THE ST. LAWRENCE CANAL

(The Wesleyan)

Formal steps for a joint conference between the United States and Canada to consider a proposed treaty between the two nations relative to the canalization of the St. Lawrence River and the opening of a waterway to the sea will be taken by the Dominion Government before December, in the opinion of Charles P. Craig, Executive Secretary of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tideway Association.

"The situation across the border is clearing up," said Mr. Craig, "and indications are that President Harding's invitation to Canada to appoint a commission for the purpose of consideration of a joint treaty between the two nations will be formally acted upon within the next two or three months." Mr. Craig said his work is not with President Coolidge at Washington this month to ascertain his attitude on the St. Lawrence project.

More Quakes

Allahabad, British India, Sept. 20 A severe earthquake was experienced at Dujanurd, Persia, on Monday morning, says a despatch to the Pioneer from Neshed. No details are contained in the despatch.

Simultaneously, slight shocks were felt in Neshed. No damage resulted. Moscow, Sept. 20—Several sharp shocks were felt Monday in the government district of the Amur region and in Turkestan. The earth is reported to have cracked at several places. No deaths or material damage have been reported.

IS THERE TO BE A PLEBISCITE?

Activities by the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance have led to the reports in political circles that a prohibition plebiscite in New Brunswick is either expected by the Alliance or else is actually in prospect in New Brunswick. Rev. W.D. Wilson formerly secretary of the Alliance is in Fredericton from Middleton, N.S. where he is now pastor of a Baptist Church, and is to go on a speaking tour of the province with Donald Fraser, the president of the Alliance. This week the Alliance executive will meet. "Dry leaders claimed they had no inside information and intimated they were just anxious to be ready."

BROTHERS MEET AFTER 35 YEARS AT EXHIBITION

Fredericton, Sept. 21—If you want to find a brother you had not seen for thirty-five years would you go to the biggest crowd that ever assembled on a fair grounds in New Brunswick and try to find him there?

Most people wouldn't, but that is what George W. Ross of West Lubec, Me., did yesterday and it worked like a charm. Mr. Ross went to the judges' stand during the races and asked the officials to call for Robert W. Ross of Newcastle, N. B. to come to the stand.

Al H. Standish of Boston, Mass., had scarcely finished calling for the long lost brother before a voice responded with "Here I am!" And there was Robert; he was looking for George, just thinking he might be there. In a few moments Thomas E. Ross, another brother from West Lubec, Me., joined the party, and then a younger man, with his hair turning somewhat grey, he was Robert E., son of Robert W. who had not seen his father since he was 2 1/2 years old when his memory and recollection for faces was not very good.

The result was a happy family reunion. Robert W. Ross left West Lubec, Me., the home of the family, thirty five years ago, after his first wife died and never returned his sister acting as mother to his son.

The reports received by the Chief Game Warden, L.A. Gagnon, indicate that deer and duck are plentiful. The season for both opened on the 15th inst.

The chief Game Warden also reports partridge plentiful. The season will open October 1st at the time that the season for moose will open. Moose are reported plentiful in certain sections.

The number of non-resident sportsmen who have entered the province so far is not large but with the opening of the moose-hunting season in October a big influx is expected. The number of inquiries from intending sportsmen in the United States has been large.

ROSSING MILL FINISHES SEASON

The Miramichi Lumber Co's rossing mill ceased operations for the season Thursday. There still remains a large pile of pulp blocks but by the close of the navigation season practically all these will be carried away.

It is rumored that the company intends to remove their entire machinery to the Morrison mill, and next spring will operate only that and the Douglastown mill.

