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

## TUESDAY, February 17, 1846.

HE House having, by several Proclamations, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the despatch of business:

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber—and being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which was read by the Clerk, and is as followeth:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Although some apprehension has been created, in consequence of the partial de maximy of the Potato

so much depend for sustenance, yet, Providence having blessed this Island with abundant crops of other descriptions, I have not felt it necessary to call for your services in your Legislative capacity until the present period. I will, however, take this opportunity of observing, that it appears to me very advisable to invest the Executive with general power to prevent the exportation of Agricultural produce in cases of threatened scarcity, which can only be now done by an Act of the Legislature; it might therefore be necessary, not only to assemble you at an extremely inconvenient period, but most injurious consequences might occur to the Colony before you could meet to avert them.

I recommend to your notice the Criminal Law of this Colony, as it applies to the crime of Burglary, which, under any circumstances, can only be punished by death. I think it very essential that this Law should be assimilated to that of Great Britain, by which, sentence of death, instead of being passed, may, in certain cases, be recorded. I also recommend the revision of the Law passed in the last Session for the better prevention of Smuggling.

I must again call your attention to the state of the Laws relating to the Roads and Bridges; it is obvious that the former must from necessity be, for a great portion of the year, in an extremely bad condition, while the Statute Labor can only be applied at one particular period.

I have also to repeat the observations I have formerly made respecting the method of paying for services performed upon the Roads and Bridges; numerous personal applications have been made to me crop, upon which the great many if the community during the past year of inability to obtain payment

from the Road Correspondent, who was himself unable to meet the demands, because he could not procure money for the Treasury Warrants placed in his hands for the purpose; individuals have travelled, in some instances, more than 30 miles, in order to lay their cases before me. I feel that you will exert your best endeavours to relieve this hard working aud indigent class of the population from so great a hardship as that complained of.

I shall cause to be laid before you the Report of Commissioners, whom I appointed, to enquire into this Department of the public service, for the purpose of carrying out more fully the wishes of the House of Assembly, as expressed to me in their Address last Session.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

I shall cause the Public Accounts to be laid before you without delay. Although I have satisfaction in announcing a further increase of the Revenue, yet, in making provision for the services of the current year, the existing state of the financial affairs of the Colony will demand your serious deliberation; the large amount of outstanding Warrants, so disproportionate to the present resources of the Colony, will, I fear, ultimately operate to weaken public confidence in their stability; therefore, as the due maintenance of public credit is essential to the prosperity of the Colony, it is my obvious duty, not only again to urge the necessity of confining the expenditure within the limits of the prospective Revenue, but also to reiterate the importance of adopting some efficient measure for the early redemption of the liabilities which a previous excess of expenditure has imposed upon the Colony.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I shall lay before you some papers connected with the present state and prospects of the Central Academy. I am satisfied that in placing this subject before you, Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen, I shall find every disposition to give this Institution all possible support, advancing, as it undoubtedly is, into a high literary reputation, under the care of the present Trustees, and the very able Masters to whom they have entrusted the educational duties of the establishment.

The Lunatic Asylum and House of Industry, although not quite finished, is in a sufficiently complete state to be used for the purposes for which it has been erected. I therefore hope, that some material change will be made in the present objectionable system of affording relief to the destitute.

I shall take an early occasion to lay upon your tables several necessary documents, and shall be

always ready to facilitate, to the best of my power, the labours in which you are about to engage.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Palmer, Mr. Hudson and Mr. Wightman do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draught of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Palmer, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Cambridge, Mr. Beairsto and Mr. Hudson do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring; with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. Dalziel, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Coles, Mr. Hudson, Mr. Yeo, Hon. J. S. Macdonald, and the Hon. Mr. Palmer do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine and report on the Public Accounts—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Thornton, Mr. Wightman, Mr. Coles, Mr. A. Maclean, Mr. Yeo, Mr. Beairsto and Mr. Aitken do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed, to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

May it please your Excellency;

We the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, respectfully thank Your Excellency for your Speech, delivered at the opening of the present Session.

In estimating the returns yielded by the crops of the past year, we have much reason to be grateful to Providence, that although there has been a partial destruction of the Potato crop-one which affords, such great sustenance to a large portion of the community -yet, that those of other descriptions have been so abundant, as not to create any necessity, for calling the draught of an Address in answer to the into request our Legislative services at any sarlies

period. With the exception of what cause may exist for prohibiting the exportation of Potatoes, we fully trust that there will not be experienced any threatened scarcity of other of the productions of the soil; and that we will not be required to impose upon the Executive, by an act of the Legislature, the extreme necessity of restraining the exportation from the Island of any other species of Agricultural produce.

We shall bestow our serious attention to the Criminal Law of the Colony, as it relates to the crime of Burglary, with a view of assimilating the Law in this respect to that of Great Britain.

The Law past last Session for the prevention of Smuggling, we shall duly proceed to revise.

We regret that the method of paying for services performed on the Roads and Bridges, which has again called for your Excellency's observation, has been productive of inconvenience to some individuals engaged in that department of the public service. In order to prevent a recurrence of any similar instances, and the hardship it throws upon a hard-working class of the population, we shall devote to the subject every consideration towards a remedy which may come within the sphere of legislation.

We shall be glad to receive the Report of the Commissioners appointed by your Excellency to inquire into this department, for the purpose of carrying out more fully our wishes connected with this subject, as expressed in our Address to your Excellency of last Session.

We shall be prepared to receive the Public Accounts as early as your Excellency will please to cause them to be laid before us; and we receive with the highest satisfaction your Excellency's account of a further increase of the Revenue.

We shall devote our serious deliberations to the existing state of the financial affairs of the Colony; and in making provision for the services of the current year, we will be so far guided by the view of its prospective revenue, as to avoid all fear on the part of the public mind, that the present outstanding Warrants on the Treasury, although comparatively large in amount, shall be weakened in their stability—and we shall not fail to pursue any measure at our adoption, which, without creating any conflict in the various interests in which the public prosperity is involved, may lead to an early redemption of those liabilities.

In giving our consideration to any papers which your Excellency may please to lay before us, connected with the present state and prospects of the Central Academy, we shall, as hitherto, be found, in giving it our support, justly to appreciate the high literary reputation to which, under the care of the present Trustees, and its very able Masters, this Institution is evidently advancing.

The Lunatic Asylum and House of Industry having been advanced to a sufficiently complete state to be used for the purposes for which it has been erected, we shall avail ourselves of any alteration in the mode of affording relief to the destitute which may be calculated to remove the objections which exist to the present system.

We shall give due consideration to all documents connected with the public service, which your Excellency may be pleased to lay before us; and we tender our thanks for your Excellency's expression of readiness to give facility to the labors in which we are about to engage.

Ordered, That the said draught Address be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

**MESSAGE** from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Secretary Haviland, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following:

### Message:

H. V. HUNTLEY, Lieut. Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor transmits to the House of Assembly the Returns of the Commissioners of Statute Labour for the past year, accompanied by returns of the linear extent of the Public Roads in the several Districts, and other statistical information connected therewith, as desired by the House of Assembly in their Address to the Lieutenant Governor during the last Session.

With the view of more fully carrying out the desire expressed by the House of Assembly in the Address alluded to, the Lieutenant Governor caused a Commission to issue for the purpose of enquiring into the construction and management of the Public Roads; copies of the Commission, and of the Report of the Commissioners thereunder, the Lieutenant Governor also transmits for the information of the House of Assembly.

The Lieutenant Governor also lays before the House of Assembly, the Account of the Road Correspondent, shewing in detail the sums expended upon Roads, Bridges, Wharves, &c., under the several appropriations of the past year.

The Lieutenant Governor avails himself of this opportunity to submit for the consideration of the House of Assembly, an application on behalf of William Collett, the Contractor for building a Frame Bridge at Mabey's, for remuneration for extra work performed by him in the erection of the said Bridge.

The Lieutenant Governor recommends the strictest economy to be observed in providing for the service of Roads and Bridges for the current year, and that the appropriations be limited to those objects of improvement which are indispensably necessary to the Public convenience.

#### H. V. HUNTLEY, Lieut. Governor.

In answer to the Address of the House of Assembly to the Lieutenant Governor, requesting to learn the causes which have prevented the Act passed in the last Session of the Legislature, for the prevention of smuggling, from being put into operation, the Lieutenant Governor informs the House of Assembly, that, observing nothing in the Act in question imperatively calling upon him to appoint preventive officers, he deemed it advisable to abstain from doing so, until the Legislature should be afforded an opportunity of rendering those officers responsible to some authority-to which authority, the Lieutenant Governor is of opinion, they should submit detailed accounts of all seizures made by them.

The Lieutenant Governor also thinks, that a portion of each seizure should be paid into the Treasury, to be applied to the public service of the Colony, instead of becoming the sole property of the seizing officer; and thus would be removed any inducement to collusion between the seizing officer and the fraudulent importer.

**MR.** THORNTON, from the Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Hugh Logna, of Georgetown, Jailer, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth:

Your Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Hugh Logan, Jailer, of Georgetown, setting forth a loss sustained by him in consequence of the escape of a prisoner, and praying relief in the case ; beg to report-

That from the statements of the Petitioner, corroborated by the information obtained by your Committee, it appears, that the Petitioner, Hugh Logan, was appointed Jailer to the King's County Jail, in May, 1839; that on his appointment he examined the state of the Jail yard fence, which was found to be deficient in strength and security, and reported the same to the Sheriff, who brought it to the notice of the Grand Jury in March following. The Jury then (in 1840) presented the state of the Jail fence, and dent for the encouragement of similar claims, they, again in March, 1841, on which last presentment the Lieut. Governor Sir Charles Fitz Roy brought the subject by message to the notice of the House of Assembly, then in Sescion, but the House declined, making any provision for the repairs of the fence. That on the evening of the 5th June, 1843, James Hawkins, a prisoner for debt, made his escape by the House, for any sum not over Twelve Poundsect raising up one of the pickets of the fence, and in

consequence of such escape, the Jailer was obliged to pay the sum of £38 10s.

Your Committee, from the information laid before them, are induced to think that the escape was made before the usual hours of locking up prisoners for the night; and that the Jailer is not blameable, as being in this case over indulgent or negligent in his duty: And it appears, that immediately after the escape, repairs were made to the fence exceeding the sum of £40.

Your Committee find, that real and personal property was attached belonging to the prisoner, without delay, by the Jailer, after the escape, which has since been sold, and the proceeds arising therefrom, £10 9s. 21d, received by the Jailer, leaving a balance of £28 0s. 9<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d, to be paid by Hugh Logan to the creditors of James Hawkins, besides interest.

The Expenditure for the past year has been £21,075 12s.31d., [ and the Receipts for the same period £16,092 9s. 3d., shewing a balance of £4,983 3s. 1d.; which balance includes the payments made for the Lunatic Asylum, £852 12s. 5d.; also £3590 on account of the contracts for the election of the Colonial Building, besides the sum of £820 19s. expended by the Commissioners, on Furniture, &c., for that building ; and also £485 for the Light House, Point Prim. Taking these four last items into consideration, it will be found that the ordinary expenditure for the year has been £16,227 101d. It will be seen, on reference to the Report on the Public Accounts, laid before the House, in its last Session, that there was an amount of £3924 12s. 84d. on the ordinary expenditure of the year, over the receipts for the same period. By comparing the Accounts for 1845, there appears only the sum of £134 11s. 74d. of the ordinary expenses of the past year beyond the annual receipts, thus shewing a decrease in the ordinary expenditure for the past year, as compared with the preceding one, of £3,789 1s. 14d.

