ACT OF INCORPORATION.

5TH SESSION, 9TH LEGISLATURE, 2 EDWARD VII., 1902.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE "TORONTO CANOE CLUB."

(Assented to 17th March, 1902.)

HEREAS the persons hereinafter Preamble. named, together with a large number of others, are associated together under the name of "The Toronto Canoe Club" for the purpose of providing the members thereof with suitable accommodation, means and appliances for the pursuit of canoeing, aquatic and other amateur sports as a pastime, and have, by their petition, prayed to be incorporated under the name of "Toronto Canoe Club"; and whereas the petitioners have in view the acquisition of certain leasehold property hereinafter referred to and described, which, however desirable for them to acquire, will be more extensive than the purposes or objects of the Club require, but the said property is incapable of division, and special legislation is necessary to enable the Club to hold and deal with that portion of the said property not actually acquired for the purposes of the Club. and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition:

Therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice

and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:—

I. Thomas David Bailey, G. Walter Begg, John A. Muirhead, Philip I. Syms. Henry H. Mason, Edmund Eleazar King, Herbert Begg, William T. Wyndow, Herbert Rolph Tilley, Harry Ford, Charles Harold Wilson, John Charles Iredale, Edward Beeton, James G. Ramsey and George Wilkie, the officers, and such persons as now are or hereafter shall become members of the said Club, shall be, and are hereby declared to be, a body politic and corporate under the name of "Toronto Canoe Club," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall have power from time to time to alter, renew or change such common seal at their pleasure, and shall, by the same name, from time to time, and at all times hereafter, have power to purchase, acquire, hold, possess, and to have, take and receive to them and their successors such lands, tenements. hereditaments and real and immovable property and estate, situate, lying and being within the City of Toronto, as may be necessary for the actual use or occupation of the Club as a club house and dependencies, and the same to sell. alienate and dispose of at such time, for such price, and on such terms as the Club may deem proper, and with further power to hold the leasehold lands, described in a lease from the corporation of the City of Toronto to one Thomas G. Elgie, which said lands are situate on the south side of Lake Street, in the City of Toronto, and extend to the new Windmill Line; and the said leasehold lands to hold, occupy, enjoy, alienate, dispose of, rent, let or lease on such terms as to rental or otherwise as the said "Toronto Canoe

Club" may deem expedient, and subject to the terms and conditions of the said lease with power to make and receive any renewal or renewals of the said lease, and by the same name shall and may be able and capable in law to sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, answer and be answered unto on any manner whatsoever; and the constitution, rules and regulations now in force touching the admission and expulsion of members, and the management and conduct generally of the affairs and concerns of the said association, in so far as they may not be inconsistent with the laws of this Province, shall be the constitution, rules and regulations of the Club; provided always that the said corporation may, from time to time, alter, repeal and change such constitution, rules and regulations of the Club.

Property ves ed in Corporation.

2. All property and effects now owned by or held in trust for the said association, are hereby vested in the Club, and shall be applied solely to the maintenance of the Club.

Power to borrow on mortgage.

3. It shall be lawful for the Club to borrow money upon the credit of the Club, and to hypothecate, pledge, or mortgage the real or personal property of the Club to secure to repayment of any sum or sums of money so borrowed, together with such interest and on such terms as may from time to time be agreed upon.

Negotiab'e make, accept, endorse, all bills of exchange and promissory notes necessary for the purposes of the Club under the hands of its Commodore and Treasurer, by and with the authority of the Executive Committee of the Club, and in no case shall it be necessary that

the seal of the Club be affixed to any such bill or note, nor shall the Commodore or Treasurer, or any other person or persons appointed in their place or stead, and so signing, as aforesaid, be personally or individually responsible therefor. Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize the Club to issue notes or bills of exchange, payable to bearer, or intended to be circulated as money, notes, or bills of a bank.

Limit of liabi ity of members.

5. No member of the Club shall be liable for any of the debts of the Club. And no member of the Club shall be liable as a contributory beyond the amount of his indebtedness to the Club for his original entrance fee and annual subscription. And any member of the Club, not being in arrear, may retire therefrom, and shall cease to be such member on giving notice to that effect, in such form as may be required by the by-laws thereof, and from and after the expiration of such notice shall be wholly free from liability as a contributory.

Power to issue debentures.

6. It shall be lawful for the Club to issue debentures to such amount as it may deem necessary, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$26,000, for not less than \$25,00 each.

Application of proceeds of debentures.

7. The funds arising from the sale of such debentures shall be applied exclusively for the purchase of lands or buildings, for the erection of a Club house and dependencies, and to furnishing the same.

Term and rate of interest.

8. Such debentures may be issued for such term and at such rates as to the Club shall seem expedient.

CONSTITUTION

Adopted 9th December, 1905.

ARTICLE I.

CLUB NAME.

This Club shall be called the "TORONTO CANOE CLUB."

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Club shall be to provide the members thereof with suitable accommodation, means and appliances for the pursuit of canoeing, aquatic and other amateur sports as a pastime.

ARTICLE III.

COLORS, FLAGS AND SIGNALS.

Section 1.—The colors of the Club shall be turkey red and black.