Port Elgin To Get New Station In 1924

Moncton, Sept. 18—At the meeting of the Westmorland Sub-district Board of Health in the City Hall this afternoon, communications received included one from L.S. Brown general manager of the Atlantic Division of the C.N.E., regarding the sanitary condition of the station at Port Elgin. Mr. Brown stated that next year a new station was to be erected there and that in the meantime everything possible would be done toward making conditions sanitary. The following were present: Chairman, Dr. Desmond; Secretary Northrup; Councillor Bourgeois; Ald. Hutchison; Ald. Geo. O. Springer; Dr. Sormany; Dr. W.P. Keirstead; W.F. Chapman; H.C. Charters and D.J. Bourgeois.

Episcopal Synod And Church Union

Ottawa, Sept. 20—The Episcopal Synod of Canada, at its closing meeting here, last Saturday, endorsed church union in Canada. The endorsement came in purely manner and was not discussed. The next session of the Synod will be held at Christ Church, Toronto, May 13 and 14, 1924, preceding a general assembly of delegates of the Episcopal Church of America at Philadelphia on May 15. Preparations for the observation of the jubilee of the church next year were left in the hands of a special committee.

QUEENS WANT TO BEAR SHARE OF WAGE CUT

The House, Sept. 18—Queen Wilhelmina and Dowager Queen Emma have decided that if the reduction in the salaries of state officials contemplated for 1924 is made effective, they will share in the cut.

Both have written to the Minister of Finance stating that in the event of the reduction they will relinquish a part of their revenue from the state in proportion to the other decreases.

DEMPSEY'S TRIUMPH RECORD FOR SPEED

Jack Dempsey's spectacular victory over Luis Angel Firpo takes rank as one of the shortest heavy weight title contests in history, according to the Associated Press.

Records covering the past thirty years of major championship matches reveal but one shorter bout, the one round victory of Tommy Burns over Bill Squires of Australia, at Colma, Calif., July 4th, 1907. Three years prior to that James J. Jeffries before his retirement had faced Burns to the title, knocked out Jack Munroe in two rounds at San Francisco.

Two years after he captured the world's title from John L. Sullivan in 1902, Jim Corbett stopped Charley Mitchell in three rounds, while Jess Willard's towel was not tossed into the ring at Toledo four years ago, until the start of the fourth round. Dempsey was credited with a three round knockout in gaining the championship. Dempsey's first battle in defense of his title was a three-round knockout over Billy Miske at Benton Harbor, Mich. in 1920.

Former Premier Of Greece Dead

The death is announced of Stephen Dragoumis, former Premier of Greece.

M. Dragoumis was head of the Greek cabinet in 1910, when he served also as Minister of Finance. His term as Premier came to a close within a few months, and later he was appointed Governor General of Crete.

In 1919 Dragoumis was placed under arrest, charged with treason and conspiracy in favor of Constantine.

I.O.D.E TO MEET IN TORONTO IN 1924

At the regular monthly meeting of the National Executive Committee of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, held at Toronto last Wednesday, the secretary was instructed to send a cable of sympathy from the members of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire to the women of Japan, and it was further decided to open a fund for Japanese relief—the money collected to be sent through the Red Cross Society.

The report of the annual meeting of the Victoria League, which took place in London, England, in last June, at which the Order was represented by Mrs. Arthur Pepler, was read. Miss W. Gordon, (Kingston) national educational secretary, announced the winners of the bursaries in Canadian Universities, the names of which have already been announced in the press.

The following conveners of National sub-committees were appointed: Committee on Immigration, Mrs. C.M. de Rune Finlay, Quebec; Child Welfare Committee, Miss Charlotte Whitton, Ottawa.

It was decided to hold the twenty fourth annual meeting of the National Chapter at the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, during the week of June 2-11, 1924.

The next meeting of the National Executive Committee will take place on Wednesday, October 3rd.

