N. S. & T. Will Manufacture Its Own Cars Soon

N. S. & T. R. Company is to Soon Commence Making Its Own Cars

Massive Profit Now Charged For Supplying Railway With Cars Compels the Company to Make That Addition to Its Equipment—New Men Are Being Added to Personnel

The Journal learns that in the new shops which the N. S. & T. R. Co. is putting up just west of the present building on Welland Ave., cars will be manufactured.

It is of interest to the public that cars such as are run on the main cost from \$38,000 to \$40,000 and those on the local line about \$10,000.

The company considers it can make its own cars much cheaper and in order to add a car manufacturing department to its ordinary equipment that there is a tremendous profit-making is quite apparent and

it is due to the fact that a monopoly of a few concerns exists.

"There never was such an opportunity for big car shops in Canada as exists today," declared a practical man who is in the business, to a Journal man yesterday.

The N. S. & T. R. Co. is following up its appointment of W. E. Massie as mechanical superintendent with that of other important appointments, announcements of which are to be made within a few days.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., April 3.—Mrs. Mabel Office, 22 years old, of No. 278 Victoria Avenue, Niagara Falls, Ont., admitted to the Falls police and Louis Elmer, commissioner of charities, that she was the mother of Ralph Armour, the baby left on the veranda of the home of Mr. and Mrs. T. A. O'Connor, No. 553 First Street, last Saturday night, and that she had abandoned the baby. Mrs. Office made a statement to Commissioner Elmer and agreed to waive all legal claim to the child which will be adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Halliday of the Hahn Apartments, Second Street. She was released by the police.

Mrs. Office was induced by the police to come from her home in Niagara Falls, Ont., to come to police headquarters in this city with Detective George H. Callinan and James Keenan, have been working to establish the identity of the mother of the child. In the belief that the child was Canadian born, the detectives confined their search for the mother to Niagara Falls, Ont. Today they ran down a clue which led them to the home of Mrs. Office. When the detectives confronted her she broke down and confessed that she was the baby's mother and said that she abandoned it because she believed she would be unable to give it proper care.

Ninety Per Cent of The Liquor Sold in Province By Prescription

J. D. Flavelle, Chairman of the License Board, Declares That 10 Per Cent. of the Medical Profession is Bedeviling the Profession.

TORONTO, April 3.—Ninety per cent of the liquor sold in Ontario is obtained on doctor's prescriptions, J. D. Flavelle, chairman of the license board, stated to the public accounts committee of the legislature today.

"And my assumption is that from 80 to 90 per cent of these prescriptions are not necessary under the act," he continued, "I intend no imputation on the doctors of the province as a whole. Ninety per cent of the medical profession are issuing less than 10 prescriptions a month. But the ten per cent are bedeviling the profession."

Mr. Flavelle estimated that during the nine months the liquor dispensaries of the province had been under government control, they had yielded a profit of \$526,000.

Mr. Flavelle stated that the board was endeavoring to bring down the number of prescriptions. Contrary to expectations, there had been little falling off in demands for liquor, since the lapsing of the federal orders-in-council.

"If you consider that the profits from this business should not be placed in the general fund, you might

ear-mark it for some such cause as mother's pensions," said Mr. Flavelle. "There are no persons more entitled to the money."

In reply to questions by Mr. Dewart, Mr. Flavelle admitted that the board occasionally paid volunteer informers for information which led to convictions. As a general rule, such informers were not called to give evidence in the courts. Amounts paid were generally from \$20 to \$25, he stated.

Hartley Dewart, opposition leader, observed that liquor supplied by the license board was supposed to be for sacramental medicinal or commercial purposes, and asked if the board did not consider that it might be well to supply it, for these purposes at the lowest possible cost?

Mr. Flavelle—"Our intention is to supply it at very little over cost to doctor's and druggists, and to make other persons pay a fair profit."

Questioned by Mr. Dewart, Mr. Flavelle intimated that was quite satisfied with the qualifications of General Manager Cleveland and Secretary R. H. Birmingham, who controlled the government liquor agencies.

Women Picket Embassy in U.S.

SYMPATHIZERS WITH IRISH INDEPENDENCE PARADE IN WASHINGTON STREETS

ANTI-BRITISH BANNERS

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Efforts of the State Department to have the Washington Police authorities break up the picketing of the British Embassy by women favoring an Irish Republic failed. The police said that in the light of the decision of the Federal Courts in the case of the Suffragists who picketed the White House two years ago, they were powerless to act unless there was disorder.