Your Committee consider it proper to remark, that the Accounts this Session are made up to the 26th February, being a month later than the previous year, or for a period of 13 months, as the accounts of 1844 were made up to 20th January, 1845; and that in consequence an increased amount appears collected that the Act only came into operation at a late period beyond the yearly expenditure of £609 6s. 31d., being the amount of Warrants issued during the additional month of February, while the Revenue Accounts only appear to the 1st became Law. January.

The Report of the Commissioners appointed by his Excellency the Lieut. Governor to examine and investigate the Ac-

of Treasury Notes in circulation; to meet which sums, there are in the Treasurer's and Attorney General's hands, Bonds to the amount of £8,671 4s. 3d., and Cash and Notes in the Treasury L2660 2s. Add., making the balance against the Colony L30,369 7s. 3d.; but it must be observed that the Bonds, Cash and Notes in the Treasurer's hands will go to pay off the Treasury Warrants to that amount, thereby leaving a balance of £18,869 7s. 3d., on which Interest is payable.

On comparing the Commissioners' Report on the Treasurer's Account with the Public Accounts, as prepared by your Com-mittee, it will be seen that there is a difference of amount on six entries for receipts at the Treasury, but the gross amount will be found correct : the disparity arises from the different mode of classification adopted by the Commissioners and your Committee.

The Revenue derived from the duty on distilled spirituous Liquors manufactured in this Island, in 1845, appears to be  $\pounds S2$  18s.  $4\frac{1}{2}d$ ; but this, your Committee believes, is not the full amount of duty derived from that source, as they find Returns have only been made from the districts of Richmond Bay, Orwell Bay, and Charlottetown ; and it must be also reof the year, when, most probably, a large quantity of Liquor had previously been manufactured before the Act in question

The amount of Land Assessment in the Treasurer's annual Account to 25th February, is £1609 17s. 7d., but the actual amount received under the Act of 7th Will., Cap. 31, is mittee, and by them again compared, it appears that the amount of Treasury Warrants afloat and bearing Interest to the 26th February, 1846, is £30,200 14s. 22d., besides £11,500 the Return of Land Assessment for the year 1845.

Account at £25-this appears an error of £2 15s. 6d., which submit, as the result of our labours the annexed Table, shewthe Treasurer states as such, at the foot of his Account, and is to appear, together with the above mentioned Land Assessment moneys, to the credit of the Colony in the Accounts for 1846.

Your Committee having referred to the Accounts furnished since 1843 by her Majesty's Collector of Customs of the Imperial Duties received by him, there appears a discrepancy of L80 18s. 4d.-this has been explained by that Officer, to your Committee, as follows :----

"That the amount was a surcharge which he had passed in "his Accounts to the credit of this Colony, but that on "application to the Board of Customs, he was ordered to trans-"fer from the balance of moneys then in his hands the said "amount, and pass it to the credit of the Crown, such sum "having been improperly credited to this Colony, and the " amount has been expended by her Majesty's Collector of " Customs in sundry disbursements of the office and officers in " this Colony."

Your Committee find an error in the Impost Accounts for the Port of Georgetown, of £8 11s. 11d., but the Treasurer has informed the Committee that the Collector for that Port has paid the amount into his hands, which will appear in the Accounts for the current year. There also appears an error, in the Impost Accounts for Crapaud of £119s. 6d., this sum has also been paid into the Treasury, and will appear as above. It would facilitate the examination of the Impost Accounts were the amount of articles imported and liable to duty under the head of Merchandize set down in the Accounts, distinct from the other dutiable articles, which practice is not at present followed by some of the Collectors of Impost.

Your Committee consider it their duty to call the attention of the House to the state of the Colonial Treasury Notes ; a large quantity of those in circulation are very much torn and defaced, and having been originally issued on an inferior kind of paper, a loss frequently arises to the holders of Notes; al-though there is in some degree a remedy provided by Law by issuing new Notes, yet individuals suffer before such takes place; besides the frequent issues are an additional expense to the Colony; and therefore, to avoid this in future, your Com-mittee would recommend that all Treasury Notes afloat be called in, and a new issue made on a better description of paper and new design of plate.

A discrepancy appears between the Report of the Commis-sioners appointed to investigate the Treasury Accounts, and the result of your Committee's enquiries respecting the amount of Treasury Warrants afloat—the former state it to be £30-200 14s. 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d., while your Committee, from the usual mode adopted by the Committees, on Public Accounts, of the House of Assembly, of ascertaining such, make the amount to be  $\pounds 28,226$  9s. 2d.; and as it appears by the Report referred to, that the Warrants paid off previously to the 21st January, 1845, have been all destroyed, your Committee cannot, there-fore, rectify any error (that may be on either side of these Reports) by a reference to the original Warrants paid off.

Your Committee anxious to ascertain the cause of this disparity, have obtained returns of the Public Accounts for the past 16 years, by which it appears the discrepancy has arisen from several causes, as set forth in the following Report, and that the amount of Warrants afloat is £30,216 17s. 113d.

"In conformity with the instructions received from the Committee of the Honorable House of Assembly, for investigating the Public Accounts, we have diligently applied our-selves to the examination of the Warrant-books and Treasurer's Accounts for the last sixteen years, with a view to ascertain the exactness of the balance due by the Colony, for Treasury Warrants affoat as reported by the Commissioners, respecting the Treasurer's accounts, in their Report. We find the amount stated in that Report, to be as correct as is possible to be ascertained, without making out new accounts with the Treasurers, for at least twelve years back. The whole of the differences

In this Table, which is prepared from unimpeacha-ble data, and will, we think, be found corrects a difference will be perceived with the published accounts of the House of Assembly, in every year, since any notice was taken of unpaid Warrants. These discrepancies have arisen from a variety of circumstances, and shew the necessity of a correct and uniform system of keeping the Books of the Colony, for the time to come. Some of the causes we allude to are-

> "The want of a regular record of Warrants issued, being entered into one volume.

> "The change in system-some years ago, the Warrants paid off appeared as Expenditure-and latterly, the Warrants issued have so appeared.

" The change of Committee to prepare and classify them.

" The carrying down of the Balance due by the Colony, from year to year, has not been done. "

Your Committee would further recommend to the House, the necessity of regulating by Law, the mode of keeping the Books of the Treasury Department, and the general manner of managing that office, the details of which your Committee do not consider it necessary to enter more fully into in this Re-port, more particularly, as the House is in possession of the Treasury Commissioners' Report, containing several recommendations, in which your Committee concur, with the exception of the fifth suggestion respecting the destruction of the Treasury Warrants.

It appears that there are several amounts in Bonds, which have remained in the Treasurer's hands for a considerable period, some under date of 1842, and several in 1843. Your Committee beg to observe upon this subject ; that although the parties are of course paying interest for this accommodation, yet as the Colony is also paying an equal amount of interest on its Debt, besides the known want of a money circulation in the Colony, your Committe consider it the duty of the Treasurer to enforce the payment of such Bonds, within a reasonable time after they become due.

Your Committee observe there is in the Treasurer's hands £549 8s. 31d., being the balance of sums received, from Coroners and Sheriffs at various times, as surplus of Sales of Land, under the 7th Clause of the Act of 7 William 1V. Cap. 31; as the whole of this sum will most probably remain unclaimed for some time, and perhaps a part of it may never be called for, your Committee would recommend, the amount should be paid out to redeem a like sum of Treasury Warrants, (whereby a saving of interest to about £33, would be effected) and the amount secured upon the Credit of the Colony, and in the event of its being, at any time, claimed by the owners of the Lands sold, to be refunded out of any moneys then in the hands of the Treasurer.

Your Committee would state their opinion, (and which they believe has been the opinion, of the former Committees on Public Accounts, appointed by the present Honse of Assembly) that much delay, loss of time, and expense are incurred in conse-quence of the late period, after the meeting of the Legislature, at which the Public Accounts are laid before the House of Assembly, particularly in the present Session, when the public business has in consequence been retarded, for at least two weeks. This delay your Committee consider might be avoided, if Auditors of Public Accounts were appointed by the Government, part of whose duty it would be, to have all accounts examined, compared and classified, previous to the meeting of the Legislature, and ready to lay before it, immediately on its assembling.

Your Committee annex, a statement of the amount of dutiable articles, entered at the several Impost Offices in the Colony, during the past year.

Your Committee recommend, that the usual Accounts and Warrant Book, be published in the appendix to the Journals.

About a year after Ferguson was in quiet possession of the Lot, a claim was set up to the property by another person holding a title to it under a grant given in 1803, to one Livingston.

The case having been, in 1837, referred by the Executive Council to the Attorney General for his opinion, that officer considered that the prior grant would hold good against Ferguson, and therefore recommended a settlement of the dispute by arbitration, which the Government sanctioned, with the understanding, that Ferguson was to be indemnified in any amount and costs that might be awarded against him.

The House of Assembly begs to state to your Excellency, that, it being land the property of the Crown, of which Ferguson obtained a grant, the House considers any loss or expense incurred by Ferguson in the suit, should not be chargeable against the general Revenue of the Colony; but as there is a balance undisposed of, arising from sales of such Crown Lands, the House of Assembly humbly submits to your Excellency, that application should be made to Her Majesty's Imperial Government, praying that the sum of Thirty Pounds should be paid Ferguson, to indemnify him for his loss; and in the mean time the House has voted the amount out of the Colonial Revenue, to save Ferguson from the further costs of a suit now pending against him for the said sum.

Legislative Council, of the 17th of March, having reference to the sending up the Appropriations for the public service of the Colony, and the Resolutions accompanying that Message, declaring that "The Coun-" cil cannot, consistently with that grave " responsibility which belongs to it, con-"tinue to receive the annual Appropria-" tions of the Public Revenue, in the man-" ner in which they are now usually sent " up to the Council, by the House of As-"sembly," have resolved unanimously, That the House of Assembly, after careful investigation, are unable to find any precedents for the extraordinary and unconstitutional course pursued by the Legislative Council, in calling the attention of the House to the manner of sending up the Appropriation Bill to the Council, for their concurrence.

The House of Assembly would suggest to the Legislative Council, that it is most unusual for the Legislative Council of a Colony to point out to the Colonial Assembly what course they ought to pursue, in the discharge of those duties, which, by the constitution, more particularly devolve upon the representatives of the people, in voting the necessary supplies for the public service.

The House of Assembly are of opinion, that the best rule for deciding questions of right, between the two branches of the Legislature, is an appeal to the law and custom of Parliament. The fittest evidence of those usages, is a reference to the most authentic precedents. The House of Assembly have minutely examined those precedents, and feel justified in declaring, that any departure from them involves a violation of the most essential principles of the constitution, and must be attended with serious detriment to the public service.

The House of Assembly must also remark, that the practice of the Imperial Parliament with regard to appropriations, which has so long prevailed in this Colony, is a part of the constitutional law of the Island, and cannot be constitutionally suspended, but by a local statute.

"The Legislative Council having had under its consideration the message of the House of Assembly of Saturday the 4th day of April, on the subject of the mode of sending up the Appropriations from the Assembly to the Council,

"RESOLVED, That the Council learns with deep regret, that the House of Assembly declines compliance with the wishes of the Council in this important matter.

"The Council would remark, that a better rule for deciding disputed questions of right between the two Houses of the Legislature, than that suggested by the House of Assembly, may be found by examination of the application of the law and custom of the Imperial Parliament, which is made in older Colonies, under similar circumstances.

W. Huskisson, of Lord John Russell, and of Lord Stanley, referred to by the House of Assembly, and which that House appears to deem conclusive in its favor. The Council does not presume to question the sincerity of the reliance which the Assembly seem to place on these Despatches, although it is unable to comprehend how the persual of them could terminate in a construction of their meaning so adverse to that which the Council entertains, and which the Council fully believes to be altogether in favour of the right claimed by it.

