which was 9.737 gross, was sunk in the Mediterranean on May 26. Among those who lost their lives were thirteen military officers and 79 soldiers of other ranks. The Leasowe Castle was built in 1917 at Birkenhead, and was owned by the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company of London.

The text of the British admiralty statement reads:

"The transport Leasowe Castle was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine May 26 in the Mediterranean.

"Thirteen military officers and seventy-nine of other ranks, and of the ship's company, the captain, two wireless operators and six of other ratings are missing. It is presumed all were drowned."

# WILL RUSH COURT CASES TO RELEASE MEMBERS OF JURY

County Sittings Will Be Held Night and Day.

Centre System in Force for First Time This Year.
