





On January 20, 1920, there will descend upon the country the full force of the 18th Amendment to the Constitition duly adopted and ratified during the war time by two-thirds of the Federal Congress and by three-quarters of the State Legislatures. This prohibits all sale, manufacture, import and export.

The amendment is supreme. Under the American system of Government no power in the land can set it aside. save only a repeal by a smilar amend

It is held that the "one-year after the war" extension is ultra vires, and cannot be enforced; and the Parliament of Canada has thus far falled to turn the Order into a Statute. He doesn't fight the other dog, although at times it may be necessary for him to take hold of an ear and nip it a little. But he annoys the dog until there is nothing else for it to do but to be guided by Pal.