"The Council is, at the same time, aware, that when two parties, entertaining different opinions, appeal to the same authorities for confirmation of their views, but unhappily arrive at opposite conclusions, that such difference can only be settled by a resort to some higher tribunal. That higher tribunal, and the only one fully competent to the decision in the present instance, the Council conceives to be the Sovereign: by whose decree all disputes between different branches of the Colonial Legislatures, relating to their respective rights and privileges (not capable of adjustment between themselves) must be eventually settled.

"The Council is deeply concerned for the inconvenience which a strict adherence, on the part of either House, to the determination expressed in their respective Resolutions, might occasion to the Country; and is willing to resort to any expedient, and to adopt any middle course that may avert so serious an infliction. Actuated by these motives, and perceiving that the Assembly appeals to documents, on which the Council also strongly relies, (without presuming to ask for greater consideration of its construction of the Despatches alluded to, that it is willing to accord to that put upon them by the Assembly) the Council proposes to abandon the determination expressed in its message of the 17th day of March last, provided, that the Assembly will agree to the following arrangement, which the Council now respectfully tenders for its consideration, in the hope that by its adoption this question may be finally and amicably "The Council has carefully considered settled without even temporary inconve-

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"That the Council shall proceed to embody in an Address to her Majesty, its reasons for seeking to establish a different mode being limited to the desire to have the Apof sending up the Appropriations.

"That the Assembly shall also embody in an Address to her Majesty, its reasons for resisting the wishes of the Legislative Council in this matter.

"That both Houses shall proceed further to pass Resolutions, expressing their determination to regulate their future practice by, and in accordance with, Her Majesty's decision.

"Upon the Assembly's assent to this proposal, the Council will enter upon the consideration of the Appropriation Bill, for this Session, in its present form.

"The allusion made in the Resolutions of the House of Assembly to the responsibility attaching to the Council, if the Appropriation Bill should be lost, will not influence or intimidate the Council to abandon or shrink in the slightest degree from the responsibilities which the faithful and conscientious discharge of its high and important duties may impose. At the same time, it would suggest, that should the House of Assembly decline to concur in the proposal now made to it, and thereby compel the Council to reject the Appropriation Bill, all the evils attendant thereon will be justly attributable to the House of Assembly.

"The Council would also refer the House of Assembly to the Journals between the years 1803 and 1810; by a perusal of which, the Council hopes that the Assembly will be convinced that the practice alluded to by it, as existing since 1784, has not been uniformly acted upon.

"With respect to the observation made in the Message of the House of Assembly, asserting the discretion with which the Appropriations have heretofore been made, the Council must express its inability to recognize any marks of that discretion in the present embarrassed state of the finances of the Colony.

First. That the matter has been frequently brought before the Imperial Government; and that their opinion appears to the House of Assembly to be in favor of that procedure, to which the present House adheres, namely, the long established use.

Secondly. That if the Legislative Council consider there is any ambiguity in that opinion, the House of Assembly can offer no objection to the Legislative Council making application, to have such ambiguity cleared up.

Thirdly. That to expect the present House of Assembly, by one of the last acts of their last Session, to refer, as of doubtful right or utility, a practice which has been successively used as a right, by previous Houses of Assembly, for the last fifty years; and which, though occasionally challenged, was never abandoned, appears to the House of Assembly unreasonable.

Fourthly. That if the Imperial Government shall, on the request of the Legislative Council, enter on the matter, and shall pronounce an opinion that the Legislative message to the Council.

Council ought to have the powers they demand, and by Act of the Imperial Parliament shall enforce that opinion, it will be for the future House of Assembly to adopt such procedure as it may deem expedient.

Fifthly. In regard to the few instances occurring between the years 1803 and 1810, wherein sundry items of appropriation were sent up separately to the Council, for their concurrence, the House of Assembly have to remark, that these were appropriations solely out of the Permanent Revenue, over which the House of Assembly then exercised no control.

Sixthly. In regard to the "right always acceded to Colonial Legislative Councils," as alledged by the Legislative Council, the House of Assembly cannot admit this to be the fact; but believe, that on examination of the procedure of all the Colonies having two Legislative Bodies, it will be found rather the exception than the rule. In particular, the Colony of Jamaica has long followed the same procedure as the Assembly of this colony; and the united colony of the Canadas, whose peculiar situation, and whose reception of a new constitution tended to induce a searching examination into the privileges of the Representative branch, adopted at their first meeting in 1841, the following, as one of their standing orders: "That all Aids and Supplies " granted to Her Majesty by the Legislature " of Canada, are the sole gift of the Assem-" bly of this Province; and all Bills for " granting such Aids and Supplies, ought to " begin with the Assembly; as it is the un-" doubted right of the Assembly to direct, " limit, and appoint, in all such Bills, the " ends, purposes, considerations, conditions, "limitations and qualifications of such " grants, which are not alterable by the Le-" gislative Council."

## To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

### May it please your Majesty;

We Your Majesty's Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Members of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Legislative Session assembled, most humbly submit for Your Majesty's gracious consideration, the derangement and loss in the trade, which Your Majesty's subjects ties on the importation of Foreign and Colonial Corn

into Great Britain should be carried out in the manner in which we are led to believe is intended, as announced in the public journals of Great Britain.

Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects do not presume to make any suggestion in opposition to the Policy on this subject, which appears to guide Your Majesty's Counsels, and which have in view the final removal of all restrictions from this branch of trade; but humbly represent that the duties which it is proposed, by Your Majesty's advisers, to impose on Corn, the produce of the Colonies, is calculated to place on their trade greater restrictions than have heretofore existed. By the former rates of duty, a protection of from four to five shillings the quarter, was given to their Barley, Oats and Rye, when put in competition in the Markets with that of foreign growth; and at times, and very recently, the products of their industry were admitted into Great Britain on payment of 6d. per quarter; whereas they are now not only unprotected, bnt subject, for three years, to a duty called nominal, but to them of great importance, of 1s. per quarter.

Your Majesty's dutiful subjects beg respectfully to submit to Your Majesty their conviction, that it could only have been by inadvertency, that their interests have been placed in a worse situation by the contemplated change than heretofore, and that whilst the general policy of Your Majesty has had in view the removal of restrictions on trade, additional burdens have been placed on that of this Colony.

Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects humbly pray that your Majesty will take the premises into your gracious consideration, and that a total repeal of all duties on the importation of their Corn, may be forthwith executed.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

The Petition of the Representatives of the People of Prince Edward Island, in Parliament assembled,

Humbly Sheweth;

That your Petitioners deem it a duty they owe to their Constituents, most respectfully to draw your Majesty's attention to difficulties existing between their branch of the Legislature, and the Legislative Council, originating with the latter body; and in evidence of part of which differences, they crave reference to the several Resolutions transmitted by the one body to the other, and hereto annexed.

In the British Constitution, theory and practice alike concede a primordial and inherent right in the people to raise and appropriate the Revenue through their Representatives. and this right, the Legislative Council contends, should be subjected to its control by the exercise of a separate veto upon each item of the Appropriation Bill. Your Petitioners are unable to perceive any advantage that could arise (even abstractly) by superseding the Constitutional Law and practice of the Colony, by forms borrowed from the neighbouring Republic. That were it not too tedious for your Royal ear, your Petitioners could demonstrate to your Majesty, how, under the peculiar circumstances of this Colony, such a violation of its constitutional practice in favor of a Body essentially irresponsible, might seriously affect the rights and interests of their Constituents. That the Council bases its pretensions to interference in the construction of the Appropriation Bill, upon " the lavish expenditure" of your Petitioners, as evidenced by their grant, two years ago, of  $\pounds 2,500$  to complete the new Provincial Building. In refutation, your Petitioners would observe, that the onus of erecting that Building did not originate with them, but was transmitted from previous Parliaments; that the additions required, were strongly recommended by the Commissioners, and by the Superintendent, and that the Resolution adopted by a part of the Council, neither contests the necessity of those additions, nor the reasonableness of their cost.

The sum voted to defray the expences of your Petitioners while in Session, is another theme of discord with the Council-a subject to which your Petitioners would most respectfully claim your Majesty's attention. It is a fact of which the Council should not have been ignorant, that, in order to obviate corruption, and obtain a confidential representation, the custom of remunerating Members of the Representative

versally, not only in your Majesty's North American Provinces, but also in the several States of the neighbouring Union, among a people remarkable for not paying public servants beyond what absolute necessity has rendered imperative. That the last three Sessions of the Legislature averaged about two months ; that the pay of an individual member for each Session has been Twenty Sovereigns, a sum much below that paid in your Majesty's other Provinces. That it is an item of expenditure which their Constituents are satisfied to bear; and that, were it withdrawn or diminished, the representation would necessarily be centred in the hands of individuals residing in or near Charlottetown, in whom the Colony generally could not repose confidence, and who, in the absence of direct remuneration, might, and your Petitioners doubt not would compensate themselves, by sanctioning the creation of sinecure offices, and tax the people for their support ; and to this result, your Petitioners cannot suppose the Council to be blind.

Your Petitioners humbly submit, that the debt of the Colony, although an evil which must and will be gradually abated, is not of that ruinous nature, which the alarm endeavoured to be excited upon the subject by the other branches of the Legislature, might lead your Majesty to suppose. That while the debt of Canada averages about thirty shillings, and that of New Brunswick fourteen shillings, that of this Colony amounts only to about ten shillings per headall Halifax Currency. That the debt of this Island is an investment in a Provincial Building-creditable to the Colony; in expensive, but most necessary public Wharves, and in extensive carriage Roads, cut through the primeval forest, which are kept in good repair, and well bridged. That in the course of the last nine years, the Legislature has expended nearly £38,000 in the construction and repair of Roads and Bridges; while, in the same time, the aid afforded by an absentee proprietary has not amounted to £200. That the appropriations for the current year do not exceed the sum of  $\pounds14,000$ , while the probable Revenue for the same period (taking the amount to be not beyond that for 1845) will most likely amount to £17,000; thus showing that the House of Assembly have been as economical of the public funds as the exigencies of the Colony permit them to be.

Your Petitioners would humbly bring under your Majesty's notice, the fact, that the Legislative Council did not consider the Despatch of Mr. Huskisson, of 21st October, 1827, nor that of Lord John Russell. dated 31st March, 1841, authorized their interference with the Appropriation Bill. That the Council having petitioned your Majesty upon the subject. and Lord Stanley, in his Despatch of the 1st September, 1845, having adhered to the opinion of his predecessors in body for their attendance in Parliament, prevails uni- office, the mistaken idea of their pesition, and the

desire of overruling the House of Assembly, prevalent in the Legislative Council, have induced an inexperienced majority of that body, to assume, as their right, that which their recent application to your Majesty, virtually admitted they did not possess.

Your Petitioners respectfully, but firmly submit, that the main utility of a Legislative Council, is by its grave forbearance, wisely to conciliate and moderate any hasty or inconsiderate measures of the Representative body; and that your Majesty's Legislative Council of this Colony, should have so little understood its duty and position, as most unnecessarily to fan into a flame, the antagonistical principles of the British Constitution, is, in the opinion of your Petitioners, incontrovertible evidence of the incapacity of a majority of that Council, to legislate wisely and well, the more especially as a majority of your Petitioners coincide, on general subjects, in opinion with the Council.