Section 2.—The Club ribbon shall be corded silk, two inches wide, in five longitudinal, alternate bars of the above colors, two red of equal width and three black of equal width, the total width of the two red bars being equal to the three black.

Section 3.—The totem of the Club shall be a red ring 6½ inches in diameter with a centre of 3½ inches in diameter.

Section 4.—The Club jersey shall be white with the Club totem on the breast.

Section 5.—The Club signal shall be a white burgee 12 inches at the base by 18 inches in length with the Club totem in the centre.

Section 6.—The sailing signal of the Club shall be a red ring 15 inches in diameter having a breadth of 4 inches, and shall be carried on the upper part of the mainsail near the peak.

Section 7.—The Commodore's pennant shall be a straight swallow-tailed white flag 12 inches at the base by 18 inches in length, having the Club totem centred thereon at an equal distance from the hoist and tails.

The Vice-Commodore's pennant shall be the same as the Commodore's with the addition of a red circle two inches in diameter in the upper corner of the hoist.

The Rear Commodore's pennant shall be the same as the Commodore's with the addition of two red circles, each two inches in diameter, one beneath the other in the upper corner of the hoist.

Section 8.—The officers of the Club entitled to flags shall be the Commodore, Vice-Commodore and Rear Commodore.

ARTICLE IV.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1.—There shall be four classes of membership: (a) Honorary; (b) Active; (c) Non-Resident; (d) Privileged.

Section 2.—Active Members shall consist of Ordinary Members and Life Members. They shall have all the privileges of the Club.

Section 3.—An Honorary Member shall have the same rights and privileges as an Active Member, except the right to vote.

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the ber, Section 4.—Non-resident Members shall not reside within the limits of the City of Toronto or a radius of ten miles thereof. A Non-resident Member shall have all the privileges of the Club except those of holding office, voting, and renting racks or lockers.

Section 5.—Privileged Members shall have all the privileges of the Club except those relating to the government and management of the Club.

ARTICLE V.

FEES.

Section 1.—The yearly fee of each Ordinary Member shall be Ten Dollars.

Section 2.—The first payment shall become due and payable on his election, and shall not be subject to discount; each subsequent payment shall become due at the Annual General Meeting. Any Ordinary Member elected after September 1st in any year shall pay full fees on election, but shall for his second club year's fees pay only the sum of Five Dollars.

Newly elected members shall not be accorded the privileges of the Club until their fees shall have been paid, and in default of payment within thirty days after notification of their election their names shall be struck off the Membership Roll.

Section 3.—(a) Applications for Life Membership shall be made in writing to the Honorary Secretary on or before 1st July in each year; and shall be accompanied by the Life Membership fee. The Honorary Secretary shall submit the said application to the Committee of Management for their approval.

(b) A Member in good standing may, after at least one year's membership, become a Life Member on payment of a fee of \$75.00.

(c) A Member in good standing may, after at least five years of consecutive membership, become a Life Member on payment of a fee of \$50.00.

Those elected before 30th November, 1895, at \$20.00.

(d) Members in good standing elected before 30th November, 1899, may, at any time after having paid at least five consecutive annual fees, become Life Members, as provided in Clause (a) on payment of fees at the following rates:

(e) A Member in good standing may, after having paid at least ten annual fees, become a Life Member on payment of \$35.00.

Section 4.—All Ordinary Members paying their fees in full before the 1st of March in each year shall be entitled to a rebate of twenty per cent. Life Membership fees must be paid in full before the 1st of July in each year.

Section 5.—No member shall be entitled to the privileges of membership until his fees shall have been paid, as herein provided.

Section 6.—The yearly fee of each Non-resident Member shall be Two Dollars.

ARTICLE VI.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS.

Section 1.—Honorary Members may be elected on the unanimous recommendation of the Committee of Management, by an unanimous vote at the Annual General Meeting.

Section 2.- Every candidate for Active or Nonresident Membership shall sign an application for membership in form "A" of Appendix, which shall be signed by an Active Member as proposer, and by another Active Member as seconder, and which shall be forwarded to the Honorary Secretary. Such application so signed shall be posted on the Bulletin Board. and shall remain thereon for at least two weeks before being considered by the Committee of Management. If no member of the Club shall, within the said two weeks, by notice in writing to the Honorary Secretary. demand a ballot, the applicant may be elected by a unanimous vote of the Committee of Management. If a ballot shall be demanded, the application shall be voted on at the next General Meeting of the Club. Five black balls shall be necessary to reject.

Section 3.—The winner of the Frank W. Baillie Championship prize shall be entitled to Life Membership in accordance with the provisions of the Trust Agreement relating to the prize.

Section 4.—Any member of a regularly organized Canoe Club, not resident in Toronto, may be admitted as a Privileged Member during a period not exceeding two weeks in any one year, on being introduced by an Active Member, with the approval of a member of the Committee of Management.

The name of each Privileged Member, together with the name of the member introducing him and that of the member of the Committee of Management by whom he is approved, shall be posted on the Bulletin Board during the period for which he is admitted; such notice shall show the date of termination of such period.

ARTICLE VII.

MEETINGS.

The Annual General Meeting shall be held in the first three weeks in December, on a date fixed by the Executive Committee.

The Commodore shall call all general meetings.

Voting shall be by ballot.