No Complaint Made.

The women began the picketing this morning. A dozen of them marshaled up and down the sidewalk in front of the Embassy on Connecticut avenue, displaying banners criticizing the British Government. This fact was brought to the attention of the State Department and officials immediately conferred with the District of Columbia Commissioners and police authorities.

It was stated that the British Embassy made no complaint.

The women undertook a demonstration at the Capitol yesterday, but were turned away by the Capitol police. Before going there they staged an impromptu demonstration on Pennsylvania avenue opposite the White House.

NEXT WINTER'S HARD COAL SUPPLY WILL COST ONTARIO AT LEAST \$17 A TON, SAYS HARRINGTON

Next winter's hard coal supply, in the opinion of Fuel Commissioner H. A. Harrington, will cost Ontario at least \$17 per ton. The prevailing price is \$14; the miner's demands, if acceded to, will add \$1.50 to that; the railway companies declare they must have another \$1 per ton for haulage, and the coal dealers have been making nothing at present retail prices.

Last night the Fuel Commissioner quite agreed with an opinion that Ontario was nearing the end of the coal road. He could foresee no condition which would ever again bring down coal prices. On the other hand, he foresaw plenty which would send

prices still higher. "The only way out," he said, "is for Ontario to procure substitutes. The day of over-production in coal is gone."

Miners Take Holidays

Mr. Harrington did not care to prophesy the outcome of the present miners' ultimatum. Thursday the miners holidayed in commemoration of the establishment of the eight-hour day; yesterday they holidayed because it was Good Friday. Today if they work, it will be for only half a day. But they have agreed, through their representatives, to remain at work until the Commission has decided a new wage scale. The miners ask a

sixty per cent. increase and declare they absolutely will not work without wage increases of at least 45-7-10 per cent.

"The fuel situation is not what one might call serious in Ontario now," Mr. Harrington stated, "but all stocks are absolutely depleted because of the abnormal winter through which we have just passed. A strike at the mines now would make things mighty serious in Ontario next winter. Those who are demanding their next winter's supply of coal now should realize that there are many families without coal and they require a little for the chilly spring weather."

Charles G. Richards Dies After Receiving 12,000 Volts Electricity

Charles G. Richards who early in the week, while walking in the Power House of the Thorold Beaver Board, received 12,000 volts of electricity through his body, died on Thursday night at the General and Marine Hospital. The poor fellow's body was in terrible shape, being literally roasted alive.

A POSSIBLE DANGER

Though the law requires that the Board of Education should have a medical man to visit the schools and look after the children, and though it also permits other expenditures that may or may not be necessary, it is nevertheless a waste of public money for a municipality the size of St. Catharines to engage two medical health officers, one for the city generally and the other for the schools. One man should be able to do the work and a thousand dollars a year of the people's taxes thereby be saved.

In providing other features for the schools the Board is doing what it no doubts feels to be modern and requisite for the welfare and advancement of pupils, but is there not a danger that the boy and girl of today may be unconsciously taught that there is an easy and pleasant road to learning? Is it not possible that the old principle that hard work and again hard work was the only key to academic success may be supplanted with the notion that moving pictures, and other frills will do the trick?

Times may have changed but in earlier days education was not made a luxury.

EDITORIAL NOTES

The appointment of Sir Hamar Greenwood to be chief Secretary for Ireland is another example of the way in which Canadians forge ahead when they go abroad. Sir Hamar is an old Whitley boy, a former student at the University of Toronto, and an aggressive publicist. The problem he has now undertaken needs a strong heart and mind.

The letter from Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals, published in The Journal this week, should be the basis of some kind of action on the part of the City Council. Whether the Hydro takes over the N. S. & T. or not, now or in the distant future, St. Catharines needs railway extensions and can get them at no direct cost to the citizens. More rails and a new station, three hundred more houses and a close study of the city's economic condition are three of the outstanding problems with which an organization such as the Chamber of Commerce should deal.

PROTECTING HUMAN LIVES

The Ontario Safety League continues to place a large amount of literature in the hands of motorists, school children, industrial workers, and others throughout the Province. In the first three months of 1920 the League has distributed an enormous amount of safety material, including 35,000 industrial safety bulletins; 32,400 school safety bulletins; 8,500 special bulletins; 8,500 traffic bulletins; 2,700 electric railway bulletins; 150,000 motorist's safety book-marks; 10,200 health bulletins; 6,500 news letters; 9,000 safety calendars; 12,000 leaflets to the "new man"; 125,000 gummed seals; 3,000 safety cards and posters.