Ruling Given On The New Receipt Taxes

In connection with the amendment to the special war revenue act, effective on October 1st by which form letters and postcards acknowledging the payment of \$10.00 and upward become subject to the stamp tax on receipts, the following rulings have been issued by the department of customs and excise.
Counter sales slips and cash register tickets are not taxable, provided no words implying or stating acknowledging the receipt or the payment of money appears thereon.
Pay-rolls, the signature of the employee thereon being receipt for wages are taxable in respect of each such signature.
Receipts for payment of legacies are taxable; likewise a receipt for money in a deed or mortgage.
Receipts for payment of taxes, except those given to or by the Dominion government, are taxable.
Individual freight bills and periodical statements of same, acknowledging receipt of payment, are taxable.
Customs house brokers receipts are taxable.
All insurance policies, whether fire, marine, or casualty wherein the payment of money is acknowledged, are taxable.
Receipts drawn out of Canada, but not valid until countersigned in Canada, are taxable.
Voucher cheques and cheques with receipts endorsed thereon, when drawn upon or addressed to a bank, are not taxable as receipts.
Remitter's counterfoil, being a part of a taxable express money order, is not taxable as a receipt.

TRY DOCTOR ONION

Few vegetables are more useful for first aid work than the much despised onion.

For hoarseness or soreness of the chest, you cannot have a better supper than boiled onions.

Kaw onions, eaten at bed-time, will break up a heavy cold. They will also stimulate a tired person.

If stung in the mouth or throat by an insect, chew raw onion till the doctor comes. It is not necessary to swallow any of the onion; the juice has the soothing properties.

The onion is as valuable for outward application as it is for inward. In cases of burns, raw and pounded onions applied to the affected parts gives immediate relief.

An onion poultice relieves ulcerated throat and bronchitis. Boil a large onion until it drops to pieces. Strain and mash, then lay between soft muslin, and apply at once to the throat. To be effective, the poultice must be hot. Similar treatment is good for hoarseness and inflammation.

When the onion comes in contact with the eyes, the juice will not be troubled with stings, blisters or watering eyes.

GREAT PERIOD OF DEVELOPMENT

That Canada is on the verge of a great period of development, is the opinion of F.H. Richmond, of London, Eng., a director of the Hudson's Bay Company, who is in Toronto.

Mr. Richmond has just completed a tour of inspection of the company's stores in Western Canada. "I was astonished at the optimistic feeling which prevails in the west," said Mr. Richmond.

Conditions indicate that the bottom of the recent financial depression has been reached and that prosperity was not far away, he said.

Mr. Richmond was of the opinion that a bank should be established by the Dominion for the purpose of lending financial assistance to the farmers in the west. This he thought, would overcome many difficulties in the way of western Canada's progress.

THAT "PRIZE FIGHT"

To the Editor of the Advocate,
Dear Sir,
I would like to ask was there anything either Christian, respectable, or elevating or even representative of true civilization in the fight between Dempsey and Firpo? If so, I hope some man or woman, possessed of human feeling and common sense will discover it.

The Telegraph-Journal is still furnishing its readers, with the sickening details, and even eulogizing the champion "savage" in the fray. Last Friday's paper, holds him up to admiration as "the greatest fighter in the world." If all that paper said, in a previous issue is true; about the crowds in St. John, who thronged the streets and hung around its office to get the news, while the fight was going on, it only shows that some St. John people, are still wanting in the true characteristics of great manhood. The Telegraph says there are two sides to this question, and it deliberately chose to pander to the warped minds, who go crazy over such things, and even went so far as to send a representative or reporter to get all the details of the pounding and punching, of the "wild savagery" as it was exhibited. As one of the readers of that journal like many more, I had to put up with the insult.

It is a poor commentary on our twentieth century culture that about 85,000 people took the trouble of patronizing the "brutal" affair. It looks nice! About half a million dollars for the winning "brute" and over a hundred thousand for the losing one; and no doubt as tidy a sum, as the winner got, for the promoter. There is an old saying, "the devil is good to his own," but it is hardly fair to the printers who furnished the details "merely as a matter of news," that they should not have a share of the boodle too. Yes! Yes.