Thirty members shall form a quorum.

Five days' notice of all meetings shall be mailed prepaid to each Active Member to his address on the Club roster.

ARTICLE VIII.

OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

Section 1.—The Officers of the Club shall be: Commodore, Vice-Commodore, Rear Commodore, Honorary Treasurer, Honorary Secretary.

Section 2.—There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the Commodore, Honorary Treasurer, and five other Active Members of the Club.

Section 3.—There shall be a Committee of Management, composed of the Commodore, Vice-Commodore, Rear Commodore, Honorary Treasurer, Honorary Secretary, three other Active Members of the Club, and the Immediate Past Commodore (ex-officio).

Section 4.—There shall be an Aquatic Committee, composed of the Vice-Commodore, and four other Active Members of the Club.

Section 5.—There shall be a House Committee, composed of the Rear Commodore and four other Active Members of the Club.

ARTICLE IX.

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

Section r.—The nomination of Officers and members of the Executive Committee, Committee of Management, Aquatic and House Committees shall be made at a General Meeting of the Club, not more than four and not less than two weeks before the Annual General Meeting.

Section 2.—The said Officers and Committeemen shall be elected by a majority vote of the Active Members present at the Annual General Meeting.

Section 3.—The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting in the manner following: Those five candidates in whose favor there shall have been cast the largest number of votes shall be declared elected; the two having the highest and second highest number of votes for a term of three years; the two having the third and fourth highest for a term of two years; and the candidate having the fifth highest number of votes for a term of one year. At the expiration of the respective terms a successor or successors shall be elected in like manner for a term of three years.

Upon a vacancy occurring from any cause, the same may be filled by the Executive Committee, until the next Annual General Meeting, when a member or members shall be elected in like manner for the remainder of the unexpired term or terms.

If in case of an election by acclamation, a tie vote, or for any other reason it becomes necessary to fix the term of office of the members of the Executive Committee, this shall be determined by a vote of the Club at the meeting at which the election shall have taken place.

Section 4.—If at the Annual General Meeting there shall be no candidate standing for any office or any position on any committee, then the nomination and election for such office or position may be made and held at the Annual General Meeting.

Section 5.—Officers and Members of the Executive and Standing Committees shall hold office until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors shall have been elected.

Section 6.—Offices falling vacant during the year shall be filled by election at a special general meeting called for that purpose.

Section 7.—Vacancies in the Committee of Management, Aquatic or House Committees may be filled by such Committee.

Section 8.—Should any member of the Executive Committee, or the Committee of Management, Aquatic or House Committees be absent from three consecutive meetings without a satisfactory excuse, he shall be liable to expulsion from office by such Committee, and the place of such member shall be filled pursuant to the preceding sections.

ARTICLE X.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

COMMODORE.

Section 1.—It shall be the duty of the Commodore to take command of the fleet, to preside at all meetings of the Club and of the Executive Committee, and Committee of Management, to enforce the rules and regulations. He may call a meeting of the Club at his pleasure, and shall do so at the written request of ten Active Members within three days of the receipt of such request. He shall be, ex-officio, a

member of all other standing committees without a vote.

VICE-COMMODORE.

Section 2.—It shall be the duty of the Vice-Commodore to assist the Commodore in the discharge of his duties, and in his absence to preside in his stead, save as to the Executive Committee. The Vice-Commodore shall be chairman of the Aquatic Committee.

REAR COMMODORE.

Section 3.—It shall be the duty of the Rear Commodore to assist the Commodore and Vice-Commodore in the discharge of their duties, and in their absence to preside in their stead, save as to the Executive Committee. On cruises he shall have sole charge of the rear of the fleet, and in his absence an acting Rear Commodore shall be appointed for the day. The Rear Commodore shall be chairman of the House Committee.

HONORARY TREASURER.

Section 4.—It shall be the duty of the Honorary Treasurer to receive all monies due the Club and give receipts therefor, and when the amount in his hands exceeds \$25.00, to deposit the same to the credit of the Club in a chartered bank. He shall pay by cheque, countersigned by the Commodore or Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee, all bills duly certified by the Executive Committee, and all bills certified by the Committee of Management, to the extent of their appropriation. He shall keep, in the books of the Club, full and accurate accounts of all monies due to or by the Club, and of all monies received, and of all monies paid by him, and of the appropriations to, and expenditures by, all spending committees of the Club, and of all receipts and disburse-

ments from, and on account of, the real property of the Club. He shall prepare a detailed statement of the estimated income and expenditure of the Club, and shall present the same to the Executive Committee, as soon as may be, after the Annual General Meeting. He shall prepare for each Annual General Meeting a statement of income and expenditure, assets and liabilities, and present the same at such Annual General Meeting.

He shall produce his books, for examination and audit, by the Auditors, whenever called upon to do so by the Executive Committee, and without any order shall produce his books and vouchers, to the Auditors for examination and audit, on the fifteenth days of March and May, and on the first days of September and December, of each year.

He shall be custodian of the Club seal.

HONORARY SECRETARY.

Secretary to keep a record of all the proceedings of the Club, to keep a correct list of the members and their addresses in the Club roster, to conduct the correspondence of the Club, to issue notices to members of the Club and the Executive Committee and Committee of Management, and notice of first meeting of all other committees. He shall collect and carefully preserve all books, letters, papers and documents relating to or of interest to the Club.

