

CLOSE OF REMARKABLE CAREER OF CHIEF DETECTIVE MURRAY.

History of His Connection With Many Celebrated Criminal Cases-First Detective Work-Joined Provincial Force in 1875-Ran to Cover \$1, 000,000 Counterfeiters-The Birchall Tragedy of 1890.

With the passing of John Wilson Murray, Chief Inspector of the Criminal Investigation Department of Ontario, Canada has lost her most famous detective. The deceased Inspector had unusual powers of deduction and showed great skill in following a clue. He always maintained that steady train-

always maintained that steady training of the mind and hard work was what made a good detective, and he deprecated any throwing of an air of mystery about the profession.

The story of the life of Jhon W. Murray outclasses many works of fiction. From his earliest childhood his leaning has been towards a free, adventurous life. Born at Edinburgh, Scotland, on June 25, 1840, he crossed the Atlantic at the age of five, when his father and mother moved to New York. At the expiration of six New York. At the expiration of six years he returned to Edinburgh, where he attended school for two years. When thirteen years of age he return-ed to the United States and attended the Georgetown Academy at Washing-

At the age of fifteen he ran away to sea. He made several ocean voyages to various countries, and particularly to the West Indies, finally returning
