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

Vaccination Kills Germs - British Army Man Discovers Serum Which Reduces Death Rate 90 Per Cent.

New York, Sept. 22.-The typhoid rror is a thing of the past. So declare the medical men of the American army, who have adopted vaccination to wipe out that scourge of nafrom the disease was first used by the British army, who fought the fierce ayages of cholera in India with the me principle. Its success in cholera ed Sir Almorth E. Wright to make a erum for typhoid which he tried on wo men who afterwards proved immune. Statistics prove the death rate has been reduced 90 per cent.

Figures Prove Success.

Then the American army took it up. n the last eighteen months twelve housand men of Uncle Sam's army ave been vaccinated for typhoid fever. of these twelve thousand, only three nen have since been attacked by the readed scourge, and these slightly. There has not been a death from the lisease in the whole number. In every other block of the army conaining twelve thousand men there have been seventy-two cases of typhoid in the same time and seven leaths. In the fifty thousand unvacinated there have been three hundred ases and thirty deaths.

Secret of Vaccination.

The secret of the vaccination busiess lies in capturing the germs of he disease, killing them to prevent overactivity, and then placing them he blood. This arouses the system of he individual and it produces an anitoxin for the disease in questionhat is, produces something to fight hat disease.

When one has smallpox or typholany such disease, it ravages the vstem until that system developes he elements that will counteract it. hen these elements are developed e disease is met by an equal or conuering force and is able to make no orther headway. The patient is then nmune. Vaccination is only a fire larm to the system and starts it to leveloping the needed antitoxin in ad-

Process Not Dangerous.

This vaccination is not to be comared in severity with that for small ox. The patient has entirely recoverwithin a day. There is some inammation at the point of inoculation nd this is fully developed within 12 ours. For a day the patient feels as ough he were going to have the tippe or cold or some other milder lments. He may have a slight chill adache or suffer slight nausea. This sually lasts only two or three hours nd all symptoms disappear within a ay. There are never any serious efcts of the vaccination. The medical rofession of the world has observed all some eighty thousand vaccin ions. In no one of these has there een any injury or fatality. There is othing whatever to fear in the pro-