ARTICLE XI.

COMMITTEES.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Section 1.—The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Commodore and Honorary Treasurer, and

five other Active Members of the Club, who shall be elected and hold office as provided by Article IX. of this Constitution. The Commodore shall be Chairman. A Vice-Chairman shall be elected after each Annual General Meeting by the Executive Committee from amongst the five Active Members, who shall officiate for the Chairman in his absence.

DUTIES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Section 2.—The Executive Committee shall have control of all the property and assets of the Club, save as hereinafter expressly set out. They shall make to the Committee of Management an appropriation to enable such committee to carry out its duties.

Section 3.—The Executive Committee shall have control of all lands and buildings held under lease or otherwise by the Club. They shall have power to let any of the said buildings, or any part thereof, for a period not exceeding three years, on such terms and for such rentals as they shall deem advisable. They shall have power and authority to expend in any year in improvements, additions or alterations to the Club property, such sums as shall be necessary to keep the property in good repair. They shall have power to appoint a Secretary for the Club, who shall act as an agent for the collection of rents, and who shall assist the Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Secretary in the discharge of their duties, and perform such other duties as the Committee may direct. He shall be responsible to the Executive Committee and shall hold office during their pleasure.

Section 4.— Every document to which the seal is required to be affixed shall be signed by the Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Honorary Treasurer by and with the authority of the Executive Committee.

Section 5.—Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held at the call of the Commodore, and, in his absence, at the call of the Vice-Chairman. The Commodore may call a meeting at his pleasure, and shall do so at the request of three members, within three days of such request. Meetings shall be called by notices mailed forty-eight hours before the time of meeting, and may be held without notice if all the members are present and consenting. There shall be a meeting of the Executive Committee at least every two months. Five members shall form a quorum.

They shall report at the Annual General Meeting.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

Section 6.—The Committee of Management shall be composed of the Commodore, Vice-Commodore, Rear Commodore, Honorary Treasurer, Honorary Secretary and three Committee-men. The Immediate Past Commodore shall be, ex-officio, a member of the Committee of Management during the term of office of his successor.

DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

Section 7.—The general government of the Club and election of members shall be in the hands of the Committee of Management, who shall be elected and hold office as provided by Article IX. of this Constitution. They shall report at each General Meeting.

No funds of the Club shall be expended for any sport other than Aquatics, without a recommendation from the Committee of Management, approved by a two-thirds majority at a General Meeting.

The Committee of Management shall have power to charge a fee for admission to the Club House on such occasions as they may deem necessary for the better entertainment of members.

Section 8.—Meetings of the Committee of Management shall be held at the call of the Commodore or the senior flag-officer present in the City of Toronto, who may call a meeting at his pleasure, and shall do so at the request in writing of two members of the Committee within five days of such request. Meetings shall be called by notices mailed forty-eight hours before the time of meeting, and may be held without notice if all the members are present and consenting.

There shall be a meeting of the Committee of Management at least every two months.

Five members shall form a quorum.

AQUATIC COMMITTEE.

Section 9.—The Aquatic Committee shall be composed of the Vice-Commodore and four other Active Members of the Club, who shall be elected and hold office as provided by Article IX. of this Constitution.

The management of the races of the Club and of the "International Trophy Race," in accordance with the racing regulations, and all matters relating to this branch of the Club's affairs, shall be in the hands of the Aquatic Committee. It shall keep in a book of the Club a record of all races, and events pertaining to races of the Club.

It shall be responsible for the custody of all trophies and prizes.

The Vice-Commodore shall be chairman thereof, and shall report to the Committee of Management at each meeting of the same.

HOUSE COMMITTEE.

Section 10.—The House Committee shall be composed of the Rear Commodore and four other Active

Members, who shall be elected and hold office, as provided by Article IX. of this Constitution.

The entire charge of the Club House, float, furniture, the control of the caretaker, and all matters relating to this branch of the Club affairs shall be in the hands of the House Committee.

It shall provide entertainment for the members of the Club; the Rear Commodore shall be chairman thereof, and shall report to the Committee of Management at each meeting of the same.

ARTICLE XII.

REPORTS.

Section r.—The Aquatic and House Committees and all committees appointed by the Committee of Management shall report to the Committee of Management all business transacted.

Section 2.—All Committees shall pay to the Honorary Treasurer of the Club all monies received by them.

ARTICLE XIII.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP FEES.

The Life Membership fees shall be carried by the Honorary Treasurer to a separate account, to be known as the Life Membership Account.

The Executive Committee shall not, without the authority of the Club in General Meeting, spend in any year more than twenty-five per cent. of the gross amount of Life Membership account.

ARTICLE XIV.

DEFAULTERS.

The Committee of Management may expel any member whose annual fees or dues of any description shall be unpaid on the date fixed for the payment thereof, by this Constitution, or the by-laws in force for the time being.

ARTICLE XV.

