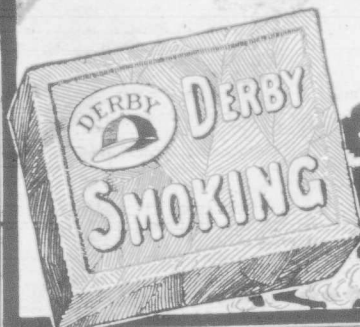

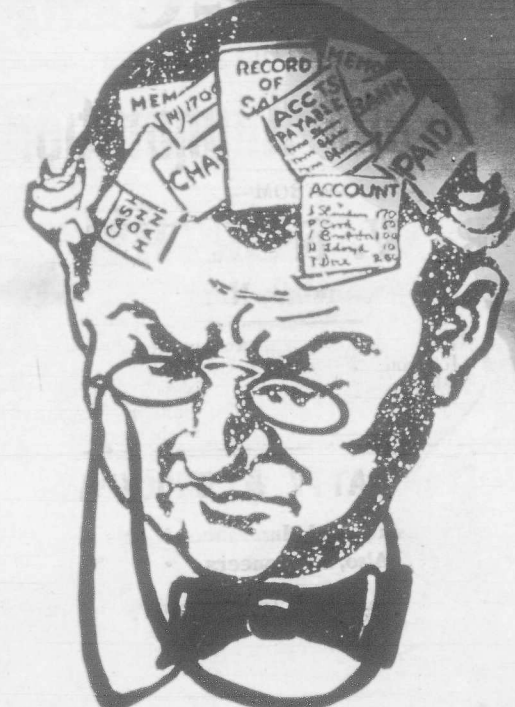

### Heavy Snow Fall in Minnesota.

Record Unequaled in that State Since 1884  
Duluth, Minn., Sept. 22.—A record unequalled since the establishment of the weather bureau in 1884 was made yesterday when snow fell at nearly all points in northern Minnesota and around the shores of Lake Superior. The earliest previous snow fell was recorded September 24, 1907. Winter scenes prevailed in the vicinity of Port Arthur, Ontario and Grand Marais, Minn., where the ground was blanketed with snow. The average temperature was 34 degrees.

If an ink spot gets on the carpet, slip a pan under it immediately, pour cold water through it and then cover it with a little heap of salt. When the salt has become dark with ink remove it and put a fresh layer in its place. An ink stain is less likely to be spread by pouring water through it than by dipping it in hot water.

Prices High

Per Cent of Supply Graded No. 3

Sept. 23rd. Although plentiful supply of some fruit the situation at the time is described as any-encouraging due to the conservative climate of the fall places it anything like an average and again the quality so not been up to the stand-

Speaking to the Telegraph last evening, a local dealer said that the indications pointed to a very meagre crop, and of the shipments already received more than 50 per cent were graded No. 3. There are a few good apples on the market, but the price is away up in the air. They are selling at from \$1.50 to \$1.50 per barrel.

Peaches, on the other hand, are very plentiful, the quality is extra good and the prices reasonable. The dealer said that he had very seldom seen a better class of goods sold here in the city.

The plum season is about done. Probably the last shipment will be received about the middle of the week. Although they have come in good quantities from Ontario, the Nova Scotia crop has been very light. In fact, very little of the Nova Scotia product has been in evidence this year.

Heavy frosts about the Cape Cod region has put a damper on the cranberry supply and will tend to boost the price from this time forward. Heretofore, the supply has been good and the prices very moderate.

The grapes are now coming in large quantities and there is every indication of a bumper crop. Nevertheless the price is a little above last year, which is accounted for by the fact that the cost of baskets has been almost doubled.

Pears have been plentiful this year, but are now thinning out, as the season is drawing to a close.

A considerable advance in the price of onions is noticeable, resulting from a rather short crop, but the class of stock being shipped at the present time is considered to be well worth the price asked. "We have seldom had a better quality of onions on sale here," said one of the wholesalers yesterday.

Will be Bad For Man if Horse Doesn't Pass Test

Yarmouth, September 27th. — B. D. Killam, D. V. S., government inspector of imported horses and cattle here, leaves on Monday on orders from Ottawa, for the Annapolis Valley, to find a man who a few days ago brought a horse from Boston and escaped the inspector. The owner of the horse claimed the animal underwent the necessary test in the United States, but had lost the veterinary papers to prove his statement. Dr. Killam had the horse put in a livery stable and wired the facts of the case to Ottawa. While awaiting a reply from the Capital, the owner took his horse and drove out of town.

Accidently Shot

Albert Vaughn, of Windsor, N. S., went out to shoot crows on Tuesday morning and his lifeless body was found beside a log. He had evidently stumbled in stepping over the log the gun being discharged into his head. He leaves a widow, a daughter of the late Ezekiel Masters, of Summerville, and four children.