Your Petitioners beg further to inform your Majesty, that the existing unhappy differences in the Legislature, may be traced to the unfortunate practice which has of late years prevailed with the head of the Executive, in promoting to Legislative honours, any plausible, but locally uninformed stranger who may land in this Colony, in preference to selecting such from the old, experienced inhabitants of the Colony, unbiassed by interest to either party. That the majority in the Council, is composed of only one unexceptionable individual; of five persons of comparatively recent immigration; and of your Majesty's Solicitor General, who has previously evinced that his views and interests as a Land Agent or Bailiff over 200,000 acres of land, are incompatible with the right discharge of his duty as a law Officer of the Crown; and who, in accordance with this feeling, advocates the rejection of the Appropriation Bill, although he must contemplate the resort of your Petitioners to one of the last defences of Constitutional freedom, in the suspension of those supplies which your Petitioners are, and ever have been prepared to grant to your Majesty. That the minority in the Legislative Council who supports the constitutional practice of your Petitioners, is composed of the Honbls. Robert Hodgson, (Attorney General), John Brecken, George Dalrymple, Charles Young and Alexander Anderson-all of whom, excepting the latter gentleman, have served in the Representative body, and all without an exception, are possessed of long and intimate Colonial experience-forming a very striking contrast to the majority.

As your Petitioners, above all considerations, are bound to maintain the rights and privileges of their Constituents, and their own independence and honour, tion that the Lieutenant, Governor is the true cause of any evils that a collision between the two Branches of the Legislature may produce-without referring to continued acts of petty despotism, never for the last thirty years attempted in North America-your Petitioners humbly prefer the following charges against His Excellency, in order to procure his removal from an office which he is incapable of filling to the advantage of your Majesty's service, or the welfare of the people over whom he has been unfortunately appointed to rule:-

1st. For having appointed to seats in the Legislative Council, four individuals-Messrs. Swabey, Irving, Rice and Hensley-of little Colonial experience, residing in, or within a few miles of Charlottetown; while gentlemen in every respect unexceptionable, might have been nominated within the same bounds.

2ndly. For the re-appointment of the Hon. William Swabey, to a seat in the Council. This individual arrived in the Colony about six years ago, and was. within eighteen months after his arrival, promoted to the Legislative Council; but being ambitious of a seat in the Representative body, resigned his appointment, and was, by a great majority, rejected at the Hustings, and having thus most incontestibly proved that he did not possess the confidence of the community, was reinstated in the Council. Your Petitioners further consider this to have been a bad selection, because Mr. Swabey is possessed of no fixed property in the Colony. --He is the mover of the existing differences.

3dly. For having, of his sole authority, suspended for the last Twelve months, the operation of an Act for the better prevention of Smuggling, which had passed the three Branches of the Legislature, and since that. has received Your Majesty's Royal assent -conduct, which your Petitioners believe to have been alike unconstitutional and injurious to the Revenue.

4thly. For loss to the Revenue, caused by neglect or contempt of duty in not having yet filled the office of Collector of Impost, at the Port of New London; although the resignation of the previous Officer was accepted about a year ago.

sthly. For acting, in many important matters, without the advice of his Council, to the detriment of the public service-his Constitutional advisers, in the majority of the Assembly, having frequently in their place in Parliament, expressed their inability to afford the Representative body any information upon certain measures, because His Excellency had not consulted them.

May it therefore please Your Majesty, to remove from the Government of this Colony, His Excellency, Sir Henry Vere Huntley; and to displace the Hon. James H. Peters, from the Office of Solicitor Geneand as they are deeply impressed with the convic- ral-as the interests of his employers claiming one

seventh of the whole Island, set him in opposition to the rights of the Crown, and the interests of the people.

Your Petitioners further pray, that Your Majesty may be pleased to command such an alteration in the construction of the Legislative Council, as that it may be likely in future to take measures less hostile to the rights of the Representative branch of the Legislature, and by such change to confer great public benefit on all Your Majesty's Loyal Subjects in this Colony,

And your Petitioners as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I cannot relieve you from the duties in which you have been engaged, without expressing the gratification I feel, in the suspension of those differences, which, had the respective Houses adhered to them, would have caused much embarrassment, and probably much distress amongst those who may be suffering under the present diminution of the means of subsistence in this Colony; at the same time, when each party seems so confident in the rectitude of their respective views, and when each sees support of these views in the same documents, it becomes a matter of regret, that the proposal to refer the question for the decision of Her Majesty the Queen, was rejected. By such a course the harmonious co-operation of the two Houses would have remained undisturbed, and a case which has been for years the fertile ground of dispute, for ever disposed of.

The alterations in the Act for the regulating of the Militia, will, I hope, tend to render that force more effective, should circumstances call for its active employment.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

In acknowledging the supplies which have been granted for the public service, I have to observe, and with regret, that no portion of the Revenue for the current year, has been specially set apart to reduce the amount of debt, now arrived at more than  $\pounds 30,-$ 000; this tends to the continuance of a heavy interest charge upon the narrow resources of the Colony.

me by your House, I shall have much pleasure in transmitting them by the earliest opportunity.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

It is a cause of surprise to me, that the glaring defect which I pointed out in the "Act for the better prevention of Smuggling" remains uncorrected. The Act contains probably the only instance on record, of persons entrusted with the duties of the preventive service being rendered legally irresponsible; and being further allowed the uncontrolled disposal, for their own peculiar use, of the proceeds of all seizures they may make. Should the existence of this Act be known beyond the limits of the Colony, I have no doubt of an enlargement in the Smuggling Trade to this Island, which, although before attended by natural facilities, was not legally encouraged by human art.

During the period that will intervene, from this time to that of the harvest, I rely upon your carefully examining into any claims for relief which may come before you, arising out of the apparent destruction of much of the produce forming the general subsistence of the poorer classes; and I shall be happy to receive your opinions upon the merits of such claims with the least possible delay, in order that the means provided to meet them may be applied in the most ready and efficient manner.

On such a statement, I cannot but apprehend that the issues of paper money have already been excessive, and that the depreciation above mentioned, and the absence of metallic circulating medium, are principally attributable to that excess.

If these impressions be correct, it appears to me that they furnish substantial reasons against the issue of any further paper money; but I shall be happy to receive from you more explicit information on the subject, especially with respect to the amount of debt now outstanding: the actual exchangeable value of the Government paper, or of the Warrants bearing interest, as compared with coin, and the arrangements that either have been made, or are proposed to be made, for rendering the Revenue equal to meet the current expenditure of the Island, and for providing for the redemption both of the existing debt, and of the suggested addition to it.

In my former Despatch I stated the reasons which prevented my advising Her Majesty to accede to the wishes of the Council and Assembly for an extension of the paper currency of the Island. For the same reasons it is desirable that the present amount of the paper currency should be reduced; and as the effect of the present Act, if permitted to become law, would be to divert from its proper object, the fund especially appropriated for the redemption of the Treasury Notes now in circulation, Her Majesty cannot be advised to confirm it.

SIR; I have had under my consideration an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, at their last Session (No. 633,) "to consolidate, amend and

continue the Act relating to Merchant Seamen."

This Act was framed on the British Statute, passed in 1835, relating to Merchant Seamen; and had that statute been now in force, the Colonial Act might have been left to its operation; but it was amended by the Statute 7 and 8 Vic. Cap. 112, and therefore it is desirable that the Colonial Legislature should reconsider this subject, with the view of adopting those amendments.

In doing so they will bear in mind, that the Merchant Seamen of this country are subject to the provisions of the British Statute in question, wherever they may be: that the Merchant Seamen of the British Colonies are likewise subject to the provisions of this Statute (except those relating to agreements, apprenticeships, and registration) wherever they may be, unless within the precincts of their own Colony; and that the Merchant Seamen of any Colony having a Legislature, are not subject to the provisions of the British Statute, whilst within the precincts of such Colony.

The Colonial Legislature should, in fact, only legislate respecting its own Seamen, and whilst within its own precincts; and in so doing they should place them, whilst within the Colony, upon the same footing as the British Seamen, except in the respect to apprenticeship and registration. With regard to registration, it would be advisable that they should postpone the consideration of that subject until they shall have seen how it has been dealt with by the Canada Legislature.

Her Majesty's decision upon this Act will be suspended, until it shall be seen whether the Legislature of Prince Edward Island are willing to adopt these suggestions.

#### VISITOR'S school report.

## FOR THE YEAR 1845.

## TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION:

GENTLEMEN;

The present Return comprehends my Eighth Annual Report on the state and extension of Elementary Education in this Island.

In submitting this to your view, I would respectfully premise, that although our Educational system, so far as relates to District Schools, presents various features of interest, I cannot flatter myself with the hope of investing with any attractive novelty, an additional description of a path already so frequently and recently trodden; my expectations will be fully realized, if I shall be enabled once again to arrest public attention, and fix it, however feebly, on an object, which, apart from considerations of official duty, I have much at heart; or prove of the smallest service in promoting the general Education of the people, by adding an item to the information on the subject, which the authorities and the public already possess.

The enquiry which first suggests itself, is, what has been done hitherto, and more especially in the past year, in the extension and improvement of Education on this Island? To supply instruction, and stimulate the people to receive it, the Government and the Legislature, for a considerable period, have not been wanting in enlightened efforts, although it has been denied that the instruction so supplied has been the best of its kind, that circumstances would admit. Obstacles of an extraneous, and also of a social nature have hitherto been opposed to the establishment, on the best principles, of a system of popular instruction, simple in its organization, and uniform in its chief features. The time appears rapidly approaching-if not already at hand-when such a system, practicable in its adaptation and appliances to our position, as an agricultural and commercial community, must exist among us in full force, and be no longer an experiment, but a great and successful and permanent institution.

To afford a view of the existing state of common school education, I beg to remark, that the appended Return, embracing such amount of Statistics as the Law prescribes, comprises Six District Schools of the higher Class, Eighty-six District Schools of the First or lower Class; Three Female Schools, Eleven Primary, and Six French Acadian Schools; total 112. These, exclusive of the Central Academy, the National and Infant Schools, form the whole public Educational Establishment of the Island, receiving support from Government, and imparting instruction to 4600 children of both sexes. This exhibits, I regret to state -when compared with the Returns of the year preceding-a decrease of three in the Schools drawing I find also a decrease of six in all other public unlicens ed Schools-the number of which, last public aid. year, was 17-thus leaving a total of 126 public Seminaries of all grades, imparting instruction to 5040 pupils.

During the ten years preceding 1844, I find the Schools to have increased in almost a steady, and progressive average of Six per annum. In that year there was more than an ordinary increase of Seventeen; but to whatever cause, or combination of causes, you may ascribe this result, I find, from unerring data, the decrease to be, as above represented, in the year which has just closed. 

In a tabular statement, compiled with considerable care, and appended to my last year's Report, the total juvenile population, within what is usually reckoned the educational age-Six to Fourteen-is ascertained; and from a comparison of that summation with the entire number of pupils who now frequent Schools, it will be found that not more than two-thirds of the youth of the Island participate in the means of regular public instruction. It would nevertheless appear, that the Schools already open would be nearly, if not altogether, sufficiently numerous to educate the whole, allowing to each School, an average attendance ranging, from 60 to 70 Scholars, which with uniform Books, and appropriate School apparatus, would not under favourable circumstances be found too great; but from the scattered nature of many Settlements, and other causes operating, this standard would, in general, be too high; but while it is evident that cir-cumstances call for the crection of some additional Schools; no very material increase in their humber is at present requisite; to sustain and enlarge the sphere of usefulness of those already in operation, is a mat-ter of greater moment; this and of other countries will shew, that on the voluntary principle, not one balf of the children of the proner are, will attend schools during the first two or three years after their the

half of the children of the proper age, will attend schools during the first two or three years after their ef-

tablishment; so that in the commencement, the number of Schools need not be so great, in relation to the population, as is ultimately proposed; as the benefits of Education become generally felt and understood, infinitely greater efforts will be made by parents to support the system, and thus fewer Schools would suffice, till the benefit was felt, and the spirit and necessity grow up together. I am happy to know that the growth of this spirit is daily extending, and supplanting that apathy which a few years back was too general; and I find, from close observation, that much is now voluntarily done in support of Schools, which would formerly be considered a grievance. While I am thus led to conclude that Education, in respect to quantity, is pretty generally apportioned to such of our population as are willing to receive it; it only remains to consider whether in its quality it be sufficient to meet the requirements of the public—the necessities of the times.