Whenever it shall appear to the Committee of Management that the conduct of any member has endangered, or is likely to endanger, the good order, welfare, reputation, standing or character of the Club, they may, by the affirmative vote of five of their number, privately warn such member that his conduct is considered detrimental to the interests of the Club; or by an affirmative vote of seven of their number, may suspend such member, or may declare his membership forfeited; but no vote on a resolution for suspension or expulsion shall be taken, unless a written notice of such proposed resolution shall have been sent to each member of the Committee of Management at least five days before the meeting at which such proposed resolution is to be introduced.

No member shall be expelled or suspended under this section without an opportunity to be heard in his own defence. Any member so suspended or expelled shall have the right, within one month after receiving notification of such action, to appeal to the Club, by giving to the Honorary Secretary written notice of such appeal. The Commodore shall thereupon call a Special General Meeting of the Club, to be held within one month after such notice of appeal. If two-thirds of the members present at such meeting shall by secret ballot reverse the action of the Committee of Management, the appellant shall be restored to membership; but, until such reversal, he shall not be entitled to any of the privileges of a member.

ARTICLE XVI.

The Club year shall end on the 30th of November.

ARTICLE XVII.

AUDITORS.

Two Auditors shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Club; they shall hold office until their successors shall have been elected, and shall audit the accounts of the Honorary Treasurer on the 15th days of March and May, and the 1st days of September and December in each year. They shall report to the Club.

ARTICLE XVIII.

This Constitution may be amended only by a twothirds majority at any General Meeting, notice of such amendment having been given at a previous General Meeting, and having been displayed on the Bulletin Board for the inspection of the members during the interim between the two meetings, five days' notice of such meetings having been given. The notice calling the meeting at which the amendment or amendments are to be considered shall indicate the clause or clauses proposed to be amended.

All amendments to the Constitution shall be reported on by the Executive Committee to the meeting at which such amendment is to be considered.

Any point not covered by this Constitution and the succeeding By-laws shall be decided by Bourinot's Rules of Parliamentary Procedure.

No. I.

ORDER OF BUSINESS AT ALL MEETINGS.

No. II.

COLLECTION OF FEES.

(a) Forthwith after the Annual General Meeting the Secretary shall notify all members whose dues for the Club year then commencing remain unpaid.

(b) The names, with the amounts due the Club, of all members not paying their annual subscriptions before the 1st of July in each year, shall be posted on the Bulletin Board of the Club until such amounts are paid or the names are struck off the Membership Roll.

No. III.

RACKS AND LOCKERS.

The annual rental for Racks and Lockers shall be as follows:

The tenancy of Racks and Lockers shall end with the Club year. Rents payable for racks

occupied for less than eight months in any one Club year may be reduced by the Secretary with the consent of the House Committee.

A member paying rack rent for a pleasure canoe, and owning a canoe which in the opinion of the House Committee is purely a racing canoe, shall be allowed a free rack for such racing canoe, such free rack to be selected by the Secretary with the consent of the House Committee

Rack and Locker rents shall become due and payable on the 1st of May in each year.

Members applying for Racks and Lockers after the 1st of May must pay for the same on allotment, and, if not paid for within two weeks thereafter, the same may be declared vacant.

The names, with the amounts due the Club, of all members not paying their Rack or Locker rents before the 1st of June in any year, shall be posted on the Bulletin Board of the Club for two weeks, unless in the meantime such amounts shall have been paid; and the Rack or Locker of any member failing to pay for same before the first day of July will be declared vacant, and the craft thereon or goods therein held by the House Committee until all charges are paid.

No. IV.

MEMBERSHIP TICKET.

Each member shall be provided with a membership ticket on payment of his fee, and shall produce the same when demanded by the Secretary, the House Committee or their duly appointed agent.

No. V.

AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any General Meeting.

TORONTO CANOE CLUB.

RACING REGULATIONS.

SECTION I.

MANAGEMENT OF RACES.

Clause 1.—The management of all races of the Club shall be in the hands of the Aquatic Committee.

Clause 2.—The Aquatic Committee shall at least two weeks prior to the date fixed for a race, post on the bulletin board, the names of the race or races, dates thereof, and rules thereof governing the same.

Clause 3.—(a) Officers of Races: The Aquatic Committee shall appoint a Referee, a Starter, a Judge, and a Clerk of the Course, for the proper management of the race, and such other officers as they may deem necessary.

(b) The duties of the Referee shall be to take charge of the races between the start and finish.

(c) The duties of the Starter shall be to start the contestants.

(d) The duties of the Judge shall be to decide the finishes.

(e) The duties of the Clerk of the Course shall be to prepare a list of all events and the contestants therein, and to see that contestants are in their proper positions at the start; he shall keep a proper record of the times and finishes.

Clause 4.—Postponement of Races: The officials in charge for the day may, with the consent of the chairman of the Aquatic Committee, postpone any race, if in their opinion the weather conditions are unfavorable.

SECTION II.

GENERAL RULES.

Clause I.—All paddling races of the Club shall be governed by the Paddling Racing Rules as hereinafter set out.

Clause 2.—All sailing canoe races shall be governed by the A. C. A. Racing Regulations.

Clause 3.—All dinghy sailing races shall be governed by the Lake Sailing Skiff Association Sailing Regulations.

Clause 4.—All craft of the Club shall carry the Toronto Canoe Club's sailing signal in the sailing races, and a registered racing number.

