PRES. COAKER REPORTS BIG PROGRESS THE NORTHERN FISHERY WORST IN FIFTY YEARS

Says that the Whole Catch From Conception Bay to Change Islands Doesn't Exceed Thirty Thousand Quintals—Trap Fishing Poor—Hook and Line Fishing Practically ~ Nil

Mr. Coaker's Summary of the Fishery North.

There are not 10,000 qtls. of fish ashore to date in the districts of Bay de Verde, Trinty and Bonavista.

I am convinced that the whole catch of codfish from Conception cieties for the year is 7,000. Bay to Change Islands don't exceed 30,000 quintals up to date and prospects of an improvement during the caplin school are not bright.

The lobster fishery is practically over, some having abandoned it many days ago. The whole catch north won't exceed 500 cases, or about one-fourth of last year's catch.

The fishermens only hope now is a good squid school catch and fine weather in September.

It is apparent that many scores of men will be seeking employment in October and unless it is forthcoming there will be considerable destitution.

The Government may as well set to work at once to prepare for the employment of three or four thousand men at railway construction during the coming fall. The construction of Fortune Bay and Bonne Bay Branches will have to be pushed in order to afford employment to the fishermen who have fared so badly.

Newfoundland needed a good fishery this year, but it will prove one of the worst for fifty years.

Very Soon There Will Not Be Time Enough to Prepare For Flight

New York, July 18 .- The aeroplane flight around the world planned as one of the features of the Panama-Pacific Exposition has not yet received the sanction of the Aero Club of America, and may have to be abandoned altogether unless the bank where the exposition authorities deposited \$150,000 in prize money complies with the requirements for the sanction very soon. The bank has not yet guaranteed to pay the prizes to the winners of the proposed race upon the notification of the Contest Committee of the Aero Club.

The Royal Aero Club of Great Britain sent the following cable to the Aero Club of America:

"Have you sanctioned around-theworld aero race? Is prize money deposited? Cable to-day. Aerodom." Wouldn't Comply

All were furious except A SUCCESSFUL and was made a lieutenant. Now, it so happened that the first bullet lodged in the flesh and was cut out by a surgeon. Bert sent it to the girl he loved best, who treasured and revered it. His second wound came from a fragment of a shell, the force of which must have been spent, for the flesh was more bruised than torn. This fragment he sent to another girl he loved best. His third wound was made by a pistol ball while the regiment was charging. 'It went clear through the calf of his leg, so he did not secure it, but he sent one like it to a third girl he loved best as the original ball that had made a hole through him

Bert steadily rose from private to captain and was constantly getting wounded. The consequence was that before the war ended no fewer than five girls possessed missiles that had pierced him in battle, and each girl thought that she alone possessed the only one that had been preserved. Shortly before the surrender at Appomattox the hero was so badly wounded that he was mustered out of service and after lying several months in a Washington hospital went home to limp about, an interesting character. Women passing him in the street would exclaim loud enough for him to hear, "Poor Fellow!" "Noble soldier!" "What a pity!" and such other encomiums as were pleasing to the ear of the man referred to.

The pity was that this noble defender of the Union had been so dishonorable as to send missiles with which he had been wounded to a number of girls leaving each to suppose that she alone had been favored by the receipt of the only original lead or iron that had nearly bereft her of the handsome Bert. But his conduct only goes to prove that physical bravery is a very different quality from moral bravery and that war heroes are no more to be trust-

ed by women than any other man. Another feature of this case is disappointing. Bert, by sending so many bullets, fragments of shells and other articles used in war to kill persons to so many different girls,





UR readers, generally, will b much interested in Mr. Coaker's log of his present voyage north in the Union motor boat "F.P.U." seeing that it gives a careful and detailed account of the season's codfishery, based on facts as the Union President finds them at the various places visited.

Mr. Coaker has the advantage of visiting the scenes and of conversing with the fishermen themselves so that his accounts of the fishery along our eastern coast may be accepted as absolutely correct. And what a discouraging tale he

has to tell. There is scarcely a single bright

rift in the black cloud. Everywhere he learnt that the catch

of codfish is small; that little as the traps have done, the hook and line men have done still less. Yet this is the time of the caplin

"scull" when our men, in ordinary seasons, would be reaping their chief harvest from the sea.

As for the lobster fishery it is about the worst on record.

"Newfoundland," asserts Mr. Coaker "needed a good fishery this year, but i will prove one of the worst for 5

These are heavy tidings, indeed, and as the President oif the Union remarks, the phenomenally small fishery this season will force many of our men to look for employment in the fall to give them the wherewithal to provide for the coming winter.

It is, therefore, incumbent on the Government to prepare for this contingency. Everything should be arranged for a couple of months employment on the branch railways this fall: otherwise there will be much destitution in the families of the three or four thousand men whose wages and five each in France and Austra. from this season's fishery will be very small indeed.

