



Voucher cheques and cheques with receipts endorsed thereon, when drawn upon or addressed to a bank, are not taxable as receipts. Remitter's counterfoil, being part of a taxable express money order, is not taxable as a receipt.

For almost two decades the major portion of the world's sapply of cobalt has been derived from the silver-cobalt-nickel arsenides of the Cobalt district, according to figures rommiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The cobalt production of Canada in 1922 was 569.960 pounds, which at \$3.25 a pound, would be worth \$1,852,370.