The League will hold an annual meeting in Toronto, beginning Tuesday, April 13th at the King Edward Hotel.

PAINT LENGTHENS LIFE OF BUILDINGS AND MACHINES

Many an old ship has stood the racket of ocean travel for years main-

ly on the strength of the tar or paint applied to her sides, but sailors do not wait for the ship's hull to become weather beaten before applying the first coat of paint. Farmers, on the other hand, seem much inclined to let their buildings reach a state of partial decay before making any special effort to safeguard them against the play of wind and water. The farmer's neighbors as well as the passing observer, will judge him largely by the care he takes of his stock, his machinery, and his buildings.

With spring approaching, the time has arrived for going the rounds of the machine shed to lick out these articles that can be moved to a warm building for retouching with paint in addition to their annual overhauling and repair.

MAINE GOVERNOR TO USE STATE MONEY TO FIGHT RHODE ISLAND WETS

AUGUSTA, ME., April 3—Chief Justice Cornish of the main supreme court today denied a motion for a temporary injunction to restrain Governor Milliken from opposing the plea of Rhode Island in the states action to test the constitutionality of the prohibition amendment in the United States supreme court.

The finding was in the suit of Winifred S. Reed of Bangor, a member of the legislature, who sought to prevent the use of state funds by the governor in the employment of Charles E. Hughes of New York as counsel in opposition to the Rhode Island proceedings.

HUGE STILLS GRABBED

NEW YORK, April 3—Two fully equipped 50-gallon stills, three with a capacity of 500 gallons each, two tons of mash, and fifteen barrels of whiskey were seized by Captain Wm. Allen, Jr., federal prohibition director for Brooklyn, and a squad of six men in a raid on a house in the borough of Queens yesterday.

Captain Allen said the condition of the stills indicated they had been in operation for more than a year. Dominico Pippie and Mareuri Dominello were arrested and held on a charge of violating the Volstead act.

"There's all kind of ice," say officials of Toronto ice companies, when they were asked as to the supply for the coming year. One company estimated that 20 per cent. more was harvested this year than a year ago. It was a mighty cold winter for the men whose duty it was to gather in the harvest. It does not require much imagination on the part of the average citizen to understand that. The employees went out to work took a whirl at the harvest field, began to shiver, and rushed back to the fire. As a consequence, though much more ice was harvested, the cost of getting it into the ice company's warehouses increased, so officials say. So probably reductions in prices are not to be looked for.

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

on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

Dominion of Canada
Department of Finance
ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
- 2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
- 3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

Address INSPECTOR OF TAXATION, HAMILTON, ONT.

R. W. BREADNER, Commissioner of Taxation.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.



CANADA'S AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Throughout Canada there is one automobile for every twenty-five people, the Dominion in this respect taking only second place to the United States, where there is one to every fifteen persons. Since the introduction of the car into Canada, the industry has made phenomenal strides. Just how remarkable the growth has been may be realized from the fact that whereas in 1905 in all the breadth of the Dominion there were but 220 car owners, in 1919 the number of registrations totalled 324,886. By provinces the registration of cars is as follows: Ontario, 139,283; Saskatchewan, 54,732; Alberta, 34,000; Quebec, 24,183; Manitoba, 29,143; British Columbia, 19,500; Nova Scotia, 9,900; New Brunswick, 3,061; Prince Edward Island, 939.

At the present time the sum of \$50,000,000 is invested in the Canadian motor industry, and its various lines account for the employment of more than 15,000 people. The estimated aggregate sale of cars in Canada last year was over \$100,000,000 and expert investigation has elicited the probability of a 35 per cent increase over these figures for the year 1920.