It is known to your Board, that a Legislative enactment provides for and organizes the Schools, and stretches its view beyond primary education, by encouraging schools of a higher grade wherever called for, and presenting no limitation to the instruction to be given in them; but it does not lay down any system of discipline, or define the objects to be taught in any class of schools. In this, I submit, is a material defect. While bearing in mind that Education has been to such an extent fostered by the Government, it remains to exhibit the effect of such encouragement, in the present state and efficiency of those schools provided for by Statute; but in estimating the progressive improvement in the quality of elementary instruction thus imparted, I would beg to bring to the notice of your Board, the fact that thirteen years ago, the average annual salary paid from the public funds to each District Teacher, was  $\pounds 9 \ 2 \ 0$ . At the present day, the yearly amount paid from the same source for the like object, is  $\pounds 9 \ 18 \ 0$ —an increase of Sixteen Shillings only in the Legislative allowance, in all that period: the share of school money paid directly by the people, I do not believe to have materially increased in the same time beyond the same ratio, being under an average of  $\pounds 40$  per annum, for every Teacher. If the standard of instruction in our common Schools be found higher than in 1833, we must refer it to other causes, than any direct encouragement from an increase of salary, or an improvement in the state of Teachers' finances.

### GENERAL ABSTRACT,

EMBRACING & DESCRIPTION OF THE DIFFERENT GRADES OR CLASSES OF SCHOOLS, WITH THE BRANCHES

COMMONLY TAUGHT, IN THE FOLLOWING ORDER.

### **P**rimary or preparatory Schools.

In these Seminaries there is little taught beyond Reading and Spelling, and occasionally a little Writing and Arithmetic; they are useful in remote and thinly peopled Districts, where District Schools could not be supported.

### French Acadian.

Of this description of Schools it may be stated, that the attainments of their Teachers are equal, and in some instances superior, to what the peculiar habits of that class of our population require.

I find that two of these Teachers have received Licenses as District Schoolmasters throughout the year; the parents, although clinging to their native language and antiquated habits, are occasionally shewing a desire that their children should adopt modern improvements; and a wish for the advantage of an English Education, is of late perceptible, although the effects are not yet felt among that people as a body.

### Infant Schools.

In addition to the one established in Charlottetown, another of these seminaries has been opened in Georgetown, in the course of the present year. Although the supervision of these does not come within the sphere of the duty of the Visitor—not being provided for by statute, yet as a small grant has been voted by the Legislature to the encouragement of that in this town, it may be proper on this occasion to bring it into public notice, and which will appear under the head of "Religious Instruction."

### National or Madras School.

For a reason similar to that which led to a notice of the preceding class of Schools, the School of this name, of which there is but one,—and that open in this town—is entitled to a passing notice. Having on a former occasion described its condition and the nature of the instruction, both religious and secular, imparted, it may be sufficient to say, that it will be found through the year which has closed, to have sustained a reputable character as a seminary, combining cheapness with utility; and by its effective system of monitorial discipline, for which schools of this class are known under favorable circumstances to exhibit admirable models, and the ability with which the preparatory branches are taught, it lays a solid foundation in the common branches of a useful English Education.

### Female Schools.

The influence which these Schools exert wherever properly managed, is known to be salutary.—In these comparatively silent and unpretending Seminaries, much valuable instruction is conveyed, to children, whose tender years, and wayward inclinations, require the exercise of mildness and indulgence. They also teach those branches of industry which form an important part of female education; they are the nurseries whence District Schools draw some of their supply; and while cheapness is an important consideration in our School Economy, they ought to be regarded as a standard part of our educational establishment. In a neighbouring Province, Female Schools form a full third of the whole number of public Schools.

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In Charlottetown, two receiving a share of the public grant, are very creditably and successfully conducted, and form the best preparatory Schools of their kind.

At St. Peter's, two of the same class are also open this year, and after a careful and minute examination, appear to me to be well entitled to the provision made by law for their encouragement.

## District Schools, First Class.

The objects of instruction in Schools of this grade, are principally Reading, Writing, Arithmetic; and English Grammar, and in these, the knowledge generally communicated—although more restricted than could be wished—is more extended in its nature, as well as higher in degree, than that afforded by the Primary Schools. Although susceptible of much amelioration, it cannot be in fairness said that common School education is in a low state among us; with the exception of two or three taught in an inefficient and unsatisfactory manner, the Schools of this class sustain a character for general usefulness, and not a few are exceedingly well conducted—their peculiar characteristics will more fully appear under the heads of the Branches taught, to which head I beg to refer you.

### District Schools, Second Class.

The observations on the character of the foregoing will be equally applicable to this class of Schools, being distinguished from the other in scarcely any thing than a capability of imparting instruction in the additional branches of the Latin Language, and the Mathematics, of which advantages, however, but few of their pupils have bitherto availed themselves. It is creditable to the zeal and talents of several young Teachers, and indicative of the spirit of emulation and improvement abroad, that they continue every year by dint of self study and occasional attendance at the Central Academy, to raise themselves to this, the highest class of our elementary Schools; this zeal is certainly worthy of more encouragement than the addition of Five pounds to their Legislative allowance, on passing an examination in this class.

### Instruction of Indians.

To the philanthropist this must always be an interesting subject. In not overlooking the education of the Micmac tribe, the Government has taken an important step towards the amelioration of their condition, and their advancement in civilization.

Four years since a sum of £15 was granted towards enabling an Indian Lad, who had attended school some years, and had made considerable proficiency, to prosecute his studies under the most favourable auspices, but it is a matter of regret that this youth could not be induced to avail himself of the bounty. He is at present with his wandering tribe, engaged in their accustomed favourite pursuits of hunting, trapping, &c. Whether he can yet be reclaimed and made the instrument of conveying to his tribe the instruction he already possesses, is now a matter of doubt; I would submit, however, that the grant adverted to, if not soon claimed, be applied to the encouragement of other Micmacs—two male and three female children of whom are now frequenting different Schools, at Richmond Bay and St. Peter's, and are at the latter place especially, a considerable tax on the charity of the benevolent family of the Teacher.

From the foregoing, it will be seen that of all the Townships, Lot 32 contains the largest number of Schools, amounting to five; the next to it, in point of Educational means, is Lot 57, numbering four. Lots 24, 28, 33, 34, 47, 49 and 55 number three Schools in each, and the remaining Townships number, some two and others one School each, excepting Townships 2, 6, 9, 10, 44, 60, 63 and 66, which have no public Schools receiving Legislative aid.

### Methods of Instruction.

It may be expected that among 112 Teachers scattered over the Island, and differing in their mental and moral endowments, and consequently in their habits of thought and of action, a very marked diversity in their manner of carrying on the business of tuition should exist; it will be found, that a very general uniformity now obtains in the mere mode—the routine of tuition A general uniform system of sound elementary education, to be fully efficacious and successful, must include as an essential element, a training or model School: Until this be established, some diversity must always exist. But difficulties arising from this want, which could not be overcome or removed, have of late years been considerably modified. At my periodical visitations, conferences of teachers are generally held at central stations, and by witnessing the examination of each other's Schools, attending Lectures, &c., opportunities are afforded of profiting by the experience and labours of one another. Several also, as already stated, yearly attend some time at the Central Academy: all this has insured a considerable degree of uniformity in these Schools.

It may be here not irrelevant to add, that while Education will make the Scholar, Nature must form the Teacher, and I invariably find that where a love for the profession does not exist, where a tact in teaching, uprightness, energy, and a judgment in adapting methods to circumstances are not to be found, the School, despite the Teacher's literary qualifications, always bears an inferior reputation; occasional diversity in other particulars is to be found, where one rules his School effectually without the aid of corporal punishment, while another does not see how it can possibly be dispensed with; one excels in teaching in a clear and perspicuous manner, Grammar and Geography, without the aid of Books, but in Arithmetic or Writing he is less successful than his neighbour, who, in the first named branches, can do nothing without his manuals. A Normal School can alone balance such excellences and defects, so as to produce the best general result.

## Branches of Instruction---how taught. Reading.

Until within the last few years, almost every School on the Island imparted instruction in this branch, on what is generally now called the rote system; it was considered sufficient, if the child could read over his lesson without blundering; all he learned was to name certain printed cymbols or words, knowing little or nothing of the meaning of what was read; certain Teachers were compelled to the practice of this system, more from want of Books suited to the capacity of the young, than from absence of professional skill; from the improved series of school books now in general use, the best system of teaching reading can easily be pursued; the new edition of the English Reader lately published in this Town, contains in the additions made to the old text, admirable lessons, both explanatory and elliptical, fitted to exercise the judgment of the pupils, and by questions on every lesson, their faculties are excited to listen, to comprehend, and to answer. I am the more anxious to draw the particular attention of Teachers to this head, from the circumstance of several having last year been rejected by your Board of Examination, in consequence of their inability to read, while found competent enough (paradoxical though it may seem) in other branches required. I remark another defect in the practice of several Masters who, knowing better, habitually speak bad English, and the language of their scholars is sure to be equally incorrect. Indistinctness of articulation and vulgar and provincial, dialects are yet too much tolerated in Schools. A greater attention paid to the rules for correct reading, prefixed to the lessons in the English Reader, and similar Class Books; would be found useful to Teachers, as explaining and enforcing those principles which nature berself must dictate to every Teacher, in preference to an affected or artificial mode of reading and elocution. The practice of reading before the pupils without knowing whether the echo of each of them be right or wrong, is highly objectionable: The Schools where this branch is best taught, are Nos: 3/ 4/6; 9; 13/20, 21, 33, 87, 49, 58, 59, 60, 66, 77, 46, 79, 84, 86, 98, 101, 102, and the state of the state of

### Orthography or Spelling.

This Branch, which may be termed the anatomizing of the Language into its constituent letters, is more neglected, I regret to say, than any other branch of tuition, although it lies at the foundation of all good reading and correct writing. Constant practice is the only certain mode of obtaining accuracy in spelling. A plan of late successfully adopted is worthy of remark: a teacher writing on a black-boärd the letters forming a word, sometimes correctly as well as designedly incorrectly, the pupil is required to point out what is incorrect, thus exercising his perceptions, and shewing the connexion between form and sound. Spelling words in classes by naming one letter at a time is objectionable, for although exciting the attention, the benefit cannot be equivalent to the time consumed, which, by this plan, is very considerable. I beg to repeat, that spelling can only be acquired by constant practice, not by repeating long column, but by practice in reading and also writing from dictation, &c.

### Writing,

Which if performed in a neat and clean style, would induce habits of neatness and of order, is taught in a very slovenly manner in Country Schools, owing principally to the very poor appointments of de-ks and seats; children are often seen shivering from cold, and unable to hold a pen, in consequence of openings in the roofs, walls and windows of many school-houses; the desks and seats are often at such inconvenient relative distances, that children cannot possibly reach from one to another with the slightest degree of comfort, in a sitting posture, and are thus constrained to stoop in a half recumbent, half sitting position; but I have always observed that the teacher whose style of writing was good, almost invariably succeeded in spite of these obstacles, in imparting a similar character to the chirography of his scholars The Schools in which writing in a neat, elegant and business-like style is most successfully taught, are Nos 9, 14, 16, 17, 18, 23, 24, 34, 41, 44, 49, 60, 61, 63, 64, 65, 66, 79, 80, 81, 86, 90, 95.