Far better were the old days when the evening lamp saw all juvenile within doors; when mother was re spected and obeyed and father was an absolute autocrat in the family.

We owe very little thanks to th phase of modern life which sees th 'emancipation' even of children whose minds are untrained and whose unformed habits are permit ted to develop and to crystalliz away from the love and counsel mother's admonitions and father's disciplinary methods.

If the home be indeed the training ground of the nation, then, we fear many of our future citizens will by and by know but little of their duties to their neighbors,, to the state and to themselves.

> and countless other duties. The men will be paid in time of peace for drills to the number of 40. and for an annual training of ten days. The rates of pay correspond with those paid in the militia, with allowances for efficiency and special trades.

Every man must be put in a minimum of 20 drills of one hour each in the course of the year, and may take two of them in one day.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

THE United States of America hold the record for the imposition of capital punishment on condemned criminals, there being more of this class put to death in the Republic each year than in all the other countries of the civilised world together.

For example, in ten months, during the year 1912 there were one hun dred and twenty-eight executions the U.S.A.; in England, during the same period, there were thirty-seven Maybe the number of crimes which

the laws of each country provide shall be punished with the death penalty, have something to do with the number of executions.

The laws of the United States prescribed capital punishment for eleven crimes. In England only four crimes are punishable by hanging

For years there has been a great and growing opposition to the infliction of the death penalty for any breach of the laws and as a result capital punishment has been abol ishd in a number of countries. These include Italy, Portugal, most Switzerland, Holland, Tuscany, San Marino, Roumania, Belgium, Ven-

SECOND INQUIRY INTO DISASTER IS CONCLUDED

Was Conducted at Montreal By the Swedish Consul General For Canada

MAKES NO COMMENT ON TERRIBLE AFFAIR

Evidence of Storstad Offi cers as Taken Will Be Sent to Sweden

Montreal, July 18.—The Norwegian authorities in Montreal have completed their special investigation into the Empress of Ireland-Storstad disaster, having heard the evidence of Capt Thomas Andersen, of the Storstad, his chief and third officers and the other members of his crew who were on deck when the collision occurred. The inquiry was completed on June 29th and the records will be forwarded to the Department of Foreign Affairs in Christiania, Norway.

No commentary whatsoever follows the report. Whether the Empress of Ireland or Storstad was to blame, whether the accident could have been avoided or whether there were othr motives for the disaster is left for the udgment of the Advocate of Stat and the authorities in Norway.

The Enquiry.

The enquiry was held in the office of the Norwegian Consulate General for Canada, on Dorchester Street, near Drummond. W. Malthe Johannessen. first secretary of the Norwegian legation in Washington, D.C., conducted the investigation together with Capt. J. Jorgensen, of the steamer Tellus and Capt. Hans Jacogsen, of Montreal. The witnesses who gave their evidence were Captain Andersen, first officer Tuftenes, third officer Saxe, chief engneier Syversten, third engineer Singdahlsen, lookoutman Fremmelid, helms man Peter Johannson and Johan Jo-Johnansen, who was a watchman in the Storstad's engine room when the accident occurred.

Surrounded by "Navy"

"We started to steam right in," said George N. Coulter, the Alonquin's chief engineer, "when the whole blooming navy, three tugboats and a launch or two, surrounded us The flagship, a dilapidated tug, came under our stern, and the beet admiral, with several sub-admirals behind him, ordered us to stop. Just as he gave the order a seaman who was washing down decks heaved a bucket of dirty water overboard and the admiral got a bath. The fleet left and we were allowed to proceed.

"Several of us went ashore after the Algonquin anchored, and saw a two hours' battle. The soldiers on both sides shot from the ship, and the only ones in danger were the innoent passersby. After the battle a list of casualties was taken, and it was found that the only dead was a cow, which had strayed from her pasture. We were later told there are no aged men or women in the city as they had all been shot. They couldn't run fast enough to get out of the way when the soldiers held a battle in the streets."



The question debated was whether the Council was empowered to enforce sewerage being put into houses drawing a rental of \$80.00 or over. It was pointed out it costs about \$14,000 per year to collect the night

soil. The evidence of the Inspectors showed that in some cases the sanitary cars were obliged to call in streets for the convenience of one house, and in other cases for the convenience of a few. These conditions applied to streets where the sewer was within a few feet from the homes, and could be connected with at very little cost.

Considerable Saving

If these houses were connected there would be considerable saving which money might be expended in other directions.

The Board agreed that the existing condtions were the result of negligence on the part of property owners which should not exist, and would neither be tolerated nor excused in any other municipality.

There was unanimous expression of opinion that if the Board has the power to compel installation, violations will not be permitted under any circumstances.

Definite action, however, was deferred until the Solicitor reports as to the powers given in the Municipa! Act and the Amendments thereof. If the Board have the powers they hope for, owners will be compelled forthwith to comply with the law.