Ontario Canada's Motor Province.
Ontario is the motor province of Canada in manufactures as well as ownership. Windsor, with its surrounding communities of Walkerville and Ford City, Oshawa and Toronto are the most important manufacturing towns. The Ford Motor Company at Walkerville employs 3,470 employees at the home office. The plant covering 3 acres. The recently completed plants of the Canadian Products, Ltd., division of the General Motors of Canada, constructed at Walkerville, cost \$6,000,000. Other large plants in the Windsor district are Maxwell's and the Studebaker Corporation, in addition to which there is a large number of plants turning out accessories and automobile parts. At Oshawa, the General Motors Corporation of Canada has three large plants, where McLaughlin, Chevrolet and Oldsmobile cars are manufactured. Last year between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 was spent in this town on extensions and improvements in connection with the industry. In Toronto the Willys-Overland is the principal plant, whilst London, Chatham, Kitchener, Hamilton and Brockville are also interested in the manufacture. Montreal, in Quebec, is also largely interested in motor industries.

Imports and Exports.
Canada is largely interested in both the import and export of automobiles. In 1919 the imports of cars, parts and accessories amounted to \$12,201,119, while exports for the same period were valued at \$10,859,234. The imports were practically all from the United States. The growth of the export trade can be seen from a comparison with the figures of 1917 and 1918 which were \$3,210,120 and \$4,418,976 respectively. Australia was the Dominion's best buyer last year the Commonwealth buying \$2,440,000 worth of cars. New Zealand came next with \$1,185,000, then the United Kingdom, \$721,000 and India \$664,000. Turkey took freight automobiles to the value of \$321,023, exports to the United States totalled \$329,068, mainly parts, and to the Argentine Republic \$552,460.

The British preferential tariff which went into effect on September 1st, 1919, is expected to impart a considerable stimulus to the Canadian automobile industry. It grants preference of one-third provided that not more than 25 per cent of the labor on the finished car shall have been done within the British Empire.


**COMMISSIONER HIGGINS

Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a force

At a meeting of the joint industrial committee of Welland Board of Trade and the City Council on Monday evening it was decided to engage George Day, sales manager of M. Bentley & Sons, Limited, as industrial commissioner at a salary of \$350 per month, beginning at the first of May. Mr. Day will be given an office in the city hall and will also act as secretary of the Board of Trade.

There came very near, being a vacancy in the Welland council on Tuesday, when a Michigan Central freight truck a limousine owned and driven by Alderman S. L. Lambert. The car still lies by the railroad crossing on South Main Street in a badly dilapidated condition. One side is completely stove in and on the other the wheel is in kindling wood. How Ald. Lambert came through himself without even a puncture is like a miracle.

Word has been received here that F. W. Throp who at one time was superintendent of the power house at DeCew Falls—had been drowned at Lima, Peru.

CANADIAN MILLING INDUSTRY

The Canadian milling industry has, since 1914, made progressive strides and flour exports between that year and 1919 increased nearly five times. Today this business has an annual capacity of slightly more than 35,000,000 barrels a year and new mills are being continually added. In 1920 Canada exported 115,099 barrels of flour valued at \$621,334. By 1919 this had increased to 316,128 barrels valued at \$1,509,000. In the fiscal year of 1919, 9,156,806 barrels were milled at a value of \$39,536,656.

Great Britain has been by far Canada's best customer for flour, her imports from the Dominion of this commodity, for the last fiscal year, being equal to about 60 per cent of the total, or \$56,000,000 out of nearly \$100,000,000.

Exports by countries for the last year were as follows:—Great Britain \$56,270,225; United States \$39,794; British South Africa \$17,309; Newfoundland \$3,471,527; British West Indies \$6,329,527; Other countries \$34,147,750.

The Trade returns for the present fiscal year show that, as yet, the exports of flour are holding their own, though the European countries are again engaged in grain growing and milling. In the last available period of five months 4,228,154 barrels of flour were exported, as compared with 4,461,313 in the same period in 1918. Of these 3,972,405 barrels went to the United Kingdom; 22,227 to British Guiana; 145,594 to the British West Indies; 257,845 to France; 100,182 to Greece; 55,735 to Italy; 23,109 to Newfoundland; and 22,202 barrels to other countries. Great Britain took a little more than 3,000,000 more barrels than she did in the same period in 1918, and 3,500,000 more than in 1917. Other countries of the milling industry took, during the same period, the following figures:—oatmeal \$4,032,587; rye \$4,245,229; bran, etc. \$1,582,312.

What accounts for the change of conditions in Europe, the export trade may fall off considerably, the Canadian milling industry by reason of its activity produced during the war is in a very strong position, and should be able to hold its own in the period of competition which is undoubtedly ahead.

GRANTS ANNUAL PASSES.