### Arithmetic.

A general defect in the mode of teaching this Science is by confining the instruction to the learning of dry rules, generally unintelligible to the young, and leaving them to solve as they best may, the questions propounded, instead of accelerating their progress, by shewing them at once the meaning of rules and questions, by examples wrought at length before the eye of the pupil. Instead of confining themselves to the bare text of a printed treatise, were teachers to adopt the practice of extending the various exercises by practical questions of every day business, scholars would carry from school into the world a much greater and useful amount of information on this head than they now do. I think that Arithmetical education from its great utility in after life, and from its tendency to generate a habit of correct reasoning, might be pushed much farther in elementary schools, so as to give to all the pupils a knowledge of vulgar fractious and decimal calculations at least. The Schools wherein this is most successfully taught, are Nos. 3, 6, 12, 14, 25, 26, 28, 30, 37, 38, 39, 40, 42, 44, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 61, 63, 65, 66, 68, 69, 77.

#### Grammar,

Which may be termed the gate of all languages; that which ought to be considered the pupils' greatest accomplishment—the proper speaking and writing of his mother tongue—is yet among many of our Schools too much despised, or at least despaired of as a thing almost unattainable. Our teachers in too many instances have entertained the idea that nothing could be done in this department without a book in the hands of each child, forgetting that when addressed vira voce, the scholar naturally strives to comprehend the meaning, which is of greater import than labouring to have the exact words of a book imprinted on the memory, and slavishly following the words, rather than solicitous about the *idea*. The opinion is gradually extending, that Grammar can be accurately taught, even incidentally in the course of reading exercises—a knowledge which is leading to a better order of things than pupils have hitherto enjoyed in this department of their education Exercises on Etymology, exhibiting the several roots of the English Language, and a general analysis of its structure, are now beginning to be more generally practised in District Schools, in Schools Nos. 4, 6, 7, 9, 20, 28, 31, 33, 34, 57, 44, 49, 59, 60, 66, 74, 77, 80, 85, 86, 88, 89, 95, 96, 101, 103, 108.

### Geography

Is taught but in ten District Schools, to thirty-five pupils only. The many important advantages to be derived from the study of this branch, which should be taught to every child, is almost entirely lost to the youth of the Island, who on leaving School know nothing of the surface of the Planet on which they live, neither have they any accurate knowledge of the character, physical and political, of its countries or of its climates, its plants, or animals, its races of men, and their degrees of civilization. As in the case of Grammar, the want of text books seems to have deterred teachers from instructing largely in this branch. I would submit that nothing more appears to me necessary for effectually and universally teaching this branch, than that every teacher be provided with a text book and a map, such as the Board of Education have imported for the use of the District Schools, (but only one of which have yet been applied for.) and then exercise the pupils on the relative position of the countries, causing them, as far as possible, to find out these for the selves, and thus by an easy process, convert every geographical and bistorical fact into a familiar intervogation. In many of the Primary Schools in the New England States, all the apparatus by aid of which a piece of chalk, the teacher draws rapidly off-hand sketches, skeleton maps, or bare outlines of countries, which the scholars, after being exercised thereon, very soon learn to do with equal despatch and accuracy.

## **Religious Instruction.**

All the youth of the Island receiving education associate together in our public Schools, without regard to religious points. Until very recently Catechisms were taught in Day Schools, and where the teacher and children did not belong to the same denomination, it happened, in not a few instances, that the Catechisms of various opposing sects were taught in the same School; but this practice being discontinued by some of the more scrupulous Teachers, and their conduct in so doing leading to feelings of animosity, it has been now abandoned, and by a compromise between opposing views, Catechisms are now banished from mixed Schools altogether. The New Testament is generally used as a reading Book. The series of School Books recommended by your Board, and now in common use, have an additional value in consequence of many of their lessons inculcating some of the most important principles of christianity, and recommending a great variety of moral duties; this is as far as religious instruction goes in our common Schools, with the exception of the following, which are the only Schools receiving public aid under the statute, esta-blished in connection with a religious body, but open to all denominations, and in these religion is taught directly from the oracles of truth, and questions thereon systematically put to the children, and passages and chapters of the Scriptures committed to memory-all with the intention of inculcating a knowledge of their contents-these Schools are those numbered 14, 21, 27, 84, 91.

The Charlottetown Infant School may be classed with the foregoing in this particular-as it is designed and fitted more to impart Scriptural knowledge, and train its pupils, by regulating their habits and dispositions, than to teach them either accurately or extensively the common and primary branches of education. It owes its origin and much of its support to the benevolent exertions of one or two charitable gentlemen in the Town, and a Committee of Ladies constantly superintend the School, and the comfort and improve-ment of their interesting young charge—up to the vacation at Christmas the average attendance was 95. The room is large, commodious, and well furnished with every apparatus necessary to the comfort of the children; and out-of-door amusement is blended with the delightful and healthy exercise of singing.-It is well entitled to public support.

Such is a general view-as extensive as limits will permit-of the state of the common Schools of this Island. It may be said that the portion of instruction communicated therein to the productive classes, should be strictly confined to that which is likely to prove useful to them in their condition of life, as the great majority who participate in public education are found amongst those whose lot it is to obtain a livelihood by manual labour; but if each of the population should receive an education suited to his circum-stances, by giving him the means of deriving the greatest possible advantage from his situation, in leading him to learn the improvements of others, as well as to devise improvements himself, then it is evident, that the instruction so supplied is not yet adequate to enable him successfully to follow his natural pursuits, and compete with those of his own class in other countries.

Without materially burdening the public Revenue, a very moderate share of encouragement would soon put a few of the most efficient of our District Schools in a condition to embrace and supply a wide range of instruction. It might be provided, that no child should leave school, and go into the world, without a knowledge of the world and the laws which govern it, by giving him a distinct and comprehensive idea of the elements and principles of natural science.

Grammar should be taught in a more practical connection with composition; for it must be confessed that few speak and write correctly, compared with the number who have gone through what is called a course of Grammar. A knowledge of Geography, Navigation and Surveying, so necessary to an agricultural and trading community, should be more promoted and encouraged. This encouragement should stimulate the best of our Teachers, some of whom now are—and more would speedily be, qualified for the task—to cultivate with greater energy and success the mental soil of the Island. To make it the interest of the Teacher to extend his course of instruction, he should be paid, not in consideration of the branches he might be found qualified to teach, but in proportion to the number and variety of those he really does teach, and a competition by examination should take place for the best school.

This would ultimately pave the way for other desiderated improvements. It is already felt, that scientific principles must be brought to the aid of agriculture, and that intelligence must assist industry, so as to increase the natural productiveness of the soil, and make it capable of supporting, in comparative comfort, an increased population. Some zealous friends to the prosperity of the Island, who have anticipated me on this head, are already agitating the most desirable mode of establishing a School for this most important end. It remains but to add, that the peoples' hearty co-operation, with the perseverance of the Govern-ment—the guardian and protector of the public weal—is all that is requisite to insure that the general education to be furnished will be the best and most ample that can be devised.

His Excellency SIR H. V. HUNTLEY, Lieutenant Governor, and Patron and Visiter of the Central Academy.

The Trustees of the Central Academy, in the discharge of the office entrusted to them for the public service, deemed it incumbent on them, previous to the last meeting of the General Assembly of this Island, to make a representation to your Excellency of the inadequateness of the present emoluments arising to the Masters of the Institution, from the Salaries and tuition fees established by the late law: which representation your Excellency was pleased to recommend to the consideration of the House of Assembly.

A Bill to amend the Act was introduced into that House, but in consequence of a difference of opinion as to some particulars therein, between the branches of the Legislature, no proceedings were eventually taken.

Under these circumstances, the Trustees are constrained to renew their representation of this important matter to your Excellency, in the hope that it will obtain a more favorable result during the ensuing Session of the Legislature.

## Memorandum intended to explain the views of the Trustees of the Central Academy, for its improvement.

In the scheme proposed by the Trustees last year, for the remedy of the insufficient emoluments of the Masters of the Central Academy, two points appeared to deserve their particular regard. First, the necessity, in the present state of the finances, of avoiding the imposition of any additional charge upon the revenue; and secondly, the preservation of the present low scale of the tuition fees to those whose limited means rendered them proper objects of the Colonial bounty. They considered that the Legislative grants to that Institution were intended to enable persons with large families and restricted means, to procure within the Island such an education for their children as, if rightly and industriously followed out, would assist them to raise themselves in the estimation of society; and to enjoy, in after life, the various advantages which, however lightly valued by the uninstructed, are nevertheless (under God's guidance and control), the sure rewards of intellectual cultivation. In the pursuit of their object, they proposed to assimilate the Academy with some of the large schools in England and on the Continent of Europe. Many of these Schools were originally endowed, either by the Sovereign, or by some powerful and wealthy person or body, for the express purpose of educating a certain number of "poor scholars" (in the language of that day). But as these Institutions soon acquired considerable celebrity, many persons of wealth and station began to desire to participate in the benefits which such well regulated and ably mastered Schools afforded; having found also that private schools, by some inherent defect, failed to stimulate talent and industry to their full exertion. The original plan was therefore enlarged; and whilst the children of those who possessed the goods of this world were admitted into these Schools upon an arrangement which entailed considerable expense, the others not so well provided, continued to avail themselves of the bounty of the founders, and had their children presented upon the foundation. Thus at this day, at Eton, Winchester, &c., there are two classes of scholars, each enjoying similar advantages in education; but the class contemplated by the Founders are subjected to little outlay, whilst the more wealthy contribute more largely to the general expense; and thus the beneficent purposes for which those Institutions were created are more fully carried out, as they are thus enabled to procure the services of the most able teachers.

From the foundations of these schools have issued many accemplished scholars, and many able men, who, far from esteeming it a disgrace to have acquired their means of obtaining distinction in such humble circumstances, have continued to speak with triumphant gratitude of the benefits received; and to dwell with kindling affection upon the memory of their youthful studies and pursuits therein.

By an arrangement similar to that above mentioned, the Central Academy might be made all that the Island at present requires; and it would not then be said, as it has been said now, that we have the material for forming a permanently good school, but are too poor to support it as it ought to be supported; and too proud to adopt a very simple plan for remedying this embarrassment.

The Trustees believe it to be generally advantageous, that the sons of persons holding various positions in society should be educated together, without favor or preference, and the intercourse to be mutually bene-ficial.

The objections which have been urged against introducing any kind of distinction into an Institution where (it is said) all should be equal, seem scarcely to require answer; for however desirable this exact equality may appear in the estimation of some, it is nevertheless an idea which has never yet been realized, either in the great world, or in the minor one:

And with respect to youths entering these Institutions upon the Foundation, it has been generally found, that talents and industry, illustrated by a virtuous life and conversation, are of such price and value, as soon to elevate the possessors to a position from which the mode of their admission will be remembered only to their honour.

<sup>F</sup> In compliance with your request of the 16th June last, that I, as Road Commissioner of District No. Twelve (12), should forward you a "Return of the total linear extent of the Public Roads, &c. &c. together with other Statistical information enumerated in an Address of the House of Assembly in its last Session, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor," I forward the following in reply, viz:

110 miles total linear extent of Public Roads now in use.

- 2 Bridges over 400 feet long, and not 500 feet.
- 1 do. over 200 feet, and not 300 feet.
- 14 do. over 100 feet, and not 200 feet.
- 97 do. from 4 feet up to 60 feet, and all about 18 feet wide.
- 1 Wharf, 405 feet long.
- 1 do. 370 feet long.