Close call under the cars—The Glace Bay Gazette says:—Michael Lee, a Sydney Mines man, had an extraordinary escape from death on Saturday night, when an I. C. R. train of seven cars past over him. Lee, who lives at old No. 3, Sydney Mines, had evidently been walking towards his home on the track, when he fell between the rails where he remained until picked up by the train hands, after the night train from Sydney Mines had past over him. The Colonial Copper Company was incorporated some ten or fifteen years ago and installed a very fine plant on their property and altogether some five hundred thousand dollars was spent, but the result did not justify the expenditure and the mine closed down five years ago. Since that time the plant has been in the hands of a caretaker and now the whole plant is being dismantled and taken away by the different purchasers, which closes another episode in the mining history of Nova Scotia.—Halifax Herald.

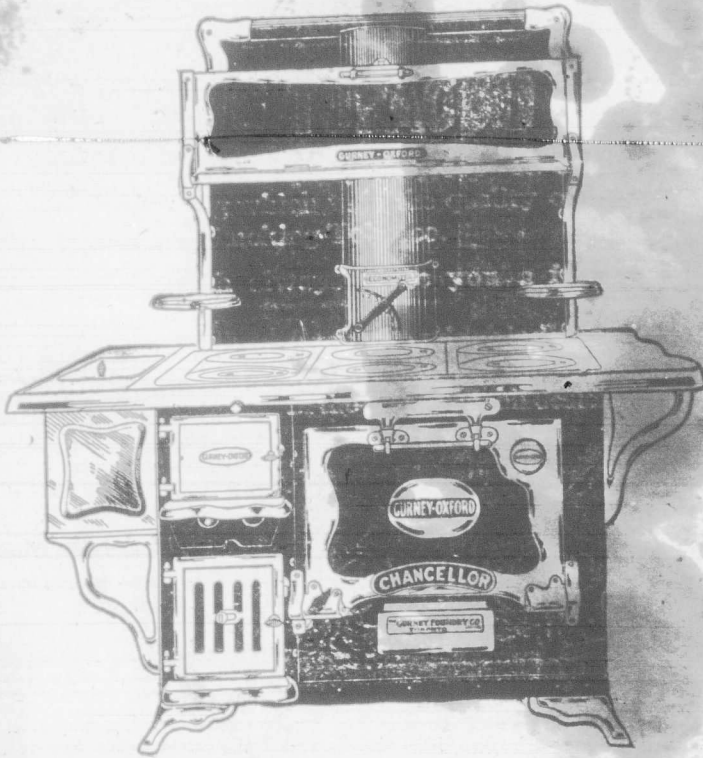

Off for China

Rev. Frank Dickinson and bride left on the 16th, inst., en route for their distant field of missionary work in Chen-tu, Western China, going via Truro and Sackville, where Mr. Dickinson preached before the students of Mount Allison College on Sunday last. They leave Sackville to-day going west via St. John, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Calgary, reaching Vancouver October 6th. 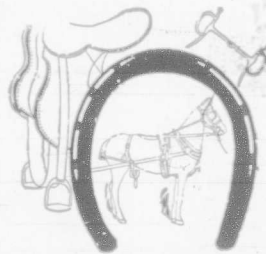

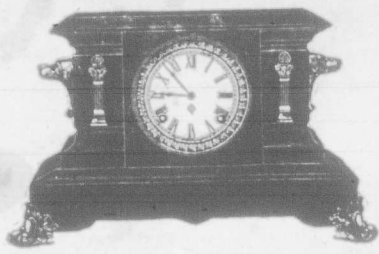

Baby Are Tied to Ship's Mast.

Woman and child Saved from Sinking Vessel After Thrilling Experience in Gale.

Boston, Sept. 19.—Lashed with her babe to the topmast of a sinking schooner, 120 feet above a raging sea off Cape Hatteras, and expecting death momentarily during a ninety-mile gale that lasted three days, is the thrilling experience told by Mrs. T. Jefferson Griffen of 394 A Highland avenue, Malden, who has just returned to her home with her husband and 2-year-old daughter Muriel after a voyage on the schooner George W. Wells, wrecked off Cape Hatteras Sept. 3.

Mrs. Griffen, with her husband and daughter, boarded the schooner at Charlestown for a trip to Fernandian, Fla. The voyage proved delightful until Cape Hatteras was reached when a terrific hurricane struck the vessel. Every conceivable precaution was taken by the crew, but the ship wallowed frightfully in the towering seas which broke over her from stem to stern. In a last desperate effort to save the lives of the passengers and crew the ship was headed for the shore. The rudder was smashed by a gigantic comb and the vessel sprung a leak. The pumps were manned, but the ship steadily settled in the boiling seas.

In what they considered a last desperate effort to save their lives and the life of their daughter Muriel, Mr. and Mrs. Griffen climbed the main mast of the ship with their little daughter lashed to Mrs. Griffen's back. The three swayed frightfully through the air while rockets and signals of distress shot by them, fired by the crew of the ship from the deck below. The revenue cutter Onondaga sighted the foundering ship and arrived just in time to remove the passengers and crew to safety.