President Of The
Bank Of Montreal
Is Optimistic

London, Sept. 18.—Sir Vincent Meredith, President of the Bank of Montreal, has just arrived in London from France. He said he was making his annual visit to the Paris and London offices of the Bank of Montreal, and learning at first hand the conditions on this side of the Atlantic "in connection with the situation in Great Britain and on the continent."

Replying to questions Sir Vincent said: "One is liable to be drawn in to politics; I must be careful to eschew politics. I must say that I was rather surprised at the advance made by France after her experience in the war. I was pleased with the conditions there. The crops are good and what is more important the people are working hard and saving."

Sir Vincent Meredith described the conditions in Canada as satisfactory. "Trade in some lines," he said, "is spotty, but as a general rule the manufacturers are doing well. As there is a splendid crop throughout the Dominion, business should be more active this autumn. The prices for grain are regulated by the Liverpool market and they may not bring large profits to the producers but the Dominion as a whole should benefit by the size of the crop."

"Canada, like other countries is suffering from the unsettled state of Europe which is depriving her of markets. But after other great wars there have been similar conditions, we could hardly expect to escape them after the greatest of all wars. Canada's debt is a burdensome one. We shall find relief as the vast areas of fertile land now unproductive, are gradually filled. I am glad to see that increased facilities are to be given by the government for the admission of immigrants. In this connection the colonization association, backed by powerful interests, is actively and successfully promoting immigration."

"Our exports consist chiefly of foodstuffs. Until the world is able to take them in greater quantities, we must suffer as other parts of the Empire are suffering, also largely because of the depreciation of exchanges and the consequent lack of purchasing power."
"I am not pessimistic with regard to the situation in Europe, we must be patient."

PARLIAMENT HOUSE
TO BE FINISHED

Following a conference between Hon. Dr. King, Minister of Public works and John Pearson, architect for the parliament buildings, it has been arranged that work on the tower, which has been in a half finished condition for over a year, will be started early next spring and, it is expected, completed in the autumn of 1924. About 150 feet remain to be added to the tower, which will rear into the sky for some 300 feet when completed.

With completion of the tower and some interior stone carving and other interior work, the whole building will be finished. The building will have been under construction for a period covering eight years.

NEW STAMP RULES

After October 1 next, postage stamps will not be accepted for the war duty on checks, receipts, and bank drafts. Furthermore, it is announced by the post office department, the excise stamps for this purpose will not be sold at post offices. This, it is contended, would lead to confusion, as postal matter might be mailed with excise stamps instead of with the correct postal stamps. The excise stamps are to be sold at banks and such other places as may be designated by the department of customs and excise. On money orders and postal notes the war tax will continue to be paid by affixing postage stamps.

Soldier Insurance May Total \$75,000,000

If all the applications for soldier's insurance now in, become policies the total insurance out under the Government scheme for returned soldiers will amount to \$75,000,000 instead of \$31,000,000 policy holders approximately. Returns are now pretty well completed for the applications made all over the country and even outside Canada under the extension of time given last session, which expired at the first of the month. During the last four weeks of that period it was stated at the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, there had been received 11,000 applications for \$2,000,000 worth of insurance.

AUTUMN

To judge by the landscape studies chosen by artists, the autumn has more sympathy from the art world than the earlier season.

There is a decided charm in the brilliant coloring of tree and vine in the faint smell of smoke and of fallen leaves. Each of these attributes of autumn reminds us that the summer really has gone, that we are again face with the long winter months, that our wanderings will be, for a time at least, curtailed. To many this sense of restriction is a real heartbreak. They fuss and fume because they cannot jump into their car and spend the day and most of the night in the open. It is a lamentable fact that motoring, as it is today, has developed a wanderlust in a majority of people, that threatens seriously to interfere with the normal development of life in the home. People no longer stay at home, especially during the summer months when the out of doors calls seductively and the open road beckons.

Much of the old time repose has



vanished in the face of a constant activity that bids fair to do away entirely with quieter pleasures. When evening comes, we wonder what we can do to put in the time. We must go somewhere. The idea of settling down quietly to a book or some other diversion is out of the question. We feel that we may miss something if we stay at home. Others are on the quest for excitement and we must keep up with the rush.