In measuring the length of the Bridges, I have taken into consideration as much of the abutments of each Bridge as are equivalent in magnitude, or in other words, as expensive in their construction as the arches, or any other part thereof. I am not aware that there is any public road now in use that can be very well dispensed with, unless the old road from Duncan Macdiarmid's to Carey's, at St. Andrew's; and that will be objected to by many of the Settlers on Savage Harbour and the Sea Board, who use it on their way East and West to the Main Post Road. It is, I think, very desirable that the present line of road from Marie (with a new Bridge on that River) be altered in a straight line to the Main Post Road at Peter Kelly's. Some of the Settlers interested in a new line are willing to grant a right of way: others, I believe, request remuneration—the present line of road is very circuitous and croeked, and the distance is not much over one and one half mile.

### To the Honorables Charles Hensley, John Myrie Holl, Peter Stevart McNutt and William Swabey; Edward Thorpton, Thomas Owen and George Coles, Esquires-Greeting:

Whereas the House of Assembly of this Island, in the last Session of the Colonial Legislature, did present to me an Address, of which the following is a copy :----

"The House of Assembly, in appropriating the moneys for the service of Roads, Bridges and Wharves. being frequently at a loss for such accurate information as will enable them to make a just distribution and application of the public money voted for these purposes, humbly request, that your Excellency will be pleased to take the most effectual means which your Excellency is enabled to adopt, to procure, previous to the next meeting of the House of Assembly, a Return from the different Commissioners of Roads throughout the Island, stating from such ascertained facts as may be within their knowledge, the total linear extent of the public roads in their several Districts, designating any particular road, or extent of road, which has become, or is becoming, of no public utility, as well as any alteration in any road which may be deemed necessary for the public interest; also the number of Bridges, Wharves and Hards in each District, in three different classes, according to their magnitude; and such further remarks and information in these respects as may be of information to the House."

And whereas it has occurred to me, that the views of the House of Assembly would be materially assisted by eliciting the opinions of people whose opportunities have afforded them the means of acquiring information upon the most approved methods of constructing and managing public roads, so far as the same may be made applicable to the local circumstances of this Island—I bave, therefore, thought fit to appoint a Commission, and do by these presents nominate, constitute and appoint you, the said Charles Hensley, John Myrie Holl, Peter Stewart McNutt, William Swabey, Edward Thornton, Thomas Owen, and George Coles, to be Commissioners thereunder, for the purpose of inquiring into and reporting upon the present construction and management of the public roads in this Island, and whether any other and what system might be advantageously introduced in respect thereto, consistently with the limited resources of the said Island. And you will return this Commission, and the proceedings had thereunder, into the Secretary's Office, at Charlottetown, on or before the 31st day of December next.

CHARLOTTETOWN, January 9, 1846.

Sir; I have the honor to forward to you, for the information of the Lieutenant Governor and Council, the conclusions to which the Commissioners, appointed under the authority of your letter of July 12, 1845, have arrived, respecting the subject therein proposed for their consideration.

To arrive at these conclusions, the Commissioners at their first meeting, agreed to propose a number of queries to each of the present Road Commissioners, the principal of which embraced enquiries respecting the practicability and expediency of substituting a money assessment or tax, in lieu of Statute Labour.

Secondly, Whether a smaller number of Road Commissioners than at present is appointed by law, could advantageously perform the various duties belonging to that office and generally, what system of repairing and constructing roads appears to them the best and most applicable to the circumstances of the country, the materials to be obtained, &c.

Your Commissioners have likewise entertained, the question, whether it might not be of public advantage to adopt some other and better means of superintending the public roads and bridges, as well as of distributing the sums appropriated by the Legislature on these heads.

To the queries proposed to the Commissioners of Roads, answers have been received, which have been attentively considered, with the other matters proposed for consideration; and the following conclusions have been agreed on.

Although if the circumstances of the country permitted, there can be no doubt of the great REPORT advantages which might be derived from a money payment, rather than the performance of Statute Labour on the roads, yet since at present one thirtieth part only of the whole Statute Labour is voluntarily commuted for money payments, it does not appear probable that a money tax could be paid; but your Commissioners adverting to the near approach of the period when the present land tax will cease, and the recognised practice of Great Britain, that the land shall bear the expense of keeping in repair the ordinary Road communications in the three Kingdoms, recommend that the approaching opportunity of re-enacting a land tax at the rate of 4s. on every one hundred acres be made use of, and the proceeds applied to the purposes of roads and 'bridges. Such a tax will produce (together with the assessments on other descriptions of property at the present rate,) a sum not widely differing from the value of the whole of the Statute Labour, supposing it were commuted at the present rate, as enforced by Statute; but when applied in the purchase of labour, it would be much more valuable and advantageous to the public service, and against such a plan your Commissioners do not think there can be any reasonable complaint, since by its adoption it is proposed to do away with all Statute Labour, whereby persons to whom the labour of their own hands is of the utmost value, will meet with no interruption, whilst others having surplus labour at their disposal can meet with employment and remuneration; and owners of estates will, by means of the improvement which real property always' derives from good roads, receive a just equivalent for the sums which will be charged on the land."

Your Commissioners are not of opinion that the present number of Road Commissioners can be diminished without injury to the public service. They are of opinion, however, that a board of superintendance to direct their operations and distribute the monies arising from the proposed tax, and the sums appropriated to the service of roads and bridges by the Legislature, would be very advantageous to the public service, by the labours of which board not only much valuable time would be saved to the Legislature, who would be thus exonerated from a disagreeable duty, but an uniform system would be obtained; whilst it being the duty of such a board to ascertain the real wants of each District, they would have full opportunity to discuss and examine the relative public importance of the claims made for assistance by different sections of the country, of which the most advantageous adjustment might be thus made.

Your Commissioners recommend that such a board should consist of nine persons, six of whom shall be residents, two in each of the three Counties, and the following should be their most permanent duties :

1st. To decide on and promulgate a system (as far as possible uniform,) of making roads and keeping them in repair.

2d. To collect from the Road Commissioners annually, estimates of works to be performed in their respective Districts, and to lay such estimates before the Legislature, with their remarks thereon.

3d. To supervise all contracts whatsoever, as well as the specifications of contracts for new work.

4th. In case of new works being contemplated, to examine the applications relating thereto, previously to their being laid before the Legislature, and to forward them with a report thereon.

5th. To let, if they should so think fit, the repairs of any Main Roads, or any part thereof, for a term of years.

6th. To hold meetings for business at least four times within a year, and an extra one when necessary.

Your Commissioners deem it their dity to diserve that great inconvenience occurs from the manner in which road certificates are now paid, and suggest for remedy thereof, that in addition to the Road Correspondent being put in possession of warrains for certain amounts, shall be anthorised to pay in cash any difference or balance appearing due by Certificate beyond the amounts of such warrants respectively, as well as the amount of all certificates for sums less than Five Pounds, and that the Colonial Treasurer b authorised to place in his hands from time, to time, a sufficient sum in cash for these purposes.



Report of the Commissioners appointed to investigate the Treasurer's Accounts.

CHARLOTTETOWN, February 28th, 1846.

SIR;

We the undersigned, in obedience to the instructions contained in your communication of the 13th instant, and agreeably to the commands of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, directing us to examine and investigate the accounts and dealings of the Honorable John Spencer Smith, Treasurer of this Island, and to ascertain and strike a true balance between that officer and the Government, on such account and dealings, and to make known all material facts and circumstances necessary and proper to be ascertained for the well ordering and conducting of that department of the public service, have the honor to report to you, for the information of His Excellency, that as soon as we could obtain the necessary documents and Books of Account, we proceeded to the said investigation, and that we have carefully and minutely examined the same, and beg to submit, as the result of our investigation, the abstracts accompanying this communication, with the following remarks thereon:

That the Accounts of the department, so far as we have been able to investigate, are, and appear to have been, accurately kept; and the computation of interest both in favour of and against the Government, minutely and satisfactorily entered; though we feel it our duty to state, that the modes of keeping the accounts could not enable us to determine the sum in cash held by the Treasurer at any particular period, there being no daily cash account, by which the amount could be ascertained.

No distinction has hitherto been made in the entry of receipts at the Treasury, whether made in money or warrants, nor any definite mode pursued by which the date of payment of warrants can be fully determined, it not having been the custom for the payee, in any instance, to endorse a receipt thereon.

No copy of the Warrant Book has been obtained from the Secretary's Office, by which the authenticity of Warrants presented for acceptance could be tested. And we have also to remark, that the distruction of all the Warrants paid off previously to the 21st of January, 1845, at which time the public accounts were furnished to the Legislature, has prevented that searching investigation which it was our desire to have made, from being carried out more fully beyond that period.

That in submitting to His Excellency the foregoing observations, we feel persuaded that the present inefficient practice has been followed from the want of a more correct mode being pointed out; and we therefore take the liberty to suggest the following alterations, which we believe will be improvements, and attended with benefit to the public service, and with satisfaction to the Treasurer.

1st. That in future the books of the department be kept by double entry.

2nd. That each entry show a true and correct record of the transaction.

3rd. That a cash account be opened, and a copy thereof submitted to His Excellency in Council, at the beginning of each month.

4th. That the Treasurer be instructed to cause the party receiving payment of Treasury Warrants to write his name, and the date of payment, across the face thereof.

5th. That no warrant be destroyed until the whole issue of the year of which it bears date have been paid, and examined by an officer authorised by Government for that purpose, and compared with the counterfoil.

6th. That the Colonial Secretary be instructed to furnish the Treasurer, from time to time, with an abstract of the Warrant Book, showing the number, date, and name of the drawer of each warrant.

In the investigation which we have been called upon to make, very considerable delay was occasioned from the fact that the accounts of several collectors of Excise had not been handed in; and this irregularity is of greater magnitude, when it has a tendency to delay the Legislature, as in the present instance it cannot fail to have done.

### To and the second

In the abstract which we have the konor to submit, see Appendix  $\mathcal{F}$ ., a balance of £11,331 6 111d. appears against the Treasurer. Bonks are in his hands and the Attorney General's to the amount of £8,671 4 3d, and cash £2660 2 81d, of which last sum £1601 17 2d. appears to belong to the fund raised by 7th Will. IV. Cap. 31. These Securities, Notes, and Cash we have carefully examined and counted, and find the full sum in the Treasurer's possession:

We also submit a statement of the balance in his hands, derived from the sale of Crown Lands, see Appendix G., as also the surplus monies arising from the sale of Lands under the Land Assessment Acts, see Appendix H., which monies are also in his hands. In addition, we have taken the liberty to furnish, for the information of the Government, a detailed list of Warrants, see Appendix A. to D., outstanding and bearing Interest; amounting to the sum of £30,200 14 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>d, with the dates when the annual interest on each respectively becomes due, by which on view, the amount of interest payable in any month during the current year will appear, and by which calls of warrants for payment may be regulated, see Appendix E

We feel it our duty also to report, for the information of His Excellency, that a complaint having been made that a certain Warrant had been re-issued after having been received at the Treasury, we have made enquiry respecting this circumstance, and believe, from what evidence we can obtain, that such irregularity had taken place, but without any intentional loss to, or fraud upon the Government, and entirely from inadvertence and unduly weighing the consequences of such irregularity.

We would further remark, that if the particulars of such Warrants as are paid by the Treasurer in each month, were published at the end of it, greater confidence would be established, and any irregularity more easily detected.

In conclusion, we feel it our duty to mention, that the Treasurer, during the whole examination, evinced the utmost desire to furnish every information, and fully to disclose the mode of keeping the accounts hitherto practised, and appeared to coincide with us in our suggestions, made to him, as to the advantage likely to arise to all parties from the adoption of a better system.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,

Prince Edward Island, May 12, 1845. My Lord;

I have the honor to transmit to your Lordship the joint Address of the Houses of Legislature of this Island to Her Majesty the Queen, praying to be permitted to pass an Act, authorizing the issue of  $\pounds 10,-000$  in Treasury Notes, the same to be made redeemable in Fifteen years, in such manner as shall, in Her Majesty's judgment, be thought proper.

