It is officially announced at Tokio that the Vladivostock fleet has again evaded Admiral Kamimura's squadrou, and this morning subjected Gen San, on the eastern coast of Korea, to a heavy shelling. There is a dearth of definite news from Manchuria but it is believed that General Oku is pressing after Karopatkin, who is slowly falling back upon Liao Yang. One dispatch says a Japanese column is working around to cut off the Russian communications, and another that General Kuroki has reached Hai Cheng. No official news has reached St. Petersburg from the Russian commander for 24 hours. According to Spenser Wilkinson, the brilliant military critic of the London Morning Post, the position of the Muscovite leader is a perilous one. It was made to take effect Buffalo is placed upon a 3-cent basis. This is a reduction of 1 cent per bushe on wheat and flax, %-cent per bushel on corn, and %-cent per bushel on bar-ley. No reduction is made on oats, because the export movement is limited A 3-cent rate on wheat means that grain can be bought from Chicago, and placed alongside ship for 4½ cents, and counting floating elevator charge of % cents per bushel net can be placed on board ship for 5½ cents.