A well known judge recently gave utterance to the opinion that motoring, dancing and the movies account in a large measure for the unrest that characterizes the young particularly—and it is true.

ALLEGED SWINDLER IS NOW IN QUEBEC

Austin H. Montgomery, Jr., president of the defunct Community Finance Company of New York, with branch offices in Baltimore and American cities, who is wanted in Baltimore to face a charge in connection with the alleged organization of blind pools through which the United States public is said to have been mulcted to the extent of \$9,000,000, is registered at the Chateau Frontenac Quebec, together with his wife, who is one of the two women lawyers of New York, and their three children.

Montgomery is living in the neighborhood, surrounded by a body guard of private detectives whose business it is to ensure him against possible kidnaping. He is wanted in various United States cities on a charge of alleged use of the mails to defraud. Alleged defalcations in the famous blind pool case are said to reach anywhere between \$3,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

Since leaving Los Angeles where he was arrested and where he promised to go to New York and reveal everything, Montgomery has been in Mexico. He crossed the border into Canada Aug. 10. No interference was offered to his entry because he had secured an extension of bail until Sept. 4. Since that time it was further extended until Sept. 17.

Smuggling Parleys Off Till November

Conferences between officials of Canada and the United States with regard to new efforts to curb liquor smuggling across the border into the United States have been postponed until November. The State Department was advised by the Consul General at Ottawa that the Canadian Minister of Customs and Excise would be absent from the capital on leave and suggested that the conference date be set for ward for November instead of October as had been previously planned. It was said at the Department that this delay was satisfactory to the United States officials.

To Boom Pinchot For Presidency

Washington, Sept. 18—Definite word reached here to-day through prominent Pennsylvania politicians that Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania was Presidential candidate, and that the movement to get a delegation for him in 1924 had started. His settlement of the coal strike is expected to be a factor in his favor. A big fight in Pennsylvania between the Pinchot forces and the Republican organization for the delegation is certain.

Governor Pinchot's candidacy may lead Senator Hiram Johnson, Governor Lowden and others to enter, thus assuring a hard fight against President Coolidge.

Home Brewers Are Fined \$50 Apiece

As a result of activity on the part of Inland Revenue Officer G.P. Stewart, three home brewers were arraigned before Magistrate Gaynor in the Police Court last week. They all pleaded guilty to the charge of unlawfully manufacturing beer without giving notice. Fines of \$50 and costs were imposed upon each of them.

Attractive Letter- heads Get Business

Inasmuch as letter writing forms one of the most important parts of the business of the supply dealer, it seems to me that it is one of the first duties of a supply dealer to make his letterheads attractive. Our own experience, as well as that of many others in the same line, has proven that the business letterhead can be made an excellent business-getter. Just recall the letters that you have received from business houses. Have not some of them been so striking as to remain in your mind and unconsciously induce you to put business in the way of those firms when the time came for you to place orders? On the other hand, have not some letterheads been somewhat repellent and given you a bad impression of the firm and its products. It is true of every supply business, and if dealers were only wide enough awake to see the importance of neat and striking letterheads, they would vastly increase their sales. The letterhead should not have anything harsh or repellent about it, but something that will cause the reader of the letter to retain in mind the firm name at the top of the letter and persuade him to do business with that firm. Unite To Maintain Atlantic Service

The White Star and Cunard lines have concluded an agreement to maintain a joint trans-atlantic service during the coming winter. This is the first combine of the sort to be arranged between two important British steamship companies. The Majestic, Berengaria, and Aquitania are the principal vessels selected to continue in service during the winter. Meanwhile the Mauretania, Olympic and Homeric will be overhauled and an effort will be made to increase the average speed of the Cunard liners above the present 26 knots. The Homeric is to be converted into an oil burner.