C. P. R. Encourages Loyalty in Service.

The C.P.R., to encourage loyalty in service, and recognize the principle of co-operation has, through the president, Mr. E. W. Beatty, announced a new departure which will, doubtless, be much appreciated. This is the granting of annual passes to officers and employees of their wives under the following classifications:

Employee on a general superintendent's district, who has had continuous service for a period of not less than ten years, will be granted an annual pass good over district on which employed.

Such employee, who has had continuous service for twenty years and over, will be allowed annual pass good over eastern or western lines upon whichever employed. Employee of any other department of the service will enjoy the same privilege as above, stating the territory over which pass is desired. Head office employees who have had fifteen years' service will receive annual passes over eastern or western lines where employed. Women employees are to be treated the same as men in this connection. This action expresses the policy of the C.P.R. to aim at the contentment and loyalty of the employees of whom there is an army of 60,000 at present, including all classes.

The Pension Fund, gift of the company, was the thought of Lord Shaughnessy. The employees contribute nothing. Already the operation of the fund has wrought the greatest benefit. The effect of it has been to increase the contentment and loyalty of the employees, to give the sense of mutual co-operation, and to stimulate the general purpose and interest of the company. There are many all over the system on the Pension Fund, which offers protection in declining years. Millions of dollars are involved in the operation of the fund since its inauguration.

MOTHERS PRAY THAT BABIES MIGHT DIE

Suffering Among Jews is So Bad That Death Alone Gives Relief.

Mothers begging for death to relieve their children's suffering, was the most tragic thing seen by Leo Wolfson, New York attorney and journalist, in seven weeks spent in Roumania, Galicia, Bessarabia and Bukowina. Mr. Wolfson, who has just returned to New York, made the trip in order to study political conditions in these countries.

"There are one and one-half million Jews in this section of Eastern Europe who are in immediate want," declared Mr. Wolfson. "In every town I visited, I saw starving, naked Jews stretching out their hands to passers-by for a piece of bread."

"They hardly look like human beings. All one sees are living skeletons, covered with yellow skin. The children are small, worn-out, frightened, little creatures, who just drag themselves aimlessly around. How they will live through the winter, no one knows. No one can begin to describe this picture of misery and want. But one can get an idea of it, knowing that mothers are actually praying that death take their children, to relieve their terrible suffering."

That there is a considerable amount dissatisfaction in the city over theatory manner in which the street highway situation is being handled at the obvious efforts of the Standard newspaper seconded by the mayor becloud the real issue, is quite apparent today from what one hears in the street.

The remark of Mayor Lovelace, at least according to The Standard reported to be his, with reference to a letter "purporting to have been sent by Hon Dr Reid to former Mayor" is not taken very kindly. The "purported insinuation" that the Mayor might be a myth, is looked upon as a "purporting to have the dignity of a man who occupies the honorable position of chief magistrate.

The Mayor has accused the Toronto Standard of misstating the facts which says the city is in a quandary. This is the position according to the news of business men and citizens generally. There is decided unrest as to the future of the railways, and Sam Beck says he will take it over and make it part of the hydro radio system. D. B. Hanna, head of the National Railways says the N. S. & T. Ry. will not be handed over to Beck. Dr. Reid says no recent negotiations have occurred between the two forces. The citizens don't know what will happen.

As a matter of fact the road is to be operating on certain streets of St. Catharines without a franchise. People Know That it was not necessary for Mayor Lovelace or The Standard to tell the citizens that application has been made to the Hydro to take over the N.

Create Discom The People Lead

GENEVA, April 5.—New instructions issued by Lenin, Bolshevist Premier of Russia, to all radical and Communist leaders in Europe and America have been revealed to your correspondent by a trustworthy informant fully initiated in the secrets of Russian Soviet diplomacy. In these instructions which hthrow a dazzling light on many recent events and developments, the Bolshevist Premier draws the general lines to be followed by his adherents everywhere to bring about a world revolution.

To Foment Unrest The main theme is a minute and systematic plan of creating and stimulating discontent not only among the workers but more particularly among the middle classes of citizens opposed to Bolshevism, that the latter may be placed to a state of irresolution or pathetic indifference, excluding any opinion when the Red minorities speak.

As the most effective means of spreading universal discontent, Lenin especially advocates the introduction of Socialistic legislation into a democratic State. Bolshevist leaders in Europe and America are urged to demand and support all legislative measures calculated to cause friction among the public and certain classes of it.