Clause 5.—The mode of turning stake boats, and all directions for each race shall be announced in the programme of the Aquatic Committee, or posted on the bulletin board one hour before the race is called, and any competitor not knowing the course, or mistaking it, or not following the rules, does so at his own risk. Stake boats and buoys will be left to port when not stated distinctly to the contrary.

The start and finish of all races shall be by the bow, and all canoes shall start and finish bow first, unless the programme of the event is to the contrary.

Clause 6.—No one shall be allowed to be entered twice for the same race.

Clause 7.—In the event of a dead heat taking place, the same crews shall contend again after such interval as the Aquatic Committee may appoint. Any crew refusing shall be adjudged to have lost the heat.

Clause 8.—In each class two or more entries shall be required to ensure a race, and should withdrawals, after the entries are closed, reduce the number to one the crew must go over the course to be entitled to the prize.

Clause 9.—Heats and stations shall be drawn

for by the Aquatic Committee.

Clause 10.—All canoes used for races in Cruising Class shall be subject to the approval of the Aquatic Committee.

Clause 11.—None but the members of the Toronto Canoe Club shall enter its races unless specially permitted by the Aquatic Committee.

Clause 12.—The crew of each canoe shall consist of one man only, unless the programme of the Aquatic Committee states to the contrary.

Clause 13.—All entries must be in writing on the blanks provided, and must be handed into the Aquatic Committee within such time as they may direct.

Clause 14.—Should the owner of any canoe or boat, duly entered for a sailing race consider that he has fair grounds of complaint against another he must give notice of same before leaving his boat on the finish of the race to the Referee, and must present the same in writing to the Aquatic Committee within one hour of his arrival at the finish, if appealed from the decision of the Referee.

The sum of One Dollar shall be deposited with each protest, to be forfeited to the Club should the protest not be sustained. The Aquatic Committee shall, after hearing such evidence as they may deem necessary, decide the protest, and the decision, if unanimous, shall be final; but if not unanimous, an appeal may be made to the Com-

mittee of Management, whose decision shall be final.

No member of either committee shall take part in the decision of any question in which he is interested. In all cases where a protest is lodged on the ground of fouling, evidences of actual contact shall be necessary to substantiate the protest. The Aquatic Committee shall, without protest, disqualify any contestant which, to their knowledge, has committed a breach of the rules.

SECTION III.

CLASSIFICATION OF CANOES.

Clause 1.—A canoe to compete in any paddling race of the Toronto Canoe Club, must be sharp at both ends, with no counter stern or transom, and must come within the limits prescribed for its class.

Clause 2.—(a) "Single" and "Tandem," maximum length, 16 feet; minimum depth, 12 inches; minimum beam, 30 inches; minimum weight, 50 pounds; a deficiency of weight to an amount not exceeding 5 pounds may be made up by ballast. All canoes owned by members of Club, built prior to Jan. 1, 1906, shall not be subject to the regulation as to minimum depth.

(b) "Fours," maximum length, 20 feet; minimum beam, 30 inches; minimum depth, 12 inches; minimum weight, 70 pounds.

(c) War Canoes, maximum length, 30 feet; minimum beam, 36 inches; minimum depth, 17 inches; minimum weight, 120 pounds.

Clause 3.—Measurement: The length shall be taken between perpendiculars at the foreside of the stem and the afterside of the stern. The beam shall be taken at the widest part wherever found. The depth shall be measured from the inside of

the garboard next to the keel to the lower side of a straight-edge across the gunwales.

SECTION IV.

CLASSIFICATION OF PADDLERS.

Members competing in Club events shall be governed by the following definitions; handicap races excepted:

Clause 1.—(a) A "Novice" paddler is one who has never raced in a Canoe Race.

- (b) A "Junior" paddler is one who has never won a "Single" Paddle Canoe Race other than a novice.
- (c) A junior "Tandem" paddler is one who has never won a "Tandem" Canoe race.
- (d) A junior "Fours" paddler is one who has never won a "Fours" Canoe race.
- (e) An intermediate "Single" paddler is one who has never won an intermediate or senior "Single" paddle canoe race.
- (f) An intermediate "Tandem" paddler is one who has never won an intermediate or senior "Tandem" canoe race.
- (g) An intermediate "Fours" paddler is one who has never won an intermediate or senior "Fours" canoe race.
- (h) In War Canoe races there shall be no status of seniority.

Clause 2.—The class status of a paddler remains unchanged during the day or at the Regatta at which he is a winner.

SECTION V.

PADDLING RACING RULES.

"Starting."

Clause 1.—(a) All canoe races shall be started

in the following manner: The Starter on being satisfied that the competitors are ready, shall give the signal to start.

(b) If the Starter considers the start false, he shall at once recall the canoes to their stations, and any canoe refusing to start again shall be disqualified.

(c) Any canoe not at its station at the time specified shall be liable to be disqualified by the Referee.

(d) Canoes shall be started by their bow, and shall have completed their course when the bow reaches the finish.

"Water."

Clause 2.—(a) A canoe's own water is its straight course parallel with those of the other competing canoes, from the station assigned to it at the start to the finish.

(b) Each canoe shall keep its own water throughout the race, and any canoe departing from its own water will do so at its peril.

" Fouls."