Here and There

Russia has more illiterates, and at the same time, more bookshops than any other country in Europe.

The largest consignment of silk from the Orient for many months, consisting of 5,500 bales, valued at \$9,000,000, formed part of the cargo of the "Empress of Russia" recently.

A shipment of silk from China, consisting of ten carloads, valued at two million dollars, went forward from Vancouver to New York under special guard over the Canadian Pacific lines recently.

The first of a series of six new seaplanes being constructed for the Canadian Government has just been delivered. The new planes are to be used in forest patrol for the prevention of destruction by fire.

Following the disastrous earthquakes and fires which devastated large areas in Japan, the Canadian Pacific liners "Empress of Canada" and "Empress of Australia" were thrown open to the accommodation of thousands of refugees, while the officers and men of the vessels did splendid work in organizing and assisting rescue parties.

The rapid increase in the export butter trade of Saskatchewan during the past year or two, has been the outstanding feature of the Provincial dairy industry. Recently the Saskatchewan Co-operative Creameries made a shipment of 25,000 lbs. of butter to China.

For almost two decades the major portion of the world's supply of cobalt has been derived from the silver-cobalt-nickel arsenides of the Cobalt district, according to figures compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The cobalt production of Canada in 1922 was 269,950 pounds, which at \$3.25 a pound, would be worth \$1,852,370.

Canada's trade within the Empire is increasing. For the twelve months ended July, Canada exported to other parts of the Empire goods amounting to \$453,437,899. This is in comparison with \$354,992,074, the figure for the corresponding twelve months previous. Imports from British Empire countries during the two twelve months' periods were: Ended July, 1923, \$195,811,190; ended July, 1922, \$153,185,581.

A wheat crop of 382,514,000 bushels is forecasted in a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The report is based upon the condition of crops at the end of July, and indicates that the Prairie Provinces will produce 357,296,000 bushels of wheat if weather conditions continue favorable. Manitoba, it is expected, will have a total wheat yield of 44,468,000 bushels; Saskatchewan 211,051,000; and Alberta 101,776,000 bushels. Alberta is the only province to show an increased yield as compared with 1922.

A party of five journalists, representing the leading newspapers of Switzerland, who recently arrived at Quebec, are the guests in Canada of E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway. They will tour the Dominion in the interests of Swiss colonization. Stops will be made at different points where Swiss people are farming, and opportunity will be given to members of the party, to converse with them and get first hand knowledge as to the desirability of Canada as a place for Swiss colonists.

In a letter on "Canada and Land Settlement," published by the Morning Post, Sir Geo. McLaren Brown, European manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, says that the agricultural salvation of Western Canada lies in mixed farming, which calls for smaller and more numerous agricultural holdings than wheat growing does, and results in closer settlement and better communication. The bigger and more densely settled the more population, the more social amenities there are and greater advantages generally, is the gist of his argument.

AMERICANS IN CANADA

There are two sides to the oft-repeated story of Canada's loss of population to the United States. In the first place, not nearly all the French-Canadians in the United States were emigrants from Canada. Thousands are children and grand-children of former Canadians who settled many decades ago in the United States. Then again few people realize how many residents of Canada today are former Americans or of American descent. The return movement to Canada, especially in the West, has been enormous. A writer in the Current History Magazine cites the figures to show how large this movement has been especially during the last twenty years. The year 1871, when the first census of the newly-federated Dominion was taken, Canada was found to have a population of 3,455,761 and of these 24,102 recorded their birth place as the United States. This was equivalent to not quite seven-tenths of one per cent of the total population. At the time of the 1901 census there were 127,899 citizens of American birth in Canada. In that of 1911 there were 303,650 representing 4.1 per cent of the total population at the time. From 1911 to 1921 a total of 748,118 citizens of the United States entered Canada, so so that at the present time there are well over 1,000,000 people in Canada who have been citizens of the United States, or something like 12 per cent of the total Dominion population.