I concur in the opinion expressed by the Legislature, that the system of barter, generally pursued in the mercantile transactions of the Colony, has considerable influence in restricting its circulating medium, and that any measure which could be devised for increasing a wholesome circulation would be extremely desirable.

I should, however, hesitate before I suggested to your Lordship the propriety of recommending the prayer of this Address to the favorable consideration of Her Majesty, if it had not been based upon an express understanding, that the necessary means would be provided within a given time, for redeeming the amount of Treasury Notes, which the Legislature are desirous of adding to those already in circulation; with such a safeguard, an issue of Treasury Notes to the amount prayed for, provision being made for their redemption within *Ten* years, instead of Fifteen, would be attended with much present convenience, without injuriously affecting the public confidence.

I deem it my duty, at the same time, to lay before your Lordship a Bill passed this Session, to suspend a certain clause in the Land Assessment Act, relating to the cancelling of Treasury Notes; this Bill has necessarily a suspending clause, and I can scarcely anticipate that your Lordship will be induced to advise Her Majesty to assent to the measure, which will divert from its proper object the fund appropriated, by the Act in question, for redeeming so much of the amount of Treasury Notes at r esent in circulation.

In the second paragraph of the Address to Her to authorize the issue of  $\pounds$ 10,000 i Majesty, your Lordship will observe a statement of redeemable within Fifteen years.

the amount of Treasury Notes now in circulation; that statement seems rather confused, and I therefore beg to remark, that the amount afloat in Treasury Notes is  $\pounds 11,800$  at this moment.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 61, of the 12th May, in which you transmit a Joint Address to the Queen, from the two Houses of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, praying Her Majesty's assent to the passing a Law to authorize the issue of  $\pounds10,000$  in Treasury Notes, redeemable within Fifteen years. 27th May, inclosing a Memorial from several inhabitants of Prince Edward Island, objecting to any such issue of Paper Money.

Having laid the Address of the Legislature before the Queen, I have to inform you that Her Majesty was pleased to receive the same very graciously.

I regret, however, that I have been unable to advise Her Majesty to accede to the prayer which it contained, for the following reasons, which you will communicate to the two Houses at their next meeting:

Having, on several former occasions, directed your attention to the unsatisfactory state of the finances of Prince Edward Island, I have looked for some explanation upon that subject, on receiving an application for an increase in its liabilities, by the proposed issue of Paper Money. But I neither find in the Address, nor in your own Despatch accompanying it, any explanation with respect to the finances of the Colony, nor any allusion to the fact, of which I am informed by this Memorial inclosed in your second Despatch, that, independently of the sum of £11,800 already existing in the shape of Treasury Notes, there are Treasury Warrants remaining unsatisfied to the extent of £26,223. In addition to the objections which I entertain to the issue of Paper Curren-Sir H. V. HUNTLEY, cy, not payable in Specie, on demand, I find that it is

I have also received your Despatch, No. 65, of the represented by the parties signing the Memorial, whose, opinion you consider to be entitled to great attention, that the Currency of the Island is depreciated 20 per cent below that of the adjoining Colonies.

> On such a statement, I cannot but apprehend, that the issues of Paper Money have already been excessive, and that the depreciation above mentioned, and the absence of metallic circulating medium, are principally attributable to that excess.

> If these impressions be correct, it appears to me that they furnish substantial reasons against the issue of any further Paper Money; but I shall be happy to receive from you more explicit information on the subject, especially with respect to the amount of debt outstanding: the actual exchangeable value of the Government paper, or of the Warrants bearing Interest, as compared with Coin, and the arrangements that either have been made, or are proposed to be made, for rendering the Revenue equal to meet the current expenditure of the Island, and for providing for the redemption both of the existing debt, and of the suggested addition to it.




His Excellency intimated to the Board that he had caused the Council to be summoned for the purpose of consulting it upon the extensive injury which the Potato Crops had sustained, this season, throughout the Island, and upon the rumour which prevailed of the ravages of the Weevil among the Wheat, with the view of ascertaining the opinion of the Board, as to whether it would be advisable to call for docu-

mentary evidence from the several Districts, with regard to any serious consequences which may arise from the existing state of the Potato Crops, and as to the foundation of the report of the injury which the Wheat is said to be suffering from the Weevil.

When the board expressed its opinion, that although the Potato Crops throughout the Island had this season been most severely affected by natural causes, differently accounted for, and that a great deficiency in the production of sound and wholesome potatoes had been occasioned thereby, there is not that scarcity to be apprehended which at present renders necessary any active interference on the part of the Executive Government; and that the report of the injury which the Wheat is said to have sustained is much exaggerated, as is sufficiently exemplified by the present Market price of flour being from 11d. to 2d. per lb., and Oats from 1s. 4d. to 1s. 6d. per bushel. The Board consequently considers any official enquiry, under such circumstances uncalled for.

#### (COPY.) Downing Street, 30th October, 1827.

SIR;

With reference to your Despatch on the 15th of May, No. 9, addressed to Lord Bathurst, upon the subject of the unfortunate misunderstanding which has taken place between His Majesty's Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, I have to express my sincere regret that any subject should have occurred to disturb the harmony of the two branches of the Legislature, whose mutual good understanding is so essential to the best interests of the Colony. The subject matter of the difference, too, is unfortunately one upon which the pertinacious adherence of both parties to what they respectively consider as matter of abstract right, must put an entire stop to the business of the administration, and plunge the Colony into irretrievable difficulties.

You will, therefore, do well to express to His Majesty's Council the regret with which I learn that they have thought fit, now, for the first time, to act upon a claim of at least doubtful right, which has been more prudently suffered hitherto to lie dormant; and which in its nature it is not very easy to reconcile to the principles of the British Constitution.

On the other hand, you will take an early opportunity of impressing upon the House of Assembly, the vital importance to the Colony of the most friendly and confidential intercourse between themselves and His Majesty's Council; and you will earnestly recommend to their adoption, such a temperate and conciliatory course as may preserve the Colony from those fatal consequences which a rupture between the two branches cannot fail to produce to those for whom they sit as Representatives, and whose interest it is their first duty to uphold.

"A system has prevailed in some of His Majesty's Colonies, which, waiving the matter of right, and adopted as one of courtesy and convenience, has been attended with the best effects. The House of Assembly precede every bill of this nature by separate resolutions upon each item; these being sent up to the Council, are separately approved or rejec- Sir Charles A. Fitzroy, ted: and those which have been assented to, are [

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subsequently embodied in a Bill, and pass of course. By this mode of proceeding, the public business is materially facilitated, and no opening is left for such unhappy disputes as now subsist between the Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island.

You will do well in addition to the general recommendation, contained in my public Despatch, to recommend to the House of Assembly a similar mode of proceeding."

#### Downing Street, 31st March, 1841.

Sir;

I have received and laid before the Queen, the Address enclosed in your Despatch No. 14, of the 5th of May, 1840, from the Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island, complaining of the system pursued by the House of Assembly, in appropriating the supplies granted to the Crown.

Having laid this Address before the Queen, I have received Her Majesty's commands to instruct you to return the following answer to the Legislative Council.

The practice of sending up the Appropriations for the current year in the same Bill, having prevailed in Prince Edward Island for upwards of fifteen years, without, (as it is asserted in the Protest of the Three Members of the Council, which you have transmitted,) having produced any very evil consequences to the Public Service, the Queen does not perceive what is the immediate motive for the present complaint.

It is of such importance to the Colony, to avoid disunion between the branches of the Legislature, that Her Majesty would regard with great concern, the addition of any fresh element of agitation. Should, however, the Council still persist, after this answer, in their wish for an alteration in the mode of considering the Appropriation Bills, Her Majesty would not oppose their desire on the subject; and in that case, you will consider yourself authorised to recommend to the Assembly, the adoption of the orable William Huskisson, to the Lieutenant practice pursued in New Brunswick, as most suitable to their situation, although not conformable to the principles in force in this country.

> It is, however, the Queen's command, that if you deem it inexpedient to bring this question forward, you will report to me, before you take any step.

### REPORT ON PETER FERGUSON'S PETITION.

Your Committee, appointed to report on the Pe-{this, your Committee consider it proper to give an tition of Peter Ferguson, of Georgetown Royalty, praying a grant of money to discharge the amount of an award, and costs, incurred defending a suit brought against him for the possession of a Pasture Lot in said Royalty, submit-

That from evidence, examined before the Committee, and a report made by the Hon. Attorney General, dated 1st September, 1845, to the Government on the subject, it appears the petitioner, Peter Ferguson, in 1828, obtained a license of occupation from the Government, of a Pasture Lot in Georgetown Royalty, and subsequently a grant of the property.

That in 1835, Ferguson was served with a declaration in ejectment, at the suit of William Keoughan, who claimed the Lot under a prior grant made in 1803, to one John Livingston; but Ferguson considering himself as having the best title to the Lot, refused to give up possession, and contested the suit with said Keoughan until 1843, when he was advised by his Counsel at Law to leave the matter to arbitration; and it being referred to Messrs. Thomas Owen and William Cundall, those gentlemen adjudged that Petitioner should pay the sum of £20 to Keoughan, and each party should pay their own costs.

That the Petitioner was also advised and recommended by the Hon. Attorney General to arrange with Keoughan, by arbitration' on the understanding that he Ferguson should be indemnified by the Government in any amount awarded against him, and the costs he should be put to; and which that officer in his report to the Executive Government hereinafter alluded to, states that he was authorised in so doing from what occurred in Council, on the occasion of a presentation of a petition by Ferguson, in the year 1837, if on consideration of all the circumstances, the Attorney General should be of opinion that Ferguson could not successfully defend the action at the suit of Keoughan.

Council, an answer was returned refusing petitioner's application, on the ground that there was no funds at the disposal of the Government. In reference to

extract from the conclusion of the Attorney General's report, as follows: "I cannot take leave of the subject without respectfully observing, that if Ferguson's claim shall be rejected after this explanation, it will be cruel towards me, as the officer acting for the Government which inflicted an injury upon him, by professing to grant him land, when that land did not of right belong to it."

Your Committee, under the peculiar circumstances of Ferguson's case, in which he acted under the idea that he was perfectly safe while holding a license of occupation, and afterwards a grant from the Government; and now being liable for a considerable sum. owing to the inattention or carelesness of one or two of its officers, in giving a second grant, when a prior one existed of the same property, feel called on to recommend that the petitioner, Peter Ferguson, should be indemnified by the Government to the amount of £20 for the award, and the sum of £10 costs of suit.

Your Committee would further observe, that the House may probably consider these amounts should be drawn from the Crown Land Fund; but your Committee beg to remark, that such fund not being at the disposal of this Legislature, and Her Majesty's Government having liberally granted a large amount : out of that Fund for public improvements in the colony, your Committee think it hopeless to expect that Ferguson will be paid by the Imperial Government out of the Crown Land Fund, or may not be realized out of such fund in time to relieve the petitioner.

Your Committee cannot conclude this report, without stating their opinion, that this expense has been incurred by the conduct of the late Surveyor General' in 1828, and the late Colonial Secretary, the former in giving a Warrant of Survey, and the latter, though under the orders of Government, in granting a license of occupation of a Pasture Lot which had already been out of the Crown for a previous period of 25 years, and of course recorded in the proper office, to which those officers ought to have made reference, That on applying to the Lieut. Governor and before giving a second grant of the same property. E. THORNTON.