Clause 3.—(a) It shall be considered a foul, when after the race has commenced, any competitor by his paddle, canoe, or person, comes in contact with the paddle, canoe, or person of another competitor, or the turning buoy.

(b) No fouling whatever shall be allowed; the canoe committing a foul shall be disqualified, unless in the opinion of the Referee such foul is so slight as not to influence the race.

(c) A claim of foul must be made to the Referee by the competitor himself; and, if possible, before getting out of his canoe in cases when the Referee has not announced his decision.

"Turning Buoys."

Clause 4.—(a) In turning races, each competitor shall have a turning buoy.

All buoys shall be left to port. Any competitor may turn any buoy other than his own; but does so at his peril.

" Accidents."

Clause 5.—Every canoe shall abide by its accidents, except when, during a race, a canoe while in its own water shall be interfered with by any outside canoe or boat, the Referee may order the race to be paddled over, if in his opinion, such interference materially affected its chances of winning the race.

" Assistance."

Clause 6.—No canoe or boat shall be allowed to accompany a competitor for the purpose of directing his course or affording him other assistance. The canoe receiving such direction or assistance, shall be disqualified at the discretion of the Referee.

"Dead Heats."

Clause 7.—Contestants paddling a dead heat shall compete again, after such interval as may be appointed, and the contestants refusing to so paddle shall be adjudged to have lost the race.

"Judges."

Clause 8.—The Judges at the finish shall report to the Referee the order in which the competing canoes cross the line, but the decision of the race shall rest with, and be declared by the Referee.

" Referee."

Clause 9.-(a) The jurisdiction of the Referee

extends over the race, and all matters connected with it from the time the race is started until its final termination, and his decision in all cases shall be final and without appeal.

(b) The Referee shall decide all questions of foul, and give his decision without it being neces-

sary to make an appeal to him.

- (c) In case of a foul, the Referee shall have the power: (1) to place the canoes (except the canoe committing the foul, which is disqualified) in the order in which they came in; (2) to order the canoes engaged in the race other than the canoe committing the foul, to paddle over again on the same or another day; (3) to restart the qualified canoes from the place where the foul was committed.
- (d) The Referee may, during a race, caution any competitor when in danger of committing a foul.
- (e) Any competitor refusing to abide by the decision, or to follow the directions of the Referee shall be disqualified.
- (f) The Referee, if he thinks proper, may reserve his decision, provided that in every case such decision be given on the day of the race.

SECTION VI.

Clause 1.—Anything not provided for in the foregoing, shall be governed by the Aquatic Committee.

Clause 2.—These rules may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote at any general meeting.

TORONTO CANOE CLUB.

INTERNATIONAL PADDLING TROPHY.

I. The trophy shall be known as the Toronto Canoe Club Paddling Trophy.

II. It shall be open for competition to any member in good standing of any recognized aquatic club or association or of the A.C.A., W.C.A. or B.C.A.

III. It shall be raced for on Toronto Bay or on waters in the immediate vicinity, as the committee may decide.

IV. The race shall be paddled on a mile course straight away.

V. The measurements of canoes for these races shall be as follows: Length not more than 16 feet, beam not under 28 inches and not over 30 inches, by a minimum depth of 9 inches.

VI. Entries shall be made to the Chairman of the Aquatic Committee not later than one week before the day of the race.

VII. The trophy shall at all times remain the property of the Toronto Canoe Club, but may be held by the winner upon suitable security, and must be returned in good condition at least four weeks before the date of the next race to the Chairman of the Aquatic Committee at Toronto. The winner shall also receive some suitable recognition of his victory.

VIII. There shall be one starter and two judges and a referee at the finish, who shall be appointed by the Regatta Committee. The Referee's decision shall be final. IX. These rules shall at all times be subject to alterations by the committee, with the consent of the Club at a general meeting, at least two months before the date of the race, notification of which shall be given through the official organs forthwith after the Amendment. Any matter which may arise, not covered by the foregoing rules, shall be settled by the Aquatic Committee.

CONDITIONS OF FRANK W. BAILLIE LIFE MEMBERSHIP PRIZE,

GIVEN UNDER DEED OF GIFT AS FOLLOWS:

This Indenture made in duplicate the twentyfifth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and two,

BETWEEN

FRANK W. BAILLIE, of the City of Toronto, in the County of York, Esquire, hereinafter called the Party,

of the First Part;

THE NATIONAL TRUST COM-PANY, hereinafter called the Company,

of the Second Part,

-and-

THE TORONTO CANOE CLUB, hereinafter called the Club, of the Third Part.

Whereas the party of the first part is desirous of providing a prize for the member of the Club winning the greatest number of points at the Annual Regatta of the said Club, and has paid in to the said Company the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), to be invested by them, and the annual income from which said investment is to be handed over to the said Club for the purposes of said prize;

And Whereas, the said Club has agreed to accept said prize subject to the conditions herein set out, and the said Company has agreed to accept the burden of the said trust.

Now THEREFORE, this indenture witnesseth that in consideration of the premises the said Company agree to, and with the party of the first part, that they will in each year pay over to the said Club the net annual income to be derived from said investment, and in consideration of which the said Club covenants and agrees to and with the party of the first part, and the said Company, that they will devote the said annual income in giving to the member of the said Club winning the greatest number of points at their Annual Regatta a life membership in said Club.

If the member of said Club winning the said prize is already a life member of said Club, then the said Club covenants and agrees with the said party of the first part, and with the said Company, to devote said annual income or such part thereof as may be deemed by them sufficient in the purchase of a suitably engraved medal for said member so winning as aforesaid.

If the prize is won by the same member of the Club for three successive years, then in such third year the member of said Club obtaining the second highest number of points shall be entitled to such prize.

IT Is Hereby understood and agreed, that if the said Club shall dissolve or amalgamate with any other Club under any other name or take a different name, or become insolvent and not able to pay its debts, or if the membership of said Club shall be below 100 members, then upon due notice being given in writing to the Company, this trust shall be at an end, and the said Company shall pay back to the party of the first part, or to whom he may appoint, all money or securities that may be in their hands in respect of said trust, either in the shape of principal or interest.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD that the contest in connection with said prize is to be governed by the rules and regulations of the Toronto Canoe Club.

This agreement shall be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of each of the parties hereto, as well as on the said parties themselves.

TORONTO CANOE CLUB.

HOUSE RULES.

Members using the club house after II p.m. must turn out lights and lock doors.

The ladies' parlor is reserved for use of ladies from May 15th to September 15th in each year.

Furnishings of ladies' parlor must not be removed for use in other parts of club house or verandahs.

The regular informal dances are open to members only and ladies.

All craft must be kept on the owner's rack, and must not be left on the floor, or on or tied up to the float.

Paddles, carpets, cushions, sails and all furnishings must be kept in the craft or in the locker of the owner. The Club is not responsible for same.

Tenure of all racks, lockers and dinghy spaces expires on November 30th of each year.

No member may use the craft of another member without that other member's expressed permission, in writing or verbal instruction to the Steward.

Members who are owners in common of a canoe should acquaint the Steward of such circumstance.

Painting, varnishing, etc., of canoes in the club house must be completed before May 15th of each year.

War Canoe parties may have the use of the "English" war canoe when not required for club purposes (Saturdays, holidays, etc.), by making

application to the Vice-Commodore over signature of five active members, one of whom must be an officer of the Club.

The racing fours and war canoes "Canadian" and "Dean" are for racing and training purposes only, and must not be kept out of the club house over night.

The Club racing boats must be emptied of all water and put in their proper places by the users immediately after practice.

Any cause of complaint that may arise is to be communicated in writing to the Rear Commodore, which complaint will be specially noticed by Committee of Management at their next meeting.

No rule herein shall be construed contrary to Club Constitution or By-laws.

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HISTORICAL SKETCH.

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ENT.

The Toronto Canoe Club was organized on the evening of December 14, 1880, when nine men met and started the Club upon what has proved to be an almost continuous success, until at the present time the membership is upwards of 550.

Of the nine organizers there remain but two who are now members of the Club; Mr. Frank M. Nicholson and Mr. Hugh Neilson. The membership increased to 24 by the end of the first year, in spite of the want of a suitable club house. That want was not supplied until 1884, when a club house was built at the foot of Lorne Street. It was a modest building, affording accommodation for the members and eighteen canoes. The Club entered into possession of this house in the spring of 1885.

This first home of the Club was situated some distance north of the present Cobban factory on Lake Street.

The membership grew steadily until in 1887 it had outgrown its quarters and the Club removed to a new and much larger building on the water front, a little east of Simcoe Street, which was provided for it by the Toronto Association of Canoeists.

This building afforded accommodation for fortyeight canoes, and club rooms and bath, locker and dressing rooms for the members.

The Club continued its prosperous career in these premises until in 1893 it became necessary to remove its building to make way for esplanade improvements contemplated by the City of Toronto.

Arrangements were then made for the erection of the present club house, according to plans approved of by the Club. This building was occupied in the fall of 1893. Of its exterior and that of the former houses of the Club, the cuts on other pages must answer for a description. Of its interior it is sufficient to say that it contains everything that can minister to the comfort and

convenience of its occupants, including racks for 200 canoes, club room, sitting room, ladies' parlor, dressing room and lavatory, gymnasium, bath room, club kitchen, committee rooms and janitor's apartments.

In 1900 the Club purchased from the Canada Permanent and Western Canada Loan Co. the leasehold water lot upon which is situated the club house and other buildings. This was held in trust by three members until October, 1902, when the Club having procured a Special Act of Incorporation from the Ontario Legislature they were enabled to hold property.

Since 1900, when the Club bought the property, they have found it necessary, owing to the continued growth of membership to make several alterations and additions to the Club buildings.

In 1900 the old club house, that was used by the Club from 1887 to 1893, was renovated, remodelled and added to the Club buildings; and again in 1903 it was necessary to still further increase the accommodation for members and their craft by occupying the two buildings to the north. The growth of the Club has steadily continued and year by year more space has been occupied until at the present time all of the property, except the north building, is used for Club purposes. A dinghy section organized a few years ago has developed into an important division of the Club, and not a little of the space above mentioned is occupied by these craft. From time to time the Club building proper has been improved, renovated and refurnished, and it is doubtful now whether any aquatic club can boast more commodious or comfortable quarters.
